Services Saturday For Ralph Taylor

Funeral services will be 10 a.m. Saturday for Ralh G. Taylor, 205 South Peachtree, who died Wednesday evening in the Veterans Hospital at Oklahoma City. He was 67.

The Rev. Leland Young will officiate at services in the Evangelical United Brethren Church. Burial will be in the Christus Garden of Sunset Memorial Gardens under direction of E. M. Trout and Sons Funeral Home.

Taylor, a veteran of World War I, had been a resident to Ponca City since 1943 and was employed as a baker by Howe Eaking Co. He is survived by his wife; a son, Sr. M/Sgt. Ralph J. 

I received a letter from you today and also got one about a week ago. Am sure glad to hear from you so often. I have certainly been moving some the last three weeks. Stay only about two days in one place but guess we will locate here for a few days anyway. I hope so for it means lots of work to move every day.

This sure is a pretty place. It was at one time a summer resort; nearly all of the buildings are hotels. It is in the mountains and is also on the river Moselle. There was quite a large boat came up this morning. Wish it was after us. Germany is sure a pretty country and the people treat us good. I guess they are glad the war is over. Anyway I am.

Say, you ought to see the hotel my kitchen is in; sure is swell. There isn't anything in Ca'dwell like it. Will try and get you a picture of it. I am going to send you some pictures right away. Sure some pretty scenery.

Oh yes, and best of all, you ought to see the bed I sleep in; sure is swell.

I will write more often now for a while. I didn't get a chance to write for we moved so often. Write often. With love, Ralph Taylor.

This repeats the above letter, but adds an introduction explaining Ralph's relatives and another letter written from Germany – "Stafford (KS) Courier" Thursday 16 Jan 1919 p 5

From Ralph Taylor.

Beck Luxemburg, Nov. 20, 1918. I have been very neglectful in writing, but a fellow can hardly write while at the front or on the move. We are chasing the Germans, but not fighting our way. They are evacuating and we are following up. I've certainly had enough of war and foreign countries. I have been in England, France, Belgium and now here, going into Germany. We were on four different fronts, namely, Alsace Lorraine, Chateau Thierry, Sessions and Argonne Forest.

I haven't the least idea when the combat troops will be going home, but not for some time yet. We were at the front when the armistice was signed and so we had to follow up the Germans to see that they don't start anything. This is Thanksgiving day but we are going to have a common army dinner.

army dinner.

Well, I can say I was lucky not to get hit during the war. I had some close calls, but came out all right. The people of France that were in the German lines and in Belgium were sure glad to see us come through. The towns were all decorated and flying French and American flags. I don't think there is anyone happier than the soldiers that the war is over because we have had so much to contend with. It seems hardly possible that we will be going home soon.—Ralph Taylor.



An article about Rep. Dean Gallo featured a "champaign brunch." The correct word should have been champagne.

- One of the more amusing mistakes was a want ad seeking a "wordperfect transcriptionist," someone with "exc. grammer," which of course should have been spelled grammar.
 - A want ad seeking contact "lense"

wearers should have been spelled lens.

- An article about a woman who was attacked read: "The woman, who police declined to identify . . ." The pronoun the writer should have used was whom.
- A letter writer told of seeing "police cars, tow trucks and 4x4's sliding down the hills and over the medium." The word that should have been used in this case is median.
- Two items that appeared on the same day (Feb. 28, 1992) both had trouble with the verbs "lie" and "lay."

I realize that many writers of letters to the editor are not models of correct grammar (and that many of them don't care if they make occasional mistakes). My point is that somebody at your newspaper office should see that these errors aren't perpetuated. Your mission, should you choose to accept it, will be to uphold the integrity of the English language.
