Loon Lake Hotel Company & golf course –

Louis Cummings was a caddy at the golf course in 1910 & a plumber on 5 Jun 1917 when he registered for the WWI draft & a plumber in the 1930 & 1940 censuses



Notes: Located on Loon Lake, N.Y., the Loon Lake House was considered one of the most popular and successful hotels of the Adirondack Mountain resort areas of New York. Originally built by Ferd and Mary Chase, the hotel was a summer resort that had its own golf course, power plant, blacksmith, water system, laundry and bowling area. The hotel was a beautiful Victorian four–storied structure that had 31 rooms, was located directly on Loon Lake and was operated by the Loon Lake Hotel Company (Chase Family). The hotel's operation fell onto hard times at the onset of the Depression in 1930 and never regained its grandeur. The hotel caught fire on Sept. 20, 1956, and burned completely to the ground.

When the cup, shown above, was added, it was not backstamped and a manufacturer was not known. Now (2014), thanks to photos and information contributed by Judy Soslau, we know that at least three manufacturers provided china to the Loon Lake House: Syracuse, Iroquois and an English company that used James M. Shaw & Co. as a distributor.

In addition to the cup, pictured above is a 6.5-inch oval casserole (with crazing) with the James M. Shaw & Co. mark as well as a detail photo from either a Iroquois China plate (date code range: 1917–1921) or a Syracuse China plate (date code range: 1922–1937). Based on the known dates, it would make sense that the ware with crazing was updated with an order to Iroquois and then an order to Syracuse. Both of the latter, of course, were New York State manufacturers.

ID contributed by dbstoneware Casserole and detail photo contributed by Judy Soslau Volumes have been written about Loon Lake House (Loon Lake Hotel Company) and its unforgettable founders, Ferd and Mary H. H. Chase, who touched the lives of so many people in different ways. The incredible success of the Chase management was due, in part, to their keen business acumen. Mrs. Chase was affectionately known as the "Mrs" who died on January 18, 1933. The great depression of 1929 took its toll on the Loon Lake House and forced it into bankruptcy during late 1931. One of the main attractions at Loon Lake was the 18-hole PGA golf course. A devastating fire of September 20, 1956, burned this famous hotel to the ground.

The Loon Lake House was built on the south and east shores of Loon Lake, about 15 miles northeast of Saranac Lake by Ferdinand W. Chase and his wife Mary in 1879, originally as a large log hotel that could accommodate fifty guests. The area was already famous among sports, as Paul Smith had established his first hotel on Loon Lake in 1848, followed by Hunter's Rest nearby on the North Branch of the Saranac River in 1852.

Located on the Port Kent and Hopkinton
Turnpike, the Loon Lake House was an immediate success. Like Paul and Lydia
Smith, Ferd and Mary were well suited to their roles as host and hostess; Ferd was a charming raconteur and Mary an excellent cook and manager. The hotel's capacity was doubled in 1880 with the addition of a new wing. In 1882, its capacity was doubled again with the addition of an imposing four story building that had views of the Green Mountains of Vermont to the east and the High Peaks of the

Adirondacks to the south.

In 1887 the <u>Chateaugay Railroad</u> reached from Plattsburgh. An additional three sto 1893. By 1910 further additions and cottages brought the total capacity to 350, and space for an additional 150 guests was added. The property grew to include a tract acres, with an 18-hole, PGA golf course, a tennis court, pool and billiard parlors, and

In addition to the ever-expanding hotel, Mary Chase leased land to guests who wis cottages, with the stipulation that they contain no cooking facilities: guests were re for meals. At the peak there were some sixty cottages, bringing the hotel's total cap

There were also laundries, staff houses, workshops, barns, a dairy, vegetable and flow water systems and a mile-long sewer system that is still working. Gas was piped froughting, and later the <u>Paul Smith's Electric Light and Power Company</u> built a small the hotel and cottages.

Ferd Chase died in 1916, and his wife continued to run the hotel until 1931, when sh difficulties brought on by the Depression. The hotel continued in business until the was used as a summer camp. It burned to the ground on September 19, 1956.

Among the more famous visitors to the hotel were Oscar Wilde in 1882, and, in 18' <u>Benjamin Harrison</u>, whose wife suffered from tuberculosis; President <u>Grover Cleve</u> President <u>William McKinley</u> in 1897.

Loon Lake's lifestyles of the rich and famous

Historic former resort features a surviving hotel annex, several cottages (including one that housed multiple presidents) and a history of famous visitors

Loon Lake is along a road less taken. You won't pass it on your way from here to there. Found three miles west of state Route 3, 20 miles north of Saranac Lake, along Route 26, the old Port Kent-Hopkinton Turnpike, it requires a dedicated trip. Its history as one of the most "socially prominent" resorts in the Adirondacks saw wealthy families such as the Vanderbilts, Whitneys, Rothschilds, Rockefellers, and Guggenheims regularly staying as guests. It features one of the earliest golf courses in the Adirondacks and African-American homesteaders with ties to Gerrit Smith of Timbuctoo and the abolitionist movement.

Every other year, Adirondack Architectural Heritage (AARCH) offers a tour of the community that includes a surviving hotel annex, several cottages (including one that housed multiple presidents) and a history of famous visitors such as Irving Berlin, George Gershwin, Theodore Dreiser, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Oscar Wilde, Red Skelton and others on the comedy circuit.

