Longtime Resident Of Woods County Dies At Oklahoma City

Funeral services for Ralph Earl Vore, 70, Hopeton, will be held at 10 a.m. Friday at the Dacoma Church of God. Vore died Tuesday at the Veterans Administration hospital in Oklahoma City.

Born May 20, 1893, in Haskell county, Kan., Vore moved to Oklahoma with his parents in 1893 at the opening of the Cherokee strip. His parents homesteaded one and one-fourth miles south of Dacoma, and Vore lived in and around the Dacoma area until three years ago when he moved to Hopeton. He was united in marriage to Flossie Reed on Nov. 16, 1920 at Cherokee, Okla.

A veteran of World War I, Vore served in the France theatre with the American Expeditionary Force. He was a member of the American Legion and a member of the Dacoma Church of God.

Vore was preceeded in death by a brother, Cecil, who died April 7, 1963; and two sisters, Haze Coale and Helen May.

Survivors include his wife, Flossie, of the home; two sons, Dave and Jimmy, both of the home; three daughters, Mrs. Neil Perci-

DACOMA BOY ABOARD TUSCANIA

**Sends Words to His Parents That He
Is Safe In Ireland.**

Ralph Vore, one of the last of the Dacoma boys to be called to the colors, was one of the Americans on board the transport Tuscania when the vessel was sunk off the coast of Ireland.

Ralph left here for Camp Travis December 2nd. On the day of his arrival at the camp he was assigned to the 41st Co., 11th Bn., 165th Depot Brigade. The next day he was assigned to duty on the construction of a Y. M. C. A. building and on his return to his company barracks that night found the company quarantined for measles, and he returned to the building he was working on where he remained until leaving for France. His ability in construction work soon qualified him for the engineers' corps which he joined and when volunteers were called for immediate service at the front, he, among 400 others, answered the call and after 12 days in-terment under medical inspection for disease, was started for the port of embarkation. According to postal cards received by his parents he was five days in reaching Jersey City, N. J., from which point they last received word from him under date of January 21st.

On the day the Tuscania was sunk, his father learned through an army officer at Alva, that Ralph was then on his way across the seas. His next information of him was had from the list of those on board the ill-fated vessel, which placed him among its passengers.

The suspense which the whole community shared with his relatives in regard to his fate was dispelled Monday afternoon by the receipt by Mr. Vore of the following terse message: "Safe ashore Ireland," signed Ralph Vore.

Considerable speculation was rife in the community as to the reason Ralph was assigned to duty in advance of others who were drafted from this county at an earlier date. We believe the above is a satisfactory answer to all speculations.—Dacoma Mascot.

Letter From Ralph Vore

Wednesday morning Mrs. Ed. Vore received the following letter from her son Ralph who was on the transport Tuscania, which was torpedoed in the North Sea February 5th. The letter contains no reference to the disaster, was not dated and gives no information concerning the whereabouts of the forces and was written upon but one side of a small sheet of note paper and reads as follows:

Dear Mother:

I will try and write you a few lines to let you know that I am all right and hope you are the same. We landed all right. This is just three months from my birth-

day. (Which shows that the letter was written the 20th of February) It is not so cold here. How is everybody at Dacoma. You don't need to worry if you don't hear from me for a month. I am feeling fine. You will find my address on the corner of the envelope.

The letter was postmarked Manchester, England, 15 days after the sinking of the ship and a news article in a Glasgow, (Scotland) paper received here announced the giving of a banquet to the forces he was with at South Hampton, England, the port from which the troops embark for France, at a latter date. So in all probability Ralph is now on French soil.

ANOTHER LETTER FROM RALPH VORE

In a second letter received from Ralph Vore since our last issue he makes the statement that he was sure on the Tuscania when she was struck; but that he got out alright. He says he never experienced any sea sickness on the trip over; that the treatment his contingent was receiving over there was certainly fine and that he was never in better health.

The letter was dated this way: It is two months and twenty days until my birthday. Making the date the letter was written Feb. 20th. No reference as to where he was or what he was doing was made.—Dacoma Mascott.

Well Mother I will close for this time and hope to hear from you soon for you know that it has been a long time since I have heard from home, don't you? But I am getting along fine, so don't worry about me for you will hear if I get sick or something, so good-bye.

Ralph Vore Has Had Lots of Fun Chasing the Huns

In a letter from Ralph Vore dated Aug. 10, is the information that he has been having a lot of fun chasing the Huns but that he had been relieved for a while and was getting along fine.

He had received several letters from his folks and friends and was glad to hear from them as news from Dacoma was always welcome. Speaking of fruit in France he says that he never saw so many cherries in his life as there were there in June but that he didn't see many peaches or apples. He and Roy Sellers each speak of the fact that they are undoubtedly close to each other but that they

Ray Vore, who has been attached to the Quartermasters Department at Camp Logan, Texas, received his honorable discharge a few days ago and returned the first of the week. His wife who was formerly Miss Lola Holder, of this city has been with him since he has been in the service. Ralph Vore, a brother of Ray, who has been stationed at Camp Logan, received his discharge and arrived home yesterday. Both Ralph and Ray and his wife left today for their home near Dacoma.

