



# Port Jefferson Survivor of Tuscania Writes Home

Port Jefferson, March 16.—A letter has been received from Edward C. Barker, who was aboard the Tuscania. It is dated February 11, and postmarked at Belfast, Ireland. In part, it follows:

"Well, I am still here and able to write, but I surely have had some experience since I left. After our start across the ocean everything went along smoothly until the night of the thirteenth day—the 5th of February—when, at 5:45 o'clock, there was a big bang, and we found that the ship had been torpedoed and we were sinking. When the ship was struck I was below, and, with others, went on deck. Here I found that the lifeboat that I had been assigned to had been torn away. The Lieutenant in Command gave orders to take the life rafts. These rafts were thrown over the side of the ship and the soldiers slid down to them, hand over hand, by means of ropes fastened to the ship's deck. On my raft there were eleven other soldiers, and, after rowing around, we picked up two fellows who were swimming in the water.

"After bein gon the raft about one hour, we were standing in water up to our waist, the raft having settled to that depth. But we didn't mind that; as we were already thoroughly wet through. This pleasant experience lasted for two hours, when we were picked up by a torpedo boat destroyer and taken on board.

"When I got up my legs were cramped to a kneeling position, and the sailors from the boat carried me down below, took off my clothes, wrapped blankets around me and gave me a hot bown of tea. After looking around for survivors, the torpedo boat destroyer went into port, where we were taken off and sent to a hospital. We were given a big feed, after which we were taken to a barracks. By this time it was 6 o'clock in the morning, but we went to sleep in a hurry, as we were all in. In all, there were about three hundred survivors aboard the destroyer, but only seven of them were from my squadron. In the morning some more of the soldiers came over, and among them were Raymond Davis and Fred Davis. I have not as yet seen anything of Roscoe Soper or Luther Smith, but I understand there is another bunch of the boys to meet us here today, and I certainly hope they will be among them. "Believe me, the people here have

certainly treated us fine. They even gave us their beds and—talk about eats!—after eating an ordinary meal, they would insist on us eating more. We thank God that we came out of it as well as we did.

"At present, we are like a one-night stand circus. Since we have landed here, we have been in five different towns, and are still going. As the saying goes, 'We are on our way, but we don't know where." You should see my uniform! I am wearing a civilian cap, United States soldier's overcoat and blouse, a British sailor's trousers and Irish leggings and shoes. I am some sight, but, nevertheless, with all this toggery, I am feeling fine. Haven't even had a headache. When the ship went down I lost everything, execpt what was actually on my per-son. This included my razor and shaving outfit, which must immediately be replaced."

# HAWKINS ASSUMES TAX POST DUTIES

New Brookhaven Town Commissioner Appoints Assistants.

Patchogue, Dec. 2.—After a lapse of 21 years, Herman P. Hawkins became Receiver of Taxes of Brookhaven Town again today as he took up his duties after having qualified just before noon yesterday following two days of hectic business in getting his bond finally approved by the Brookhaven Town Board.

That body met Wednesday to approve his bond of \$50,000, but when it was reviewed it was found that it was not in the form desired by the board and Town Counsel Ralph J. Hawkins, so it was sent back to Brooklyn by a special messenger to be redrafted.

The board remained in session until 4 o'clock that afternoon when the new bond was produced. On being analyzed it was found that one important word was missing and again the board had to refuse to sign it. This time Town Counsel Ralph J. Hawkins got in touch directly with an official of the bonding company who drew up a new bond that night and mailed it so it was ready for action at 9 o'clock yesterday morning.

The Town Board members were on hand at that hour and after finding this bend satisfactory signed it and it was then rushed to Riverhead by special messenger so Mr. Hawkins would be qualified by law to receive the tax books from the Supervisor on Dec. 1. The collection of taxes will start on Dec. 10.

Mr. Hawkins, a Democrat, served two terms from 1909 to 1912. At the time he was on a fee system and now he is on a salary of \$3.600 less a 20 per cent. refund which the Democratic officials who were elected last month have agreed to make to the town.

Mr. Hawkins, tax receiver, who comes from Port Jefferson, has announced his appointments for the coming six months. Included in the list are several Republicans who assisted in the office under Frank Hocker, jr., during the past term but for the most part the appointees are new and followers of the Democratic party. The list is headed by Edward C. Barker, who was looked on as the Democratic choice for Tax Receiver until the convention when Hawkins was nominated.

One change is the appointment of men to assist in the office for in the past it has been staffed entirely by women. Mr. Hawkins announced shortly after his election that he would appoint some men to office, and four are included.



Robert E. Lee Barker Charleston - Robert E. Lee Barker, of Charleston, South Carolina, passed away on October 28, 2018, following a brief illness, in the company of his husband, David Johnson. Born in Port Jefferson, New York on October 20, 1929, Bob was preceded in death by his father, Edward Cadman Barker, mother, Luta Margaret Moody Barker, and beloved sister, Virginia Catherine Barker Thompson. Bob was raised in Port Jefferson, New York, and served his country in the United States Army during the Korean War. Following his discharge from the Army, Bob returned to Port Jefferson where he pursued his professional passions in interior design and historic preservation with considerable success for over two decades before moving to Charleston with his mother, Margaret, in the mid-1970s. Once settled in Charleston, Bob continued his work in design and historic preservation on larger canvas that Charleston represents. Bob's love of Charleston shone through this passion for historic preservation and his active role in many renovation projects. Throughout his adult life, Bob always held a special place for Drayton Hall located just outside of Charleston. Bob had the great fortune to visit the iconic 18th century Palladian estate in the 1960s, while it was still owned by the Drayton family, and returned in the 1970s to help open Drayton Hall as a historic site of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Serving as Interim Executive Director on occasion, Bob's passion for interpreting and presenting history touched countless individuals through his magical tours as Drayton Hall's Senior Interpreter for nearly four decades. In 2012, Drayton Hall established a fund in Bob's name to honor his dedication to Drayton Hall and our shared American past. Bob remained active in retirement. He was an enthusiastic gardener and chef, whose Thanksgiving dinners were widely regarded as culinary masterpieces. Bob was active in many local causes, and was a dedicated parishioner at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church on Anson Street in Charleston. Bob married his husband, David Johnson, in 2016. They resided happily on Ashley Avenue in Charleston until Bob's passing. Bob is survived by David, as well as by his nephews and nieces, Craig, Shelly, Keith, Lisa and Kyle Thompson, and his cousins, Dr. Margaret M. Coyle of Asheville, North Carolina, with whom he shared many adventures, John, James and Ellen Coyle. Memorial arrangements will be the subject of a further announcement.
