He was a member of Company E, Twentieth Engineers (Forestry Battalion). Charles Vanlandingham formerly was employed by the Fidelity Trust Company and later by J. B. White, the Kansas City lumberman. He was working in the South for Captain White when he enlisted in the forestry battalion. His relatives so far have been unsuccessful in getting any information as to whether he was among those saved. His sister, Miss Gertrude Vanlandingham, lives at 3913 Broadway.

WAS ON TORPEDOED SHIP

**CHARLES VANLANDINGHAM TELLS OF
SINKING OF TUSCANIA.**

**His Company, Twentieth Engineers,
Lost Only Nine of 160 Men Drowned
—Men in Boats Two Hours
Before Rescue.**

Corp. Charles Vanlandingham of Kansas City, with the Twentieth Engineers, writes from England to his sisters, Miss Anna Vanlandingham and Miss Gertrude Vanlandingham, 3913 Broadway, of his experiences when the Tuscania went down: "I was greatly surprised

down:

You will probably be greatly surprised to know that I am here. There were about two hours of my life on the evening of February 5 that I doubted if I ever would be here or any place else but in the bottom of the drink.

The trip progressed very pleasantly until we had been out thirteen days from New York and had traveled for two days through the war zone. The evening of the 5th was the most beautiful sunset I have ever seen, and just after sunset Phil Carroll and I went below to get ready for supper. We lay down on our bunks for a few minutes, as our mess wasn't until 6 o'clock and it was then only 5:30.

We both were asleep at 5:50 when a terrible crash came. All the lights went out. Well, everybody knew that the subs had torpedoed us. You can guess what sort of a feeling came over me as everything was in total darkness. The torpedo had struck squarely in the engine room and the boat began to list something terrible. We were down in "E" deck, which is the steerage and two decks below the first open deck, and no lights.

Well, at first there was a great deal of confusion and scrambling for the steps, but some of us who had bunks near the stairway began to yell: "Take your time, boys! Take it easy. Don't any one get trampled now!" And the fellows all marched out splendidly. When we got up on deck to the lifeboats the boat was listing so it was hard to launch them successfully and numbers of them couldn't be launched at all. The boat I was due to get off in got away safely, but there were so many others getting into it who didn't belong there I figured my name was mud.

Then I heard one of the boat crew announce the closing of the airtight compartments and she would float for at least two hours, which gave me new hope. Of course, there were numbers of men falling into the water through faulty launching of lifeboats. So I spent the next hour trying to help throw life lines to those who had fallen overboard, but the task was futile, as those we managed to get a life line to were so cold from the water they were unable to hang on. All the time the Tus-

cania was firing sky rocket distress signals, and finally a submarine chaser came alongside. It could only take a few, however, as they are comparatively small boats and there were close to 2,800 on board the Tuscania. Word was passed along the line that there would be another sub chaser alongside soon.

Of course they had to steal up in total darkness as there were chances of them being torpedoed during the rescue work. It seemed hours before we saw the next sub chaser slip alongside and it was three-quarters of an hour between the first and second boat. Before the second one came along the Tuscania took a sudden list to the starboard side and the deck was slanting on an angle of about 45 degrees. When she listed so suddenly everybody I think had a picture of themselves in their minds of floating around on the waves in a life preserver as there were at least fourteen hundred on board yet.

You can bet I felt good when I saw that sub chaser come alongside and when I had slid down a rope and placed my foot on her deck it was like living again.

We made it into a port in Ireland by 12:30, midnight, and they had a hot feed waiting for us when we got there. We were struck at 5:50 p. m., rescued at 8:30 p. m. and the ship went down at 9:15 p. m., so we didn't have much time left.

Those Germans sure must be good shots as two bloomin' bloody torpedoes hit us right amidship, which is the point they aim at. Our company fared better than any other, as we only lost nine men out of the 160 odd that were lost. I don't know how soon we will go to France, but probably very soon. I lost everything I had expect what was on my back. Good things to eat are very scarce over here, which you can take as a hint. Much love.

