





Ninety Michigan Men On Ship.

The following list of names of Michigan men who were aboard the Tuscania is taken from the official ship's roster, telegraphed to Adjt. Gen. McCain from the port of embarkation after the Tuscania was reported sunk. In addition to the possibility of mistakes in transmission, the lists had been copied at least three times before they were turned over to the newspapermen and sufficient time had not been allowed for thorough checking up and correction. There are undoubtedly mistakes in spelling of of names and names probably have been omitted.

Up to the first of this week a number of these men had not yet been accounted for.

FORTY-NINE ALIENS GET FINAL PAPERS

Two World War Veterans Are Among the New Citizens.

World war veterans continued to field the center of the stage in the naturalization hearings in both Circuit and Superior courts Monday. In all 49 foreigners were admitted to citizenship.

Albert Bottinga of Beverly, a miner, was on the Tuscania when it was sunk off the Irish coast and narrowly escaped with his life. Joseph Bukowski, 233 Mount Vernon-st., was on the transport Mount Vernon en route to France and assisted the gun crew in sinking a submarine. Both told their stories in court at the hearings and had little trouble in getting their final papers. Those admitted to citizenship in both courts are:





2 DEAD; TWO AILING FROM

State Doctor Investigating Epidemic At Fish Lake Boys Camp; Fourth Case Appears At Druce Lake Today.

City, county and state health authorities today were conducting an inquiry into an outbreak of spinal meningitis, at Camp Duncan, a west side Chicago Y. M. C. A. summer t camp located one mile north of Volo on Fish lake, which claimed two lives yesterday and today, and sent two other youths to local hospitals where their conditions are regarded Health authorities are as serious. of the opinion that the disease will not spread.

Dr. Andy Hall, state health director, today sent Drs. Daring and Van Wormer of Springfield to the camp, where an investigation is being made, Dr. Daring had made no official an-

nouncement late today.

William Nalmet, 13, of 1227 South Spaulding avenue, Chicago, died yesterday soon after being brought to the St. Therese hospital from the camp. Theodore Bryant, 10, of 1027 Till avenue, Chicago, died this morning at the same hospital. Tests of serum taken from their spinal columns proved that spinal meningitis was the cause of death, Dr. Howard C. Hoag announced today.

Druce Lake Boy III Harry Craig, 4, of Druce Lake, is in a serious condition at the Lake County hospital, under strict quaran-

tine, and is believed to be suffering from the same disease. Alfred Esser, 10, of 1019 South Damen avenue, Chicago, was rushed to the St. Therese hospital yesterday afternoon from the camp, believed to be suffering from the disease, Although hospital authorities would make no statement, R. P. Bowdon, director of the "Y" camp, said today that the youth was not suffering from spinal meningitis. His ailment was described as "ear trouble."

the past ten summers, has 200 boys in barracks there at the present time. Mr. Bowdon, director of the camp, would make no announcement of the spread of the disease today.

The State health director has

made no official announcement yet. Physicians were puzzled yesterday by the sudden death of the Nalmet youth, starting an immediate inquiry which revealed that spinal meningitis was the cause of death. The camp was immediately quarantined, and the Esser youth, believed to have been stricken, was rushed to the local hospital.

Health officers today announced that the "epidemic" was under control. The disease spreads by contact with infected persons, by towels, eating utensils, and objects handled by persons suffering from the disease.

"While we do not believe it possible that any case of this disease will be found in Waukegan, we are ordering all parents whose children become ill to immediately report the affair to my office," Dr. Howard C. Hose said today. "We are not fearing an outbreak in Waukegan, however," he added.

The inquiry into the outbreak was well under way this afternoon. Dr. Leon G. Brackett and Dr. John E. Freeland, who treated the two youths who died, and are now treating the Esser boy and the Craig child, would not say definitely whether or not the dead youths had died of spinal meningitis, or whether the two youths now in the hospitals were infected with it. They admitted however, that the two youths had the "same indications as those who died."

