Bullard, Dexter Lyman 1888 NY – 1963 FL

DEXTER LYMAN BULLARD
Mr. Bullard, 75, of sixth Street, Port Salerno, died in Veterans' Hospital, Coral Gables, Tuesday evening following an extended illness.
He was a native of Newport, N.Y., and had lived here for the past eight years. He was a member of Harold Johns Post 62, American Legion, Stuart, and of the Port Salerno Civic Association, and attended Port Salerno Southern Methodist Church.
Survivors include the widow, Florence Gladstone Bullard, Port Salerno; a daughter, Mrs. Carl Tromsdorff, Herbertsville, N.J.; a sister, Mrs. Leonard Allery; two brothers, Fred and Barnum Bullard; all of South Hadley, Mass., and two grandchildren.
Funeral services will be at 11 a.m. Saturday at John's Funeral Home Chapel, Stuart, with Rev. Durward H. Knight, pastor of the Southern Methodist Church of Port Salerno, officiating. Burial will be at Fern Hill Memorial Park.
Friends may call from 7 to 9 p.m. today and Friday at the funeral home.

Dexter L. Bullard

Dexter, Lyman Bullard, 75, of Salerno, Fla., a former resident of South Hadley, died Tuesday at the Veterans Administration Hospital at Coral Gables, Fla.

He was the son of the late Fred E. and Fannie A. (Comstock) Bullard and was born Aug. 2, 1888, at Newport, N.Y.

Mr. Bullard was a veteran of World War I. He enlisted from Ely, Nev., and went to Camp Lewis, Wash., Nov. 4, 1917. He was assigned to the 20th Engineers (Forestry) at Washington, D.C., Jan. 1, 1918.

He sailed for overseas on the S.S. Tuscania Jan. 24, 1918. The ship was torpedoed and struck off the north coast of Ireland on Feb. 5, 1918. Picked up by a trawler and landed at Larne, Ireland, Bullard was one of 53 survivors. There were 210 lost in the sinking of the Tuscania.

He served with various camps with the 20th Engineers. Returning to the United States in May, 1919, he was discharged at Camp Devens June 12, 1919.

Mr. Bullard leaves his wife, Mrs. Florence Gladstone Bullard; a daughter, Mrs. Carl Tromsdorff of Lakewood, N.Y.; two grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Leonard Allery of South Hadley Falls, and two brothers, Fred of Chicopee Falls and Varnum of South Hadley.

Funeral service and burial were held Friday at Salerno.

DEXTER LYMAN BULLARD

Born at Newport, N. Y., August 2, 1888. Son of Fred E. and Fannie A. (Comstock) Bullard. Enlisted from Ely, Nevada and sent to Camp Lewis, State of Washington, November 4, 1917. Assigned to 20th Engineers (Forestry) at Washington, D. C., January 1, 1918. Sailed for overseas on S. S. Tuscania, January 24, 1918. Ship torpedoed and struck off the north coast of Ireland, February 5, 1918. Picked up by trawler and landed at Larne, Ireland. 53 survivors, 210 lost. From rest camps in Ireland and England shipped to France. Served in various camps with 20th Engineers. Sailed for the U. S. with 17th Co., 20th Engineers, May 14, 1919. Sent to Camp Merritt, N. J., and from there to Camp Devens, Mass. Honorably discharged at Camp Devens, June 12, 1919.

