





#### TUSCANIA SAVED IS GIVEN

List of Survivors Begins to Come; Many Californians Are Reported Safe.

.WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Out of the war zone today came the names of hundreds of American boys saved from the torpedoed transport Tuscania, to ease the anxiety in the homes of this country. The names are now being sent across the water in a steady stream and as rapidly as possible being compiled for publication. Not until the entire list is in will the war department be able to check up and determine those who gave up their lives.

Was on the S. S. Tuscania when she was sunk by a tin fish. Blewey -just like that. Landed on the north coast of Ireland. Lost everything. Dressed up in Irish, English and U. S. clothes. Everything "jake" now. But have seen no good U. S. "roll your own" smoking. Kind of shaky yet.

#### PAY ROLL LOST

OAKLAND, March 13.—Bruce Bowring, a survivor of the Tuscania, in a
letter to his father, Franklin Bowring, 3021 East Nineteenth street,
writes: "I am safe and feeling fine.
I was given a new uniform by the
British army. I've got British underwear and socks, a 'Fusilier' overcoat
and a hat from the royal flying corps.
Believe me, I ha e some uniform."

Part of the letter follows:

"Well, here's another day gone by and everything is getting readjusted fine. We are going to be advanced \$10, or two pounds. All our papers were lost on the S. S. Tuscania. We had just signed the pay roll a couple of days before she was sunk. All our service records were lost, and you can't get paid unless they have the service record to make up the pay roll.

"But the way the English Government has treated us and fixed us up with clothes and all the toilet articles necessary! The first thing I'm going to do is to send a cable to you. It will reach you before this letter.

Oakland Youth Tours Scotland Scenery Beautiful, People Are Kind

With six days' leave from his camp | Keene and started out again and put near London Bruce D. Bowring of this city, a member of the 100th aero squadron, toured Scotland with a churn. Bowring's mother, Mrs. Franklin Bowring of 3021 East Nineteenth street, is a native of Scotland, and in going there her soldier son was largely actuated by a desire to visit the places he had heard his mother describe. His trip took him to Edinburgh, Glasgow, Perth, Stirling, Inverness, the center of the Western Highlands; Loch Lomond and other historic and beauty spots. He found Scotland beautiful and the Scottish people "just flowing over with hospitality."

Here is a story of his visit told in a letter to his mother and father:

"I just got home last night from my six-day 'service leave,' and really I've seen so much that I can't begin to remember it all now. But it will come back to me.

STARTS FOR EDINBURGH "Well, to begin with, Derrick Lane, a chap from Hollister, Cal., and myself got our six-day pass and half fare voucher last Saturday, the 27th. We left camp at 3 o'clock and got into London

that day in solid and at night we all went to a show and to bed at 11. Tuesday morning we left for the heart of the Highlands, Inverness at 10. We passed through Perth, stopped there an hour or so, got out and saw a little of that place—a beautiful city it is, too. We arrived at Inverness at 5:30 and went up to the American "Y" to stop. We walked around the city after eating and out into the country a little We tried to talk to an old Scotchman, out in the field workingone of the old-timers who still wore kilts-but it was a foreign lingo to us. It might have been English, but the only things I could get was something meant for Yankee and 'bonnie laddie.'

"Inverness is the first town I ever heard of where they had street cars and where the people voted them out of town, a sure enough fact. That's going backward with a vengeance.

'I say here and now, 'See America First.'

"We left Inverness for Glasgow on the 4:30 p. m. train the same day, passed through Stirling, and saw the old Stirling Castle, 1000 and more years old and so on dome tota Ol

that evening at 6. We went up to the Eagle Hut 'Y.' and had supper and so on, and at 10 that night caught an ex-

press to Edinburgh, Scotland.

"The train was just packed. There was a lot of soldiers right from France going home on leave. We had to stand up the whole distance, 293 miles, but I kept awake listening to the fellows tell about the Yanks holding down their sector. Everyone of them couldn't say enough for them. Well, anyway, we arrived in Edinburgh at 8 o'clock in the morning.

"We couldn't travel in the day time going up, partly on account of our limited time, but mostly on account of train schedule. We passed through Newcastle and over the Tweed river that separates England from Scotland.

