Former Resident Of Melba Dies

NAMPA (Special)—Granville J. Wade, 50 of Kelso, Wash., formerly of Melba community, died Sept. 26 in the Veterans' hospital in Portland, according to word received here Monday. He had been under treatment in the hospital for about two weeks. *

Mr. Wade was born in Elwood, Neb., and came to Idaho in 1914, locating on a homestead at Melba.

He left Melba several years ago to make his home in Washington.

Surviving are his wife, Susie Wade; two sons, Billy and Donald, and a daughter, Priscilla Wade, all of Kelso; a sister, Mrs. Vernice Lydiatt of Melba; a brother, Capt. Victor Wade of the United States Army and stationed in Des Moines, Ia. Capt. Wade arrived in Nampa Monday night to attend the services which will be Wednesday at 2:30 p. m. at the Peckham chapel in Caldwell. The Rev. W. W. Deal will officiate, and burial will be in Canyon Hill, Caldwell.

Mr. Wade was a World War veteran.

Death Granville Wade at Portland

Relatives have received word of the death of Granville Wade, 51, Portland, Oregon, Friday, following an illness caused by a malignant tumor of the brain. Born and raised on the farm of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Wade, three miles northwest of Elwood, he left here and went to Idaho when a young man.

He was a world war veteran, his transport having been hit by an enemy torpedo and sunk in the Atlantic ocean. His parents, who lived here at that time were notified of his death but later he was accounted for among the survivors. He was a graduate of the Elwood High school.

Funeral services were held at Caldwell, Idaho, Tuesday and burial was at Greenleaf, Idaho.

Surviving are his wife and two children of Portland, Oregon, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Wade, of Melba, Idaho, a sister, Mrs. D. L. Lydiatt also of Melba, and a brother, Victor of Washington, D. C.

FORTY-TWO ENLIST WEDNESDAY IN U. S. FIGHTING MACHINE

Army Enlists 27, Navy 14 and Marines One—Many Too Late and Must Accept Draft Call.

Forty-two men joined Uncle Sam's fighting force through the three recruiting offices Wednesday. The army enlistments numbered 27, navy 14 and marines one.

Yesterday was the last day for men of draft age to enlist in the army and there was a waiting line all day at the army recruiting office. Seventeen men were turned down because of their physical condition and five failed to have the proper papers from their draft board to permit their acceptance. Since Dec. 1, Sergeant Stumpf has sent 109 men to Salt Lake for final examination at that point.

Men having the proper credentials from their draft board are still being enlisted in the navy and marine service, while at army headquarters colored recruits are wanted and men of 18 to 40 for various branches of army work.

**FORMER HOLDREGE BOY
IN THE LIST OF MISSING**

Late reports of the missing men who were on the ill-fated transport Tuscania contains the name of Granville J. Wade, Elwood, Nebr.

Mr. Wade was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Wade of Elwood and enlisted in Co. E. Sixth Batt. Twentieth Eng. Forestry Division of the National Army.

Granville J. Wade was a graduate of the Holdrege High school class of 1909, and is well remembered by many Holdrege people. His parents moved here from Elwood to give their children the advantages offered by the schools of Holdrege. After school hours he put in his time in the newspaper shops here, working for a short time for The Progress. After his graduation he took up a homestead in Idaho, but at the time of his enlistment was residing with his parents at Elwood, to which place they returned after the education of their children.

So far as heard from three soldiers from Nebraska are missing and appear to be victims of the torpedoing of the U. S. ship Tuscania off the Irish coast recently. Of those reported two are from this part of the state—Granville J. Wade, of Elwood, and Erven Miller, of Anselmo. It may be, however, that these men were not lost, but are now in Ireland and their names have not yet been reported as among those rescued from the vessel.

NEBRASKA MAN AMONG SAVED

Granville J. Wade of Elwood in
New List of Tuscania
Survivors.

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—The war department tonight announces the names of forty-four additional soldiers who were rescued from the torpedoed liner Tuscania, and that of one other man listed as missing, but who, it develops, was not on the ship. Eight of the survivors previously had been reported in press dispatches as saved.

