All Kenosha soldiers, who were former members of the Kenosha Infantry Company M, Wisconsin National Guard, now received their assignments to new posts of duty, according to a recent communication from the Waco camp and with the men scattered in half a dozen divisions, not a trace of the old company remains. Only one, First Sergeant Joseph Bartol, has been retained under the service of former Captain Edward Dayton, who is now an adjutant and ranking captain in a new organization. This selection of Sergeant Bartol, indicates either that Captain Dayton and he, will be assigned to the drilling of new troops or according to a persistent rumor be sent across the pond for first hand acquaintance with French methods of warfare.

TELLS OF MARCH OF COMPANY "M"

**Sergt. Joseph Bartol Gives
Detailed Account of Tri-
umphal March of Ken-
sha Soldiers.**

"HONOR TO LIBERATORS"

**German Cities Brilliant With the Flags
of the Allies, Greet the Army of
Occupation—Prices in Germany
are Still Exorbitant.**

At eleven-fifteen o'clock on the morning of the thirteenth of December, several Kenosha soldiers, all members of old Company "M" were accomplishing the thing for which they left their families and friends and volunteered to serve "Old Glory." They were actually crossing the Rhine as members of the Army of Occupation. This interesting bit of information is one of the remarkable things revealed about the experiences of the Kenosha soldiers in a recent letter from Sergt. Joseph Bartol.

The letter gives a brief account of what our members of the 107th Supply Train did each day from the time that they landed in England after the terrible experience of the "Thescania" until as victors they ate their Christmas pudding in the city of Marienburg, Germany. The letter contains the first continuous account of their march which has yet reached Kenosha. In the company with Sergt. Bartol were Capt. Asbury Vale and a score of other Kenoshans, who shared the glory of the triumph.

Here is the daily diary sent back home by the Kenosha soldier:

"We went from England to France on the 27th of March, arrived in a little town called Montejohn. We were there about a week and left for the coast to get our trucks. We drove the trucks back, and started to work, and believe me, we have been on the job ever since. We left for Alsace Lorraine on the 12th of May, and were stationed at Fontaine, and remained there until the 23rd of July and then left for Chateau-Thierry and got into the "big noise"; were there until the 3rd of September, and then left for Soissons and were there until October 7th; then left for a town in the back area named Chevillon. We left this town on October 16th for the Argonne

Sector, and were there when the noise was over on that 'never to be forgotten' 11th of November. We almost immediately began our march to the Rhine. Our first stop was at Dim and the next was Songey. On November 25th we arrived in Beck. We left on December 1st for Moetsch. The second we proceeded to Grosslittgen; on the third to Gilzem; on the fourth we rested; on the fifth to Eichen; on the sixth to Humerbech; on the seventh to Moureal; on the eighth we rested; on the ninth to Medermendig; on the tenth to Eich; on the eleventh we rested; on the twelfth to Meisenheim; on the thirteenth to Rommersdorf. We crossed the Rhine at 11:15 a. m., and arrived at Rommersdorf, Oberrommerfeld on the night of the fourteenth; on the fifteenth we went to Hartered; the sixteenth to Rauback. We remained there till the eighteenth, and then came to Marchhausen, where we are now stationed."

Sergt. Bartol also tells how Germany has greeted the Armies of Occupation not as invaders but as liberators. "In Luxemburg—and in every town we came to, as well—they had arches across the streets, from which hung the flags of the allies and beneath them large banners reading 'Honor to our liberators.' Even here in the center of Germany most of the Germans seem to think a great deal of the American soldiers."

In writing of the conditions in Germany the Kenosha sergeant says that there seems to be enough to eat but that prices are exorbitant. "Can you imagine a pair of common shoes costing \$42.00 in good American money?" he writes. The ever present question of "When do we get home?" has been bothering the Kenosha soldier but he admits that the chances are very poor for the members of this unit seeing the Statue of Liberty until after Easter. "We must stay," he writes in conclusion, "until Germany has a settled government. Then we may go home but that may be a long time yet."

Local Survivors Of Torpedoed Ship Present At Anniversary In Kenosha

**Eric Anderson, Joseph Bartol
Attend Memorial Meeting
For Troop Ship Disaster.**

Eric Anderson, 904 South Jackson street, and Joseph Bartol, 505 South Genesee street, attended the sixteenth anniversary reunion of the survivors of the "Tuscania," world war troop ship, at a gathering of the association in Kenosha last night. Both men are survivors of the torpedoed vessel on which many American soldiers lost their lives.

The reunion was held in Kenosha because of the fact that two full companies of Kenosha soldiers were on the "Tuscania" when she was sunk, many of them going down with the ship.

The "Tuscania" was packed with men and headed for England when

it was suddenly struck by a torpedo from a German U-boat off the coast of Ireland. The troop ship sank rapidly and many of the lifeboats were tangled and capsized before they could be launched. Hundreds of soldiers were forced to leap into the sea and many of them were sucked down with the ship. The lifeboats that did get free from the ship were packed full but continued to comb the sea picking up swimmers until they were loaded to the gunwales.

