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L. B. Watters Taken by Death

Lawrence B. Watters, 66, a native of Victor, died Monday while visiting at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Leslie Smith of Missoula.

He was born in 1896 in Victor, a son of Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Watters. He was educated in Victor and at Montana State College in Bozeman.

Mr. Watters served in the Corps of Engineers in World War I.

He married Lois Veider of Grantsdale, April 25, 1925. He served as a rural mail carrier at Victor for 22 years.

Mr. Watters farmed until 1955 when he sold his land and built his present home on Big Creek north of Victor. He spent all of his life in the Victor area except for Army service and three years as a longshoreman at Portland, Ore.

Mr. Watters was state commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars for three years and one of the original organizers of VFW Post 1430. Survivors include his widow, Lois; five children, Mrs. Charles E. Dean, Mrs. Smith and John Watters, all of Missoula; Mrs. Gayle E. Munson of Hamilton and George H. Watters of Bartonville, Ill.; three sisters, Mrs. Charles Shirly of Houston, Tex., Mrs. Margaret Olds and Mrs. Marion Vandemburg in Idaho; a brother, Dwight Watters of Seattle; eight grandchildren, and several nieces and nephews.

Funeral arrangements are pending under the direction of the Whitesitt Mortuary of Stevensville.

Boys, Saved from Watery Grave, Write Home.

Lawrence Watters and James Ever-.ett Babbitt Tell of Experiences on Ill-Fated Boat.

Victor, March 14.—Letters were received Tuesday by the parents of Lawrence B. Watters and James Everett Babbitt, who were on the Tuscania., which was sunk by a torpedo February 6. Elmer, referred to in the first letter, is Elmer Luther Cowan, who lost his life. The three boys left Victor about the last of November. The letters follow:

"February 14, 1918.—It has been some time since I have written you, but much longer since hearing from you. may think I have had an easy time, but since going aboard the ship it has been rather hard, as we have been moved about so much. Have been treated like princes since we landed, except for clothing, as the government has not a very big supply here. Am just getting started again to collect a few little things of my own, donated by the Red Cross Associa-Olympias he now you have beard

"Suppose by now you have heard of our disaster on the sea, when we were in sight of land on both sides of the ship. We all thought we were safe, but guess the submarine had us sighted, and waited for us until dark, and then let her drive.

"It is an experience I never want to go through again. We were all ordered out, and especially requested to keep our lifebelts on, or with us. I, with half of the other bunch, was lined up for supper, on the third deck. The others, however, had just eaten, and were called out on deck for the rest of the night, as we were in what they call "Hell's hole." All of a sudden there came a bang, and out went the lights. Then we were in a mass of crowding men, and there was a great scramble for the upper decks, where the lifeboats were stationed, and where we were drilled to go in case of such an emergency.

"It was a terrible sight to see the way some of the men lost their heads and jumped overboard, some of whom were saved, and the rest numbered among the lost. Ropes on the lifeboats broke, spilling men in every direction, most of whom were picked up and saved. The boat I was to have gone on was smashed, so I was left on deck, with the rest of those who were going with me, as well as many others, who were in the same fix.

"Something told me that we would be saved, and sure enough, three torpedo destroyers came alongside of our ship and took us away to different landing points. We lost everything we had to our names, excepting what we had on our backs.

"From all indications, we are afraid that Elmer is among the missing, as we can hear nothing of him. Many of the lifeboats that were safely launched were mashed on the rocks. Most of the friends I had made, since being in the army, were killed in that way.

"I found Everett Babbitt, and we stuck together and made it away on the same "chaser." If this ship had sunk as quickly as most of them do, hardly any of us would have been saved. It took something over two hours for it to go down.

"The young wireless operator never left his post, but stayed right there to send messages and signals.

"Well I spent the last cent I had for soap, towels, tobacco, stationery and many other articles, so I was broke for the 14 days on board and ever since I landed. Hope you are all well and enjoying the green grass, as we are. Have been in many different countries and places since leaving home. If you want to send me anything please send me sweet chocolate, hard candy and handkerchiefs. You see I lost everything, even my sweater.

"May send cable before this reaches you. With love to all. LAWRENCE WATTERS.

Safe Ashore. "February 13 .-- I wrote you a few days ago. I am on foreign soil and am alright. I was on the ship that was torpedeed, but got away safely on a small boat. Lawrence is here with us but Elmer isn't here. He isn't among the list of drowned so I still have hopes that he is alright. I know it will be a great shock to his folks and friends. I guess you heard all about the ship being torpedoed and you were wondering if we were on the ship or not and if we were safe. "Well it is time for the lights to go out in the Y. M. C. A., so I must close for this time, "JAMES E. BABBITT."