#### SCOTCH ARE HOSPITABLE.

"As it was Sunday when we got up there, there wasn't a single place to go and get breakfast, or so we thought. Just about the time we had given up hope we were directed to a soldiers' and sailors' buffet. The Red Cross has them at all big stations, but in our hurry to get out we passed it up. We got some sandwiches and coffee and the Scotch ladies talked a leg off us, and in

old, and so on down into Glasgow. For miles before we got there, we passed through town after town with nothing but factories. The smoke stalks look like the oil fields with hundreds of oil towers, only all are made of brick and belching smoke.

"We got into Glasgow at 10 p. m., and stopped at another 'Y.' Thursday morning we looked the town over and saw to what extent the shipbuilding operations are going. For miles on the Clyde is one ship after another. Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock we went to Balloch on Loch Lomond on the street car or tram. It was a pretty two and a half hour ride. We rented a boat right away and rowed out on Loch Lomond, It was sure beautiful and the weather was perfect as it had been so far on our trip. When we were right in the middle of the lake we could see five old castles.

#### WHAT SIR WALTER MISSED.

"Derrick raved over the lake and islands, but I guess I've seen too much that is prettier and bigger. Clear Lake has it backed off the map. Ben Lomond is quite a tall peak, but not nearly as high as old Knocti (you know what I mean). I don't think old

"They directed us to the American Welcome club, and I've not seen a place yet to equal it over here, just like walking into your own home. All Scotland we found the people just flowing over with hospitality, all except one place-Loch Lomond-too many swells.

"The club is run by some Scotch women, and the meals and rooms are everything anybody could ask for, war or no war, and only 35 cents for a meal and the same for a bed. So we put away one of the meals for breakfast; porridge, fried sausage and fried potatoes, bread, butter, jam and coffee, engaged our room and started out for the rest of the day. We'd forgotten all about sleep.

#### PLENTY TO SEE.

"We had only got started up the street when a Scotch sailor, home on leave from the navy, halled us-one of the nicest chaps you'd want to see. He took us in tow, and we saw Edinburgh for two days as she was never seen before. I can't describe any of the places, but one of the ladies at the club sent you a book of the city with her compliments. She'd lived in San Francisco ten years ago up to the time of the earthquake, and then she came home to Scotland and married. But the city has more beautiful sights than I ever saw before in my young life. First, he took us throug Edinburgh castle. They can trace it back to the year 1000, and it was quite old then. He showed us where the first King of England and Scotland, James I, was born and Mons Meg; an old cannon I read about in school.

"It would take too many pages to But there tell it all. was nothing we missed. About 4 o'clock we went home with our sailor guide, and had tea and listened to tales from all over the world. We left with a promise to meet him early in the morning. After that Derrick and I walked to the park and listened to a swell Scottish band for three hours and landed in bed about 10 o'clock,

"The next morning we met Bob

Scott would have written the "Lady of the Lake" if he had seen America first. "But I'll give them credit for having a beautiful country. We went back

to Balloch and had supper at 7:30 and eaught a train back to Glasgow at \$:30. It only took us 30 minutes to go back, so we went to bed again at the

"We caught the 9 o'clock train Friday morning back to Edinburgh and got there at 10:30, so we went up to the American club for lunch. In the afternoon we went out to Forth Bridge over the River Forth. I've seen big bridges around New York and different places, but this one sure brings home the bacon.' It is three miles long and 'umptine' feet high, said to be the biggest bridge in the world. I guess et is, all right.

#### LINCOLN IN EDINBURGH,

"We saw the only statue of Abe Lincoln in Europe, in Edinburgh, put up by Edinburgh in memory of the Scottish-American soldiers who fell in the Civil War.


"We left there Friday night on the 7 o'clock train for London, We were lucky in getting a seat going back. It was a good 14 hours ride, getting u in London at 9 a, m. We went to th 'Y' and had breakfast and cleaned up but we didn't fool around any, for started in to rain as soon as we hi We had sunshine all th the Strand. time until we returned to London.

"We got a couple of good tickets t 'Yes, Uncle,' an American musica comedy, which was playing in Net York when I was there. It was really fine show and I enjoyed it, a it was the first good show I'd seen since we left New York. And the we caught the 6 o'clock train for home and got to bed by 9:30. I was tired out for we had sure been on the go. I can see, mother, that you came from Scot land, just as much as Dad came fron England. But I'm glad I'm pure Yanl just the same. By the way, we traveled over 1500 miles altogether. seeing the world alright."





## Hypnosis Course Is Canceled at North Olmsted

A course in hypnosis which was to be given by the head custodian of North Olmsted schools was canceled yesterday by Supt. Kenneth E. Lower.

The school head said it was dropped because of "newspaper publicity."

