FORMER BILOXI BOY WAS ON TUSCANIA BUT TELEGRAPHS HIS MOTHER, "SAFE"

BILOXI

A former Biloxi boy was on the ill-fated Tuscania, which was a victim of a German submarine in the North Atlantic.

C. B. Barnett, 24 years old, member of Company E., Twentieth engineers, who joined at the outbreak of war and was on his way to the fighting front, cabled his mother, Mrs. C. W. Barnett, now residing at Moss Point, yesterday, as follows: "Mother, I am safe." The Barnetts lived in Biloxi

five or six years ago and resided on West Howard avenue.

Barnett joined the Twentieth United States engineers at Hattiesburg. Barnett was a resident of Hattiesburg for sometime, being employed by the Joyce-Watkins Co., lumber dealers. He enlisted six months ago.

The boy's father and mother reside at Moss Point, where Mr. Barnett is in the lumber business. The Barnetts have a wide acquaintance along the gulf coast.

TUSCANIA SAILOR WOUNDED IN WAR IS IN MOSS POINT

Benton Barnett Sent Home After Injuries Inflicted by German U-Boat.

Moss Point, Miss., April 4.—Benton Barnett, who has gained fame as a member of the Tuscania crew, which was sunk by a German submarine, has arrived home. He was a member of the Forestry division and departed with the American engineers for foreign service over a year ago on the Tuscania. He suffered a painful injury to his arm when this boat was sunk, and it was thought for some time that amputation would be necessary. He was kept out of actual service, but remained overseas until recently when he was sent back to the States. He was mustered out of service at Camp Shelby Saturday and returned to this city, where he is now at home with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Barnett.

Mr. Barnett, a former resident of Biloxi, where he and his parents are well known, proved himself a hero like all other coast boys who have engaged in the struggle and his friends in Biloxi remember him with the greatest pleasure upon his safe return to his home in Moss Point. At the time that Mr. and Mrs. Barnett and family resided in Biloxi they made their home on West Howard avenue.

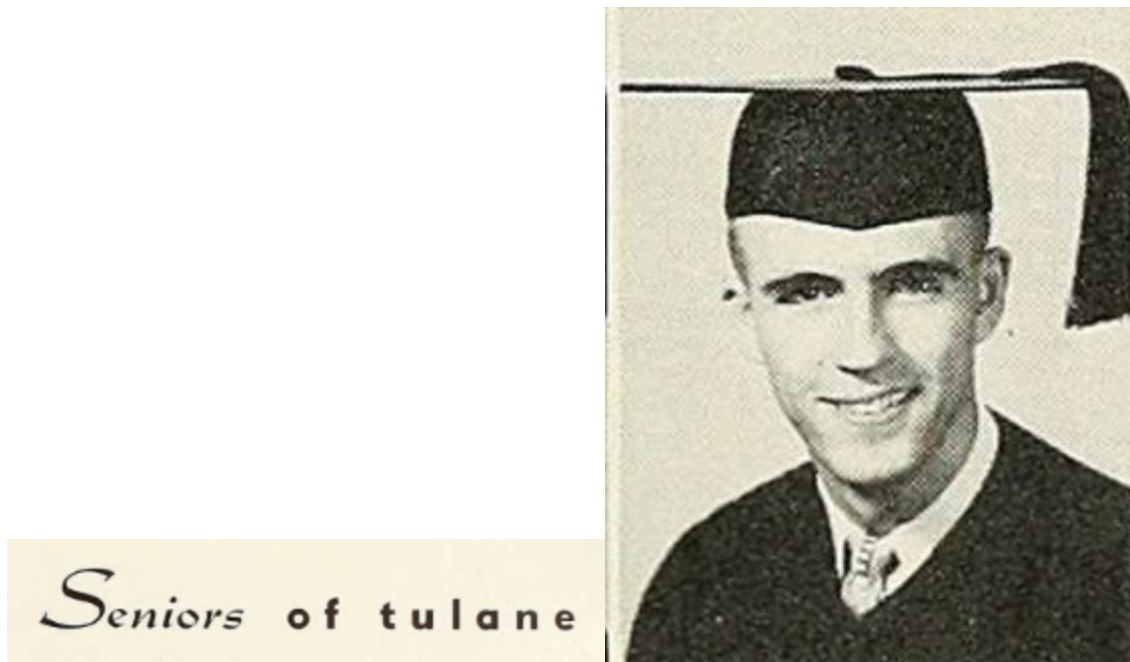