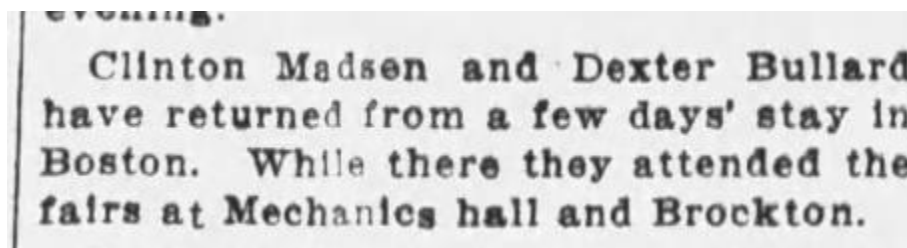

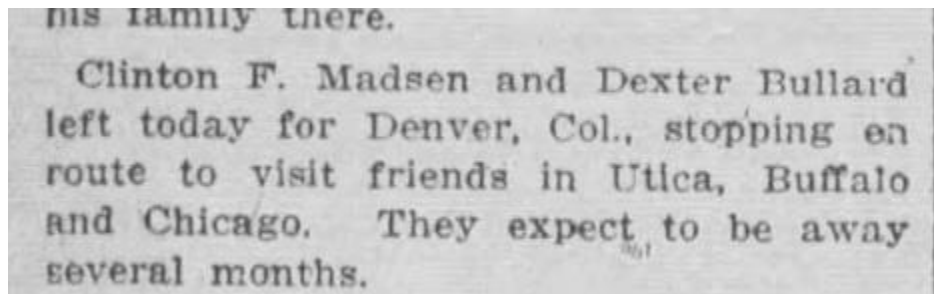

**DEXTER L. BULLARD MAY HAVE
BEEN ON TUSCANIA**

Was with Co. E, 20th Engineers. Reported to Have Been on Ill Fated Transport—Lieutenant Gore of Amherst.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Bullard of Cottage avenue, are anxiously awaiting word as to the safety of their son, Private Dexter L. Bullard, 30 years old, a member of Co. E, 6th Battalion, 20th Forestry Engineers, who is thought to have been on the ill-fated transport, the Tuscania, which was torpedoed by a German submarine.

A dispatch giving the names of 22 members of this company, as having been saved, does not contain that of the local boy. He was drafted in White Pine, County Ely, Nevada, on November 3, and was a member of the 37th Co., 166th Regiment, Depot Brigade at Camp Lewis, American Lake, Washington, but was recently transferred to the Engineers.

He was a mine concentrator and when his ability in this line of work was discovered he was sent to the 20th Engineers and left for France with the regiment. He was a member of the Odd Fellows.

Lieut. Harold M. Gore of Amherst, is also thought to have been on the Tuscania, as at last reports he was said to be in the same outfit as was Bullard. Lieutenant Gore received his commission at Plattsburg, November 26, 1917.

DEXTER L. BULLARD SAFE

Survives Sinking of Tuscania—Telegram Received from War Department.

A telegram received from the War Department Saturday night by Mr. and Mrs. Fred Bullard of Cottage avenue reported that Dexter L. Bullard of this town, a member of Co. E, 6th Battalion, 20th Forestry Engineers, was safe, having survived the torpedoing of the Cunard liner Tuscania. There was a great deal of anxiety here when word was received earlier in the week that a lifeboat containing 22 members of Bullard's company, had come ashore and that he was not among the number. It was with much relief that his parents received the official notification of his safety.

TUSCANIA SURVIVOR WRITES OF EXPERIENCE

PRIVATE DEXTER L. BULLARD OF SOUTH HADLEY FALLS LOST EVERYTHING BUT CLOTHES ON BACK.

In Open Life Boat For Three and a Half Hours in Darkness Before Patrol Boat Picked Them Up—Letter Written in England.

Dexter L. Bullard of Cottage street, South Hadley Falls, a private in Co. E, 8th Battalion, 20th U. S. Engineers, who was on the United States Transport Tuscania, has sent his first letter home since the boat was torpedoed by a German submarine. In his letter he tells of being in an open life boat for three and a half hours before being picked up by a patrol boat. Because of the rigid censorship in England he was not able to tell all that he could. The letter follows:

Belfast, England, Feb. 8, 1918.

Dear Mother: No doubt the news has reached the United States by this time of the torpedoing of the first transport of United States troops, on which I was one of the number. But very fortunately I was one of the lucky ones. I do not feel any worse for the experience, although many received injuries of some kind, I did not get a scratch.

There were 53 men in the life boat that I was in and we got away in 30 minutes from the time the transport was hit, so did not see any of the pitiable scenes that I heard of later. We were picked up by a patrol boat after rowing around in the darkness for three and a half hours.

We have our company together now but there are 40 unaccounted for, but some of them may turn up later. I believe we lost 25 or 30 men out of 250.

I guess you have been notified that I am safe. I heard that the depot at Jersey City was blown up the second day we arrived there from Washington, so they must have missed us by several hours, but they nearly got us over here.

I lost everything I had except the clothes on my back. I lost my blouse, but saved my mackinaw. I was given a blouse here. It is the kind the British soldiers wear. We have been treated fine by the townspeople and they gave us a royal sendoff when we left for camp where we are now located. We are not permanently located here. We are to move again soon.

Will close for the present. Write often as it takes so long for mail to reach one here and don't worry any about me as I am sure I shall come through it all whole. DEXTER.

ANOTHER LETTER FROM PRIV. DEXTER L. BULLARD

South Hadley Falls Boy on Fated Tuscania Writes of Address Delivered By Ambassador Page.