Samuel Whitman, executive secretary of the Cleveland Mental Health Association, had attacked the course as "potentially dangerous." He said it should be taught only by "someone highly trained in psychiatry."

The course was slated as part of North Olmsted's adult education program. Oliver H. Williams, head custodian for 11 years, had been named instructor.

Williams said he never had taught before. He said he learned hypnosis from his father and grandfather and had given exhibitions in hypnosis while touring with carnivals and rodeos.

THE SMELTING PLANT
AT TOWN OF BENSON

Last Sunday a Star representative had ocasion to visit the growing town of Benson, about fifty miles east of Tucson and in the northwest corner of Cochise county, the greatest of the counties of Arizona, as a producer of copper, gold and silver, more particularly the former commodity.

Of course no one would think of spending a day or even half a day in the junction town without visiting the plant of the Southwestern Smelting and Refining company, the officers of which are the following.

R. A. Boggess of San Francisco, president and general manager; A. J. Pidgeon, of the Arizona and Michigan Mining company, vice president; Walter L. Wiley, cashier of the Merchants' National bank of Peorla, Illinois, treasurer, and Franklin Bowring, of San Francisco, secretary.

Among the directors are the names of Walter L. Wiley, S. H. Cummings, J. Wyne, A. J. Pidgeon, Doane Merrill, R. A. Boggess and Franklin Bowring

The company maintains an office at 302 Mills building, San Francisco, but the main office is at Benson.

There is to be found in the plant:

The latest and most modern machinery calculated to give the miners the most accurate and exacting results. A railroad track scale of 100 ton capacity has just been finished, on which the ores received by cars, will be weighed. There will be erected scales for weighing ores received from teams.

From the scales the ore is delivered to the sampling mill platform.

After passing through the crusher, the ore is handled entirely by machinery in order to get an exact sample for determination of values. The discard is delivered into the bins, while the small sample is passed into the room where it is ground up fur ther and from which the assays are made.

The capacity of the sampler is 500 tons per ten hours.

After the ore reaches the bins, it is fed into the furnace, which consists of the latest water jacket blast furnace, having a capacity of 250 tons per day.

The smelting plant was equipped with modern flue dust chambers, flue dust gatherers, etc., for saving of values contained therein. At a very early date the company will furnish electric light for Benson.

Fuel oil will be used under the two immense high pressure boilers.

Arrayed against the trio in defense of the honesty of Boggess is Mrs. Abbie J. Reid, a beautiful young woman employed as stenographer in the office of the promoter. Though numbered among the many creditors of Boggess, Mrs. Reid expresses her faith in the honesty of her employer. She insists that his methods are schemes are bona-fide and that his securities are gilt-edged. She further asserts that the action begun in the United States

In the suit to have Boggess forced into bankruptcy there is also interested Alexander Hirsch, a German capitalist of New York. Hirsch was the plaintiff in a suit brought against Boggess last December in the United States Circuit Court, in which it was alleged that the promoter had juggled with the affairs of the Empire Consolidated Quicksilver Company of Lake County, of which he had been ap pointed receiver. Charles E. Hay, brother of the late Secretary of State, Hay, was named as co-defendant. Hirsch sued to recover \$9,626.

Neither Boggess nor Stone are in the city at present to make answer to these charges. Mrs. Reid and Franklin Bowring, who is secretary of one of the Boggess companies, alone champion their cause.

Burch, Spaulding and Sunder, the petitioners, claim that they are the creditors of Boggess in sums that aggregate \$8,075 and that the debts are founded on promissory notes. In addition they allege on information and belief that Boggess is indebted in a sum in excess of \$250,000. The other creditors are not named in the petition, but Burch states that they include banks and bankers in this State, Arizona and Illinois, the money in every instance being borrowed on promissory notes. Burch also states that Boggess owes Mrs. Reid, his stenographer, the sum of \$1,500.

The petition recites that Boggess transferred 750,000 shares of the Imperial Quicksilver Mining Company's stock to Frank M. Stone in order to hinder, delay and defraud his creditors and that he also transferred 238,000 shares of Southwestern Smelting and Refining Company's stock to Stone for the same purpose. It is further alleged that Boggess transferred 6,500 shares of the stock in the Bank of Benson, Arizona, in order to defraud his creditors. BOGGESS' ENTERPRISES.

The concerns which Boggess is promoting are the Southwestern Smelting and Refining Company, of which he is president, and the Imperial Quicksilver Mining Company, stituted the proceedings against Boggess.







