GEORGE A. BORGENHEIMER Born Oct. 24, 1896. Entered the service at Chippewa Falls, Wis. Oct. 12, 1917, as a private in Co. A. Trained at Camp Douglas and Camp McArthur, Transferred to the 107th Supply Train, 32nd Div. Sailed Jan. 22, 1918. Promoted to Sergeant. Fought in battle of Chateau Thierry, and practically every battle of the 32nd Division. Returned to the U. S. and was mustered out May 29, 1919. Re-enlisted in the service for one year, being assigned to Motor Transport Corps.

George A. Borgenheimer, 82, 109 Pear St., Chippewa Falls, died Thursday evening at St. Joseph's Hospital, Chippewa Falls.

He was born in Chippewa Falls Oct. 24, 1897, the son of George Brogenheimer and Anna Boettcher. He resided here all his life. He was a member of the Chippewa Falls Fire Department for 25 years and after retiring was employed by the city as a heating plant engineer for 10 years.

He was a Sgt. First Class in the U.S. Army during World War I, participating in the major campaigns in France and Luxembourg.

He married Dorothy Adams Oct. 22, 1924 at Notre Dame Catholic Church, Chippewa Falls.

He was a member of World War I Barracks 2095, American Legion Post 77, a charter member of VFW Post 1038, Last Man's Club, Knights of Columbus Goldsmith Council 974, past president of the men's Thursday night bowling league, with his high game as 298. He was an avid gardener and a member of Holy Ghost Catholic Church

Surviving are two daughters Mrs. Peg Becker, Dallas, Texas, and Mrs. Howard (Ellen) Perry, Radcliff, Ken.; a sister Mrs. Ane Clem, Chippewa Falls; eight grandchildren; and one great-granddaughter.

He was preceded in death by his wife Aug. 1, 1979; a son J.R. (Bob); his parents; six brothers; and five sisters.

A funeral service will be held at 11 a.m. Saturday at Holy Ghost Catholic Church. Interment will be in Our Lady of Hope Cemetery.

Friends may call after 5 p.m. today (Friday) at the Horan Funeral Home. The Knights of Columbus and the parish will conduct a Christian vigil service at 8:15 Friday at the funeral home. Military rites will be conducted Saturday by th Chippewa Falls Patriotic Council.

COUPE COLLIDES WITH FIRE TRUCK

Two Vehicles Both Damaged in Crash Near High School at Noon.

The Stutz fire truck pumper of the fire department, being driven by Geo. Borgenheimer, sustained a damaged fender in a collision with a Ford coupe belonging to Henry Geissler while speeding to a call from the Chrystal residence on North Jefferson avenue, at 11:40 o'clock today. No persons were injured.

The truck was going north on Bay street to Oak, which is the route taken by the fire truck drivers responding to calls in North Chippewa in order to avoid a corner and heavy traffic on the more traveled streets. Mr. Geissler was driving west on Cedar street and the two vehicles met at the intersection of the two streets.

There was a crash and the two vehicles stopped. Both drivers immediately backed away from each other, and the truck proceeded on its way to the Chrystal residence. The coupe was also damaged but Driver Borgenheimer said upon his return to the fire station that Mr. Geissler had driven away when the fire squad passed that way in its return from the call.

Mr. Borgenheimer attempted to stop the truck in order to prevent a collision as indicated by tracks in the snow where the wheels had skidded. Indications pointed also to efforts made by Mr. Geissler to stop his car before the crash.



Two local firemen were seriously burned and a third injured when an explosion occurred while they were fighting a fire in the Gonyea apartments. Main street, Monday morning. George Borgenheimer and William Huber were trapped in the flaming room when the force of the explosion jammed the only door and they had to batter it down. They both were burned about the face and hands. Edmund Paul, who was in the doorway at the time the blast occurred, was sent hurtling down a flight of stairs by the force of the explosion. The building was a total loss. Both Paul and Huber are expected to be in the hospital for more than a month and Borgenheimer is expected to be released soon.

World War I veterans meet for 55th reunion

With its claim to being the oldest organization of its kind still uncontested, the Last Man's Club of World War I held its 55th reunion Sunday evening at Van's Supper Club. Bill Bereaux of Chippewa Falls was elected president of the club, succeeding Al Brusen of Menomonie who became secretary-treasurer.

Memorial recognition was given Last Man's Club member Selmer Gaard of California who died in January, 1974. The ten members who gathered with their guests for dinner and a time of fellowship recalled that exactly 57 years ago, on August 11, 1917, they had marched down Bridge Street as new recruits. The nearly 300 men of Co. A and Hdqtrs. Co. of Chippewa Falls, and Co. B of Stanley were under the command of Capt. E.H. Firth and Capt. John Hanley.

