WAUKESHA MEN ON LOST TUSCANIA

WERE IN MOTOR SECTION OF 107TH SUPPLY TRAIN

GRABOW STILL UNHEARD FROM

Other Local Men Reported Safe at Irish Ports. Were "Co. L" Members

Waukesha is one of the Wisconsin cities to whom the Tuscania disaster comes home, and there were many anxious hearts during the days when it seemed impossible to secure definite information regarding the fate of at least nine local boys who were known to have been on board the transport. Gradually, the lists of rescued came to include first one and then another of the local men, and on Wednesday all had been accounted for except Corporal Grabow.

The Waukesha men were drivers with the motor truck section of the 107th Supply train and ranked as corporals. They are:

Grabow Probably Lost

Additional names of survivors re-ported up to yesterday still fail to list as saved Corp. Ernest Grabow, and his relatives and friends are fearful that he may have been Waukesha's first sacrifice in the Great War.

Ernest Albert Grabow was the third man to sign up when Co. L was recruited. He is married and his wife is at present living in Milwaukee. His father, Otto Grabow, and his two brothers, Fred and William, reside in Waukesha. Mr. Grabow is a cousin of Mrs. Fred Peters, whose home is at 201 Pewaukee avenue. Corp. Gra-bow and Corp. Williams had been close friends and chums through all their service as soldiers.

Former Co. L Men

Eight of the men were in the ranks of Co. L when that company was organized here last summer. Following the summer training at Camp Douglas they were transferred to Waco, Texas, and there re-assigned to the unit which they are at present enrolled.

Corp. Boehmke is son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank J. Boehmke, and was a member of the Waukesha postal force when he enlisted last summer.

Allen Williams is son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Williams, and was a chauffeur when he entered the service.

Clarence Andree drove a car for the Waukesha Bakery until he joined Co. L. He is son of Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Andree, and a graduate of the Waukesha high school.

Aaron Rhodes was a member of the Waukesha Pure Food company's staff of workers. His parents are Mr. and

Mrs. Dell Rhodes.

Allen E. Schmidt was an employe at the Spring City Foundry. News-paper lists credit him to Superior, though he enlisted as one of the Waukesha company.

James Chilson was an employe at the Waukesha Gas Co. plant, and has contributed several letters and poems to The Freeman columns while in the service. He is son of the late Charlie Chilson.

LOCAL MEN TO RECALL DEMISE OF TUSCANIA

Signal rockets were shooting high in the air, spraying their bombshells of colored light like fountains, but Allen E. Williams, Waukesha county's undersheriff, wasn't enjoying this lovely picture any too well.

This was a very serious predicament he and hundreds of others were in. They were troops being carried to France on the British troop ship, Tuscania, which had just been torpedoed. The date was Feb. 5, 1918, just 22 years ago Monday.

Williams was on the boat, sinking steadily, for two hours until he was able to slide down a rope off the heavily listing ship onto a British destroyer which had pulled alongside.

What brings this dramatic rescue of Williams and several other Waukesha persons to mind Saturday is the twenty-second annual reunion of the National Tuscania Survivors' association at Kenosha, beginning Saturday night and lasting for three days,

Waukesha Survivors

Those now living in Waukesha, besides Williams, who were on the sinking troop ship were Edwin Boehmke, a mail carrier; James Chilson, a truck driver for the Wilbur Lumber co.; Robert F. Riley, office manager at the Waukesha Auto Sales co., and William Jaeger. an employe at the Estberg jewelry store, who lives in Milwaukeee. Harry Vandenberg, North Prairie farmer, is another close-by resident who was on the boat. All are expected to attend the Kenosha meeting. Williams has missed only one of the annual meetings since they began,

Besides Boehmke Chilson and Williams, who lived in Waukesha at the time of the sinking, there were other Waukesha residents on board the ship. Some have died, and others are now living in other places. Clarence Andree is now dead. Lyle Barnhart, who was originally listed from Waukesha in the reports of the accident in 1918, is not known here. Ernest Albert Grabow, who was first reported as lost when the boat sank but was later found to have been saved, is now living in Florida. Charles P. Merten is said to be living in Pennsylvania. Aaron W. Rhodes is now dead. Allen E. Schmidt is said to be living in Whitewater. All of those who came from Waukesha served with the 107th supply train.

2,400 Soldiers on Board

There were 2,400 soldiers, along with the crew on board the Tuscania as it left New York with other troop ships, to be picked up by a single British convoy ship early in 1918 off Nova Scotia. Three days out other destroyers came out to meet the troop ships. As the boats neared the west coast of Scotland, all on board felt that they were safely over in England. The afternoon of the fatal day, boxing matches had been staged on board.

In the darkness of the night the German submarine, eluding the patrol ships, struck, slipping away after shooting its torpedo. Patrol ships were miles away, circling the troop ships. Although help was nearby, the sinking cost the lives of 210 soldiers and 40 of the crew. The boat sank within two hours.

Most of those on board got off in lifeboats but the lifeboat to which Williams had been assigned could not be lowered because the torpedo had wrecked the lowering device. So he was forced, with others to clamber onto the tilting deck and wait for the destroyer to come alongside.

They were saved and went on to England and thence to France. To-day, the sinking seems far away but to many on board those vital minutes still seem not so far away.

