Tula B. Thompson was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Thompson of Dill. He went into the service with the contingent that left Cordell October 4, 1917. He was given a brief period of training and was among the first selected men of Oklahoma that were sent overseas.

He went down with the sinking of 'the transport, Tuscania, which was sunk by a German submarine, February 6, 1918, about 12 miles off the coast of Ireland.

He was single and 22 years of age. He made his home with his parents at Dill prior to extering the service.



Washita County's Contingent Given Lively Reception Before Leaving for Training at Army Camp.

One hundred twenty-three men leave this evening by special train as Washita county's contingent to the training camp at Camp Travis, San Antonio, Texas ,to become members of the national army of the United States. They are in command of one of their number for the trip.

The men were honored this afternoon by a general program for their benefit. A parade was formed, headed by the members of the contingent, the Cordell band and the Boy Scouts, and followed by the children of the city schools. The band furnished music following the parade and addresses to the boys were scheduled by Attorneys Beets, Burnette and Billups and by Bob Harvey, mayor of Cordell and chairman of the local board for Washita county. It was intended to have S. P. Freeling, attorney general of the state of Oklahoma, here to make an address but he could not come, and it was impossible to get any one else of state-wide reputation to address the boys, although an effort to get them was made.



Newspaper articles show Jessie was listed at this time period as "Miss Jessie Swehla." She is listed in newspapers as Jessie Swehla when she obtains a marriage license & marries Charles Elmer Brady in Marion, Marion KS on 8 Oct 1919. He is a resident of Peabody KS & she of Marion KS at the time. Charles Elmer Brady was born 25 Mar 1898 in Grenola, Elk KS & died 4 Dec 1965. He is buried in Memorial Lawn Cemetery, Arkansas City, Cowley KS, F: 43791277.

So – between the end of January, Jessie is supposed to have married William Razor & died in California at the end of March.