A letter received in South Hadley Falls by Clinton Madgen from Private Dexter L. Bullard of that town tells of an address, heard by 2,000 American soldiers, delivered by Ambassador

Page. The Falls soldier, who is a member of the 20th Forestry Engineers, writes that there are but nine members of his company missing. A week ago there were 35 unaccounted for.

The letter was mailed at Winchester, England, and was dated February 13th. He said in part, "There are only nine men in our company missing. Ambassador Page was here this afternoon, and gave a short talk to the rescued men and there were over 2,000 of them, including the officers."

It is understood that the South Hadley Falls Red Cross is going to send Private Bullard an entire outfit, he having lost everything when the Tuscania sunk. He is now wearing a British soldier's outfit.

**TUSCANIA SURVIVOR
TELLS OF EXPERIENCES**

**ON ACTIVE SERVICE WITH

Winchester, Eng., Feb. 12, 1918.

Dear Mr. Trusdall:

No doubt you will be surprised to know that I am on this side of the pond although my trip over was interrupted by a torpedo from a U-boat. I was on the ill-fated Tuscania when she was struck but luckily for me I was fortunate to get away in one of the first life boats to be launched. There were 53 men in the boat and we got away from the transport without mishap and were picked up by a patrol boat after we rowed around for about three hours in the dark. We were taken to a seaport town in the north of Ireland where we were given the best of treatment. There were about 500 soldiers landed there and we were the center of interest to the townspeople, being the first American

troops they had seen. After staying at that place three days we were moved to a camp not far distant where we joined the balance of our company that had been rescued. Only nine men in our company were unaccounted for.

I heard that the railway station in Jersey City was blown either the same night or the next day after we left there, so the Huns missed getting us twice which is not much to their credit.

I wish you would give this letter to the White Pine News so all my friends will know that I am safe. I am unable to write to them all.

I had a letter and also received two pairs of socks from Mother Trusdall before I left Washington, but they like the rest of my effects are at the bottom of the sea. I certainly miss the little knit bag the ladies in Ely gave us boys the morning we left.

I forgot to mention that I was the only one from White Pine county on the transport, so there need be no anxiety on the part of friends or relatives concerning any of the boys that left Ely with me.

Would greatly appreciate it if you will send a copy of the White Pine News occasionally.

With best regards to all who may ask about me and a heap for yourself.

TUSCANIA SURVIVOR WRITES Q. M. G.

Lady Denby Also Sends Letter of Heartfelt Thanks.

Private Dexter Bullard of South Hadley Falls, a survivor of the torpedoed transport Tuscania, has written the following interesting letter to the Queen Mary Needlework Guild of this city:

Army and Navy Y. W. C. A.
Winchester, England.

Dear Miss Parfitt:—Will now answer your letter which I received while in Washington and which I still have with me, as it was in my mackinaw pocket with several others I had not answered. I have not received the box of cookies and pies which you sent me, and I doubt if they were forwarded from the States, but I still have hopes of receiving them when we arrive in France, as I received your letter before I left Washington, saying you were sending me a box, but we left that night so did not get all my mail. One of these pies would go fine right now; and I bet I could get Sixpence

from each man for a look at an American pie.

We received an advance of \$10.00 on our January pay when we got here, and they paid us in England money, and a good many of the boys got confused when they went to buy anything. I soon learned the value of the coins, and the only trouble I had was in making them last, as everything seems to be higher here than in the States. When I read your letter, I did not think I would be over here so soon, and see the green fields in February as you told about. The fields are green everywhere, and the farmers were doing their plowing last month. The spring flowers are coming out now, and the weather has been fine the last few days. I have been into Winchester several times and visited the Cathedral there, which was started in 1093, and contains the tombs of many Kings, including William the Conqueror, and Isaac Walton, who wrote "The Angler." He used to fish in the streams around here, including the river Itchen.

I guess the U. S. has awakened to the realization that we are in the war, since the sinking of the Tuscania by a

German U-boat. I won't tell you much about that, as I think you already know from my mother that I was among those that were on the boat, and that I landed safe in Ireland after being picked up by a Patrol Boat. I do not feel any the worse off for the experience, but would not care to go through it again. We may get it though, when we cross the English Channel.

Will close for this time, and if I receive the box of cookies and pies will write and let you know about it.

**Cora Bullard Ran Away From Home—
Found In Syracuse.**

Cora Bullard, 15 years old, a runaway girl from Utica, was captured in Fayette Park yesterday afternoon by Detective James Keefe after a chase through the inclosure, says the Syracuse Post-Standard.

The girl left her home in Utica some time in June and came at once to Syracuse. She worked for a week here and returned home. On July 3 again came here.