Body of Elmer Cowan Washed Ashore on Rocks.

Second Letter Received From, Lawrence Watters Since He Was Wrecked off Coast of Ireland.

Victor, March 21.—Another interesting letter has been received from Lawrence Watters by his folks. It was written February 17 and is as follows:

Well here it is Sunday and I just came from church in the Y. M. C. A. This organization is sure doing a great piece of work in this country. Well first of all I will tell you that Elmer L. Cowan was found dead. His body had been smashed and mangled on the rocks. and drifted ashore on an island. There were 175 bodies picked up and buried on this shore, with military honors. Goodness knows how many more on other islands. We lost forty-six out of our company. The rocks and cliffs were the cause of the greatest loss as the wind was so violent that the soldiers could do nothing against the waves and consequently were drifted to the rocks. Four out of seventy lived to tell the fate of their It certainly is pitiful comrades. the way they tell it.

That is all I will tell of the horrible disaster, but will leave the rest till I get home.

We each got paid £2 until our service records could be sent from U. S. No one was ever more pleased and delighted to get it than I, for I have not known what money looked like since I left the states.

I can understand the English money pretty well now, but they say French money is much more difficult. When you write tell me all about the farm and how you are all feeling. Have you had any weather cold enough for ice?

The people here are putting in the crops and they say the cabbage, sprouts, turnips and the like have been growing all winter.

Gee, it has been so long since I have had a letter that I hardly know what one looks like. You see we won't get our mail until we move again and I don't know when that will be.

The people around here are all waiting for the spring drive to take place. I really think it is about ready, according to the way they are acting at the front.

Soldier's Letter.

A letter received recently by Mrs. John Smith from her brother Albert at Camp Lewis contains the following: "I received your letter a few days ago and I was certainly glad to get it, but I have been going so fast the last two weeks that I haven't had time to write at all. We have been out on the target range for two weeks and believe me it keeps us going. We get out at 6:45 a. m., stay until 11:45, then walk back 11/2 miles to dinner and out again at 1 p. m. and stay until 6 p. m. Then in the "non. com." evening we have school, so we are a pretty busy bunch. I have fired about 200 shots since we started and very few of them wasted. I had the high score of the company and next highest of the regiment. On the record score I got 28 hits out of 32 shots. We shot at ranges one, two and three hundred yards at targets eight inches square. I received a card from Lawrence Watters a few days ago, but is was written before he knew of Elmer's fate. We are in quarantine for measles again so it will be at least two weeks before I can expect to get a furlough to come home. Your brother, SERGT. ALBERT COWAN.

It | 1 will be remembered that Elmer it Cowan, Lawrence Watters and Everett Babbitt enlisted in the forest service in December, 1917, and sailed for France February 1 on the boat which was torpedoed and sunk off the coast of Scotland on the morning of February 5, 1918. the life boat in which Cowan left the ship only one man escaped alive when the boat was dashed to pieces on the rocks. His body was recovered and interred at Port Ellen, which is near where his father was born. At the request of his brothers and sisters the body was brought home through the Red Cross and the government.

Elmer Cowan was in the senior high school class and would have graduated with the class of 1918 had he remained in school. He was a star athlete of Ravalli county and won many medals and a cup during his three years of high school work. The services were conducted by Rev. F. J. Salsman of Hamilton, who was well acquainted with the deceased. Interment was in the Victor cemetery.

The dedication was combined with a meeting of district No. 1, and Gomer Lockridge, as commander of Bitter Root post, No. 1430, was in charge.

Men and women from Whitefish, Kalispell, Polson, Plains, Deer Lodge, Anaconda, Shelby, Great Falls and Missoula joined the members of the Hamilton post and auxiliary for the double district meeting of posts and auxiliaries and the dedication.

The veterans convened at the clubhouse, while the auxiliaries held their session in the Odd Fellows' hall. Mayor Joseph Iten welcomed the groups, and the response was made by Mike Mansfield of Ole Beck post, Missoula. Band selections were given by the Ravalli county school band, directed by George C. Bor-

Program numbers included the history of Bitter Root post, given by Joseph I. Mahe, Spanish-American war veteran, who related that the first V. F. Lois May Watters, 79, died of natural causes at her home in Victor Tuesday night.

Lois was born Dec. 31, 1903, at Tobias, Nebraska, to May and James Veeder. She received her education in Nebraska. She graduated from Nebraska Normal College at Lincoln and attended classes at University of Montana in Missoula.

She moved to Grantsdale, then to Vio-tor, where she taught school. She was a cor-

respondent for the Western News and Ravalli Republic newspapers for many years.

She married Lawrence Watters in Victor in April, 1925.