Settlements began in the area with the construction of the Port Kent-Hopkinton Turnpike in the early 1830s – a toll road that hugged the shores of the lake. Nearby Merrillsville was the first hamlet, founded around 1831 when a 24-year-old John Merrill built an inn as a stagecoach stop along the turnpike. He also established the first post office in the Franklin Township as hunting, logging, and mining interests grew.

In 1848, Gerrit Smith, one of the wealthiest men in New York State, gave Willis Hodges, a free Black abolitionist from Virginia, two-hundred acres as part of his plan for Black men to own property so they could vote. Known as Blackville and located north of the lake, it survived only two years due to harsh weather, poor farming conditions, and lack of experience by the settlers. Hodges Bay on Loon Lake is named after Willis.

By the 1850s, the area caught the attention of Paul Smith, a hunting and fishing guide before becoming a hotelier. He stayed at the Merrill Inn when he first visited and operated at least two different lodging establishments at Loon Lake beginning in the early 1850s before moving to Lower St. Regis Lake by 1859.

A family's legacy

Loon Lake's turn as a summer resort really began 20 years later, when Ferdinand and Mary Chase purchased 10 acres after several years of exploring the area on hunting and fishing trips, and it is their history that shines today. They built a 31-room, three-story log cabin which opened in 1879.

Within four years they expanded to 100 rooms with multiple dining and sitting areas and wide porches overlooking the lake. An observation tower offered views of the surrounding mountains and Vermont. The first annex, matching the 100 rooms of the main hotel, was built next door in 1893. A circular drive, that still exists, brought guests to the front door, and a grand staircase led down to a boathouse.

The Chases continued to expand their holdings for the next five decades until it included most of the fifty-plus cottages on the lake – without kitchens, as stipulated by Mary Chase, so everyone had to eat in the dining rooms. A city-like infrastructure supported the enterprise with a water and sewer system, barns, a dairy, gardens, laundries, and housing for a staff of close to 500. Local guides provided outdoor experiences and guests could indulge themselves with bowling, billiards, and the nine-hole Scottish-style **golf** course which opened in 1895 and expanded to eighteen holes in 1922.

Mary Chase was intimately involved in the operation of the resort, hired every person herself, and invited every guest. She perused the social columns, and if she disapproved of what she read, you were not invited back.

After Mary Chase died in 1933, the hotel limped along until it was purchased in 1947 by Andron Resorts, a hotel company from Florida that catered to Jewish clientele. A nearby hunting lodge was converted into a synagogue that is still in operation today.

Two different railroads snaked through the woods to provide access from Montreal, Plattsburgh, Lake Placid, Utica and points beyond, and ne'er did the tracks meet. Each line had its own station parallel to the other.

Caddie House

The first building on the AARCH tour is the Caddie House. Built in 1895, it may have been designed by Stanford White. Although White designed the Boston Public Library and triumphal arch in Washington Square in New York City, he may be more famous for his part in a love triangle with actress Evelyn Nesbit and railroad heir Henry Thaw who murdered White on the rooftop of Madison Square Garden in 1906. Thaw's prosecution was dubbed the "Trial of the Century" at the time.


The architecture of East Asia, which influenced many Adirondack Great Camps, is reflected in the Caddie House's pagoda roof and deep-boxed eaves over a wide, wrap-around porch. The open interior is dominated by two, side-by-side staircases in the rear. After WWII, it was purchased by PGA Pro Harry "Zeke" Pimstead and became the post office as well as a pro shop. Pimstead died in 1974 and the building was purchased by the current owners, Karl Beckwith Smith and Hal Truesdale, in 1978. The **golf** course closed in 2003.


Irish House

The Loon Lake House burned in 1956 along with Annex #1 – a fire so large legend says flames could be seen from Montreal. A smaller, second annex, built around 1905, still stands next door to the Caddie House. Known as the Irish House, the three-story structure with nine bedrooms and 7½ baths has been extensively restored in the last few years by Patty Cogswell, a lifelong resident of the community. Its lawn was once the putting green for the **golf** course, and a ball washer still sports the front yard.

The golf course at Loon Lake was one of the earliest in the Adirondacks – 14-year-old Louis Cummings was a caddie on golf links in the 1910 census – and most likely it was here - https://www.adirondackexplorer.org/stories/loon-lakes-lifestyles-of-the-rich-and-famous



Keeseville is a small hamlet located in both Clinton and Essex Counties. Although Keeseville was originally a village, a decision was made in 2013 to dissolve it. The hamlet is now under the jurisdiction of the Towns of Ausable and Chesterfield.

Keeseville is well-known for its close proximity to <u>Ausable Chasm</u>, a scenic attraction referred to as the "Grand Canyon of the Adirondacks." Ausable Chasm offers breathtaking views, miles of nature trails, and rafting, tubing & kayaking opportunities.

The <u>Ausable River</u>, famous for trout fishing, runs right through Keeseville. There is also a campground in Keeseville - the Ausable River Campsite - which has campsites and trails for mountain biking.

While Keeseville is a small community, there are dining and lodging options availble right in the hamlet.

However, since Keeseville is a small community, there are only a few local lodging and restaurant options available in the hamlet.

At the southern end of Keeseville, North Country Camps has one summer camp for boys and one for girls. Farther south, about 10 miles away from Keeseville, Pok-O-MacCready Camps is another popular summer camp.

The hamlet is a short drive away from two major wildlife areas: the Ausable Marsh State Wildlife Management Area and the Wickham Marsh State Wildlife Management Area. Both are located along the western shore of Lake Champlain, and they are open for various recreational activities.
