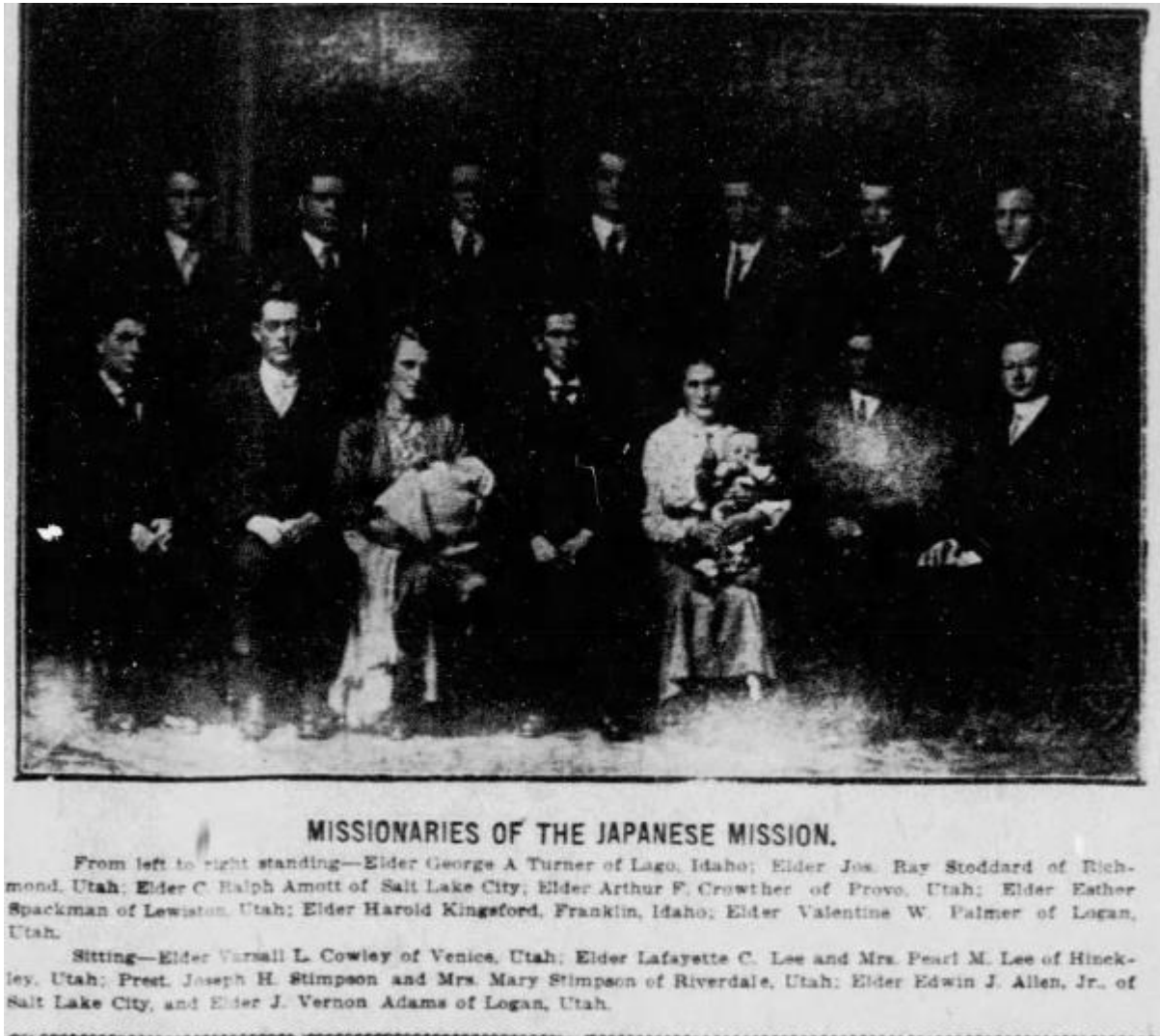

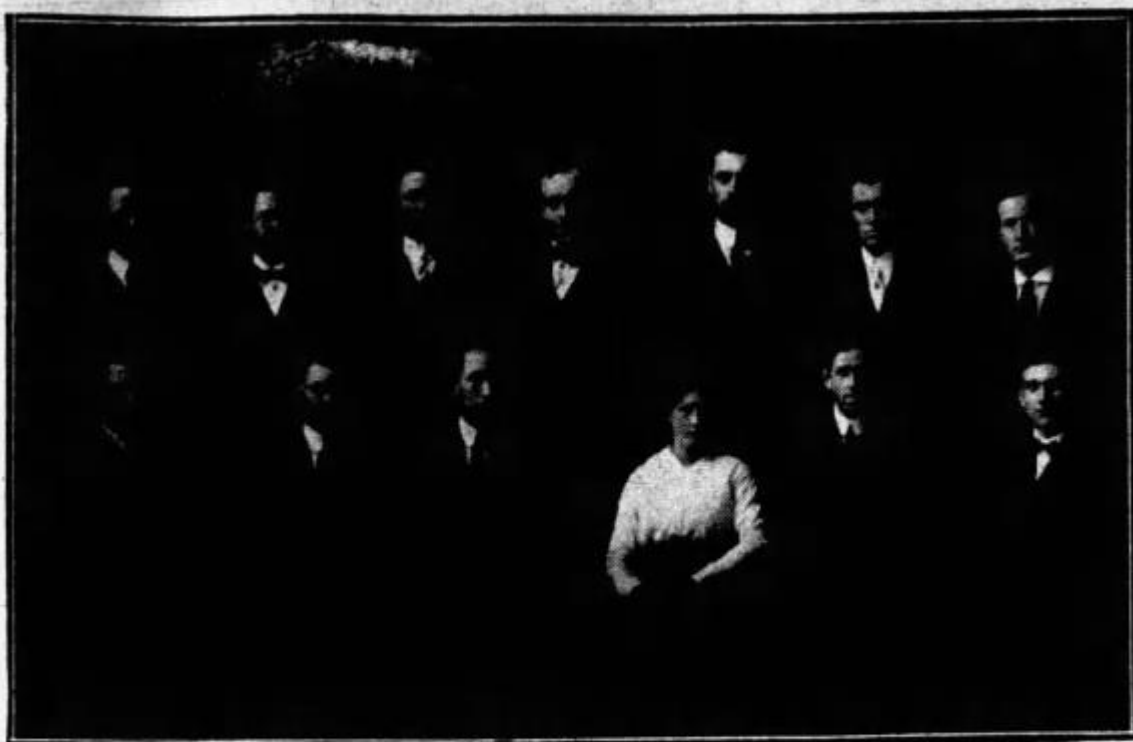

SAPPORO CONFERENCE.

Elder Edwin J. Allen in reporting the Sapporo conference said: We have not done a great deal of tracting the last year as I have felt that our tracting has not brought forth results. Everything has been on the increase in Sapporo, except the Japanese Bible class, which is not so well attended as formerly, but we feel that those who do come are really in earnest and are seeking for the truth. The Saints' meeting is not so well attended as we should like to be. Mrs. Kumigai takes a good interest in the Sunday school. Elder Noguchi also helps in the Sunday school. In Toyohira we have a rival Sunday school next door but we are keeping our students and seem to be gaining all the time. One sister's husband has become more lenient and the sister can now come to church and do her duty. Elder Ito was somewhat put

out about something for a while, yet by the efforts of Pres. Ivins he has now become diligent once more and is helping us with the work as best he can. One of the investigators is now translating Keeler's "Lesser Priesthood," which will probably be finished this coming summer. The investigators seem to be coming around very well, and as a whole our work for the coming year looks prosperous.

Elder George A. Smith.