Her father, Fred Bullard, came to Syracuse yesterday and asked the police to institute a search for her. Detective James Keefe was detailed on the case. He ascertained that the girl had been spending a good deal of her time in Fayette Park.

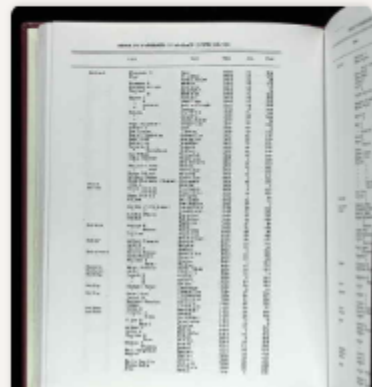

SOUTH HADLEY — The Electric Light Department should not purchase more electric power generated by the Seabrook, N.H., nuclear power plant, according people interviewed at random here Monday.

The majority of those interviewed oppose the proposed purchase of power from Seabrook, an issue which is before the Municipal Light Board. The Massachusetts Municipal Wholesale Electric Co. has proposed selling the SHELCO about \$15 million in Seabrook power.

Interviews conducted in the Falls, at the Woodlawn Shopping Center parking lot and at the Center Common revealed that opposition stems from objections about nuclear power rather than the proposed purchase itself.

Dawn Dietz of 86 Bardwell St., a student at Holyoke Community College, said she opposes the use of nuclear power.

“More money should be used to develop solar energy because there is less hazard than with nuclear power, with all the waste to deal with,” Miss Dietz said.

“Get rid of them”

Varnum Bullard, of 99 Essex St., Holyoke, a resident of South Hadley for 65 years, said of nuclear power plants, “the sooner they get rid of them the better.”

Dave Allen of 55½ N. Main St. said that nuclear power plants have never been a good investment, and are frequently shut down.

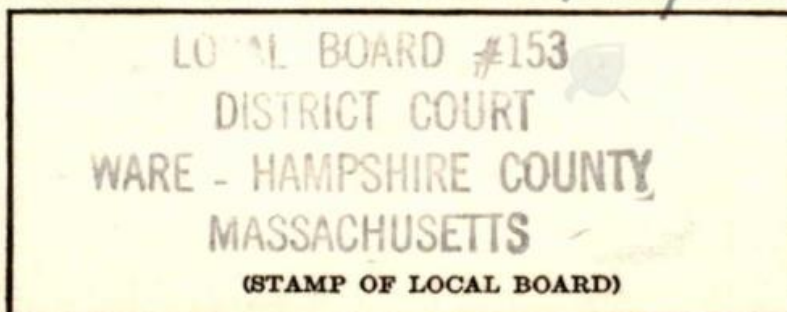

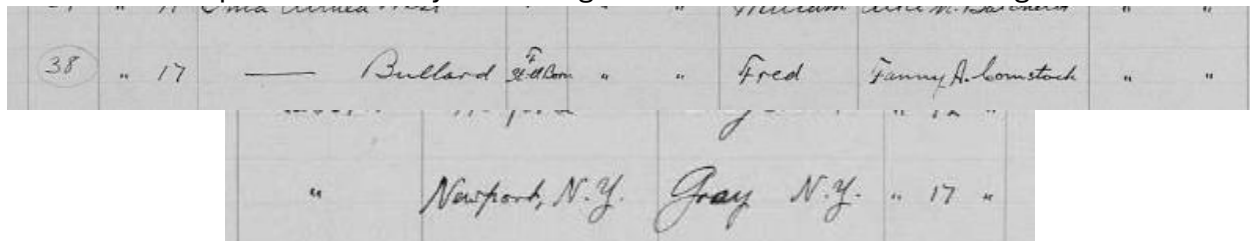

Fannie Bullard of South Hadley MA. Burial occurred 2 Jan 1925 in "Village Cemetery" (that is, South Hadley Falls Cemetery, South Hadley, Hampshire MA.

A week later, she charged that a Utica NY jeweler was guilty of "criminal assault" upon her. In Aug

1906, a runaway Cora was apprehended in Syracuse NY. This time, her mother had sworn out a warrant charging her with being “wayard.” Institutionalization was being considered. - Cora E. Wartime:

His obituary reports he was 1 of 53 survivors, apparently of the Tuscania. According to a wartime newspaper article, there were 53 people in his lifeboat. He & the others were picked up by a patrol boat after rowing in the dark for 3.5 hours. Dexter reported that his lifeboat had left 30 minutes after the torpedo hit, so he was not a witness to later events.
