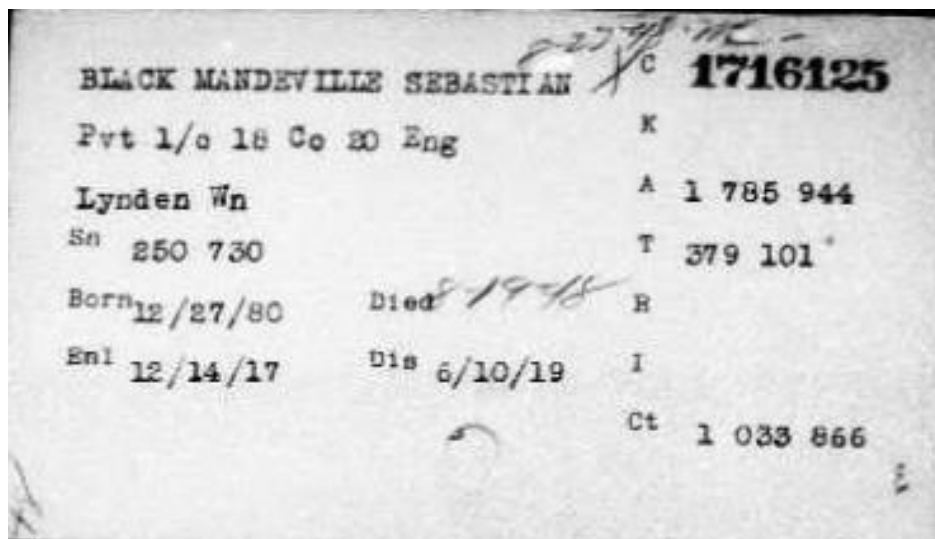

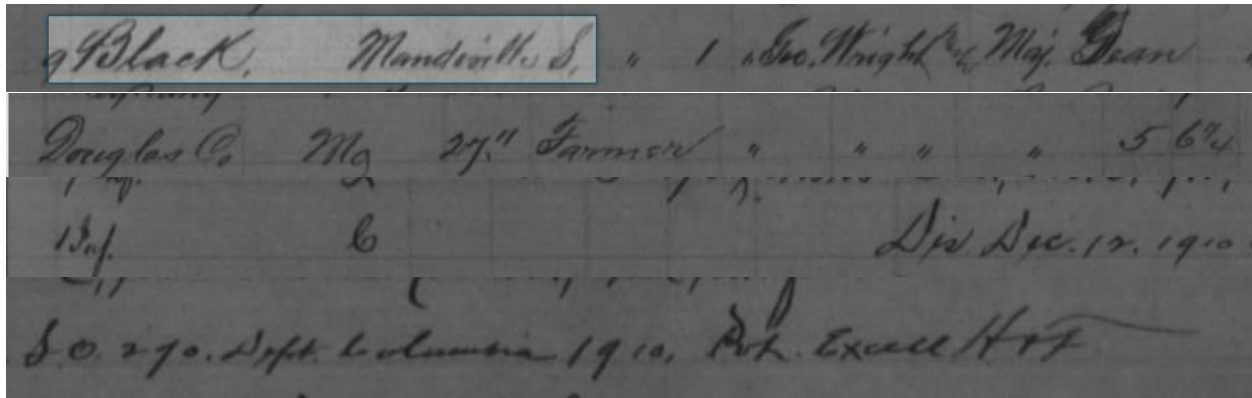

## TWO RECRUITS ARE ACCEPTED

### Break Monotony of Continual Rejection of Applicants.

The monotony of rejecting men for enlistment in the army at the local recruiting station was broken yesterday by the acceptance of two men.

Mandeville S. Black, 28 years old, from Lajara, Col., was accepted for the infantry and sent to Fort George Wright to await assignment. Christopher H. Lentz, 25 years old, a former soldier in Company M of the Third

infantry, recently stationed at the local post, was accepted for reenlistment in the infantry and by a special telegraphic order from Washington was assigned to the Sixth infantry at Mis-soult, which sails for the Philippine islands the first of the year.

Sergeant Sturgill, the noncommis-sioned officer in charge of the station, returned to duty after being on sick report at the Fort Wright hospital for several days.

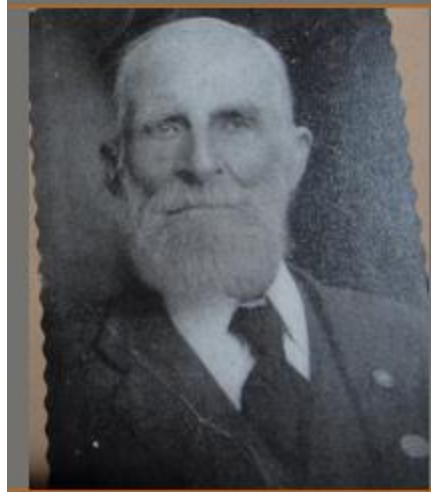