THREE AGENCIES PROBE CRASH OF CAR AND TRAIN

SHERIFF'S OFFICE, RAILWAY COMPANY AND CORONER IN-VESTIGATE ACCIDENT WHICH RESULTED IN DEATH OF BUSHEY.

Milwaukee, Sept. 6—(A)—Three separate investigations were underway here today into the wreck of an electric transit train, carrying passengers home from Labor day outings, which resulted in the neath of one man and injury to 25 other persons at a grade crossing near here.

The Milwaukee Electric Railway and Light company, operators of the two car train, and offices of the sheriff and coroner were working on reports which will be heard at an inquest into the death of Fred P. Bushey, 53, Milwaukee, who drove his automobile into the path of the speeding train at 5:30 p. m. yesterday.

Hurled Against Wall

Bushey's automobile was hurled against a concrete waiting station near the crossing. The train travelled more than six hundred feet, tearing up rails and splintering ties, before the first car broke away and rolled down an embankment. The other car remained upright, but was quickly enveloped in smoke and flames caused by broken electrical wires.

The crash was witnessed by dozens of persons playing golf on the adjoining Greenfield course and others swimming in a nearby public pool. Spectators were helping the injured out of the wreckage when ambulances from Milwaukee hospitals arrived. Private automobiles were used to transport some of the injured to medical centers or their homes.

Chicagoan Badly Hurt

Among the more seriously hurt was Sam Dague, 55, of Chicago. He suffered a skull fracture. Mrs. Lottie Church, 41, Winnetka, Ill., received chest injuries. Others requiring medical attention were residents of Milwaukee.

Although he suffered a severe cut on the head, Patrick H. McGovern, 38, motorman of the train, assisted in the rescue work until doctors ordered him to the hospital. McGovern rolled down the embankment with the derailed car while Lawrence Bordeen, conductor, was thrown off the rear platform and suffered only minor bruises.

Statements taken by authorities from witnesses to the crash agreed that both Bushey's automobile and the train, eastbound from Waukesha, were traveling fast when they reached the crossing. A 12-year old boy, Mitchell Murdzia, was standing near the waiting station when the automobile was hurled against the small structure. He suffered from shock but was otherwise uphurt.

Had Attended Fair

Bushey, authorities learned, was returning from Elkhorn, Wis., where he had attended the fair with two of his three sons, Worth and Cameron. The youths had returned earlier to their home here while Bushey, a horse racing enthusiast, stayed for the last trotting event. They were waiting to have supper with him when they learned he was killed.

Bushey, for 21 years operator of Bushey's business college at Appleton, Wis., had been employed here the last three years as salesmanager for the Spencerian business college. His widow, Mrs. Blanche Bushey, has been on a vacation at Waupaca with their other son, Warren.

He was the son and youngest child of Albert Edward Barnhart and Frances Ellen Bagg, who married 26 March 1876 in Wisconsin.

In the 1900 census, Lyle, age 3, born December 1896, lived in Wautoma, Waushara County, Wisconsin, with his parents Albert and "Francis" Barnhart and brothers Arthur and Lynn. His maternal grandmother and maternal uncle also lived in the household.

In 1910, his widowed mother Francis E. Barnhart, a dressmaker, lived in Waupaca, Waupaca County, Wisconsin, with son Lyle, age 13.

Lynn Barnhart entered the U.S. Army on 9 May 1917. As a corporal in the 107th Supply Train, Co. A, he sailed from New York City on 24 January 1918 aboard the troopship SS

"Tuscania." The ship was torpedoed and sunk in the North Channel between Scotland and Ireland on 5 February 1918 by German submarine UB-77, with 215 soldier casualties.

Also a survivor of the "Tuscania" was Lyle's nephew Worth Lloyd Bushey. Worth was the son of Lyle's sister Blanche Gertrude Barnhart and her first husband, Fred Bushey.

Lyle returned from World War I aboard "Virginian" in May 1919 in the same unit, with the same rank. His military serial number was 250,929.

In the 1920 census, conducted 13 January 1920, Lyle Barnhart, age 23, single, was an electrician for an electric railroad company. He was a boarder.

Later that year, on 20 May 1920, Lyle Barnhart married Frances Ellen Bagg in Waupaca County, Wisconsin.

census, his ex-wife Bernice "Barnheart" (age 31) claims she is widowed. She resides with her mother Emma Steinmates and her brother Carlisle Steinmates (age 17) in Dayton, Waupaca County, Wisconsin. Her daughter Frances (age 2) lives in the household. On 7 February 1931, Lyle married Mae Nelson in Chisago County, Minnesota. Lyle and Mae had two daughters:

Mary Patricia Barnhart Turner, born 1931 in Wisconsin. Wife of Myron Leroy (Mike) Turner. Shirley Jean Barnhart Hess, born 1932 in Wisconsin. Wife of Vernon Leroy Hess. In 1940, Lyle and Mae N. Barnhart lived in Waupaca, Waupaca County, Wisconsin, with their daughters Mary Patricia (age 8) and Shirley Jean (age 7). Lyle was a beer distributor for a brewery.

In 1950, the family of four lived in Ogden, Weber County, Utah. Lyle was the chief of telephone wire for the Utah General Depot and Mae was employed as a clerk in cost accounting for the same employer.
