Bodies of two Minneapolis men who were aboard the *Tuscania* when it was torpedoed, have been recovered and buried in Scotland, according to word received by The Journal today. They are James J. Buckley, 225 West Fifteenth st, and Homer L. Anderson, brother of Mrs. J. N. Oppedahl, 2320 Newton av S. Buckley was a sergeant in the 20th engineer regiment, and Anderson was a private in the same unit. The burial of the two men with other victims of the torpedoing was announced today by the war department. Other Minneapolis men aboard the transport were saved.

Three Wisconsin Men Included in First Installment Received

Washington, Feb. 16. — On the honor roll of America's hero dead the war department today wrote the names of eighty-one American soldiers who perished in the sinking of the transport Tuscania. The list, the first installment of the official revised records, received here from London included three from Wisconsin:

Homer Llewellyn Anderson, Cumberland.

Russel F. Bennett, Plainfield.

James T. Hawley, Neenah.

No New Estimates

Washington, Feb. 16.—No new estimates of the total number of dead among the American soldiers aboard the Tuscania had been made by the war department today, but ten names appearing in a list of eighty-one identified dead given out by the department last night apparently brought the death roll up to 174.

The war department's report of survivors still is far from complete. More than 200 men remain unaccounted for.

ANOTHER GOLD STAR ON CUMBERLAND'S BANNER

CUMBERLAND, Aug. 15.—John Erickson of this city received official notice that his brother, Albert Erickson, was killed in action in France.

Erickson, who was about 24 years old enlisted nearly a year ago and has been in the thick of the fight several months.

His death makes three gold stars for the Cumberland service flag. The others are for Homer L. Anderson, who drowned when the Tuscania was sunk, and John L. Paulson, who died of wounds received while fighting near Soissons.

FRIENDS MOURN CARL ANDERSON

Carl G. Anderson, whose sudden death resulting at the Good Samaritan hospital, Saturday night, cast a deep gloom among his wide circle of friends and acquaintances, was one of the most popular young men of West Palm Beach, where he has been a resident for the past six years. He was a trusted employee of Ott and A. J. Carmichael, tobaccoists, and had made his home with Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Carmichael for the past five years. The deceased entered into the social life of this community among the younger set with a quiet, unassuming demeanor, and was an earnest advocate of all outdoor athletic diversions. He was a young man of exemplary habits, clean of mind and speech, a Christian at heart and in his daily application of the Golden Rule. Carl Anderson had no enemies. He was too gentlemanly, too much the courtier to engender hatreds or dislikes. To know him meant to hold him in the highest personal esteem.

BODY OF CARL ANDERSON SENT TO FORMER HOME

**Young Man Died as the Result
of Injuries Received in
France During War**

(Special to the Metropolis)

WEST PALM BEACH, Nov. 23—The body of Carl Anderson was shipped to Cumberland, Wis., former home of the deceased, Sunday evening. The local American legion and the Elks accompanied the body to the station, and the body will be received by the Homer Anderson Post, American Legion at Cumberland, which was named for his brother, who was killed in action in France.

Mr. Anderson died Saturday following a serious operation on his stomach Friday. His condition was serious and it was thought that he could not have lived many months in his condition. The trouble came from an accident in the late war, when he was crushed between two trucks in France. He spent many weeks in a hospital there and had never recovered. He lost two brothers during service in the late war and is the third member of the family to die as results of injuries received at that time.

Left to mourn Carl Anderson are his father, Frank Anderson, three sisters, Mrs. John Opperdahl of Minneapolis and West Palm Beach, Mrs. George Erwin of Cumberland, Mrs. Frank Baylers of Elmira, Wis.; and three brothers, John, Ray and Frank Anderson, all living in Minneapolis.