The First Presidency having urged that all the Elders become thoroughly familiar with the literature they distribute, it was deemed necessary, for the benefit of the younger elders who ~~cannot as yet read Japanese, for the~~ older elders to give, in English, the contents of the literature now being distributed among the people.

Elder Amasa W. Clark spoke on Tract No. 1, "The Road to Salvation."

Elder Arthur F. Crowther spoke on Tract No. 2, "The True and Living God."

After singing, Elder Edwin J. Allen dismissed the meeting by prayer.

Edwin John Allen was born 5 October, 1892. His parents were Edwin John Allen and Sarah Delilah Varney. Shortly after graduation from high school, Edwin was called on a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, to serve as a missionary in Japan. In 1916, Edwin was called into the military, and sent to England. He was aboard the *Tuscania*, headed toward Ireland, when it was sunk by German fire. Thereafter, Edwin was sent to the Occidental University to learn Morse code. He was serving as a telegraph officer when the armistice was signed. After the war, when he returned to Salt Lake City, Edwin married Dessie Duke 18 March, 1920. Their children were Maxine, Lucile, Tom, Marjorie, Jeanne, and John. In 1932, the family moved to Fresno, California. Edwin's Japanese skills proved useful to him during his time as a first lieutenant in the navy. He was called into "the service" for the second time in 1942, because of his language ability. His first responsibility was the interrogation of prisoners, and later attended the surrender ceremonies in Japan.

