



State Journal Rushes Names of Survivors to '40-Mile Zone' Parents

"Hello! This is The Wisconsin State Journal at Madison. We are glad to inform you that your son, who was on board the Tuscania, is one of the survivors! He's safe and sound in England! Congratulations!"

This was the joyful news sent out by telephone and telegraph to scores of anxious mothers and fathers living "within 40 miles of the capitol" as fast as the names of the survivors came in over the United Press wires yesterday.

Many of these heart-stricken mothers and fathers living in Beaver Dam, Reedsburg, Kilbourn, Baraboo and other neighboring towns and cities received the first intimation of "their boy's" safety from The Wisconsin State Journal.

Mothers Cry With Joy

In most cases they were unable to express more than a feeble thanks, their joy in receiving the hoped-for message leaving them unable to say more. Many of them who have undergone the terrible strain of doubt regarding their son's well-being broke down and cried when the message was delivered to them.

It was last Wednesday when these mothers and fathers were stunned by the news that flashed over the land—the torpedoing of the transport Tuscania, carrying nearly 2,500 American troops, by a German submarine off the coast of Ireland. The first reports had it that more than a thousand of these men, most of whom belonged to Wisconsin and Michigan regiments, had perished.

Frantic Appeals for News

Since that time the agony they have gone thru has been such as only a mother can feel. The days have passed as months. Their frantic appeals to Washington for news were unavailing for the government could not give out any list until it had checked up on the names of the rescued and compared it with the sailing list.

And so they were left in utter ignorance regarding the safety of their sons. All that they knew was that the boat had gone down—the prey of a German torpedo—that their boy, the fellow who left home only a short time ago with

hope, they had waited and waited anxiously for days for any bit of news.

At exactly 12:02 yesterday afternoon, The State Journal received word from the United Press that the names of the survivors would be released two days earlier than was at first anticipated—and a short time later they began coming in over the wire. The first name received was that of Henry Albert of New York City.

Kilbourn Man Notified

The first one to be notified by The State Journal was Henry Tolleth of Kilbourn. At approximately 2 p. m., The State Journal informed Mr. Tolleth that his son—Hale Robert Tolleth—was one of the survivors.

"Oh, thank you! Thank you!" he said, his voice trembling.

A short time later The Journal called up Mrs. Ira Schultze of Waterloo and informed her that her son had been one of those who had been saved.

"I'm so very glad, so very glad," she repeated over and over. "Thank you ever so much!" and she broke down and wept—for joy.

Earl LeRoy Powell of Baraboo was landed safely in Ireland and he immediately sent a cable to his father who notified the families of Donald M. Duncan and Arthur F. Bender. One of the entire list notified by The State Journal, the Powell family was the only one that had received direct word.

Mrs. Emma Thayer of Reedsburg, whose son, Arthur H., joined the service some time ago, was one of the mothers who have been breathlessly awaiting news from her boy. She was deeply appreciative of The State Journal's service.

"Thank you, thank you," she said over the wire, "nothing could please me better."

And so it was down the entire list.

All thru the day and most of the night, The State Journal received messages from anxious mothers and fathers and brothers and sisters for word regarding the missing.



Settlement Houses Sprouted in Response to Desperate Need (Part I)

Excerpt:

In the early days of the settlement house movement, the entire East Side was carpeted with teeming tenements interspersed with factories. In the Lenox Hill area the factories included a confectioners, a cigar factory, a steam laundry, a storage and carpet cleaning company, and the Long Island Pickle Works. Where the United Nations stands today, there were slaughter houses and tanning factories. The majority of the residents were Italians, along with Bohemians, Slavs, Irish, Jews and Germans. Men worked in the hotels or factories, or as laborers, porters, carpenters, and painters, while women found work in the cigar factories or laundries, or washed and cleaned for private families. A 1919 investigation found that they "find little time for rest or recreation; the proper stimulus for developing them physically and mentally is noticeably lacking."

This report lamented that the factories emitted "steam and noxious odors," that they were noisy and cut off light and sunshine, causing some tenement dwellers to live in perpetual darkness. It also complained about the continual traffic of trucks, wagons, autos etc. driving over 1st Avenue's cobbles, and the additional noise created by the elevated trains on Second Avenue. The emerging picture is one of desperation and deprivation as over-crowding in dismal quarters is darkened by landlord exploitation.