At Camp McArthur at Waco, Tex., they trained as part of the 32nd Red Arrow Division and left for Europe on Feb. 7, 1918. The Fourth Wisconsin Infantry Band, organized at the Chippewa Armory in May, 1917, by Band Leader Louis Altman, also embarked from New York with the 32nd Division.

Chippewa County men were to participate in some of the most devastating action at Chateau-Thierry, Soissons and the Argonne Forest. Of the 2,100 boys from Chippewa County who served in W.W.I. nearly 500 served overseas with the 32nd Division.



Arthur Nelson Harvey of Chippewa Falls was just 19. A Jim Falls resident, Earl Odear Weisenberger was slightly older, 25.

Both privates in the U.S. Army were on board the transport ship Tuscania with Corp. Claire Metzenbauer, 23, of Chippewa Falls, when the ship sank in a torpedo attack by a German U-boat.

The three men were among 48 from Wisconsin and 210 American troops in all to die in the attack off the Irish coast on Feb. 5, 1918.

They were also the first World War I casualties from the area.

Metzenbauer's parents in the town of Lafayette were notified that their son was killed when they received a cablegram from the Department of War.

troops were aboard the trans- F. R. Tapper, E. Yell, H.F. port ship. A 1962 account in the then-Chippewa Herald-Telegram said that 225 of those troops were from Wisconsin, and 35 were from Chippewa Falls.

business man, civic worker and for- drive. mer fire department captain, died early Thursday morning at a local hospital. He had been a patient there since he suffered a heart attack at his office two weeks ago. His home was at 805 Fifth avenue north.

Boetcher retired Oct. 15, 1943, from the fire department, in which he had served 27 years. He was a captain four years and prior to that a lieutenant. He was active in fire prevention work for years and annually spoke to thousands of local school children on that subject.




AUGUST H. BOETTCHER DIES IN 76TH YEAR

Veteran of the Franco-Prussian War, in which he received a slight wound in the very last engagement.

In 1910 census he said he had been previously married (while wife Anna said it was her 1st marriage).

George advertises his Lafayette WI farm for sale beginning in Feb 1911; the ads run for several months. In Aug 1911 the farm buildings burn down in a fire of mysterious origin. While in jail in Oct 1911, George thinks a fellow inmate is joking when he sees the man with a noose around his neck and does not alert anyone The man hangs himself.

In Dec 1911, his wife Anna charges that George came into the house in which she was living and placed a gun to the back of her head. George claimed it was a bottle. When George sued for divorce from Anna in Apr 1912, the judge dismissed it after an airing of domestic difficulties.

In May 1912, Anna successfully obtains guardianship of their sons George & Robert. Naturalized 19 Nov 1912 in the Circuit Court of Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WA; declarant in 1884.

In the 1920 census, his status is divorced & he is living by himself. Meanwhile, Anna claims to be married in the 1920 census.

 Harry Boetcher, born Boettcher, known in Wisconsin as Harry / Harry Frederick Borgenheimer but in Montana as Boetcher, 24 Oct 1888 Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI – 28 Nov 1951 Great Falls, Cascade MT. – Raised by George & Anna (Boettcher) Borgenheimer in Chippewa Falls, Chippewa WI. Mentioned in their obituaries & those of his "siblings" as a brother named Harry Borgenheimer. Even his obituary in WI reers to him as "Harry Borgenheimer." - Obituary: "Chippewa Herald-Telegram" 30 Nov 1951 p 3 – Harry died suddenly 28 Nov 1951 at Columbus Hospital in MT. He had just been home to attend the funeral of his sister Mrs. Charles (Henrietta) Doelle in Chippewa Falls on 1 Nov 1951. His brother George left by plane to MT to attend Harry's funeral 1 Dec at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Great Falls. He will be buried in Great Falls MT. B. Chippewa Falls 24 Oct 1888 & educated here. Went to MT as a young man & has lived there since. Married Emma Eisemhart of Great Falls. Survived by 3 sisters: Mrs. Walter Malietzka (Minneapolis), Mrs. Genevieve Blaisdell (Chippewa Falls) & Mrs. A.E. Clem (Chippewa Falls).

