Tuscania Survivors Feted in England.

George Upham has sent his sister, Mrs. Fred H. Masterson of 332 Sherwood street, a most interesting program of a gala matinee that was given at Southampton, England, in honor of the Tuscania survivors.

Mr. Upham left Missoula on December 11, serving with the Twentieth engineers, company F, of the 6th battalion. A letter dated March 7, which Mrs. Masterson received yesterday, says that he is still in England, hoping to get over into France at any moment; that his entire outfit was lost with the Tuscania and it requires time to get a second equipment.

The program bears upon its face, the appropriate quotation from Elbert Hubbard: "Complete success eliminates a man from his fellows; but suffering makes kinsmen of us all." The entertainment included the S. Q. M. S. Hidden Magic, Mirth and Mystery; an original comedy Irish classic, "Father and Son;" a comedy recue, "The Love Chase" with numerous other spectacles and musical numbers.

This is but one instance of the cordial hospitality that is extended the American soldiers by their cousins overseas.

GEORGE UPHAM RETURNS HOME.

George Upham, a nephew of ex-Governor Upham of Wisconsin, returned to Missoula after many months service with the 20th Engineers in France. Upham enlisted early in 1917, and was one of the first 250,000 men to go over. He is a survivor of the Tuscania, which was torpedoed in February, 1918. Out of the 35 men in the lifeboat he embarked in, but five soldiers including himself were saved. The rest of the men lost their lives when the lifeboat was dashed to pieces on the rocks.

Aged Man Found Dead At Cabin Door

Amos Upham, 87, was found lying dead before the door of his cabin on Bull lake Friday evening by Mr. Winslow, the driver of the Bull lake school bus. The cabin is only a short distance from the road and Winslow thought he saw an object lying before the cabin and stepped over to investigate. He found the old man lying there with his large dog by his side as close to the dead body as he could get.

Coroner Baney was notified as soon as possible and also Undertaker Gompf. The body was brought to Libby. It was estimated that Mr. Upham had been 'dead about 24 hours at the time he was found.




