Former executive of gun company

Frederick James Thomas, 79, vice president of the Allentown Pneumatic Gun Co., Allentown, when he retired in 1963 after 45 years of service, died Friday in Monroe County Hospital, East Stroudsburg.

He resided with his wife, Adrienne (Collier) Thomas, at 245 Unquowa Road, Fairfield, Conn.

Born in Bridgeport, Conn., he was a son of the late Samuel and Matilda (Horn) Thomas.

He was a member of the United Congregational Church, Bridgeport, and was a former member of First Presbyterian Church, Allentown.

He served in the Army Air Corps during World War I.

He and his wife celebrated their 53rd anniversary this year.

Surviving besides his widow are a daughter Adrienne, wife of James A. Cunningham of West Simsbury, Conn., and four grandchildren.

Services will be at 10:30 a.m. Saturday in the J. S. Burkholder Funeral Home, 1601 Hamilton St., Allentown.

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

13 Nutmeg State Men on Tuscania

Only 20 Names of Survivors Received Out of 2,000 Rescued --- None from Connecticut.

Washington, Feb. 7. (Special)—An even 13 men from Connecticut were passengers on the transport Tuscania which was sank by the German submarine. Up to an early hour this morning the names of only 20 of the survivors had been received by the war department out of about 2,000 who have ween rescued.

Frederick Thomas of 27.4 Main street, this city, was aboard the steamship Tuseania when it was torpedoed as he was a clerk in the 158th Aero squadron. He lived with his sister, Mrs A. E. Manning and was employed in department G-4 at the Remington Arms plant as a clerk. He was 23 years of age.

Roscoe R. Loper, formerly of this city, son of William Loper, Sr., of this city was a member of the 213th squadron which was also aboard the torpedoed steamer. He was 25 years of age and was serving as an electrician. No word has been received as to whether they were among those who were saved or not.

THOMAS IS SAFE SAYS MESSAGE

Bridgeport Soldier Escapes Unhurt When Tuscania Is Torpedoed.

Fred J. Thomas, a Bridgeport soldier attached to the 158th aero squadron, escaped unburt when the troopship Tuscania was torpedoed off the coast of Ireland.

"Arrived here safe," says a cablegram received from Thomas today by his sister, Mrs. Fred E. Manning, 2,754 Main street. The cablegram was sent from Buncrana, Ireland, where hundreds of survivors were landed.

PRIVATE THOMAS HAS RECEIVED DISCHARGE

Served in Aviation Corps, After Being Torpedoed Upon The Tuscania

Private Frederick J. Thomas of the 158th Aero Pursuit Squadron has received his discharge from the army and is at home with his relatives, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest F. Manning of 2754 Main Street. He enlisted in November 1917, and was sent to Kelly Field, Texas, for training.

When the Tuscania was reported torpedoed Private Thomas name had appeared in the list of those lost at sea. On landing in England he was sent to one of the large aviation training schools for further instruction. While there he was in several enemy air raids and on one occasion his camp was badly damaged by the Hun planes.

Director John Washo and City Engineer Thomas F. Kennedy conferred today with the Allentown man. Repairs to the underside of the arch would be made through use of a gunnite process in which the Allentown company specializes.

Bryan C. Collier Victim of Heart Ailment; Was 72

Cement Gun Co., Engineer Helped Build New York's First Subways

Bryan Cheves Collier, for 25 years the dominant personality in the Cement Gun Co. of this city and known throughout the world in engineering circles for his accomplishments, died

yesterday afternoon in the Allentown hospital of a heart ailment with which he had suffered almost three years.

Mr. Colier was born in Indiana Spring. Ga., March 17, 1870, and therefore was in his 73rd year. He was a son of the late Bryan A. and Adrienne Cheves Collier. After graduation from the University of Georgia he went to New York City, where for a quarter of a cen-

After graduation from the University of Georgia he went to New York City, where for a quarter of a century he was engaged in engineering operations. Thus he was field operating engineer in the construction of the Broadway and 7th Ave. subways during the long period of the building of the first units of the big city's underground railroad system.

