



He trained at Washington University camp, Washington. He was a sign painter and 27 years old. His brother, Samuel, 22 years old, is in the Quartermaster Corps at Camp Johnson.

Forty-eight children, the sons and daughters of prominent residents of Ridley Park, delighted a large and appreciative audience of parents and friends assembled last evening in the borough auditorium, with cleverly executed folk-lore dances and song carnival, given under the caption of "Mother Nature's Garden Party," in the Auditorium. The young folks had been striving for several months to make the pageant a success and this they accomplished, their efforts being heartily appreciated. The excellent work of the children reflected much credit on those who assisted in staging the pleasing affair. The carnival was given under the direction of the Evening Entertainment Committee of the Woman's Club and the proceeds derived from the venture will be divided between the Playgrounds and Country Week Associations.

NINE Philadelphians are known to have been on the *Tuscania*. One, First Lieutenant Richards Jarden, is known to be among the survivors. The list follows:

Names of survivors from the transport *Tuscania*, which was torpedoed off the north coast of Ireland were being received late last night in Washington.

The list contains the names of three Philadelphians, Private William H. Donnell, Second Lieutenant Richard Jarden and Private Earl W. Widdop. There were nine men from this city aboard the *Tuscania*, but as the list is not complete the fate of the remainder cannot be determined. They are Sergeant William J. Lambert, First Lieutenant James McCormick, Private Edward E. Bardsley, Corporal Chester H. Reed, Private Albert R. Jacobs and Private Archley C. Leavitt.

The names of those actually lost will not be determined until all the survivors have been checked on the sailing list of the *Tuscania*. The names of those saved are being cabled as rapidly as possible.

There was no change yesterday in official figures of the victims of the *Tuscania*. A dispatch from an Irish port sticks to 101 casualties, although the War Department has 113 men unaccounted for.

AMONG THE MANY INVENTIONS which are to be sprung on the unsuspecting public this coming season is one from the brain of a Philadelphian. It is certainly something out of the ordinary and will catch fish if the fish will bite. It is an automatic float which contains an apparatus which cinches the fish the instant it bites. For the purpose of catching small fish which are not protected by the fish laws of the State it seems to be all right, but it




Is a question whether it would not come under the ban if it were to be used for the purpose of catching game fish, although E. E. Bardsley, the inventor, says he thinks it is legal. It consists of what looks like an ordinary float made of wood, but through the centre, from top to bottom, is a hole through which runs a strong wire fastened to the top by a rubber band. At the lower end of the hole and connected with the wire is what might be called the "set" of the trap, for in reality the invention is nothing more or less than a trap. Running down from this trap is the line and hook or hooks. The modus operandi of the concern is this: The hook is baited, the trap set, the innocent little fish comes along, takes a fall out of the worm, the jerk springs the trap, the rubber band draws the hook and float together and if the angler is there for business the finny victim is on the bank half a minute later.

A fluid motor consisting of a disk or plate and a nozzle located above the plate but inclined downward toward the same, and also occupying a position parallel with a line tangential to the periphery of the plate so that it will discharge downward upon the face of the plate, adjacent to the periphery of the same, a jet parallel to such tangential line, substantially as specified.

2. A fluid motor in which are combined a disk or plate having an upturned flange upon its outer edge, and a nozzle located above the plate but inclined downward toward the same, and also occupying a position parallel with a line tangential to the periphery of the plate, whereby it will discharge downward upon the face of the plate, adjacent to the periphery of the same and within the flange, a jet par-

allel to such tangential line, substantially as specified.

3. A fluid motor in which are combined a disk or plate, and a nozzle located above the plate but inclined downward toward the same, said nozzle being pivoted to the supply pipe and capable of being moved thereon to right or left so as to occupy, when in either extreme of movement, a position parallel with a line tangential to the periphery of the plate, substantially as specified.





To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, EDWARD E. BARDSLEY, a citizen of the United States, residing in Center township, in the county of Camden and State of New Jersey, (whose post-office address is Westville, Gloucester county, New Jersey,) have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Hair-Wavers, of which the following is a specification.

My invention relates to a device for producing in ladies' hair the appearance commonly known as the Marcel wave, in which the hair is given a peculiar complex wave which is characterized by having the individual strands of hair waved in planes at an angle to the general plane of the lock of hair in which said strands are associated.

The object of my invention is to provide a simple and efficient device for producing the Marcel wave, which device will be automatic in its action to produce the desired result, and which will require no particular skill on the part of the user in its manipulation.

The nature and characteristic features of my invention will be more readily understood from the following description, taken in connection with accompanying drawings forming part hereof, in which—

drawings. The arm 7 is also provided with a heat insulating handle 9 which carries a finger loop 10, in which one of the fingers of the user is adapted to be inserted to insure the proper actuation of the device. The arm 7 is provided near its rearward end with a horizontal slot 11, and at a position intermediate its end, with a slot 12 which is preferably V shaped, these slots 11 and 12 being provided for a purpose to be presently explained.

The member 6 preferably comprises two thin flat arms 12, 13, arranged one on each side of the arm 7 of member 5, and carrying at their forward ends another jaw 14 of the waving device proper, which is also preferably made of sheet metal and having an operative surface complementary to the operative surface of the jaw 8.

The arms 13 also carry a heat insulating handle 15, which is also provided with a finger loop 16 to insure the proper actuation of the device.

The rear ends of the arms 13 are connected to each other by means of a pin or rivet 17 which passes through the horizontal slot 11 in the rear end of arm 7 of member 5, and likewise the arms 13 are connected intermediate their ends by means of a pin or

PATENTS—INFRINGEMENT—ROTARY WATER MOTOR.

The **Bardsley** patent, No. 509,644, for a rotary fluid motor, is not infringed by a dental spittoon made in accordance with the Hurlbut re-issue, No. 11,696, in which the inner bowl is revolved by a jet of water similar to that employed to revolve the motor of the patent; such feature of the device not being patentable.

Woods, Circuit Judge, dissenting.

Appeal from the Circuit Court of the United States for the District of Indiana.

The action in the Circuit Court was to restrain the appellee from infringing Letters Patent No. 509,644, granted to **Edward E. Bardsley**, November 28, 1893, for a rotary fluid motor, assigned to appellants.

The infringing spittoon is manufactured in accordance with re-issue Letters Patent, No. 11,696, granted September 27, 1898, to Frank Hurlbut, for a dental spittoon. Both the Hurlbut and **Bardsley patents**, and other **patents** bearing upon the controversy, are set out at large, or cited, in *Justi v. Clark* (this day decided by this court) 47 C. C. A. 565, 108 Fed. 659.


