Wm. White of Waterloo Is Dead

WATERLOO, Wis.—William White, 69, president of the village of Waterloo, died suddenly at his home here Wednesday night. Death was reported due to a heart attack.

Mr. White, who had been village president for the past two years, had been downtown until shortly before his death.

His wife, who was asleep when he returned home, awakened when she heard him fall after he entered the house.

Mr. White, a retired druggist, was scheduled to attend a meeting in behalf of the village at Jefferson today. He had not been ill previously.

Mr. White was born in the town of York and had resided in this vicinity most of his life. Mr. and Mrs. White came here in 1924. He was a member of the Masonic order here.

Surviving are his wife; a daughter, Mrs. J. O. Johnson, Madison; three brothers, Lewis, Waterloo; Fred, Chicago; Earl, Olympia, Wash.; four sisters, Mrs. Albert Krause and Mrs. Clarence Cole, Waterloo; Mrs. Leona Meyers and Mrs. Cora Hart, Hillsboro; a granddaughter, Miss Marion Whitcomb, Madison.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 2 at the Schwandt funeral home here under the auspices of the Masonic order. The Rev. Martin Thomas, pastor of the Methodist church here, will officiate. Burial will be in the village cemetery.

Waterloo's Mayor White Dies at 69

WATERLOO — William N. White, 69, Waterloo mayor, died suddenly at his home Wednesday night after suffering a cerebral hemorrhage.

He had been in good health and active lately. He came home from downtown Waterloo shortly before 11 p. m., suddenly was stricken with the hemorrhage, and died shortly before midnight.

During his life, Mayor White held numerous city and county offices. At the time of his death he was a member of the Jefferson county pension board and the Waterloo library board.

In years past, he had held posts on the village board, the electric light commission, and the school board. He also was Waterloo postmaster for eight years.

He served abroad during the first World war with the 32nd division and won the rank of major during his service. He belonged to the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Waterloo Masonic lodge, and Zor Shrine, Madison.

Mayor White was a native and lifelong resident of the Waterloo area.

Survivors are the widow, Myrtle; a daughter, Mrs. J. O. Johnson, Madison; a granddaughter, Marian Whitecomb, Madison; four sisters, Mrs. Cora Harte and Mrs. Leone Meyer, both of Hillsboro; Mrs. Albert Krause and Mrs. Clarence Cole, both of Waterloo, and three sons, Fred, Chicago; Earl, Olympia, Wash., and Louis, Waterloo.

Masonic funeral services will be held at 2 p. m. Saturday in the Schwandt funeral home here. The Rev. Martin Thomas, Methodist church pastor, will officiate. The American Legion will have charge of rites at the grave in Waterloo cemetery.

Capt. W. N. White of Waterloo, Ia., arrived in the city yesterday morning from Camp Grant to visit his daughter Mrs. E. H. Whitman in the St. Clair Shea apartments. Capt. White landed from overseas May 5th on the Quarter Master of the 32nd Division and was with Major Firth and Capt. Wiley in France. He was on the ill-fated Tuscania when it went to the bottom in the North Channel. Capt. White states that on their way back they had as their guests Secretary Newton Baker and other prominent men. A dinner was given on the boat in their honor which was an elaborate affair.

Capt. White has spent 15 months overseas and is to report back to Camp Grant, May 29th, for discharge.

WATERLOO, Wis.—This thriving Wisconsin town is anxiously awaiting the arrival of July 4, not particularly because the day marks the birth of the nation, but chiefly because it will be the culmination of a four-day homecoming celebration. The celebration will last from July 1 to 4 inclusive.

It was on the evening of July 4, just 30 years ago that the Waterloo homecoming idea was conceived. A number of "old-timers" were sitting in the office of the Waterloo Democrat watching the fireworks when one of them remarked that it would be a wonderful thing to invite all of the former residents back for a reunion.

The idea was received with favor and invitations were sent out, and that first homecoming, although not as large as those of today, was so successful that every 10 years former residents make a pilgrimage to Waterloo to revive old friendships.

The executive committee of this year's affair includes: Z. O. Fallinger, M. W. Locke, W. N. White, L. E. Perry, E. H. Hagel, Dr. F. L. Joyce, L. C. Fallinger, Emmet McCracken, A. R. Setz, and O. M. Boock.

This year, Portland, York and Medina will join Waterloo in the big celebration.

Waterloo Pre-fabrication Work Attracts Attention

WATERLOO, Wis.—State officials and construction engineers gathered here yesterday to witness assembling of the pre-fabricated overpass connecting the Waterloo high school and grade school buildings.

It was reported that erection of the overpass marks the first time in Wisconsin building history that pre-fabricated paneling has been used for any structure other than a private dwelling.

The overpass corridor, which is 35 feet long, 11 feet wide, 12 feet high, and 18 feet above the ground, must be approved by the state industrial commission. Ibell Bros., Waterloo contractors, assembled the corridor.

