

Local Survivors Of The Tuscania Sinking

Kalispell still has two living survivors of the sinking of the Tuscania off the coast of Scotland Feb. 5, 1918. The sinking of the ship by a German submarine was the first casualty for the United States in World War I. The two survivors who live in Kalispell are Fred Metcalf

Some Things You Don't Forget

Smoking may be considered hazardous to your health, but two Kalispell men would be quick to tell you it may have saved their lives. The two men — Fred Metcalf and Joe Basye — were aboard the ill-fated Tuscania, which was torpedoed off the coast of Scotland Feb. 5, 1918, during World War I.

Metcalf and Basye are the only two living of the eight men from Kalispell who survived the sinking of the Tuscania. The eight were in the famed 17th Company 20th Engineers which was on its way to Europe to build the miles of trenches, the great hospital units, the thousands of warehouses, the miles of railways and the acres of piers and docks needed when the United States entered World War I.

Fred and Joe were among the first American doughboys to go across the Atlantic to set up for the fighting men. They helped to build a mill in Castets, France, made lumber and ties to move the big guns to Flanders, boards for the barracks and ties for the railways. Joe was a logger before enlisting for service with the 20th Engineers.

Former Montana Gov. J. Hugo Aronson was supposed to have been aboard the ship, but came down with measles and mumps and was quarantined just before the call to leave.

The eight Kalispell men who enlisted for the engineers were sworn in at Ft. Wright in Spokane.

The Tuscania, with 2,400 men on board, left the United States Jan. 27, 1918, and steamed her way across the Atlantic. After 13 days at sea the Tuscania was in sight of land, the islands that shelter the coast of Scotland. The men were to land at nine

o'clock the next morning. As it was to be their last evening aboard ship, a dinner was planned to celebrate the event. The halls were filled with men waiting their turn at the tables. There was singing and good-natured fun...

And then it happened . . .

At 6:20 p.m. a torpedo from a German submarine ripped through the boiler room causing an explosion. Fred recalls being thrown 20 feet from the blast. The history book of the 17th Company states:

"A terrific blast rent the air, followed by a sound that resembled the falling of load upon load of broken glass, down a long stairway. The boys were knocked off their feet. The lights were snuffed out and cries of "They got us' filled the air.

"Then the thoughts of escape turned surprise into panic and all became a fighting, cursing mob. The strong fought their way to the hatchways, the weak prayed and pleaded, order was forgotten.

"In the flare of pocket flashlights one could see hundreds of faces paled with fright, distorted with fear and frenzy, others stern and with glaring eyes, as they pushed on to safety. Someone came from below with word from the chief engineer that the boat would float for hours at least, and the word was passed from mouth to mouth in breathless tones, half doubtful, half confident, but working its effect. The strong, delayed in their rush, helped the weak and disheartened and when the last

man came on deck there was order and discipline to the last word."

The men loosed the rigging, swung out the lifeboats and lowered them into the rolling sea. The destroyers which had been escorting the Tuscania came alongside and took off their loads in turn.

Ropes broke while lowering some of the boats and the men were dumped into the sea, making it come alive with screams for help. The boats that landed safely on the water were tossed about on the stormy sea, and men who knew nothing of sea life did their best to keep the boats riding free through the choppy waters.

The front end of the raft on which Joe was riding broke off but the pontoons kept

re-equipped. Only one rifle survived the sinking and Joe jokingly tells, "And the fellow who owned it got the dickens for letting it rust."

The men remained in Europe until June of 1919. After returning to the Flathead, Joe went back into the logging business for a time and then went into the typewriter business in Butte. He also worked in Billings and Kalispell and for a time operated a

motel in Hot Springs. He and his wife have lived in Kalispell since his retirement.

Metcalf retired in 1955 after 33 years with the state and federal Forest Service.

Other Kalispell men who survived the sinking were Pete Lavelle, John Morrow, Emil Anderson, Stewart Cairncross, Joe Tucker and Walter Damon. The late John C. MacMillan a one-time Kalispell resident who enlisted from South Dakota, was also one of the survivors.

The National Tuscania Survivors Assn. is headquartered at Milwaukee, where a history is being compiled.

Joe and Fred still get together occasionally and talk about the nightmare of Feb. 5, 1918, and still find it remarkable that all eight men who enlisted from Kalispell survived the sinking.

"A lot of water has gone under the bridge" since that fateful day; but Joe and Fred will always remember the night of terror and their struggle for survival.

KALISPELL — Joseph Daniel Basye, 92, of 630 Third Ave. E., Kalispell, died Monday morning in the state Veterans Administration Home in Columbia Falls.

He was born March 31, 1887, in Norman, Neb. When he was 16, he moved with his family to Montana. He was a woodsman until he enlisted in the U.S. Army on Dec. 14, 1917. He served in the Army Corps of Engineers and was on the Tuscania troop ship that was torpedoed at the beginning of World War I. After the war he returned to Montana and lived north of Kalispell. He later moved to Warland, north of Libby, then operated apartments in Hot Springs. In 1970 he moved to Kalispell.

He was a member of the World War I Barracks and the

American Legion.

On April 28, 1923, he married Mary Bloomhagen in Bil-

lings.

He is survived by his wife Mary, Kalispell; one son, John, Tacoma, Wash.; a brother, George, Columbia, Calif.; three sisters, Viola Graves, Central Square, N.Y.; Pearl Rhodes, Kalispell; and Grace Yenne, Whitefish; two grandchildren, six great-grandchildren and one great-granddaughter.