It was several hours before rescue ships arrived on the scene and a hurried search brought no trace of the death dealing submarine. The vessels were too busy hunting survivors to spend much time steaming after the U-boat.

Last night's anniversary meeting brought several hundred survivors, and tales of heroism and stamina were retold by the hundreds.

Mark 30th Year For Company M

Thirty years ago this morning, Company M, Fourth Wisconsin Infantry, marched through Kenosha to the railway station and embarked on a trip from which many never returned.

Company M was the first infantry unit to be furnished by Kenosha during the war, although a cavalry troop, later converted to an artillery battery under Capt. John S. Coney, had left previously. The company was recruited personally by its company commander, Captain Ed Dayton, after other recruiters had given up the attempt as impossible.

The company trained at Camp Douglas, Wisconsin, Camp MacArthur, Texas, and Camp Merritt, New Jersey, before beginning its eighteen months of combat service at the front in France. In addition to Capt. Dayton, it was staffed by Lieutenants Asbury H. Vale and Francis A. Singer.

Part of the company sailed to Europe on the liner *Tuscania* which was torpedoed and sunk en route. Cpl. Arthur Junker was lost in this action, one of Kenosha's first casualties.

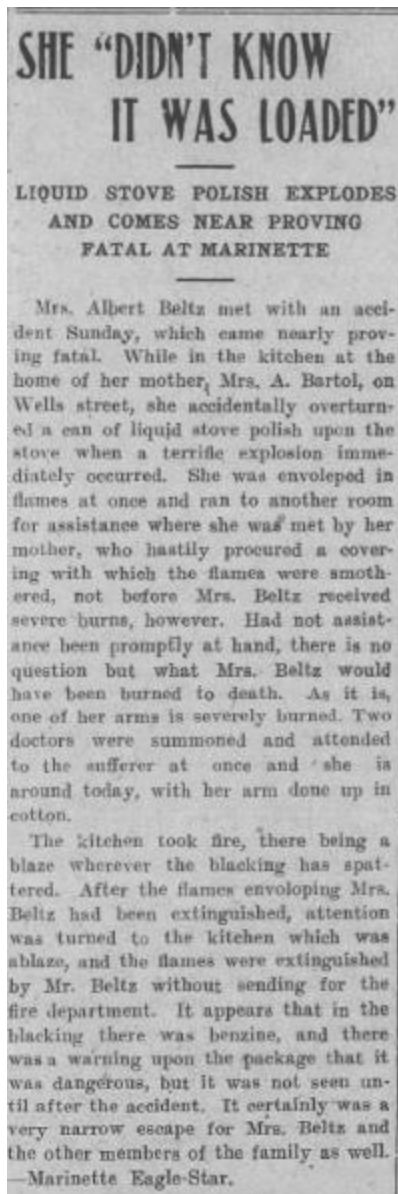

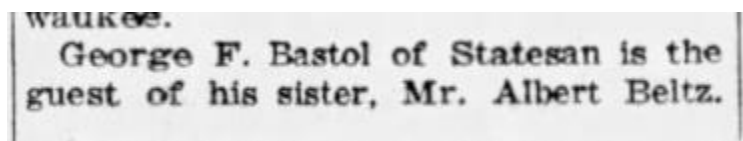

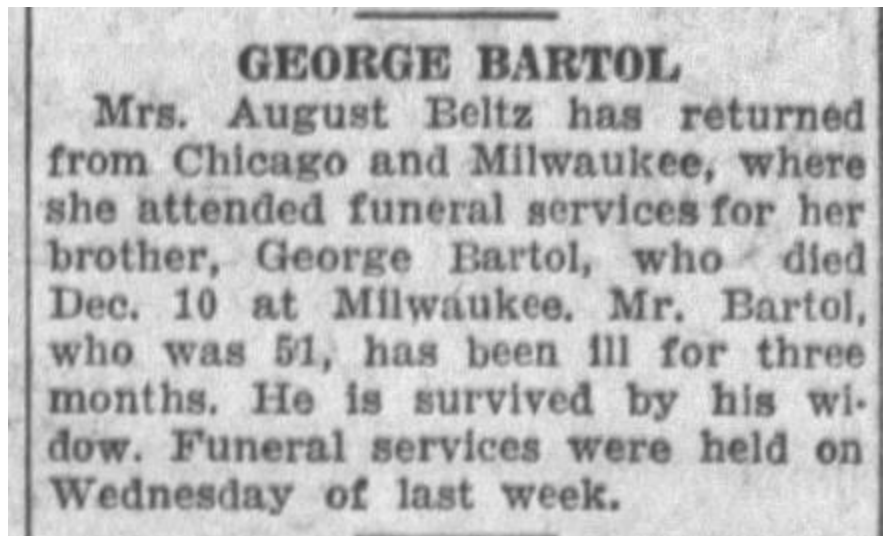