- <u>HOWEVER</u>, Harry is born Oct 1888 & "father" George Borgenheimer marries "mother" Anna Boettcher on 7 Sep 1889. On 9 (or 11) Jul 1888 in Brown Co. WI, August Boettcher, a resident of Tilden WI, married "Lima Timis." In Jun 1892, August & "Emelia" Boettcher divorce. In the divorce petition, they report they have not lived together for 5 years. A wedding date in Jul 1888 makes it likely they are the parents of Harry Boettcher, born Oct 1888. August is the brother of Anna Boettcher Borgenheimer.
- In the 1910 census, Harry Boetcher who drops the double-T in Boettcher resides in Great Falls, Cascade MT, a hired man/butcher. He is age 30, born US, parents b. Germany.
- On 24 Oct 1914 in Cascade Co. MT, Harry Frederick Boetcher married Emma Veronica Eisenbart (1893 MT 1982 MT, F; 118064454), the daughter of John Eisenbart & Emma Rose Schenck.
- Both MT & WI newspapers agree on his birthdate and death date & his surviving siblings, although his MT obituary lists only his brothers' first names & not their surname Borgenheimer.
- His Find A Grave record links him to his biological father, August Henry Boettcher (1863-1940, F: 37554485). His MT death certificate lists his father as August Boettcher; his mother's name is left blank. August Henry Boettcher is the son of August Johann Boettcher & Henrietta Catherine Hafferman. This makes him the biological brother of Anna Maria Caroline (Boettcher) Borgenheimer. To complicate genealogy, August appears to marry a woman named Anna Marie (1869-1936) in 1894 in Cook Co. IL so she appears on Ancestry.com family trees as Harry's father – or his mother appears to be confused with August's sister Anna.
- Supposition: George Borgenheimer and his wife Anna Boettcher Borgenheimer, who married almost 11 months after Harry Boettcher/Boetcher's birth, adopted or fostered or at least raised Harry, their nephew, the son of Anna's brother. Harry presumably used the surname Boetcher because he was legally born "Boettcher" and not "Borgenheimer."

tombstone indicates from Wisconsin. - Listed as "Emil" in the 1905 WI state census. - Husband of Eve (sometimes Eva) DeTour (identified as Deton in one obituary). She is mentioned in MT newspapers as Eve DeTour through Feb 1936, then as Mrs. Eve Borgenheimer with the DeTour family in Apr 1936. – Walter & Eve's daughter Ann Mary Borgenheimer was born 23 Mar 1937 in Butte, Silver Bow MT. Ann had the surname Cummins when her mother died in May 1985. - Widowed, Eve Borgenheimer married William Anthony Twohy (1900-1977, F: 70843006) in Butte, Silver Bow MT on 6 Jan 1945. Eva (10 Dec 1902 MT – 28 May 1985 MT, F: 70843053) was the daughter of Louis Henry DeTour (1870-1933, F: 71824579) & Mary Agnes Durnen (1878-1965, F: 70843219). – Walter dies at age 35 years, 3 months, 15 days, on 10 Jan 1938 outside Bozeman, Gallatin MT in an airplane crash. Was a carpenter; resident of Basin MT. Obituary: "Chippewa Herald-Telegram" 11 Jan 1938 p 1 & p 4 – Walter R. Borgenheimer, 36, formerly of Chippewa Falls, died as a passenger on an airliner which crashed near Bozeman MT. Walter was flying to the bedside of his critically ill mother in Chippewa Falls. Anna, who lives at 102 W. Vine St., does not know of her son's death. A resident of Chippewa Falls until 1929 when he moved to Basin MT where he has resided since. While in Chippewa Falls, worked at the fire department for several years. Survived by wife Eve Detour Borgenheimer (formerly of Chippewa Falls) & their 10-month-old daughter. Walter was notified of his mother's illness on 9 Jan & was taking a plane from Butte MT. A last-minute cancellation freed up a seat on an earlier plane, which crashed. A successful contractor in Basin MT since 1929. "Chippewa Herald-Telegram" 11 Jan 1938 p 1 – lead story: "Borgenheimer Dies in Plane Crash" with photo of Walter – A Northwest Airlines plane crashed & burned in the Bridger Mountains 14 miles north of Bozeman. The plane went into a tailspin, plunging nose-first into a clearing. The nose snapped off on the frozen ground. Searchers found all 10 aboard dead on 10 Jan but a storm/blizzard prevented removal of the bodies, so a guard was left on the plane. Two woodcutters 200 feet away saw the crash but were unable to approach due to flames. Killed were the pilot, co-pilot and 8 passengers, among them two Northwest employees (the state traffic manager & a mechanic) & W.E. Borgenheimer, 36, Basin MT, who cancelled a reservation on a later plane to speed to the bedside of his critically ill mother at Chippewa Falls. Northwest Airlines issued a statement that all on board had died. The bodies were badly burned, with three thrown from the fuselage & the rest found in the front of the plane. These were the first ever passengers to be killed in a transport plane crash in MT & the first to die on a Northwest Airlines flight. Last year the National Safety Council gave Northwest an award for 11 years, flying 47 million passenger miles, with no passenger fatalities. The plane was bound for Chicago from Seattle via Minneapolis. The flight had been grounded at Butte MT due to ill weather. Buried in Mountain View Cemetery, Butte, Silver Bow MT. F: 144439859