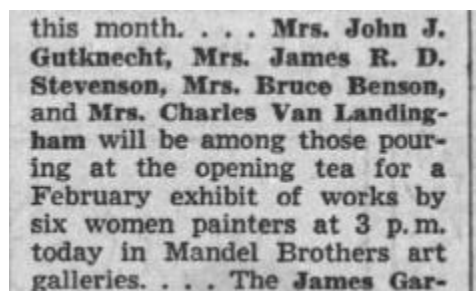

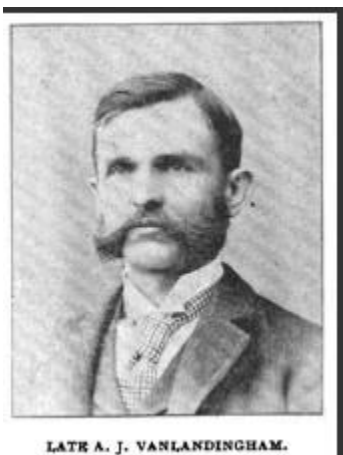

DEATH COMES AT LAST

A. J. Vanlandingham, Formerly Kansas City's Commissioner,
Passes Away.

SEVERE COLD IS THE CAUSE

Fatal Illness the Result of Exposure
While Attending a Meeting of
the Interstate Commerce
Commission.

Special to the Kansas City Times.

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 21.—A. J. Vanlandingham, commissioner of the merchants' traffic bureau, died tonight at 8:30 at his residence, Washington boulevard and Tay-

lor avenue. Mr. Vanlandingham lost his wife a year ago, since which time he has not enjoyed very good health. Three weeks ago, while attending a meeting of the interstate commerce commission at Washington, he took a severe cold and was unable to throw it off, being confined to his bed ever since his return. He leaves a family of nine children.

A. J. Vanlandingham was born in 1853 in Wilkinson county, Georgia. He entered railway service July 1, 1870. Up to 1875 he was porter, clerk and utility man of the Southern Express and in the city ticket office of the Memphis and Little Rock road. From December 1, 1875, to October 30, 1876, he was clerk in the land department of the Little Rock and Fort Smith. From January 15, 1878, to February 28, 1880, he was messenger for the Southern Express company between St. Louis and Texarkana. From February 28, 1880, to September 1, 1882, he was in charge of the express department of the Little Rock and Fort Smith and from September 1, 1882, to June 1, 1883, he was assistant general freight agent of the Little Rock and Fort Smith railroad. From June 1, 1883, to January 1, 1884, he was general freight agent of the same road and from that time to October 1, 1887, he was general southwestern agent of the Kansas City, Fort Scott and Gulf, now the Kansas City, Fort Scott and Memphis road. In October 22, 1887, he became assistant general freight agent of the Kansas City, Fort Scott and Memphis and associated lines, a position which he held to December 15, 1889.

When the Kansas City transportation bureau was organized, December 15, 1889, by the Commercial club, the board of trade and the live stock exchange, Mr. Vanlandingham was selected as commissioner, and he held the position continuously until March 30, 1897, when he tendered his resignation to accept a similar position with the freight bureau of St. Louis. At the organization of the Kansas City bureau he entered into a three years' contract at a salary of \$5,000 a year. When that expired he signed a contract for two years at \$5,500 a year. After the expiration of that contract his salary was \$6,000 a year, the contract being a yearly one, Mr. Vanlandingham reserving the right to resign the position at any time.

Mrs Vanlandingham had been sick for some time with the grip, which developed into pneumonia.

Mr Vanlandingham received a telegram Monday afternoon calling him to Kansas City immediately, as his wife was very sick. He had been making arrangements to move to St Louis in the near future.

A number of telegrams of condolence were sent from the Traffic Bureau and his many friends in St Louis.

Mr Vanlandingham has nine children, the youngest of whom is only 3 months old.