Those attending the assembling were Albert E. Buechner, Madison, of the state department of public instruction; O. F. Nelson and Frank A. Fredrickson, both of Madison and both of the state industrial commission; O. W. Remmel, Milwaukee, of the Harnischfeger Corp.; A. R. Clem, Milwaukee, of the Wilbur Lumber Co.; Martin F. White, Milwaukee, architect of the project; J. D. Hyer and Henry Kunz, of the Waterloo school board; L. E. Houle, Waterloo school principal; and W. N. White, Waterloo mayor.

Historical Museum Holds Banners of Many Campaigns

World War I flags and flags of other historic American battles are to be found in the Wisconsin State Historical museum.

The latest addition to the battle flag collection is a parade flag of the 32nd Division (Red Arrow Division) which was brought back from France in 1919 by Capt. William N. White, Waterloo.

It is a red silk flag, 36 by 50 inches in size, with broad gold fringe. In its center the national coat of arms is sewed in silk. Heavy red, white, and blue silk cords and tassels were attached to its staff. Mrs. J. O. Johnson, Madison, Capt. Williams' daughter, gave the

flag to the Wisconsin Historical museum.

Other flags of the fighting regiments and batteries of the famous 32nd Division which are in a place of honor in a large case in a museum corridor on the fourth floor of the State Historical Library bldg. are decorated with Croix de Guerre and with broad white ribbons bearing the names of the offensives in which these regiments fought in France.

Standing near them are the framed citations received by them for distinguished service to France.

In another case, in another corridor, are preserved other flags belonging to other fighting Wisconsin World war com-

mands.

The stand of colors of the famous pre-Civil war Milwaukee Light Guard is among the highly prized trophies also. This well-drilled organization furnished many efficient officers to the Union army during the rebellion.

One of the Civil war flags has painted on its stripes the names of the battles in which the Mineral Point guard took part.

There are a number of Confederate banners captured by Wisconsin heroes in bloody engagements.

Among the Spanish American war flags are several large Spanish flags obtained at the destruction of Admiral

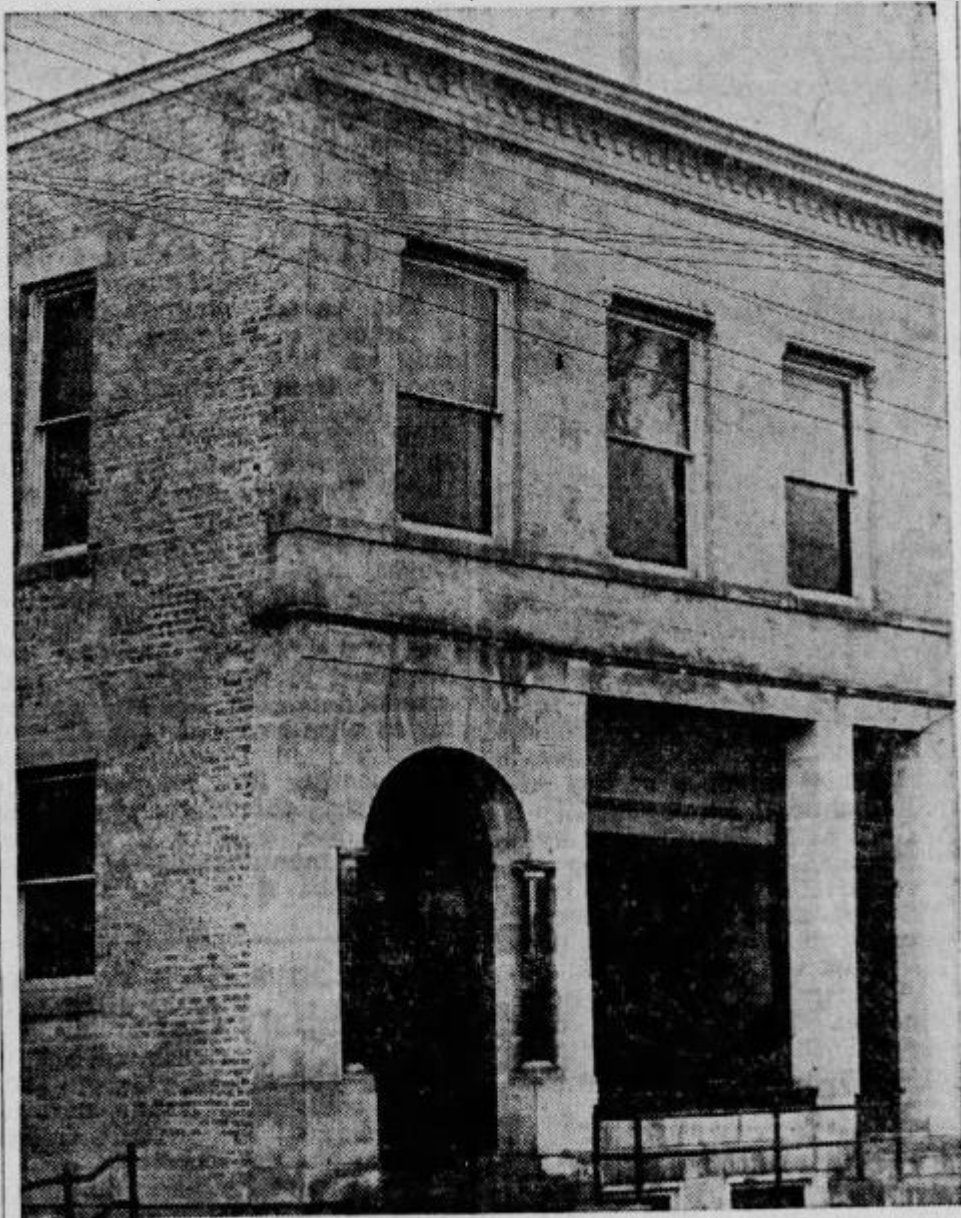
Cervera's fleet.