Then he was field engineer in charge of operations for the construction of the huge Kensico dam for New York City. Later he was assistant engineer for the borough of the Bronx and as highway construction engineer was in charge of the construction of the Madison Ave. bridge in New York City.

In 1915 he came to this city to join the Traylor interests and developed the Cement Gun Co. and the Gunite process which in peace times was used in the construction of reservoirs, dams, tunnels, sewers, levees, swimming pools, irrigation canals, port and dock facilities, protection of mine timbers and now, in war time, is being employed in many Army and Navy developments by the Allied nations on all the home and fighting fronts.

He was successively the chief engineer, general manager, vice president and president of the Cement Gun Corp. and at the time of his retirement nearly three years ago was the chairman of the board of directors.





TRAYLOR'S ACQUIRE CEMENT GUN CO.

Valuable New Industry for Allentown Which Will Employ 250 Men.

The Traylor Engineering and Manufacturing Co. of this city, Samuel W. Traylor, president, has purchased the controlling interest of the Cement Gun Company, Inc., which in the future will have its headquarters and mills in conjunction with those of the Traylor Company. In the near future the new industry will give employment to 250 men.

Samuel W. Traylor is the president of the new company; H. Battersby, treasurer; W. J. Roberts, vice president; F. R. Crispen, secretary, and B. C. Collier, general manager. This corporation will be operated and managed entirely independent of the Traylor Co., which, however, will manufacture the guns to be sold by the Cement Gun Co.

The cement gun somewhat resembles a large cannon or howitzer in construction. It is used by large contractors and municipalities in the construction of sewers and large buildings. According to Mr. Traylor the gun is one of the best specialties seoured by his company in many years. Orders are being secured for the new product from all parts of the country.

The first shotcrete application

Akeley, tasked with figuring out a way to repair it, eventually came up with the 'plastergun' in 1907, a tool that shot dry plaster through a hose using compressed air. <u>Water</u> streaming from another hose was added to the mix once it reached the nozzle.

Despite initial teething problems caused by clogging in the nozzle, the shotcreting process was born. Akeley eventually settled for a more sophisticated design predicated on the double-chamber principle: two alternatively pressurized chambers that pumped material into the conveying hose.

By 1909, Akeley was ready to file for a patent, which was formalized only two years later after various tweaks and improvements. The invention was promptly copied by other savvy businessmen that, having realized its manifold applications, began commercialising it under other names such as the 'cement gun'.

By 1912 the Cement Gun Company had bought Akeley's patent for his invention and use of 'gunite', as Akeley coined it, was spreading in the construction industry. One of its first applications was the lining of the Hunter's Brook Siphon in the Catskills, a water project property of the New York Water Supply that fed water from upstate reservoirs to New York City. Other uses included the fireproofing of mines with the so-called 'gunite mortar' during the 1920s.

In the 1930s, the word 'shotcrete' was introduced by the American Railway Engineering Association to describe the **process**, which has gathered acceptance to become the **industry's** term of choice.

The principle of the cement gun was discovered in 1907 by Carl E. Akeley (sculptor, naturalist, explorer) of the American Museum of Natural History. The device he invented was a result of his experiments incident to building mounts for trophies. The carcasses were formed by spraying plaster of paris onto an expanded—metal frame of the required shape. He soon concluded that this apparatus was better suited for applying mortar. Within 3 years, the device had been improved by the Cement Gun Company, Allentown, Pennsylvania. In 1910 the patented device was designated Cement Gun by Byron C. Collier, president of that firm (now Allentown Pneumatic Gun Company).

The term Gunite was coined by Collier in 1911 to describe the mortar product applied by the Cement Gun. The term Gunite first appeared in the engineering literature about 1914; Guncrete, in 1925; Pneucrete, in 1929; and Blocrete, in 1953. Gunite, Jetcrete, Cement-Gun, and other similar expressions, are proprietary; their use is appropriate only when the proprietary method or equipment is involved. These terms, as well as shotcrete, denote concrete or mortar pneumatically gunned or shot into place through a nozzle; the terms should not be confused with pneumatic concrete, which is simply pneumatically conveyed through pipes into forms.