Ralph Vore's Home

Ralph Vore, arrived here Saturday noon from Camp Pike Ark., where he received his discharge.

Ralph left here for Camp Travis in November, 1917 and was one of the first from here to get to France. His boat the Tuscania was torpedoed off the Irish coast, landing him in Ireland where he spent a week, which he says,

was the most interesting and enjoyable part of his trip, and where he met the most hospitable people.

He went into the trenches in Alsace Lorraine May 16, 1918, for twenty one days straight, after which he was in the fighting continually untill the signing of the armistice. Soissons and Chateau Thierry are two places where his division, the 32nd,

made a name itself, and Ralph is wearing as much of the "Croix de guerre" as American military regulations permit for his part with the French in retaking a French town.

Ralph came through without a wound or scar which is rather remarkable inasmuch, as he is one of thirty-two of his original company of two hundred and fifty to survive the fighting, and 14000 of the division were killed in action.

It would take a fair sized book to record the experiences of Ralph's division, 21 days in the trenches without relief, fourteen hours march and a days fighting right on top of it, seventy-two hours without food, and fighting all the time, one meal a day some days when they were in action, and a 400 kilometer (about 250 miles) march into Germany with their 70

lbs. packs after the Armistic was signed.

Ralph came back on the S. S. Great Eastern, which made the record time of 13 day for a round trip, and made the run from Brast to New York in 5 days 23 hours 30 minutes.

Ralph says he is glad to be back, is never going to kick again on the cooking or step off on the left foot first.

Everyone is glad to see him

back, and he is assured of a hearty welcome and an interested audience of listeners wherever he finds time to stop.

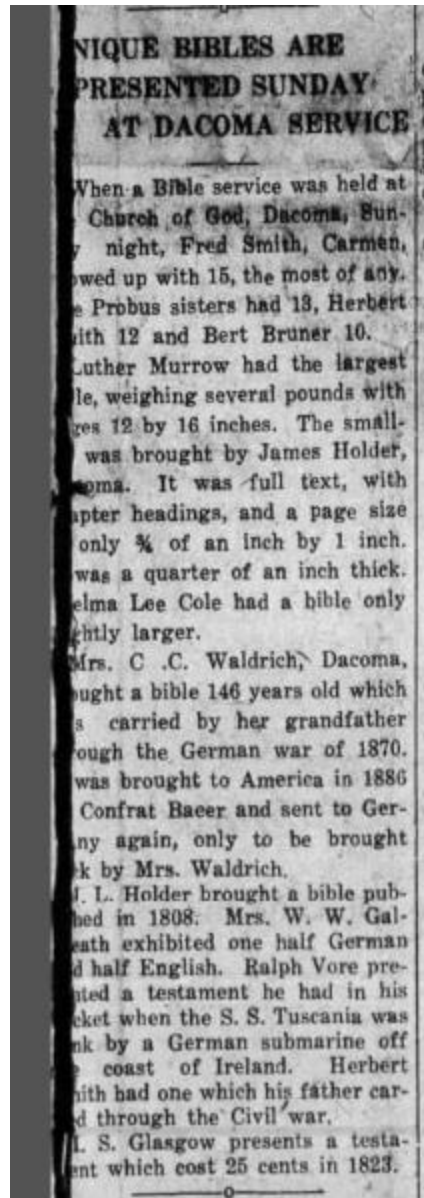

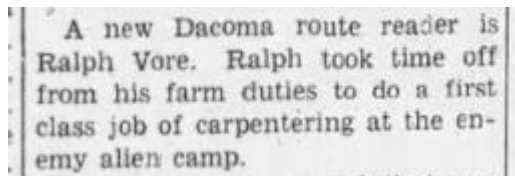

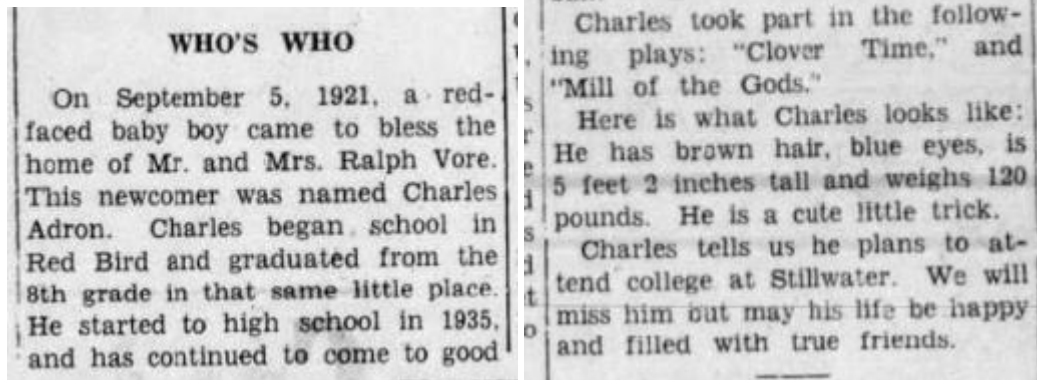
