He is preceded in death by his parents, brothers Bob and Bud, special friend Harold Maki, and many more friends and relatives.



It is with profound regret we are called upon to chronicle the death of Anton Weber, one of Marshfield's popular young men, which occurred at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Weber at 205 North Maple street last Friday evening. The young man whose obliging manner and jovial disposition won him many friends while employed by P. J. Kraus as clerk, left this city last winter for Milwaukee apparently enjoying the best of health and after working several months at the Boston store, returned to this city last March stricken with that dread desease, consumption. Kind ministrations of loved ones and the best of medical aid failed to bring relief and the young man gradually grew weaker until the final summons came.

The funeral was held from St. John's Catholic church at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning, Rev. Fr. Volz, officiating, a large number of sorrowing relatives and friends following the body to its last resting place.

ATTEMPTS TO KILL

"SHINE" AT BLODGETT BARBER SHOP USES REVOLVER.

Burkhart Breseman Narrowly Escapes Being Victim of James Sublett-Disappears after Shooting and while Pursued Telephones for Officer to Come and Arrest Him.

Yesterday afternoon a sensational shooting affray occurred at L. A. Wright's store on Central avenue when Jim Sublett, the colored "shine" at the Hotel Blodgett barber shop, attempted to take the life of Burkhart Breseman, assistant at Wright's bakery.

The bullet missed its mark by only a few feet and buried itself in the counter. Placing the smoking revolver in his hip pocket as he left the store Sublett ran north on Central avenue to the Hotel Blodgett barber shop, passed through the basement and disappeared. Officer Griffin and a posse of citizens started at once in pursuit and traced the culprit to the north side. Less than a half hour after the shooting Sublett telephoned from the Marshfield Brewing Co.'s office to Geo. W. Wagner, one of his employers, asking him to send an officer there as he wished to give himself up. Upon the arrival of Officer Griffin he handed over his revolver and was escorted to the lockup.

It seems there had been considerable ill feeling between Breseman and Sublett, dating from two days before when the latter is alleged to have said, "if you monkey much with me I'll cut your throat with a razor."

Three persons witnessed the shooting which occurred about 2:30 o'clock; Breseman who parrowly escaped be-

Ing which occurred about 2:30 o clock; Breseman, who narrowly escaped being the victim, Anton Weber and Miss Agnes Bloomer, the last named two being clerks in the store. Sublett had been delivering himself of a rather forceful argument on the social equality of whites and blacks addressing lty of whites and blacks, addressing himself particularly to Miss Bloomer. His talk becoming too personal and pointed to please Breseman, the latter ordered the darkey to leave the store, at the same time coming from behind ordered the darkey to leave the store, at the same time coming from behind the couter as if to enforce his demand. With a vile epithet Sublett, who was standing near the door leading to the street, drew the revolver from his pocket and fired. Breseman saw him raaching for his hip pocket and beat a hasty retreat followed by the other two occupants of the store. two occupants of the store.

two occupants of the store.

The report was heard by a number of people who happened to be in that vicinity, some of whom saw Sublett return the revolver to his pocket and run toward the Hotel Blodgett. In a few minutes a large crowd had gathered and the evidence of the same transfer. ered and the excitement was more intense than has been witnessed here for some time. It is probable that if the negro's shot had resulted fatally he would have been handled roughly by the crowd when overtaken.

At the police station Sublettassumed an air of bravado, but a deathly pallor showed through his yellow skin. As he glanced at the faces peering through the several grated windows he remarked to Officer Griffin "This is no safe place to put a man. I could be shot through one of those windows," The officer assured him he was in no danger from that source. danger from that source.

In answer to a News reporter's queries Sublett said that he was ninteen years of age and that his parents live at Murfreesboro, Tenn., from which city he has been absent for the last nine years. He came to Marshfield from Minneapolis two months ago and shortly after his arrival purchased the revolver at one of the local hardware stores. He said it was his intention to send it to a friend in Chicago. He kept the gun in his trunk until yesterday morning when he transferred it to his pocket, with no intention of shooting anyone. "I'm a fool to ever carry a repocket, with no intention of shooting anyone. "I'm a fool to ever carry a revolver," he said "for I am quick tempered and easily lose my head when anyone hurts my feelings. I am sorry I used the revolver but glad that no one was hit. It was done more in self defense than anything else for Breseman maked at me with a candy pail in his rushed at me with a candy pall in his hand." This last statement is denied by the employes of the store.

Sublett will have his hearing today before Municipal Judge Andrews, and Dist. Alty. Brazeau will be on hand to prosecute the case.

FOUND GUILTY.

JAMES SUBLETT MUST SERVE TERM IN STATE'S PRISON.

Colored "Shine" Who Attempted to Shoot Barkhart Breseman in Wright's Bakery on March 11th hast—Entered a Plea of Self Defense—Sentence will be not Less than One Year nor More than Five.

James Sublett, the former colored bootblack at the Hotel Blodgett barber shop, was found guilty on Tuesday of assault with intent to kill Burkhart Breseman and will be sentenced by Judge Webb at the expiration of this term of court. The law specifies that the term in state's prison for such an offense shall be not less than one year nor more than five. Sublett, through his attorney, J. W. Cochran of Grand Rapids, entered a plea of self defense. The jury was out but a short time when a verdict against the defendant was brought in.

Sublett went on the stand in his own defense and testified that Breseman struck at him with a candy pail after hot words had been exchanged and to protect himself pulled out the revolver and shot on the spur of the moment. He denied having purchased a ring for Miss Agnes Bloomer, the young lady over whom the quarrel started, but had intended to mail it to his sister and simply called at Wright's store to

ask Miss Bloomer's opinion of it. Breseman, Anton Weber and Miss Bloomer, the three witnesses of the shooting, testified that Breseman did not strike at Sublett with a candy pail. That he ordered the negro to leave the store on account of his persistent and unwelcome attentions to Miss Bloomer and immediately thereafter Sublett shot at Breseman and ran from the store.

LARGE STORE BURNED.

Connor Lumber Company Sustains Heavy Loss at Laona.

(Special to The Northwestern.) Marshfield, Wis., March 14.-The Connor Lumber & Land company's big store building and contents at Laona. was totally destroyed by fire Friday. Their warehouse No. 4, containing surplus stock, and the hotel Gordon also caught fire and suffered heavily. loss is estimated at \$45,000, partially covered by insurance. Ebbe, son of Mrs. Della Ebbe, will leave Sunday for Honolulu and further foreign service, according to word just received by his mother, who was preparing to spend the month of September with her son at Coronado, Calif. For the past two months Lieutenant Ebbe has been in Norfolk, Va., as an instructor, and previous to that was test pilot and instructor at San Diego since April 1942 when he returned to the United States after three years of foreign service. Ebbe ferried a B-24 bomber from his San Diego base to Norfolk in just 12 hours.

Before coming to the United States a year ago, Lieutenant Ebbe was shot down in the Dutch East Indies and lost for two days. Before going to Java, Gordon was in the Philippines at the Cavite air base.