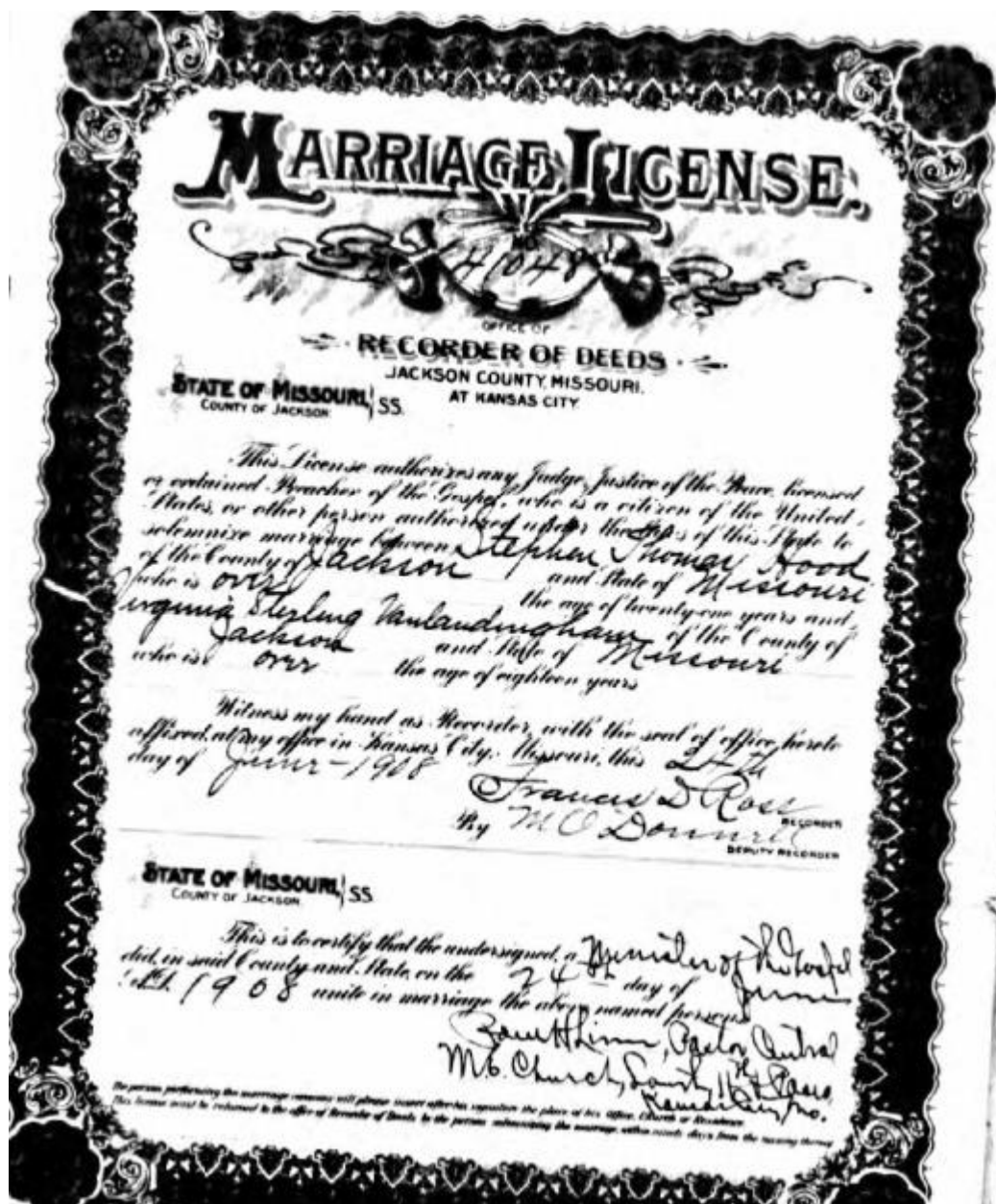

Seeks to Recover Money Invested in Idaho Corporation

Sensational charges are made against the Jackson company, incorporated under the Idaho laws, in a district court suit filed Wednesday afternoon by Andrew Solosabal, who alleges that the company obtained \$6000 from him by making false representations. Maxey Jackson, head of the company, is named defendant.