He is the art editor of the "Fresno Morning Republican." – On the marriage license, Mabel Rowena Williams, age 27, b. CA, resided at 182 Sunnyside Dr., San Leandro CA. She was the daughter of Charles Whitten & Agnes Wright, both b. MI. She said it was her 2<sup>nd</sup> marriage, she being a widow. [Not true] Bruce Doubell Bowring, age 32, born CA, resided at 1615 San Pablo Ave., Fresno CO. It was his 1<sup>st</sup> marriage.

Spouse: Marion Grace Russell Cunningham Reed Bowring, has 2 CA Death Index records, one as Cunningham & one as Bowring, 9 May 1900 San Francisco, San Francisco CA – 11 Jun 1979 San Francisco, San Francisco Co. CA.

Daughter of George Lewis Russell & Jessie Estelle McMullen. The "Santa Rosa (CA) Press-Democrat" 16 Feb 1943 p 3 notes death of George L. Russell on 15 Feb 1934, a native of CA. His surviving daughter is Mrs. Bruce Bowring & his son George H. Russell of San Francisco.

Marion Russell married in San Francisco, San Francisco CA on 1 Sep 1917 in a Catholic ceremony to Milton Frederick Cunningham (28 Feb 1896-15 Jun 1980, F: 87587786), the son of Frederick HughCunningham & Catherine (Kate) Waters. Milton & Marion's son was Milton Russell Cunningham (1920-1981).

On their 1917 marriage license, Marion Grace Russell, single, 1st marriage, age 19, was a resident of 3109 Geary St., San Francisco CA. [She was not 19 but 17 and presumably underage to marry without parental consent.] She was an exchange operator, daughter of George Russell (b. CA) & Jessie McMullen (b. CA). Milton Fred Cunningham was age 22, b. CA, resident of 632 – 25th Ave., San Francisco CA, a laundry driver, son of Fred Cunningham (NY) & Kate Waters.

In the 1920 census, Milton & Marion Cunningham lived with her divorced mother, "Jessy" Russell & her brother Harvey G. Russell in San Francisco, San Francisco CA. She was awarded a divorce in CA with a monthly payment of \$30 in Dec 1927. Marion Cunningham applied for a marriage license with Robert Silver Reed on 5 Feb 1930 in San Mateo, Mateo CA. Marion Cunningham was age 29, b. CA, resident of 2045 – 16<sup>th</sup> St., Apt. 6, San Francisco, San Francisco CA. Robert Reed was age 39, b. WI, resident 2945 – 16<sup>th</sup> St., Apt. 6, San Francisco, San Francisco CA. She signed the document as Marion Grace Cunningham.

Robert was a fireman for the city of San Francisco CA. When he died in Jul 1933, his obituary listed his widow as Marion G. Reed.

In the 1930 census for San Francisco, San Francisco CA, Robert S. Reed (39 WI, father b. MO, mother b. England, age 22 at his 1<sup>st</sup> marriage, a fireman in the fire department) lived at 2954 – 16<sup>th</sup> St. with wife Marion G. Reed (29 CA, parents b. CA, age 17 at her 1<sup>st</sup> marriage, telephone operator, newspaper) & Marion's son, listed as Robert's stepson: Milton R. Cunningham (10 CA, parents b. CA).

Robert Silver Reed was born 30 Apr 1890 Superior, Douglas WI & died 5 Jul 1933 San Francisco, San Francisco CA. Robert was the son of Walter Webster Reed (1865-1958, F: 193838999) & Matilda Agnes Silver (1863-1904, F: 66912644). He had married May Linda Rastede on 12 May 1913 in San Francisco, San Francisco CA; he was age 23. When he

registered for the WWI draft in 1917, he said he was a motorman for United Railroads & was married. Robert & "Malinda" divorced in Jun 1926. He is buried in San Francisco, San Francisco CA CA, F: 3539724. His obituary lists Marion G. Reed as his widow. Marion's address in the 1940 census is 1423 Castro St., San Francisco CA. She lists herself as Marion Cunningham, divorced. This is the same address Bruce Bowring lists on his 1942 WWII draft card (25 Apr 1942) & his next-of-kin as Mrs. Marion Bowring. She is divorced & using the surname of Cunningham in this census. This would date their marriage between 1940 and 1942 but no documentation has been found.

She is buried in Cypress Lawn Memorial Park, Colma, San Mateo CA. Her tombstone reads: Bowring Russell Cunningham.
