

South Hills Worker Dies At Age Of 72

Harold W. Bresnahan, 72, of Route 3, died early Monday at the South Hills Club.

He was born Oct. 11, 1895, in Ripon, the son of William and Anna O'Malley Bresnahan.

Mr. Bresnahan was a member of St. Joseph's Church; a veteran of World War I and a survivor of the ill-fated Titanic. He worked at South Hills the last 11 years.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. E. T. Meyrs, Livonia, Mich.; five sisters, Mrs. Julia Henderson of New London, Mrs. Theresa Doenitz, Mrs. Eva Tilson, Miss Nora Bresnahan and Miss Irma Bresnahan, all of the city, and six grandchildren.

His parents, four sisters and one brother preceded him in death.

Funeral services will be held at 9:30 a.m. Thursday at Uecker-Witt Funeral Home, and at 10 a.m. at St. Joseph's Church, with the Rev. James R. Thurman officiating. Burial will be in Calvary Cemetery.

Mrs. William Bresnahan of Ripon, is in receipt of three telegrams apprising her of the safety of her son, Harold W. Bresnahan, a member of the 107th Supply Train, aboard the Tuscania. The telegrams were from the War Department, the adjutant general and the Red Cross Chapter.

in July. He has been writing home regularly until about three weeks ago. He wrote home January 28, telling his mother not to expect a letter for a month at least as he was leaving shortly for a foreign port.

VALE'S MEN LAST OUT OF FRANCE

107th Supply Train Officially Announced to Arrive on Virginian on Next Monday Morning.

ALL SAW HEROIC SERVICE

Formal Orders of the War Department
Announces This as the Last Unit to
Sail for the State—Milwaukee
Planning Grand Review.

The one hundredth and seventh supply train, which has seen wonderful service over in France under the command of Captain Asbury Vale of Kenosha and which contains some sixty Kenosha men did not return on the Louisiana on Tuesday and a new order of the War Department states that this unit of the 32nd Division has sailed from Brest aboard the battleship Virginia and it is due to arrive at Newport News on the morning of next Monday May 19th. As the transports with returning troops have been coming into ports in this country about a day ahead it is pretty probable that the word from these boys will begin to reach Kenosha about next Sunday at noon. The 107th will be on the last steamer bearing members of the 32nd Division from France home. It is probable that the men will be sent to Camp Upton to await order to move West to Camp Grant. It is not known who will be in command of the train since Captain Vale has been ordered back to Coblenz. Get \$877 Cash in Hub Market; Home Entered

Pearl Necklace Lost in Bresnahan Home; Police Investigate Both Jobs.

Two burglaries, one of which yielded \$877 in cash and the other jewelry valued at \$200, were being investigated by the police today.

In the first of the two, a bedroom in the home of Harold Bresnahan, 6330 Sheridan road, was found ransacked and a pearl necklace and a diamond ring was stolen.

In the second burglary, two yeggs rifled a safe in the meat market owned by Joseph Fiorini at 6221 Twenty-second avenue, after having spent the greater part of a night opening it. They secured nearly \$900 in cash, but did not disturb papers or other articles in the safe, and left untouched the rest of the market.

Bresnahan Home Entered

Police reported another burglary on Sunday, which is occupying the attention of the detectives.

Harold Bresnahan, 6330 Sheridan road, reported at 8:00 o'clock Sunday night that he had just found a bedroom ransacked in his home.

Detectives Frank McClusky and Paul Callahan were assigned to the case. Bresnahan told them that he and his wife had gone out for a ride between 4:20 o'clock and 5:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Mrs. Bresnahan then went into the bedroom to dress for dinner. She opened the bedroom window about three inches from the top, and placed her diamond ring and string of pearls on the dresser.

Return to Find Jewels Gone

At 7:30 o'clock, with dinner over, Mrs. Bresnahan went into the bedroom to find the dresser drawers had been ransacked and their contents spilled over the room. So far as could be ascertained Sunday night the only articles missing were the diamond white gold ring, valued at \$150 and the pearl necklace valued at \$50.00.

No one was heard or seen in the home during the time that the robbery was committed, the Bresnahans told the police.

Police reported that there were some fingerprints on the dresser drawers and Detective Robert Deschneau, fingerprint expert, took these for records. While Deschneau was working on the case this morning Mrs. Bresnahan found the diamond ring on the driveway outside the window through which the burglars entered. The necklace is still missing, however. Detectives hinted that the job was done by kids.

Dodd, on a \$30 check. Earlier this week he applied for parole; it was denied. Harold admitted he forged checks on a number of occasions but always made them good. He is divorced & the father of 1 child. He has lived in Fond du Lac & New London. In Oshkosh, he resided at 708 Mount Vernon St.

"Oshkosh Northwestern" 7 Jun 1943 p 5 – Harold Bresnahan, age 47, a resident of the Milner Hotel, pled guilty in Municipal Court on 7 Jun 1943 to a charge of grand larceny. He stole \$75 from Mrs. Viola Sprague, proprietor of the Blue Front Tavern on High Street, where he is employed as a bartender. He said he was intoxicated 2 Jun when he stole the

money. He went to Milwaukee where he spent all but \$16, returning to Oshkosh 5 Jun where he was arrested at Main & High streets on his way to the tavern.