WAUKEGAN, ILL.—(A.P.)—Two Chicago boys who were attending a west side Y. M. C. A. camp at Fish Lake, near Volo, are dead of spinal meningitis and a physician dispatched by the state health department visited the camp today to determine whether others have been infected.

William Nalmet, 13, Chicago, died shortly after he was brought to St. Theresa hospital yesterday and Theodore Bryant, 10, Chicago, died today. After a test of spinal fluid Dr. Howard C. Hoag, Waukegan health commissioner, pronounced both deaths due to spinal meningitis.

Bruces Lake, is ill of the same disease at the county hospital. He was not an attendant at the camp.

Another of the campers, Alfred Esser., 10. Chicago, was brought to the hospital suffering from an ear affliction.

The camp opened June 14 and was scheduled to close Aug. 30.

The camp was quarantined by state health officials today. None of the physicians at the camp would say whether other boys had become ill.



Roundup nabs absent parents

SAN BERNARDINO — In a massive round-up coordinated by the San Bernardino County District Attorney's office, more than 45 absent parents had been arrested by Tuesday morning for

It is the first mass roundup of absent parents — mostly fathers — in San Bernardino County. If the 100 parents can be made to support their children and repay the county for welfare grants those children have received, the savings to taxpayers could be as high as \$3.5 million, Eix said.

About 80 of the 100 persons sought have children who are receiving welfare assistance in the form of cash grants, he said.

All the 45 persons arrested from 6 p.m. Monday to 6 a.m. Tuesday have been booked into San Bernardino County Jail, with bail set at \$500, Eix said.

Those sought are parents who are separated or divorced from their spouses and who have made agreements to support their children and then failed to uphold them.

Most of the absent parents were subpoenaed in the past to return to court, but failed to appear, Eix said. Nearly all the warrants were issued for failure to appear, he said, although some were for failure to pay child support.

The roundup is the result of two months of planning and investigators from the district attorney's office are working with more than 16 law enforcement agencies.

Monday night's arrests were made by law enforcement officers from various San Bernardino



My ex-step grandfather and the only father my father ever knew

J.D. (which is the name that we always knew him by) had only one good eye. The other eye was damaged when he fell on a stick that Eddie has left sticking straight out of the ground in the back yard. He also had a messed up hand from getting hit by a truck right outside Buena Park. It was not too far from our house on Darlington, and I remember being told that that was the place that JD got hit.

JD had a 2nd wife after Ruth and had a dau., Edith. The wife died while the girl was young and JD m. 3rd. Martha. and had children, Candy, Jerry, and Mike.

JD was a really nice guy. I don't remember many times when I saw him angry. He could be stern, but he wasn't ever violent. And he was always really friendly to everybody. He drank a lot of beer, but like most of the family, he was a "functional alcoholic." Unlike Uncle Eddie, I don't think JD ever did the hard stuff like vodka.

Like most of the family, JD and Martha moved from Indiana out to California. Martha was best friends with Charlotte's sister-in-law Martha Ellen (Alexander) Cory, and the two families always lived pretty close to each other.

JD and Martha and kids were very close to us while we were growing up. Deanna was the flower girl for either Edith or Candy's wedding (can't remember which). We had a lot of family gettogethers with JD and Martha and their kids, Martha Ellen and her kids, and Aunt Charlotte and Uncle Clem with their kids. I remember going over to JD and Martha's on several occasions. They never seemed to stay at one house or apartment very long. Edith, Candy, Jerry, Mike, Deanna, and I, spent many times playing monopoly, speed, war, and other card and board games.

