## Onetime Miner, Policeman Earl Berry Dies

Earl H. Berry Sr., former Reno policeman who later worked in the gold mills of Virginia City, died Thursday in a local hospital. He was 75.

Member of a pioneer Virginia City family, Mr. Berry was born in Six Mile Canyon and attended Fourth Ward School in Virginia City. He enlisted in the U.S. Army in World War I, served in France and was discharged in 1918.

After working in Virginia City mines he then joined the Reno Police Department and in the 1920's was one of two motorcycle policemen. He left the police force in 1935 and returned to Virginia City to work in the gold mines at Crown Point, Crown Collar and Donovan's Mills. Prior to his retirement 15 years ago, he worked in tungsten mills of Getchell.

Survivors include his wife Hazel of Virginia City; two sons, Earl H. Berry Jr. of Reno and William Berry of Buena Park, Calif.; two sisters, Alice Andreasen of Virginia City and Ethel Hosking of Carson City; and three grandchildren.

The funeral will be held Monday at 11 a.m. at Ross, Burke and Nobel Mortuary. Burial will be at Mountain View Cemetery with Rev. Paul H. Towner of St. Paul's Episcopal Church officiating.

## Earl Berry Sr.

Earl H. Berry Sr., former Reno policeman who later worked in the gold mills of Virginia City, died Thursday in a local hospital. He was 75.

Member of a pioneer Virginia City family, Berry was born in Six Mile Canyon, Dec. 23, 1895, and attended Fourth Ward School in Virginia City. He enlisted in the U.S. Army in World War I, served in France and was discharged in 1918.

# LIST OF SURVIVORS OF THE TUSCANIA BEGINS TO ARRIVE

**Will Be Issued as Fast as Checked—  
Name of Only One Nevadan Ap-  
pears—Is Hurlburt Berry of Vir-  
ginia City**

**(By United Press)**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—The list of Tuscania survivors began to arrive at the war department today and the names are being announced as rapidly as they arrive. It will be impossible to announce the list of those dead until the survivors' lists are completed and checked. Among the Californians on the list of survivors so far completed and checked are George Chavez of San Jose, Frank Clark of Templeton, Charles W. Collins of San Jose, Clifford V. Manley of Orcutt and Denis L. Jones

of Arbuckle. From Nevada Hurlburt Berry of Virginia City is the only man listed thus far.

## **Members Same Family Have Close Call**

SAN JOSE, Feb. 9.—Early this morning the war department telegraphed relatives of Frank Chavez here that Chavez was wounded in action in France. An hour later a second telegram arrived and reported that George Chavez was among the Tuscania survivors. The brothers enlisted here the same day, one joining the infantry and the other the engineers.

# TRAFFIC PATROLS TO BE STARTED AT SCHOOLS

Assuring increased protection from traffic dangers for Reno school children, a program for developing the school traffic patrol plan to a maximum of efficiency in this city was launched today. A picked squad of boys of the North Side junior high school began the work of patrolling crossings in the vicinity and safeguarding their schoolmates to and from the school. Next week it is planned to have similar patrol squads in operation at all the schools of Reno.

Organization and operation of the patrols is being planned under the joint direction of police and school authorities, the Nevada division of the California State Automobile Association, and the Kiwanis Club, which formerly carried on this activity in Reno.

The new patrol squad at the North Side school was chosen under the direction of Miss Echo Loder, principal, and is composed of the following boys: Bryce Platt, Harold Van Tassel, James Shepley, Elwyn Trigerro, Richard Jameson, Leo Pistone, John Marini, Marion Jackson, William Dunseath and Earl Cassidy.

Chief of Police J. M. Kirkley has appointed Traffic Officer Earl Berry to handle direct supervision of patrol work, including instruction of the boys. In order to guard the patrol boys themselves against risks, they will be required to operate from the curbs, signalling traffic for the right-of-way and then conducting children over the crossing when the way is clear. City Engineer J. M. Glynn is assisting by having pedestrian lanes painted at crossings where the patrol squads will be on duty.

Success of the patrol idea is indicated by a statement of B. F. Rose, manager of the Nevada division of the automobile association, that more than seven thousand boys are now enrolled in patrol squads of northern and central California, where the motorists' organization has sponsored the movement.

Lester J. Hilp, president of the Kiwanis Club, has appointed the following committee to assist in developing the patrol plan: Dud R. Day, chairman, Herbert Walker, Leo Ginsburg and Clarence Day.