The complaint charges that Solosabal bought 600 shares of stock in the company for \$6000, after Jackson had described three inventions on which, it is charged Jackson represented the company held patents. It is alleged in the complaint that the Jackson company is holder of no such patents and that the stock is worthless.

The inventions, according to the complaint, were a novel "dirigible" automobile headlight, which threw the rays of light with the direction the wheels were taking, a bolt and nut which could not come unscrewed and new rail joints, which would do away with the "bump."

It is alleged that Jackson sold 250 shares of the stock on the same representations to other persons.

MRS. VIRGINIA JACKSON DIES.

She Had Been a Teacher at De Lano School Since Its Founding.

Mrs. Virginia V. Jackson, 52 years old, a teacher at the R. J. DeLano School for Crippled Children since its beginning in 1929, died today at the Research hospital. She had been on leave of absence this school year because of ill health.

Mrs. Jackson lived at 4235 Locust street. She leaves a daughter, Miss Suzanne Jackson of the home; three sisters, Mrs. T. M. HERS A HEROINE'S DEATH

RUTH VANLANDINGHAM DROWNED
TRYING TO SAVE HER FRIENDS.

**Not the First Time This Kansas City
Girl Had Braved Peril in a
Rescue—Was an Ex-
pert Swimmer.**

The heroic act of Ruth Vanlandingham, who was drowned last Saturday near Russellville, Ark., in attempting the rescue of friends, was characteristic of the girl. Once before she had faced death to save a life and succeeded.

Last spring Miss Vanlandingham saw a runaway horse coming down a street in Russellville. Her sister Irene was in the buggy. Without a moment's hesitation the girl leaped from the sidewalk, gripped the bit of the running horse and brought it to a stop, but not until she had been dragged many yards. Her sister was uninjured.

SHE WAS AN EXPERT SWIMMER.

Those who knew her well in Kansas City, where she had lived most of her life, say she is absolutely fearless. She was an expert swimmer, and at Prior Lake, Wis., last summer, kept her friends in terror at her daring dives and feats in the water.

Friday night Miss Vanlandingham, together with W. A. Crawford, superintendent of the public schools of Russellville, his 19-year-old daughter, Frances, and Miss Vera Meade, principal of the high school at Ola, daughter of U. L. Meade, an attorney of Russellville, went to the Illinois River for an outing.

WENT TO SAVE HER FRIENDS.

The entire party went swimming Saturday afternoon. Miss Crawford got beyond her depth and her father attempted to save her. Seeing that he too was going down, Miss Vanlandingham and Miss Meade went to their assistance and the swiftly running water bore them all under.

Miss Vanlandingham was graduated from the Manual Training High School in 1910 and the year following attended the University of Kansas. She and her sister, Irene, have been teaching school in Russellville the last two winters. At Manual she was a member of the Oita Society. Miss Vanlandingham was a daughter of A. J. Vanlandingham, at one time transportation commissioner of the Commercial Club. Since the death of her parents her home has been here with her brother, W. B. Vanlandingham, 4501 Robert Gillham Road. She was 20 years old.

ALL THE BODIES RECOVERED.

The bodies of Professor Crawford, his daughter, Frances, Miss Vanlandingham and Miss Meade were recovered yesterday within a radius of one hundred yards of each other and about a half

mile south of the point where they were drowned.

Crawford's arms were about his daughter. A searching party of two hundred kept up the search all Saturday night for the bodies.

Miss Vanlandingham's uncle, Louis Garrett of Little Rock, Ark., was at the head of the searching party when her body was found. The body will be brought to Kansas City by the uncle, her sister, Miss Irene, and her young brother, Edwin Vanlandingham, this morning.