He was preceded in death by his parents, one sister, Ruth

FEDERAL SQUAD AIDS CLEANUP AT KALISPELL

Beer, Whisky, Gin and Moonshine Taken in Raids With City Officers Co-Operating

KALISPELL, April 11.—Nearly a dozen arrests and the seizure of a large quantity of liquor, including beer, whisky, gin and moonshine, were the fruits of a joint raid on alleged liquor law violators made Monday morning by federal officers, the sheriff's force and the city police department.

Part of the cases will be handled through the federal courts and the others, under a city ordinance, on the formal charge of selling intoxicating liquor and maintaining a common nulsance.

A federal complaint was filed against Nels Haig, arrested at the Norden hotel, who was arraigned before United States Commissioner I. D. Rogylien. His bond was fixed at \$500 and his hearing set for 10 a. m. Tuesday. It is also expected that other federal cases will be filed as the result of raids on the Park and Norden hotels.

Those arraigned before Police Judge McCarthy were Iver Isaacson, Eddie, Joe Basye, Robert Lavelle, R. D. Farrington, Emil Knutson and Mrs. Josie McDermott.

Besides the two hotels, the residence at 448 Fourth avenue west was raided. Complaint in the city cases was made by Chief of Police Metcalf, who says sufficient evidence was secured at each place raided to make a case. He also says there are prospects of other federal charges in the near future.

SEVERAL ARRESTS MADE BY FEDERALS ROBERTS REPORTS

Recent raids made in Great Falls include the arrest of Cornell W. Breece, and Anna Breece, after 74 pints of beer was alleged to have been found on the premises at 600 First avenue, north, reports received by Sam Roberts, deputy prohibition administrator, show.

At Ennis, Mack Bates was arrested. Agents report seizure of 62 gallons of moonshine whisky, nearly a gallon of gin, and nine gallons of home-brewed beer, reports show. John Kennedy, also of Ennis, was arrested after agents raided a softdrink parlor where a quantity of liquor was alleged to have been found.

Kalispell raids resulted in the arrest of Lloyd A. Walter, and seizure of 16 pints of liquor; and at the Joe Basye place, agents report arrest of Basye and seizure of 1 1-2 gallons of whisky and gin, and 10 quarts of beer.

WHY I LIKE KALISPELL

Coming here 42 years ago, I was a tenderfoot unaccustomed to western ways. I had lived in Philadelphia. In those days Kalispell was a small town. I have traded horses on the Main street. Several days after a horse trade, the conversation was like this:

"Hey John! You doggone horse thief. You beat

me on that hoss."

"Sure! you little black-whiskered billy goat. I'll beat you again if you trade."

"No you won't. I'll get you the next time. Ha!

Ha! Ha!"

There never was any animosity in trading horses or anything else. Everybody was your friend. It is this feeling of friendship that makes this place outstanding.

"Bill, lend me \$10 for a few days." Bill pulls a wad of money out of his hip pocket. "Here it

is." No questions asked.

When I pay it back a few days later, he says, "Hell, John, keep it. I don't need it. I have over \$700 in the bank, and I get nearly \$300 a month

from rentals."

Incidents of this kind are an every day occurrence in Kalispell. You go down to the court house to pay your taxes on the last day and find you haven't quite enough money. Cal will say, "Bring it in tomorrow, and I will fix so you won't have any penalty to pay." He probably paid it out of his pocket.

"I hear you are doing a little logging, John."

"Yes, I am, George."

"How are you fixed for money?"

"Well, George, I am going to the bank and try

to borrow \$150."

"No need to do that, John. I have \$400 in the First National bank. It is not drawing any interest. Come on over and I'll fix you up."

George says, "Let this man have \$250 on a

checking account."

"We should have a note made."

"No," he says, "you can pay me when you get your money from the Kalispell Lumber Co."

I was the owner of the logs. These are the things which make me like Kalispell. It is the people that make a town, not the buildings and lawns, although they are beautiful. We are not behind in culture either. We have an author who writes good mystery stories, a student in Europe studying music, a man with a Carnegie medal, and mother notable people. We have nine survivors of the Lusitania which was sunk in the first World war. It was sunk off the coast of Ireland in the Norfth Sea. Some of them landed in Scotland on a rocky shore after a perilous night on a small boat. In fact, all who were saved landed in boats. There were ships close by. They had orders to stay as they were afraid the sub would get more of them.

Here are the names of the survivors: Emil Anderson, Joe Basye, Walter Dayman, Fred Metcalf, Pete Lavelle, Stewart Cairners, John Morrow, Joe Tucker.

I am particularly interested in this because my boy was on the ship just ahead of it and saw the Lusitania go down.



The girls were so frightened they locked themselves in the tool shed and sat there all night "scared to death," till daylight the next morning. Smoke from the fires had blown this far.

Dances were held in the schoolhouses, women brought kandwiches and cake. Tickets the were one dollar and the money used to improve the schools. Music consisted of violin and guitar, or violin and piano.

Fishing was fabulous in those early years. Regardless of the stream fished in one could catch the limit in a very short time.

A. ever gave me was two cookies, a cup of chocolate, one apple at two different times, and I made up for that by buying a carton of eigrottes that had a card inside stating it had been paid for by the Sunset tofacco fund.