History

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints first sent missionaries to Japan in 1901. Although political tension closed the Japan Mission between 1924 and 1948, members of the Church continued to practice their faith, share the gospel, and build the Church in Japan. When the Church returned to Japan at the end of World War II, a small group of faithful Japanese converts, few having been baptized, were found meeting together regularly.

It is unclear when LDS missionaries in Japan began using similar picture shows, but by 1910 they were employing them often. That year mission president Elbert D. Thomas disclosed that Marriott S. Marriott had traveled throughout Hokkaido. “He has taken with him a magic lantern, with a full set of life of Christ pictures, pictures of the Prophet Joseph Smith, and some of other Church leaders, temples and scenes from Utah, and hundreds of tracts and books.”⁵⁸ Thomas then related that Marriott had success with his magic lantern. In one Ainu village about one hundred adults and a number of children gathered to watch the lantern pictures and then visited for two hours about religion.⁵⁹ Edwin J. Allen Jr. also described how he and his companions in Hokkaido showed moving picture exhibitions on gospel themes such as the life of Christ. One missionary provided background organ music; another operated the magic lantern projection machine; a third lectured on the images being

presented to the audience. They held these presentations in the evenings when it was dark so the machine would project a good picture.⁶⁰

While the Japanese in the American West bore the brunt of the conflict, Americans in East Asia were occasional targets for reprisal. During the summer of 1907 the relationship between the two Pacific powers strained over the “Japanese Question” in California. The LDS missionaries in Japan felt the backlash. John L. Chadwick, stationed in Sendai, peppered his journal entries with short statements describing the unrest that June. “As the people feel very indignant over the affair in America we thought of not going out tracting but after thinking it over we decided to go out and see what we could do.”⁶³ The following week

he noted in three separate journal entries that the Japanese newspapers had printed numerous articles about the treatment of Japanese immigrants in California, and [they] were stirring up the Japanese against all Americans.⁶⁴ His companion, Daniel P. Woodland, wrote the following in a letter home: “We are making a few friends, and distributing our literature freely in all parts of the city. However, the people are somewhat indifferent towards Christianity, and we find it very hard to get into their homes. The Japanese question in America has caused some animosity here.”⁶⁵ In 1913 the state of California passed the Alien Land Law, which prevented Japanese residents from owning property.⁶⁶ “Japanese all stirred up about Calif. Land Laws,” Edwin J. Allen noted in his journal.⁶⁷

Dessie Duke Allen writes:

My husband served in World Wars I and II. In the first World War in the Army he was attached to the Air division. He was a survivor of the S. S. Tuscania torpedoed Feb. 15, 1918. Prior to the war he served four years as an L.D.S. missionary in Japan.

In the second World War he offered his knowledge of the Japanese language to the Navy. His duties included the establishment of a prisoner of war interrogation division of Naval Intelligence in Washington, D. C.

He was assigned to Adm. Halsey's flag ship in the 3rd Fleet on the U. S. S. Missouri as interpreter and interrogator of Japanese Naval Officers in preliminary arrangements for the surrender of the Japanese.

Page 70:

He acted as interpreter at the surrender ceremony on the U. S. S. Missouri, and was attached to the staff of Adm. Balentine at General MacArthur's headquarters in Tokyo as interrogator of Japanese government officials. He was with other interrogators representing the Army Intelligence Department and the State Department. Upon completion he resigned his commission as Lt. Commander to return to civilian life.

After establishing a small business for his sons to operate, he enrolled in a Law School which offered day and night classes. He graduated in 1952 from the Lincoln University with an LLB degree at the age of sixty years and at the present time is employed as a legal secretary and investigator.

Utahns Anxiously Await Names of Illfated Soldiers

A widespread feeling of apprehension for the safety of young men of Utah, thought to have been members of units of the ill-fated transport, torpedoed off the Irish coast, today caused many inquiries from anxious relatives and friends in this city.

Uncertainty as to the whereabouts of many young men who were known to have been at camps on the Atlantic seaboard awaiting transportation to Europe, added to the anxiety of Salt Lake people, who all day have been trying to get messages through to authorities who might assure them of the safety of the men.

