# 23 MADISON MEN TO TAKE UP FLYING

Wm. J. Blackman of Brooklyn
Is Among Number Accepted
by Government.

TO GO TO ITHACA AT ONCE.

Plans Under Way to Increase Area of Barracks for Artil-

lery Training.

(Special to The Eagle.) Madison Barracks, N. Y., June 23-Among the twenty-three reserve student officers at Madison Barracks, who today received notification of their acceptance by the Government for special training in the Aviation Corps was William J. Blackman of Brooklyn, Mr. Blackman has been a member of Infantry Company No. 3. He decided to make the change a couple of weeks ago. The 'lucky" ones, as they are being classed at the reserve camp, are to leave here tomorrow evening and report to the commander of the ground station maintained by the Government at Ithaca.

Arrangements are under way whereby the Government plans to double the training grounds at Madison Barracks. Approximately fifty acres of adjacent territory are to be taken over for the training of the field artillery reserve students and for general maneuvering purposes.

Army orders today designate a battalion of New York State field artillery, formerly a part of the Sixtylery, formerly a part of the Sixtylery, formerly a part of the Sixtylery, formerly a part of the Sixtylery for training service at Madison Barracks. The field artillery battalion is made up of approximately 500 men with full field equipment and 160 officers. Their equipment is said to be made up principally of three-inch guns, calssons and other light pieces. This battalion had a great deal of experience on the Mexican border and is conceded among the best of guardsmen in this branch of the service. As soon as they arrive here they are to make up their camp on one of the new parcels of land to be taken over for training purposes. No new buildings are to be constructed there, it was announced.

With every facility at their command for giving expert instruction the camp authorities believe that the four atudent officer field batteries will have at least a working idea of the handling of field pieces at the end of the present camp.

The reserve students were allowed their usual half honday. Many of the candidates enjoyed a trip to the Thoueand Islands on the steamer Thousand Islander.

President Rush Rhees of Rochester University arrived at Madison Barracks this afternoon and will confer

diplomas on nearly 200 undergraduates who left that college when the camp opened. The Rev. Dr. Cornelius Woelfkin, pastor of the Fifth Avenue Baptist Church, New York, will be the principal speaker at both morning and evening services conducted at the camp Y. M. C. A.



# LT. BLACKMAN HOME; BOTH LEGS BROKEN IN AIR CRASH, MENDING

Brooklyn Aviator, Injured in July, Reaches Brooklyn on Leave of Absence.

Lieut. William Jackson Blackman, son of Dr. William W. Blackman of 519 Clinton ave., is back home from France, recuperating from the fracture of both legs in an aviation accident on July 11 of this year. Except for the fact that he is still hobbling on crutches, young Blackman is in the best of health and with only one thing



to worry about—that he may not be fully recovered in time to get back to the front before the war ends. He arrived at an Atlantic port on October 21, and was sent to a hospital at Colonia, near Rahway, N. J. Last Friday he obtained a ten-day leave of absence and came home immediately.

Lieut. Blackman has a host of friends in Brooklyn, few of whom have not been around to his father's home on Clinton ave, to get his story of the big doings in the aviation France. camps in He graduated from Adelphi and then went to Cornell, finishing in 1917 with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. Immediately after graduation from college he entered the ground school for aviation at Cornell and finished his work there on August 18, 1917, after which he went to Mount Clemens and then to Mineola for the finishing touches to his training for the air service,

On June 24 of this year Lieut. Blackman sailed on the Tuscania, which was torpedoed and sunk on


February 5.

On July 11, 1918, a Nieuport machine, with Lt. Blackman at the wheel, left the ground at a French aviation field and had not risen to more than 100 feet before it shot to the ground and was reduced to a mass of junk. He was pinned beneath the motor and when rescued it was found that his right leg had been broken below the knee and the left leg fractured at the knee.

The young lieutenant, 25 years old and of fine physique, hobbled into the reception room of his father's home this morning to see an Eagle reporter. He said that while recuperating he was told by a member of the Royal Air Force that the Americans and Australians made the best aviators this war has produced.

Lt. Blackman has no plans for the immediate future. He wants to get back into the fighting before it is all over.



Miss Blackman was a lifelong seldent of Brooklyn and had been active in social work since she was raduated from Vassar College in 114. The agency was then known as the United Hebrew Charities, Her study of its work played an imortant part in its reorganization n 1926 for the broader role of family welfare service.

This unit, despite unfavorable events and the outbreak of hostilities, accomplished its purpose and arranged for the transportation here of numbers of refugee children who had responsible welfare agencies ready to provide new homes for them in America.

Miss Blackman was a member of the Amercian Association of Social Workers and the Family Welfare Association of America. She was active in the affairs of the Welfare Council of New York and was the chairman of its Selective Service Committee. She was for 10 years chairman of the board of the Social Work Vocational Bureau, an employment bureau for professional social workers. For many years she served as chairman of the Vassar Alumnae Iad committee.