There is a Philippine flag, captured at Manila during the insurrection.

The oldest flag in the state collection is a large part of a flag carried in the Scottish Rebellion of 1719. A War of 1812 painted flag, carried by the Washington Phalanx of Boston, also is in the collection.

Flags from the war of the Mexican border, cavalry and artillery guidons, chaplain's and Red Cross flags also are contained in the collection. Nearly all the banners are in good condition despite their long exposure in battle conditions, wind, and rain. Some are torn by musket balls and other projectiles.

First Business Was Conducted from Cigar Box

WATERLOO — On Jan. 12, 1847, 100 years ago the Waterloo postoffice was established. At that time the postmaster, Charles D. Toppings, conducted all of the business from a cigar box, but today Postmaster E. A. Peters has a staff of six to dispatch the mail and serve the 3,590 patrons of the office.

When Postmaster Toppings was first in charge he busied himself once a week with "making up the mail." Then it was dispatched, by team, to Aztalan and the incoming Waterloo mail was picked up and brought back for delivery. At that time postage on a letter was two shillings or about 50 cents, and a copy of a newspaper became community property and was circulated from family to family.

Money Orders in 1868

Local histories and records are vague on the development of the Waterloo postal system from the time of its inception until 1863 when R. J. Reimer was recorded as postmaster. The office became a money order office on Oct. 12, 1868, when James Cushing bought the first money order for \$50.

Upon the change of political power in 1884 Mr. Reimer was relieved of his postmastership and it was given to Peter Janisch. After his death, his widow was granted the appointment and she in turn named Tim A. Williams as acting postmaster, an arrangement that prevailed until 1888.

H. M. Knowlton, Republican, served from then until 1894 when the political trend called for a change to a Democrat and P. H. Bolger was appointed. In 1903 he was succeeded by Cornelius Donovan, who held the position until 1911. The following year, early in Alex Archie's term of office, a postal savings bank was added to service of the office.

Relieved in 1915

Archie was relieved by Charles Janisch, Democrat, in 1915. Ten years later William N. White was appointed and held the office until Peters took over in June, 1933. Peter's past 13 years of service brings the count to 36 years of Democratic reign with 34 years credited to the Republicans during the past 70 years.

Waterloo has been named as a prospective site for a new post-office building. Citizens feel that it would be fitting to mark the 100th anniversary of postal service in Waterloo with an announcement that such a building was to be erected.

About 35 years ago the office was moved to its present location, known as the Archie bldg. Prior to that time the services were carried on from six more temporary locations.

End Record Year

As far as Postmaster Peters and his staff Winifred Draeger Baker, William J. Hignins and Charles Michel, clerks and Charles Rood, city carrier — are concerned the 100th anniversary is marked by closing a year of record business.

During the past month 35,000 1½ cent stamps were sold. That was 10,000 more than what were sold a year ago. Twenty-one thousand pounds of second class mail were handled the same

month. Though it was impossible to give an accurate account of the first class postage or parcel post records for that period it was agreed that the 1946 Christmas season was definitely a record year. Since 1920, when the office became a second class office, there has been a steady increase in receipts.

Sub-Stations Set Up

Twenty-four years ago the practice of setting up a sub-station at the McKay Nursery plant for the purpose of handling regular and COD parcel post mailing, was instigated. Such a station is maintained there each year for a period of eight weeks, during the rush season. The Courier Printing Co. is another area plant that has helped swell the receipts. Their publications are mailed to all parts of the world.

Rural mail delivery was added to the service of the Waterloo postoffice in 1904. Today two carriers R. A. Woerpel and Henry Raminger, with Adolph Veith as substitute carrier, serve more than 2,000 persons on two routes.