Two Utah soldiers are known to have been members of a unit on the transport. These were William C. Clive, Jr., son of Prof. W. C. Clive, and Edwin J. Allen, Jr., son of Edwin J. Allen, a foreman in the Z. C. M. I. shoe factory. Both young men are members of the 100th aero squadron. Up to noon today, no definite word had been received by the parents or through news dispatches concerning Clive and Allen.

Edwin J. Allen, Jr., enlisted last summer. He is 25 years of age and prior to his enlistment was an employee of the Smith-Faus Drug company.

TO DATE there are four known Salt Lake survivors of the Cunarder Tuscania, the army transport which was torpedoed off the coast of Ireland. These are Lieutenant Renwick S. McNiece of 1148 Blaine avenue, field artillery, unattached; William C. Clive, Jr., 116 North State street, mechanic in aviation; Edwin J. Allen, Jr., 355 Kensington avenue, in aviation, and Raymond D. Smith, 188 J street, in the non-flying section of the signal corps.

Lieutenant McNiece is a graduate of Princeton and taught mathematics and Latin at West high school. He graduated from the second Presidio training camp in field artillery, but was unassigned to any particular unit at the time of the disaster. His mother and other relatives were overjoyed over his escape.

William C. Clive, Jr., is the son of Professor and Mrs. William Clive. He enlisted in the aviation department of the regular army as a master mechanic and went to the Pacific coast for intensive training. He is 31 years of age and was formerly employed by the Utah Motor company. Mr. Clive's younger brother recently enlisted as a musician in the Forty-third infantry when that unit was stationed at Fort Douglas.

Edwin J. Allen, Jr., 25 years of age, enlisted last July in the aviation branch of the signal service, and was first assigned to Fort Douglas. He went to Kelly field, San Antonio, Texas, and was in training there for about six weeks. Then he was forwarded to Mineola, L. I. He there attended aviation school No. 1. Just before sailing he was placed in charge of squad No. 11.



Young Allen is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin J. Allen of the Z. C. M. L., and the family home is at 355 Kensington avenue. A brother, Stanley L. Allen, is now in training at Kelly field, and, according to the father, is "ready to go forward like his brother."

There was some question in the mind of the father of Lieutenant Smith last night as to whether or not his son was

actually aboard the transport. He had one telegram from Senator Reed Smoot stating that Raymond D. Smith was not among those who sailed on the transport. Another telegram stated that Raymond Smith was among those rescued.

Lieutenant Smith is now attached to the signal corps. He was formerly quartermaster's sergeant of the Utah field artillery and during his connection with that organization was one of the best known and liked non-commissioned officers in the regiment. He is 24 years of age, the son of Mr. and Mrs. T. C. S. Smith, 188 J street, Salt Lake City. His last position was with the Salt Lake & Utah railroad at Provo.

Lieutenant Smith graduated with the degree of A. B. from the University of Utah in 1916. He was prominent in school activities and athletics. At the university he was a member of the Commercial club, Forensic club, manager of football, athletic council business assistant, advertising manager of the Utah Chronicle and charter member of the Phi Alpha Epsilon society. He trained with the officers of the Utah light field artillery at Jordan Narrows and was selected to train at the second officers' training camp at the Presidio, from which he graduated with the rank of second lieutenant, November 24, 1917.

SALT LAKER ON TUSCANIA TELLS OF RESCUE FROM SEA

Edwin J. Allen, Jr., Is Aided While Struggling
in Water by William C. Clive, Jr.,
Also Local Man.

THE following letter from Edwin J. Allen, Jr., a member of the 100th aero squadron, who was on board the Tuscania when it was struck by a torpedo, was received by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Allen, 355 Kensington avenue. The "Bill" Clive referred to in Allen's letter is William C. Clive, Jr., son of Professor W. C. Clive of Salt Lake:

England, February 19, 1918.

Dear Folks: This is about the third letter I have started to write to you, and before I could finish it something came up and I never could get it off. I know you are anxious about me, especially when you heard of the terrible experience we had off the Irish coast, last Tuesday night. I could make a very thrilling letter of this, but I must be careful of mentioning anything that would help the kaiser.

I have had my first experience with "Fritz," as the British call him, and the experience has put the fighting and winning "pop" into every one of us to get even.

The Tuscania was a large liner, comparatively new, I understand. We were quartered in the steerage part of the ship; the first and sec-

ond-class rooms being occupied by the officers and first-class sergeants and the men who were working on the ship as waiters and cooks. On account of being the first to embark we were put in the bow of the ship, which we occupied all the way across, except the last day or two, when they changed us to a place much lower, about midship. They were going to put some sick fellows in the place we had.