Patrol squads will be composed of boys chosen for high standing in their school work and for general efficiency. Each boy will wear a distinctive arm badge.

# ITALIAN GIRL LEARNS ENGLISH FROM SAILOR

## Neapolitan Girl Writes Letter To Mother of Reno Seaman

An Italian girl in Naples has learned to speak English from a Reno sailor, and after studying the language two months she has become acquainted with some flowing phrases. Giving the girl the lessons was William Berry, 24-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Berry of 111½ West Taylor street.

Berry's parents learned of their son's teaching ability through a letter received from his student in

aboard ship. One time he spent seventy-two hours in a lifeboat off the coast of Portugal, finally being rescued by an English gunboat.

Early this month, he returned to his home here for twenty-two days, having flown to Brazil and then to the east coast of this country. While at home he married Joyce Powell of Virginia City in that town.

At present he is stationed at Norfolk, Va., and expects soon to be transferred.

letter received from his student in Naples. Her name is Giuseppina Montanaro, and she explained in the letter that she was writing because "Bill has always spoken to me of you." She explained that she began studying English under his tutelage only two months ago and asked that her limited knowledge of the tongue be excused.

Her letter began, "In this day full of sadness and boundless discouragement I draw by myself courage, which before was in want, to write you." She hoped she was not indiscreet, explaining that she was "Bill's disinterested girl friend." Miss Montanaro said she was very glad to have been his friend, and that he was a young man of many virtues.

"Be glad and proud, how every mother should be, of your son," she wrote. "Today he is not with me. He will not be with me tomorrow and day after tomorrow; perhaps forever he will not be with me. . . . Today Bill is in another city that I hope will be as hospitable as my city."

The Italian girl requested that Mrs. Berry correspond with her, and Mr. Berry said today that the request will be granted.

The young sailor from this city joined the service shortly after the Pearl harbor bombing and spent a year in the African and European theaters of war, taking part in the invasion of North Africa, Sicily and Italy. He is a diesel motor machinist, and has a younger brother, Earl Berry, jr., who is a radioman, second class, in the navy serving in the South Pacific.

Cremation was at Mountain View Crematory, San Bernardino, Calif.

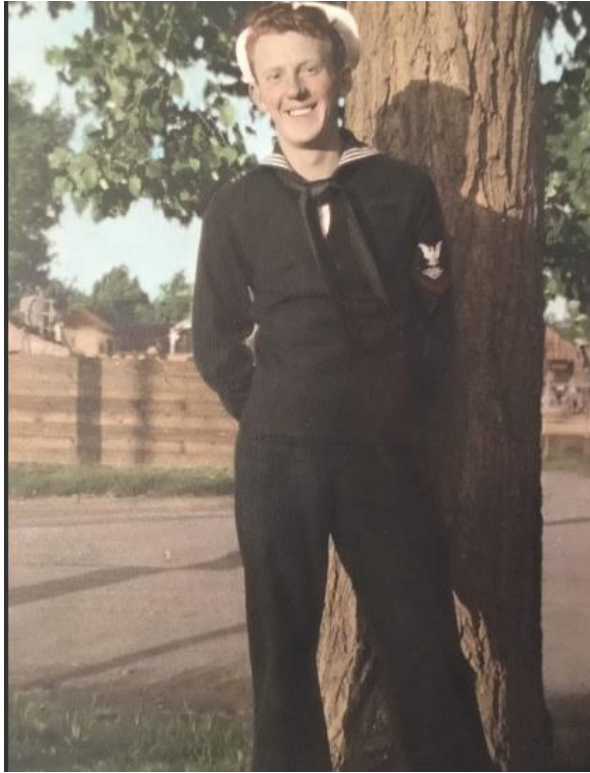

# **BADLY HURT IN RUNAWAY**

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## **VIRGINIA CITY BOY IS SERIOUSLY INJURED**

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**Thomas Berry, Jr., is Thrown From a  
Carriage in Six Mile Canyon  
and Skull is Fractured.**

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In a runaway accident yesterday afternoon Thomas Berry of Virginia City and his son Thomas Jr. were quite badly injured. The runaway occurred in Six-mile canyon, and that both occupants of the carriage were not killed is wonderful.

