



Survivors Not on Official List

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Eighteen hundred and thirty-two names of American soldiers rescued from the torpedoed liner Tuscania had been reported to-night to the War Department, leaving 345 of the soldiers on board unaccounted for.

No official report has reached the department to change the estimate that all except 113 of the men were saved, but the names have been coming in very slowly over the cables and there is no assurance as to when the list will be complete.

From the names so far received and the passenger list of the lost steamer The Associated Press has compiled the record of those still not reported. Probably more than two hundred of the men whose names appear on this record are safe in Ireland and will be reported soon.

The preparation of the list, even in its incomplete form, represents an aggregate of one hundred and forty hours of labor. The War Department has only issued an official roll of those on the ship. The Committee on Public Information has made no effort to compile a list of the missing, merely issuing lists of survivors. The list follows:

Bruno, an Italian by birth, was twenty-six years old, and voluntarily left his machine shop employment to go into the army. He has a brother at Camp Mills.

as saved to about 200. The war department is exchanging daily long cablegrams with the embassy at London in an effort to complete the survivors' roll and untangle names garbled in transmission. In spite of the fact that only some 260 of those on the passenger list are officially unaccounted for, the department has more than 270 names of survivors which it has been unable to decipher, About forty of these are supposed to be duplications and as many more are names of those of whom there is no record. "TAXI" WILL MAKE GERMANS SETTLE FOR LOST STEAK

Extracts From Diary of Private Friedman, Who Was on Torpedoed Tuscania.

A slice of raw boefsteak was resting on the bad eye of Private Friedman, who, clad in shirt and breeches, was lying on his back in a bunk nursing the bad eye which an American fist in a recent friendly boxing had blackened. Then along came a torpedo which shook off the beefsteak and sunk the American transport Tuscania. So Friedman, minus the steak, went upstairs and sat down on a life faft, thinking resentfully about the Germans. A German or two may live to regret having disturbed the convalescence of Private Friedman's eye, and to regret a few other things that have stirred his wrath. Maybe some Germans already have cause to regret, but that would be a military secret.

Presently, dear reader, we shall let Private Friedman tell in his own words the story of the beefsteak, the torpedo, the raft and other things. But first let's introduce him.

Broadway knows him by the name of "Taxi," because that is the generic name of all taxi drivers in New York. His real name is Walter C. Friedman, formerly of No. 737 Lexington Avenue, now of the 213th Aero Squadron, American Expeditionary Force. He kept a diary and The Evening World is privileged to publish here some extracts from it. We'll begin with Feb. 5, which was the day things began to happen. The Tuscanta was in the submarine zone then:

COME SIGHT OF LAND.

"Feb. 5.—We had boxing bouts on board from 2 until 4.30 P. M. I boxed a boy from another company and got a nice black eye. About 3.30 P. M. we saw land and were told it was the coast of Scotland, and the boys cheered. Boxing was over and we went down to messroom for eats. My eye was pretty bad and the steward gave me a piece of raw beefsteak. I went to my bunk and lay down and put the meat on my eye.

"I was there only a short time when I heard a crash and fell out of my bunk and the meat fell, off and all the lights went out."

"I surmised it was a torpedo or mine that hit us, so I ran up on deck as fast as I could, but I had to take my time as all the boys were doing the same. When I got on deck I quickly got to the station where the lifeboat I was assigned to was, but the explosion had wrecked our boat, as it was on the starboard side.

"Well, it looked pretty bad for us until the Lieutenant in charge of 9-A crew told us there were some rafts at the stern and all that wanted to could get on them. So I was one to go with him.

"Right here I want to say something for one of my comrades by the name of Frank Bruno, a New York boy, member of the 213th Aero. He was one of the unfortunate ones who were lost.

"I had nothing on but shirt and breeches when I came on deck. So while we were launching the raft Frank came up and said: 'Walter, it's going to be awful cold on that raft and you haven't got much on. Wait a minute.'

"Before I could say anything he was gone, and in a few minutes he was up there with three coats, a lifebelt and a helinet for me. He gave two of the coats to some boys and then I asked him to come on the raft with me. But he said he would wait a while, as the boat did not look like it would sink just then, and some boys were saying they were going to run her aground.

COMRADE LOST LIFE TRYING TO SAVE OTHERS.

"I can't understand how Frank lost his life, but I am party sure he lost it trying to save the other boys. He was one of those boys that never thought of himself, and I certainly felt bad when I heard we had lost one of our pals, a boy who gave his life for his country and his comrades. But if I get a chance, which I hope to get soon, I will make the Germans pay dearly for his life.