Soldiers Felt Safe.

We didn't sail for Europe the day we embarked, but proceeded to another port, where I saw the remains of that terrible explosion, that you heard of some time ago this winter. Quite a large number of ships sailed with us as escorts, and we felt quite safe. The sea was rough and heavy some days and every time she "ducked", the men, thinking something had happened, were out of bed and running, which shows we were not going to be caught sleeping. As we entered the danger zone we had to carry our life belts with us everywhere we went, at least for several days. Later we were ordered not to take any clothes off at all, but be ready any minute.

A large number of British destroyers met us and helped escort us

through the most dangerous part, and when we saw those we felt absolutely safe. It seemed impossible for a submarine to even see us, because our escort searched around so well. The ship never kept the same course, but tried in many ways to fool the eye of any periscope that might be looking around.

Tuesday afternoon, the day before we were going to dock at —, about 2 o'clock in the afternoon, we saw the coast of Scotland. It seemed mighty good to the boys, because we had been on board almost as long as I was when I came home from my mission in Japan. We had a big boxing match on that afternoon and the boys climbed away up in the ropes and masts and crowded the ship's deck and some lifeboats. I am of the opinion this is what gave us away. It was a clear day and any submarine captain could pick us out there as a good mark.

Officer's Third Trial.

When the coxing was over it was almost time for supper, 5 o'clock, and I met one of the ship's officers standing near the rail. I stopped and talked for a minute, and during our talk he said: "If we are going to get it, it would be right around here." He had been on two ships that had been torpedoed, and the last one, as he told me afterward, happened a year ago on the very same day and month, except that it was in the morning. I left him and went to supper.

That very morning I rolled up my blankets and other things I had and got out of the hold in No. 4, up on the main deck, and put them in a stateroom one of the boys had. I decided I would never go down there again and was going to sleep in the hallway, between staterooms, on the floor. I had eaten and was standing near the staircase in the main hall, talking to a friend, and I didn't have my life belt with me. I was going for it and was prompted to several times,

but I never did get it, or my coat, overcoat, hat or puttees.

While we were talking and laughing, suddenly, with a big crash and stifled explosion, a torpedo hit us. The lights went with it, and then the fun started. The explosion seemed to take away some of the air or something, but everyone knew what had happened. Naturally, the first thing I thought of was getting my belt, only ten yards away; but I couldn't see my hand in front of me and I met the rush of men making for the nearest exit. It was useless to back it and I turned with the rest, and when we reached the deck outside there was another crowd surging and pushing, trying to get up a stairway where only one could go up comfortably, and there must have been four or five going up at once. One poor fellow got down, and I don't believe he ever got up again.

I made my way to the port side, where our squad was, and found only two other men there out of the full number—eight. I inquired where I could get a belt, as I didn't think I had much of a chance without one. The lights came on again and I ran back through the staterooms, looking for one. I found one and went back out on deck.

Men Fall Into Sea.

The lifeboats were being lowered, and the one that I was supposed to get into was almost full before it reached our deck, and just as it slowly went past us a rope on one end that held it gave way or the pulley was unhooked in some way, and one end dropped and almost all the fellows dropped down into the water. One or two clung on, and when they had it lowered a few moments afterward a boat from above must have slipped, because down she came on top of the other. I crowded back against the wall, because I didn't care to look, but I couldn't get away from their cries.

Other boats all along the line came and were lowered, but I didn't want

any of them. The boat was listing badly and it was hard to stand up without holding on to something. There wasn't a moment that I was afraid, but felt that surely one of those destroyers would come back and get us. It wasn't long before one came up alongside, but she couldn't get very close. After several attempts, ropes were thrown out and fastened and the men began sliding down them to the deck of the destroyer. By this time the boat had listed more and more to starboard, and on the port side we could scarcely make out the water.

Our lights had gone out and I was near the rail by a rope with Bill Clive, and as the last man left it I climbed on the rail, and, grabbing the rope, started down, the rising up and down of the destroyer with the waves tightened and slackened the rope, which almost threw me off. Before I reached her she suddenly pulled off without warning, breaking the rope close to the destroyer, which dropped me down into the sea. Ropes were hanging down the side and men on the deck were pulling them up, but the poor fellows didn't have the strength to hang on, and down they would go again.