Berry and his two eldest sons left

Berry and his two oldest sons left town about 3 o'clock for the family home in Flowery district in a buggy. When a short distance west of Fischer's mill on Six-mile Canyon road, the kingbolt of the vehicle broke, frightening the team, which dashed madly down the roadway violently hurling the three men to the ground.

Thomas Berry Jr. struck the rocky side of the roadway with his head and was rendered unconscious, and his father was severely bruised and shaken un, while his son Will escaped with slight injury. The injured men were taken to the Fischer residence and a telephone call was sent to Dr. Hodgins. The doctor found that Thomas Berry Jr. had suffered concussion of the brain, and it was three hours before he recovered consciousness.

Dr. Hodgins returned from a visit to the patients this morning and said that Berry Jr. was unconscious nearly all night, but this morning was able to recognize him, relapsing at intervals into a semi-comatose state, his conscious moments showing slight delirium, but he is confident of the patient's ultimate recovery.

Thomas Sr. suffered a sprain wrist, a badly bruised shoulder and several other bad bruises and cuts. Will Berry was only slightly injured.

## OFFICER BERRY IS SUSPENDED

**Struck a Contrary Prisoner,  
Causing Great Loss  
of Blood**

As the result of striking a contrary prisoner last night, Thomas Berry, one of the best known officers in the city, was suspended from the police force this morning pending an investigation of the matter. In the meantime the man whom he arrested and struck is in the city jail under the care of a physician with severe wound on the side of his head, where he was hit by the officer's blackjack.

The man was drunk on the streets last night and while he was making a disturbance he was taken in by Officers Berry and Cadle. On his way to the jail he resisted arrest and was struck by the former officer. The blow did not render the man unconscious and it was not thought when he was put into the station that he was seriously hurt. This morning, however, he was found lying unconscious in his cell and Dr. Baldwin was summoned to give him medical attention. He revived in a short time and is now resting easy though he is weak from loss of blood.

The man says that the assault was not justified and pending an investigation Mr. Berry has been suspended. The matter will be brought before the city council at its next meeting.

The man says that his name is Pete Barrett and that he has been working on the government irrigation ditch.

Late this afternoon Officer Berry was interviewed in regard to the matter. He says that the man was making a disturbance at the Overland Hotel and that he placed him under arrest at the request of the clerk. The fellow resisted and attempt to assault the officer upon which the latter struck him. He then consented to go to jail, but when near the station made a second attempt to get away. Officer Berry says that he was making a desperate effort to free himself when he struck him again, after which the man consented to be locked up. He says that the prisoner was bleeding slightly from the last blow when locked up, but that he did not think that he was badly hurt or he would have called a doctor and had him placed under medical treatment.