One time, we had a family picnic at some park somewhere around Anaheim. It consisted of our family, JD's family, Charlotte's family, grandma Ruth, and possibly Martha Cory's family but I'm not for sure they were there. It had this insanely high wall that overlooked a river. The park was on top of the wall. You could stand on the ground, look over the wall (which at this side was only a couple of feet high), and look down some 20 feet to the concrete and rock below. The was a stairway for getting down to the river, and all us kids went down there to explore. One of the cousins found a storm drain and claimed that it went all the way through under the park and came out the other side. So we all tried to go through it. Luckily, before we got too far in, the parents came and got us. We all got very much in trouble. I "re-found" that same park as an adult, and was glad to see that there is now a fence on top of the wall to keep people from falling. I heard that the reason they put that there was because some little kid fell. It's always such a shame that somebody always has to die before people do something about dangerous situations.

JD always owned or worked at bars the whole time I was growing up. We often visited him there even though kids aren't supposed to be allowed in bars. It was in one of JD's bars that I first learned to like Polska dogs and play pool. The bars were always dark, and often had paintings done on black velvet. My dad did a large painting for one of JD's bars to hang up over the bar. It was of a nude devil women with horns and a tail. I don't know what ever happened to it.

For most of the time I can remember, they lived in and around Chino. One memory I had was the time that my dad and JD went in together to raise a hog for slaughter. On the day it was to be slaughtered, we went down to the "farm" to watch the slaughtering and take home the meat. I didn't watch the slaughtering, but I did see the pig hanging up after being killed. We took home so much meat that our freezer was totally packed - and that was a full size upright freezer!

JD was pretty much the only father my father ever knew even though officially he could only be considered an "ex-step" father. He was also the closest thing I ever had to a grandfather although he had kids my age and younger. I never really got to spend time with him as a grandfather though.

JD and Martha posed in the family photos as my grandparents for my first wedding (to Ray Williams).

The last address for JD and Martha Bryant was 15378 Sequoia Ave Apt F Hesperia CA 92345 Phone # (619) 947-5096. They moved up to Hesperia right before we moved to Victorville. They lived in a sleezy little apartment right off of Bear Valley road. We had planned to have them and my parents over as soon as we got the house put together and fixed up, but since that took years (and is still going on while I'm writing this), we never got around to it before JD and Martha died.

J. D. Died at abt 3:00 am at home.

He died of apparent suicide by a 22 caliber gun to the head. J.D had been suffering with emphysema and was not expected to live long. He had been concerned with the mounting cost of his medical treatment and didn't want to cause any more expense to his family. His expected death was the reason that when he was found dead, the coroner just assumed it was a natural death.

He was picked up at home by Mortuary Transport employee (Inland Empire Transportation, Inc) Ken Terry (step-grandson in law) for Kern Mortuary. Ken did not recognize JD and did not know JD's real name was Gerald until after he had taken him to Kern Mortuary.

Ken had been dispatched to the call from Kern as a natural death, but when he started to bag up the body, he found a bullet hole in the temple, and so he had to call back in the Coroner. There was no gun present, so quite a scene followed. It went from being a natural death, to being a possible homicide. Finally, the family confessed that one of the kid's husband had hidden the gun to try to cover up the suicide because they didn't want everyone to know that JD had killed himself.

Ken came home after the call and was talking about this crazy case that he just had that was supposed to be a natural death, then became a homicide, which then became a suicide. He had only met JD and Martha a couple of times, and he didn't recognize them at all during the call. Also, he knew JD as "JD" and so he didn't connect the name Gerald Dougles Bryant with "JD." It was later on that morning that my parents called me with the news that JD had died. The family totally tried to hide the fact that JD had committed suicide. They actually told my dad that JD had died of ephazyma.

When I told Ken that JD had died and asked him if he could find out what Mortuary he was taken to, and other details, he finally put two and two together - The natural death/homicide/suicde case was JD! This left me with quite a problem. My dad was extremely distraught at the idea that JD would have died so soon and so suddenly. Yes, he was dying of emphasyma - BUT he wasn't that bad off yet. He shouldn't have died so quickly! Legally, I can't talk about any mortuary or coroner cases - NO MATTER WHAT. Talking about the case could have cost Ken his job. BUT was I supposed to leave my dad so upset and confused?