"We launched the raft and slid down the rope—the Lieutenant and seven other boys and l—and we rowed the best we could to get away from the ship before she went down, as she might suck us down with her. But luckily she didn't go down until about 9.30, and we saw the great rescue by the British fleet which saved so many of our boys.

"We were quite safe on the raft and did not expect to be picked up until daylight. But about 10.30 we saw a ship near us and yelled to it. And one of the boys who was smoking a cigarette flashed it in the dark while we yelled. It was a pretty good signal as the boat came alongside us and pulled us on board. They took us down in the dining room and gave us blankets and took our clothes down in the potter room to dry.

"They told us she was a British trawler and had beet, twenty miles away when she got the wireless. was 5 A. M. when we landed in an Irish town. We were taken to a hotel where they had hot tea and beefsteak for us. The Red Cross nurses gave us dry clothes and medicine for our coughs and colds, and then we all got rooms in the hotel and stayed four days, until we left for England, where we met the rest of the survivors. "It was some reunion-sh hands with the two boys. reunion-shaking boys feel none the worse for their experience, and what they all ask is when are we going to get a crack at the Germans so we can get even with them and give them a dose of of their own medicine." Private Friedman enlisted and "beat the draft." He is one of the Ameri-cans "over there" where the big drive is on. And he is the kind that the Germane already are meeting.

Walter Charles Friedman of the 213th Aero Squadron wrote in his diary about the sinking of the Tuscania, and how Frank Bruno, also in the 213th, saw Friedman on deck wearing only a shirt & breeches & went below. Bruno returned with 3 coats, one of them for Friedman, 2 for other men & a lifebelt & helmet for Friedman, telling him it was going to be cold on the raft. He did not join Friedman in the lifeboat but decided to wait. Friedman wrote that Bruno never thought of himself, and likely lost his life because he was helping others. 



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




Headstone of brother Ross Bruno (1891/1892-1963) – Find A Grave 236490982

Doctor Killed By His Car In Icy-Driveway Accident

Crushed Under Bumper Against Curb As Motor Runs And He Pushes Briefly Stuck Auto

Suffern - A young resident motor running and the automatic physician at Good Samaritan Hospital, telephoned by one of his parents' neighbors that something was amiss at their home, yesterday afternoon found his father, a prominent Rockland County podiatrist, crushed to death between his car and a driveway curb.

Dr. Cyrus J. Arrigo, 69. who practiced in the County for 40 years, was pronounced dead by Dr. Leonard Benedetto, Rockland

County coroner.

An autopsy showed Dr. Arrigo fied instantly of a crushed chest. Fifteen of his ribs were broken, according to the coroner.

The accident occurred in the driveway of Dr. Arrigo's home, a hundred feet back from Route

The podiatrist's son. John, rushed home from his duties at Good Samaritan Hospital and found his father pinned under the car's right front bumper, according to authorities. No one was at home at the time.

Authorities said Dr. Arrigo apparently drove his car onto a patch of ice where it became stuck. He got out of the car to

transmission in low gear, according to the coroner.

The auto apparently began moving, knocked Dr. Arrigo to the curb of the driveway and crushed him under its bumper, the coroner said.

Investigating authorities found marks where the rear tires had churned into the ground before

the car stalled.

The podiatrist's son used his own auto jack to lift the car from his father's body, which police removed from under the vehicle.

Dr. Arrigo was active in medical o ganizations. He started practice in Nyack 40 years ago. He was a graduate of the Long Island University College of Podiatry. Dr. Arrigo was raised ir New York City.

He was a member of the Royal Health Society of England, and was president of the Rockland Podiatry Association. He was also Nyack police podiatric surgeon for 20 years.

Dr. Arrigo is survived by his wife, Catherine; his sons Dr. John Arrigo of Suffern and Frank A.rigo of Oradell, N. J.; a daughpush it from the ice, leaving the ter, Mrs. Dorothy Galante of



His Death Leap Due to Mistake

Suicide Believed Himself Wife's Ax Slayer.

Fate played a grim joke on Herman Schukke, 48-year-old baker, yesterday. Schukke quarreled with his wife—even as you and I—and, infuriated by her insistence that he do something constructive about getting work, struck her in the head with a small hatchet.

Schukke saw the streaming blood, saw his wife fall to the floor; saw her aged mother, who hadn't paid attention to the quarrel, rush in and fall down beside

her daughter.

With his mother-in-law's shrieks, "You've killed my daughter!" ringing in his ears, Schukke fled to the roof of his house at 112 East 116th st. Behind him was the wreck of eighteen years of marital contentment and the horror of murder; ahead of him was the peace of oblivion, surcease from work and quarrels. Without hesitation, he jumped—six stories to the street.

He did not know that inside his apartment his wife, only dazed from a glancing blow on the head,