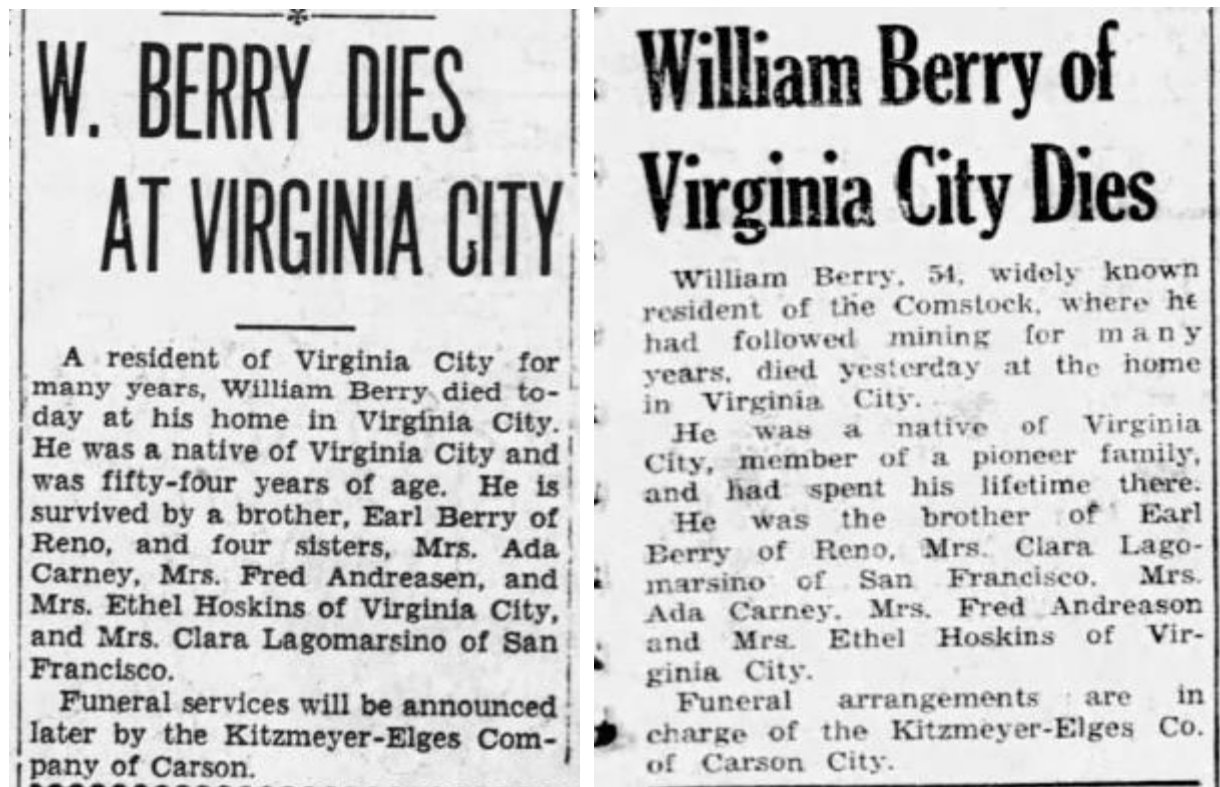

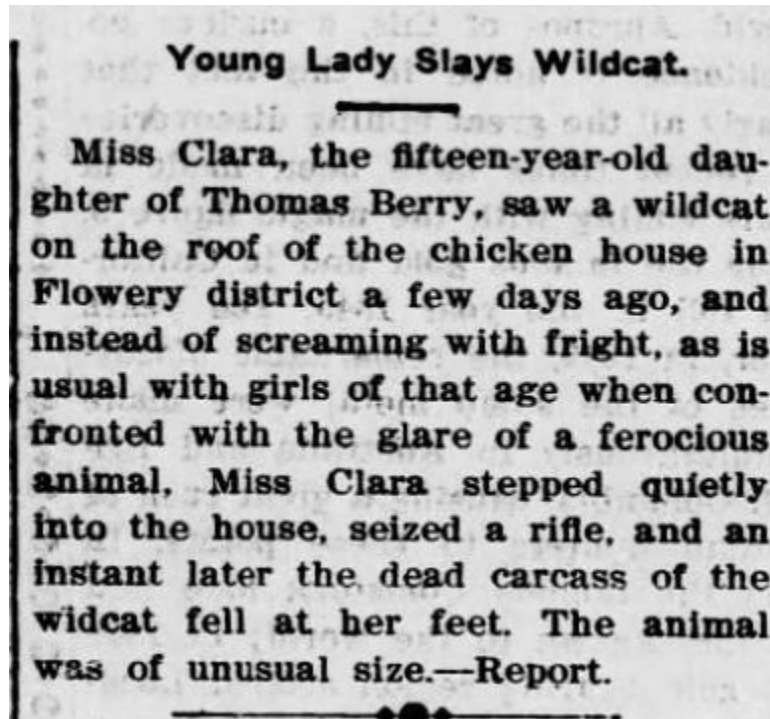

A native of California, he had resided in the Comstock region since a young man, where he had conducted a grocery store and engaged in other business enterprises in Virginia City. He had also been interested in ranching at different periods. He left, with his family, for San Francisco five years ago.

Surviving besides his wife are four children, Clara, Roy, Norma and Earl Logomarsino; two sisters, Mrs. James McDevitt of Virginia City and Mrs. Louisa Costa of San Francisco, and three brothers, Louis, John and Victor Logomarsino.

He was a brother-in-law of Earl Berry of Reno and Thomas Berry of Virginia City, who left last night for the coast to attend the funeral.

Berry in other sources), came to the Virginia City area from England in 1873, following his stepfather who had left England and taken records with him that Thomas needed to claim an inheritance. He never found his father. Thomas had worked as a carpenter in England. After acquainting himself with the Six Mile Canyon and Flowery district, he decided to there permanently, so he went back to England and married Sarah Jane Bentham in Hulme, Lancaster County. After having three daughters, they returned to Virginia City NV. They originally lived in Seven Mile Canyon, which runs into Six Mile Canyon, the mouth of which is about ½ mile from Virginia City, and Thomas worked in the mines, walking to work.