I finally decided to tell my dad what happened. He deserved to know. It turned out to be the best thing - especially for Martha and her kids. Suicide was something that my dad could understand given JD's circumstances. When I told him that JD had committed suicide, he admitted that JD had even shown him the .22, and discussed it with him. Although he was sad that JD was gone, my dad didn't blame JD for doing it.

Martha and the kids continued to keep everything quiet. They had a direct cremation with no service - not even a public memorial service. Of course, the police were still keeping a close eye on the case. They didn't quite buy that hiding the gun thing, but Ken let them know that JD had bought the gun himself for the purpose of suicide - so no charges against the family were ever brought. I think it turned out to be Candy's husband who supposedly hid the gun. Considering the seriousness of the action, you'd think that anybody with the least bit of brains would know better than to make a suicide look like a homicide by removing the suicide weapon. The funny thing is that since our local coroners don't like to actually touch a dead body, they almost got away with hiding the gun. The coroner was more than willing to consider it a natural death without even looking closely at the body. But even if Ken hadn't of found the bullet wound, it would have been found out later at the mortuary. The mortuary has to take a picture of the face for indentification purposes before the body goes to the crematory. Imagine the ruckus if the guys over at Kerns had found a bullet wound on a body that was supposed to have died of natural causes! The Coroners office, the police, and everybody involved would have been publically racked over the coals AND THEN the family WOULD have ended up in jail!

My dad was upset that they didn't have some sort of memorial service. To all intents and purposes, JD was my dad's father. Imagine if your parents got divorced and remarried, and your step mom refused to invite you to any family gathering or funeral!

IL and again on 23 Sep 1942 in Indianapolis, Marion IN to Ruth Evelyn Jones Quinn Olson (1913 IN 1988 CA, F: 230405405). Ruth was the daughter of James Patrick Jones (1913 IN 1988 CA, F: 230405405) & Ollie Mae (1913 IN 1988 CA, F: 230405405). Ruth Jones had previously married Thaddeus Theodore Quinn (1913-1974, F: 44132711) in 1932. Later, she married Adelore Joseph Olson (1929-2009, F: 49830196) & died with the surname Olson. Married Dorothy Anne Kurtz (25 Oct 1935 Marion Co. IN), daughter of Arza Earl Kurtzx & Dorothy Ann Amick, on 31 Aug 1957 in Martinsville, Morgan IN. According to a family history, Gerald & Dorothy had a daughter Edith Ann. In Nov 1957, Dorothy petitioned for a divorce in Indianapolis,

Marion IN three months after their marriage. She was killed in a car accident 15 Jul 1959. Her obituaries and newspaper articles refer to her and daughter Edith sometimes as Kurtz and sometimes as Bryant. Dorothy is listed as Kurtz, never married, on her IN death certificate, but she is buried as Dorothy Ann Bryant in Eastern Cemetery, Jeffersonville, Clark IN, F: 127605169. - Married Martha Lewis on 7 Mar 1959 in Marion Co. IN. This record (seen in an indexed version only) may have confused "Martha Lewis" with "Martha Louise Ferguson." - Married Martha Louise Ferguson (1928-2002) daughter Ansel Hugo Ferguson (F: 188098308) & Sadie Anna Carver (1887-1967, F: 249040523) whom he divorced Sep 1967 in Los Angeles, Los Angeles CA, and apparently again in Oct 1973 & again 23 Jan 1981, both times in San Bernardino Co. CA.. – According to a family history, Gerald was known as J.D. Bryant & had only one good eye. He died of suicide, ill with emphysema, with a prognosis that he would die soon. The coroner however ruled the cause of death as natural causes until a bullet wound was found in his temple. There had been no firearm found with his body, so the death was then ruled a homicide. Investigation found a family member had removed the gun from the scene; it was then ruled a suicide.