Drawn Up by Foot.

Clive knew I was down, and in their anxiety to get me up they pulled on the rope, but my strength in my hands was gone, skin blistered and "rope burned" from my first slide. But I had not lost my head: I can say that much. I yelled up for them to wait until I got a fresh grip, and I wound the rope around my foot and they pulled me up, but I left a lot of poor fellows down there. After I got up I looked around and found a round buoy and threw that over to some of them.

All the lifeboats had gone and I decided I would stick to the sinking ship until the water came up over the first deck and then take my chance

in the water with whatever I could find.

In a few minutes another destroyer pulled up alongside on the starboard side and we all got on. The boat had listed so that we didn't need any ropes, and we were soon on our way to some port on the coast of Ireland—a four-hour ride—getting there in the early morning. As we moved down through the towns and cities of Ireland, the people cheered and greeted us with—some of us in rags, or scant clothing—brass bands and the warmest kind of hospitality. I don't know how long we will stay here, but we will be a long time getting reorganized and fitted up again. Everything was lost. I didn't come away with a thing, besides what I had on. No telling when we will get paid, and at present I am going around in half British and half American uniform.

If needs be, I am not afraid of death. I expected it that night, but never once shuddered. It is coming some day in some form. I lost some of my best friends. I saw two brothers go over, and one had to see the other go, too weak to help. Such things are hard, but when I listen to some of these British boys coming home with their muddy helmets and packs on their backs, with gold braid on their coat sleeves—one for every wound, and some with seven or eight, it makes a person feel confident and different.

British Confident.

They talk and joke about dodging bullets, and standing in muddy trenches for a couple of days. They have been doing it for three or more years, and it has come to be part of their lives. We aren't used to it in America, but we over here, and you over there, must be strong and persevere like these people. They don't go around with scared and drawn faces, as we would imagine, but laughing and confident, bent on one thing.

We aeroplane men won't have the

adventure of trench fighting, being kept busy behind the lines working on machines. All the honors are due the men of the artillery, infantry and flyers, who are taking it with "Fritz" every day.

Some time when I can give you a settled address and you decide you would send me a package put in a bar of toilet and shaving soap, and tooth paste. They are extremely expensive over here. I only get away with a handkerchief and a comb. I am feeling fine and being royally treated, so I hope you will always know that I am getting enough to eat and looking out for myself, fully expecting to be home again in a short time.

I took out \$10,000 insurance, which costs me \$5.60 a month, and if I should happen to "get it," the government will send it to you in monthly payments for twenty years, \$57.60 a month.

I lost all the letters, recommendations, Japanese books and everything.

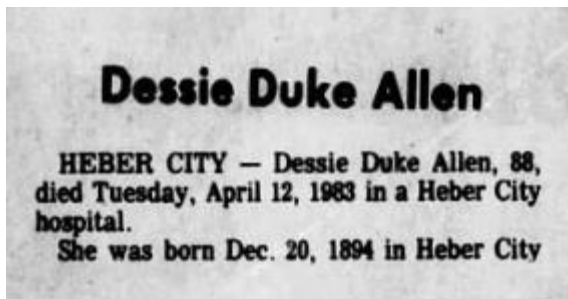

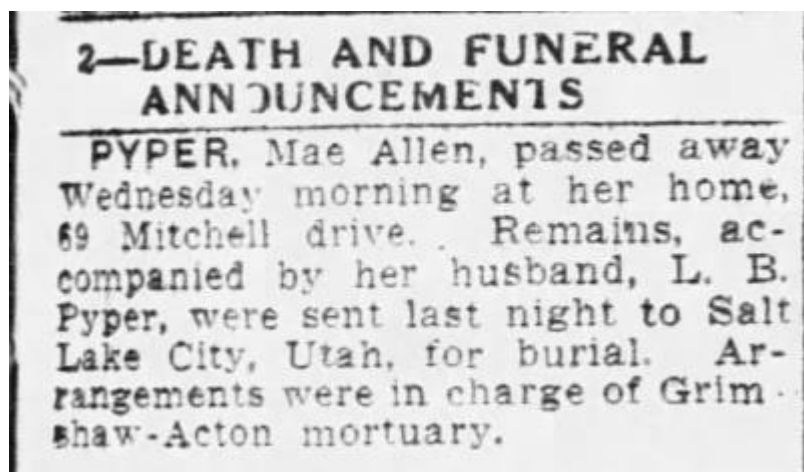