Because of his expanding family, Thomas built a large house in Six Mile Canyon. His nickname was “Strawberry” because of his red hair. [Note that Earl's son has a nickname of “Wild Red.”] The Berrys were the last family to move from Six Mile Canyon; by then, they had had 9 children. Her uncle William Berry was a prospector, and one day broke off a piece of rock & found it was almost solid gold. The family tried to keep their find a secret – unsuccessfully.



William, his father and brothers worked this mine for years, making a good living from it. Ore was hauled up from a shaft they dug using a windlass hitched to a horse, which father Thomas drove, while his sons – William, Thomas & Earl – dug in the mine & filled the buckets to be hauled up. When the horse stepped on Thomas Sr.'s foot, then Ethel had to drive the horse for several months. The mine was very rich but also very big, so they sold it to the Flowery Mining Co., which built a large mill on it, which operated until the late 1930s. Since the family had prospered from the mine, they did not work in mines anymore.

Marion wrote: "The youngest boy, Earl, ran away from home when he was 18 years old and joined the army during World War I ... He didn't actually run away from home; he was old enough to leave at that time, but he joined the army and had some real experiences." Earl survived the torpedoing in the North Sea of the troopship "Tuscania" (which is spelled Toscania in her memoirs) and was in icy waters until picked up by some Irish fishermen, who nursed him back to health. He was in the battle of the Argonne Forest. Around 1920, Earl became one of the first motorcycle policemen in Reno. The other one was William Deal.

Earl's brothers, Thomas & William, participated in drilling contests, and held the state champion title for 7 years and once became national champions.

The Berry children attended school in the Flowery District, at a small schoolhouse in the center of Six Mile Canyon. There were 8 grades.

Marion Andrea Andreasen Gladding, the daughter of Alice Berry, a native Nevadan, and Frederik Andreasen, a Danish immigrant, was born in Virginia City on April 6, 1910. She attended the First Ward and Fourth Ward schools in Virginia City and studied teaching at the University of Nevada. For several years she taught at a small country school near Fallon, but in 1933 she returned to Virginia City and began working in the post office, a job she held until 1969 when she retired.

In her oral history interview, Marion Gladding recounts the history of the Berry family, a Nevada mining family who operated their own mine in the Flowery district during the opening decades of the twentieth century. Mrs. Gladding also reminisces about various buildings that used to exist in the Flowery district, but which have since disappeared, and thus provides the reader with information on a community about which relatively little has been previously recorded. 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#### number of children:

My grandmother and grandfather were perhaps the last family to leave Six Mile Canyon; by this time they had had 9 children. Two of them had died. There was Sarah Emma Berry, Ada Berry, Marion Berry, Thomas Berry, William Berry, Clara Berry, Alice Berry, Earl Berry and Ethel Berry.

The youngest boy, Earl, ran away from home when he was 18 years old and joined the army during World War I.... He didn't actually run away from home; he was old enough to leave at that time, but he joined the army and had some real experiences.

He was on a troop ship named the Toscana. It was torpedoed in the North Sea, and he was in icy waters until he was picked up by some Irish fishermen. They nursed him back to health, and [eventually] he rejoined his company in the army. He was in the Battle of the Argonne Forest, went through the whole European campaign and then returned to the United States. Later, around 1920, he became one of the first motorcycle cops in Reno. There were 2 of them at that time, and he was one; the other was William Dean.

#### Earl during war:

Marion Andrea Andreasen Gladding was born in Virginia City in 1910. She attended the First Ward and Fourth Ward schools in Virginia City and studied teaching at the University of Nevada. In the late 20's, Harley Davidson Motorcycles were introduced to the Reno Police Department. The first two officers to ride them were Bill Deal and Earl Berry.

"Mason Valley News" (Yerington NV) – Sat. 13 Aug 1921 p 1 – Earl Berry of Sixmile Canyon came to town Sunday morning with an eagle that had a 7-foot wingspan from wing to wing, according to the "Virginia Chronicle." The death of the eagle probably averted a tragedy at the Berry home, as the eagle made 3 attempts to reach a baby sleeping in a buggy, and hovered about until killed by a shotgun charge.

"Reno Gazette-Journal" 13 Aug 1927 p 8 – Motorcycle training officer Earl Berry of the Reno Police Department badly damaged his motorcycle and bruised his leg & hip when his motorcycle collided with a light delivery truck while he was answering a "hurry call."
