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

James W. Logan, son of John F. Logan of Route -, Uree, N. C.

Corporal Loomis M. Hales, a brother of Mrs. Blanche Tuhney, of Clayton.

Corporal Wesley Shell, son of John W. Shell, Route 1, Sugar Grove.

SPECIAL DISPATCE TO THE ENQUIRES.

Washington, February 9.—After the names of hundreds of survivors of the transport Tuscania had been received and posted at the offices of the Committee on Public Information up to 10 o'clock to-night, it was announced no more would be available until to-morrow.

A few more names were in possession of the War Department, but will not be arranged for publication before to-morrow, by which time it is expected the remainder of the survivors' list will have come over the cables from England.

All day long a steady stream of names saved flowed in over the cables and telegraph wires and was given the right of way over all except the most urgent business.

Among Number Is Wesley Sheel Whose Sweetheart Was Anxious About Him.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 9.—Among the North Carolinians reported safe and well from the Tuscania disaster is Wesley Shell, of Sugar Grove, Watauga county. A girl said to be his fiancee asked, through The Brooklyn Eagle today, if he had been saved.

Others reported saved are: Lommis M. Hayles, Clayton; James W. Logan, Uree, Rutherford county, and James Coburn Bigger, New Bern.

Mrs. Anna Roberts Bigger, of Grant's Pass, Ore., who is in New Bern visiting her sister, Mrs. J. P. C. Davis, received a cablegram yesterday from her husband, Lieut. J. C. Bigger, who was of the troopers on the Tuscania when she was sunk by a German submarine off the coast of Ireland Wednesday. stating that he had landed safely. The cablegram contained nothing except the brief announcement of Lieutenant Bigger's arrival. Mr. Bigger is known in New Bern and Beaufort, the home of Mrs. Bigger before her marriage. is a lieutenant in the Field Artillery. but had not been assigned when he left for "over there." So far as is known there were no New Bernians on the Tuscania when she was sunk.

If number of entries count for anything—and it certainly does—the first eugenic show ever held in Roseburg is a huge success.' When it opened in the Commercial Club rooms immediately after the baby parade this morning, there were by actual count just 63 babies on hand to be judged as to their physical standards. And more were coming in.

There were all kinds of babies and every one of them was entitled to a prize. The cutest, prettiest and chubbiest babies to be found anywhere were assembled in those club rooms. and the task of selecting the champions from a eugenic standpoint is a difficult one for the doctors. In all probability a decision on the prize winners will not be reached until a late hour this afternoon. The doctors comprising the examining board are: Dr. E. B. Pickel, of Medford; Dr. Marion H. Ober, of Eugene, and Doctors Lucetta Smith, R. M. Brumfield, J. R. Chapman, F. W. Hunt and F. W. Haynes, of this city. The babies entered in the contest up till noon today were:

FORMER PITTSBURGHER DIES AT SEATTLE, WASH., SON HERE IS INFORMED


Thomas W. Bigger Succumbs at 76—Was Allegheny City Auditor.

Thomas W. Bigger, aged 76, died yesterday in his home at Seattle, Wash. According to his son, Frederick Bigger of this city, his father was in the best of health when last heard from, a little over a week ago. At that time he is said to have gone to the home of another son, near Seattle, for a short visit.


Mr. Bigger was born near Xenia, O., in 1848, and when a young man he came to Pittsburgh, where he became active in public affairs. He served as city auditor of old Allegheny City for 15 or 20 years, at the expiration of which period he went West to investigate some mining property in which he was interested. He settled in Seattle about 20 years ago and has made several trips to Pittsburgh since then to visit his son.

No final decision has as yet been reached as to the disposition of the body, although it is thought by his son, Frederick Bigger, that the remains will be cremated and shipped to Xenia, to be interred beside those of his wife. He leaves two sons, Frederick Bigger of 4181 Ceneter avenue, Pittsburgh, and James Bigger of near Seattle.

Frederick T. Bigger achieved considerable prominence as an authority on city planning and urban renewal. He was born in Pittsburgh, the son of Thomas W. and Sarah Lois Coburn Bigger. He received his Certificate of Proficiency in Architecture from the University of Pennsylvania in 1903, and by 1908, according to his AIA application, was established in his own firm in Seattle with another graduate of the University of Pennsylvania, James S. Warner. Bigger & Warner became Evans, Bigger & Warner when the firm moved to Philadelphia in 1910 and joined forces with Edmund C. Evans. By 1914 Bigger had returned to Pittsburgh, however; and he continued to hold Pittsburgh as his base of operations until the end of his life.