The war department also received by cable tonight the names of five soldier victims of the Tuscania previously reported in press dispatches, and the name of one survivor which had been announced by the department some days ago.

Besides the thirty-seven names of survivors contained in dispatches to the department tonight, thirty-seven other men previously listed as missing were found to be survivors today when the press list of Tuscania missing was checked against all available official records, leaving a total of only seventy-four American soldiers unaccounted for. Included in that number are the thirty-three unidentified dead buried on the Scottish coast.

GRANVILLE WADE WRITES OF TUSCANIA EXPERIENCES

Interesting Letter From Former Hol-
drege Boy Telling of Some of the
Conditions of Sinking.

Following is a letter recently re-
ceived by Mr. and Mrs. John Wade,
from their son, Granville, who is in
England, and is very interesting in-
asmuch as it tells of some of his ex-
periences regarding the sinking of the
Tusciana.

"Winchester, England.

February 15, 1918.

"I suppose you know all about the
Tusciana by this time and it will be
safe to write about it. I'm in the hos-
pital with the mumps and have nothing
to do but write so will tell you a lit-
tle about it.

"We had just finished supper, and
I was out on deck, when we were
struck. It was almost dark, just 5:50.
We were surrounded by about 20
ships, counting destroyers and all, so
they must have considered us the most
valuable ship in the bunch. I was
about twenty feet from my lifeboat at
the time, and went to my place and

waited for the rest of my company and put on my life belt which we were required to carry with us all the time. A few men lost their heads and went over the rail, but not many.

As usual about half the boats could not be gotten away. Several of the boats, on the starboard side, where we were struck, were smashed by the explosion. Our company got away two boats out of the six we were supposed to have. I was supposed to go on the first boat on the port side, but the tackle broke and we lost it and no way of getting the other two off. They only weigh three or four tons and are nice little things to handle.

"When we were out of luck for boats we just stood at attention, and waited for something to turn up. This shows what a month's discipline will do for a bunch of men. Some of the companies lost their heads and lost a big bunch of men but we stuck it out in good order and lost very few. A few of us got a rope out and picked up several men from the water, one with both legs broken. The sea was pretty rough and a man didn't last long in the water.

In about an hour and a half a de

In about an hour and a half a destroyer pulled up along the bow and took off a bunch of men, about half hour later another came up and took the rest of us. The ship had tilted over till the deck stood about 30 degrees by this time. We marched to the destroyer in good order and went down the life lines onto the deck. It was just two hours from the the time we were struck until we got aboard the destroyer. The ship sank an hour later.

Those destroyers are the classiest little boats on the sea, we made 28 knots an hour for quite a while after we started, and were away overloaded at that. The life boats were picked up by fishing boats and other destroyers. We landed at ———, Ireland, in five hours' run. We went from there to ———.

Last Sunday morning we left there and crossed the channel from ——— in ——— and came down here. We got in Monday morning and have been in the hospital ever since. I am feeling fine but they won't let me out for at least ten days yet. I am not worrying much. I am getting a little to eat now and then and am sleeping in a real bed.

"The people of Ireland sure treated us fine. We didn't have a chance to spend any money there, everything was ours that they had.

"Winchester is one of the oldest towns in England. The road that leads to our camp was built by Ceaser in the old Romn days.

"We expect to go over to France in about three weeks.

"We lost all our equipment and shaving outfits and are a hard bunch right now.

Elizabeth Tucker Wade, daughter of Jacob and Marthyann Tucker, was born in Laura, Ohio, on March 25, 1864, and died at the home of her daughter in Melba, Idaho, April 12, 1944, at the age of 80 years and 17 days.

Her family moved to Iowa in the fall of 1865 where they resided until 1880. In February of that year they returned to Ohio, where they lived for three years. They moved to Elwood in a covered wagon in 1883.

She was united in marriage to John William Wade on December 15, 1888 and they enjoyed 55 years of married life together. He preceded her in death, passing away December 11, 1943.

To their union were born three children, two sons and one daughter. The oldest son, Granvil Jacob, passed away in November 1941.