Bigger joined the AIA in 1914, achieved fellowship status in 1937, and emeritus in 1963. He served on the National Capital Planning Commission from 1948 to 1954 and is credited with being the chief planner for the Greenbelt Towns in Maryland, Ohio, and Wisconsin. A lifelong commitment to Pittsburgh can be seen in his service to the Pittsburgh City Planning Commission from 1922 to 1954, during which time he initiated and directed production of "The Pittsburgh Plan."

Bigger was a native of Pittsburgh, PA; he worked in Seattle between 1909-1910. According to the U.S. Census of 1910, Bigger moved in that year from a residential hotel operated by William Shanks. He does not appear in the Seattle city directory after 1910, and probably left the city.

His father was Thomas W. Bigger, who in 1918 worked in the Epler Block, Seattle, WA.

The Building's History

The Snohomish Carnegie Library is one of Washington State's remaining thirty historic Carnegie libraries. Its original construction represents the efforts of the City's early residents and the Carnegie Foundation, which funded libraries throughout the country from 1886 to 1923, to build a new facility. The building is currently located within the Snohomish City National Register Historic District.

Frederick Thomas Bigger and James Smyth Warner, of Bigger and Warner Architects designed the building. The two relatively young architects had been educated at the University of Pennsylvania. From available records it appears that they moved West shortly after their graduation and secured the commission for the Snohomish Carnegie Library. Both men soon thereafter returned to Philadelphia, working during the period of 1910 – 1914 as Evans, Bigger and Warner with Edmund C. Evans. By 1914, Bigger moved back to his hometown of Pittsburgh, where he subsequently became a well-known planner, serving on both the National Capital and Pittsburgh City Planning Commissions, and as the chief planner for the Greenbelt Towns in Maryland, Ohio, and Wisconsin. The City of Snohomish has retained interesting correspondence from the

original architects' files, along with letters between the city and the Carnegie Foundation.

The building's design follows an early twentieth century prototype, based on the grant requirements of the Carnegie Foundation.

Completed in 1910, it was set on a large, landscaped site. The site contains many beautiful mature trees, which have been identified by a city survey for preservation. The building's location was somewhat separate from the city's traditional commercial district, as was typical with most Carnegie Libraries. Currently single and multifamily wood frame residences fill the east side of the block.

The library building is a simple rectangular form on a tall raised base, with an original Meeting Room and services in a Basement level, and a large Reading/Reference Room on the tall Upper Floor. A central, symmetrical stair at the front, west facade provided public access. This layout was typical of most Carnegie Libraries, and it reinforced the democratic goals of early public libraries.

The building's Renaissance Revival/Prairie School style is impressive. The exterior featured large wood frame windows, and cast-in place decorative bands and book publishers' printers' insignia that enlivened the white stucco concrete walls. The interior was characterized by a 17'-tall Upper Floor Reading Room, which was a lofty and light filled space. Because it was constructed in an earlier period of library design and philosophy, the building presents challenges for contemporary use, particularly with the floor levels, set high above and below grade, which do not easily meet current universal access goals.

The library served the City of Snohomish for over 90 years, but its size was clearly inadequate to house expanded library programs of the post war era. In 1968 an addition designed by Everett architect Harry E. Bostesch, was constructed on the south. The 5,352 square foot Addition to the approximate 4,000 square foot original building appears to have been designed with a primary goal of economic construction. It is a one-story, flat-roofed, slab-on-grade, steel framed structure with a single column in the middle of the large library Reading Room and wood frame interior partitions and roof joists.

In an effort to connect the two floors of the original building and the new grade-level spaces, the 1968 Addition featured an Entry Corridor, placed over portions of the original building's west and south facades. The new Entry Corridor on the west destroyed the original building's public entry and impacted its physical integrity. The 1968 Addition also featured a 3' tall, olive-green colored plastic fascia, designed with a boxy geometric pattern. The intent of the fascia on the 1968 Addition may have been to recall the 6" tall decorative relief band on the original library's facades.

Was a Washington & Jefferson College student in the senior class, preparatory department 1897-1897, resident of Allegheny, room at E. Beau St. & Wade.

Earle R. Forrest wrote a book in the 1920s – "The History of Washington County" [PA] – which detailed the 10th PA Volunteer Infantry's involvement in the Spanish-American War. There were 250 Washington & Jefferson College students who enlisted, leaving the county on 27 Apr 1898 for war. The men figured they would be sent to Cuba but were instead assigned to the Philippines.

Among those mustered in on 9 May 1898 were James C. Bigger. The men went to Mt. Gretna, then to Camp Merritt in Richmond in late May, one of the 3 volunteer regiments east of the Mississippi River to composed the 1st expedition to Asia. They sailed on the "Zealandia" on 15 Jun 1898 from San Francisco, arriving in Honolulu 24 Jun, then sailing into Manila Bay on 17 Jul. On 31 Jul 1898 they became the first American troops fired upon in the Philippines, at Fort Malate. The troops advanced on Manila on 13 Aug.
