Elmer W. Williams, 62, Winthrop Harbor, Dies

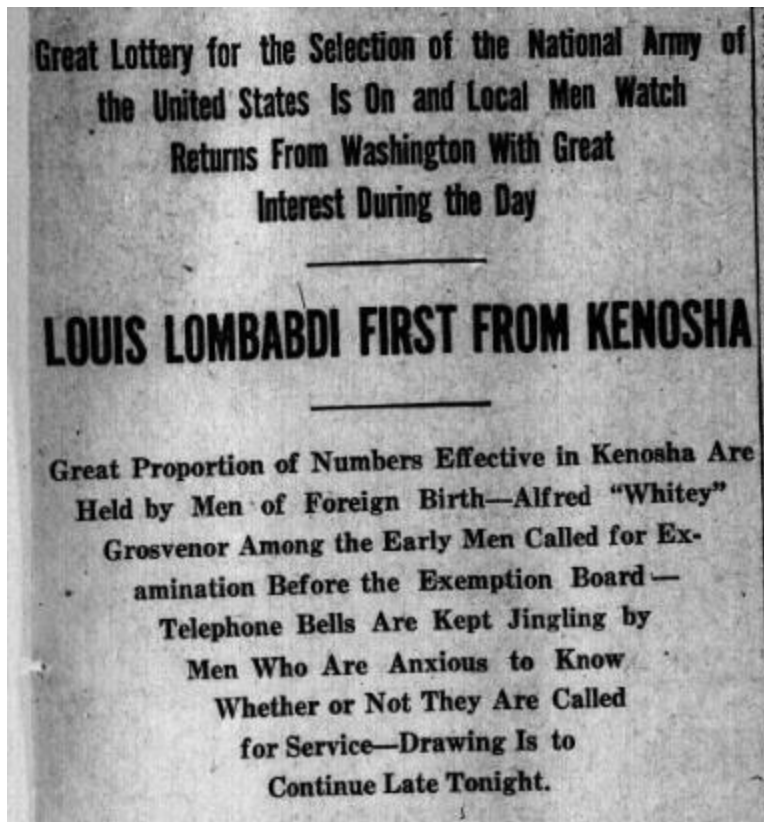

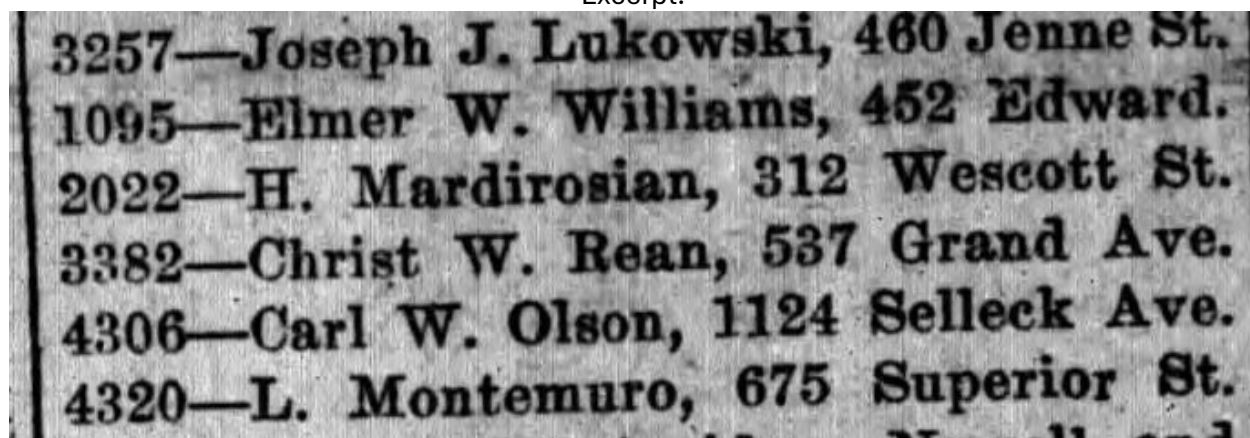

ALL SOLDIERS GONE

**Co K Departed for Camp Saturday
—Joined Here by Phillips and
Mellen Units.**

The military spirit that has been prominent in the city the past few months is gone. It vanished Thursday with the departure of the last of Marshfield's militia units for the statemobilization center, Camp Douglas, leaving at 11:15 a. m. This unit was Company K. On the same train, composed of ten coaches, two baggage cars and one caboose, were the Phillips and Mellen companies, whose cars were transferred here from the Soo to the Omaha line.

The visiting soldiers arrived about a half an hour ahead of the scheduled time, 10:30 a. m. The Phillips company, of which Ed. Witt of this city is the commander, detrained here and marched to the Omaha depot with the local company, while the Mellen company remained on board the train during its transfer to the other line, after which they were allowed to go as they pleased until train time. Practically all of the Mellen and Phillips boys were unquipped.

A large crowd of people was at the depot to bid the soldiers farewell. It was tearful parting for many.

Kenoshans Attend a Tuscania Dinner

**Thirty Wisconsin Survivors Meet at
Milwaukee and Recount An-
niversary**

Milwaukee—(AP)—A night of terror aboard the Tuscania when the ship was struck by a German torpedo near the coast of Ireland were revived Sunday by 30 Wisconsin boys who were part of the contingent of Wisconsin and Michigan national guardsmen aboard the vessel.

They attended the anniversary dinner of the Tuscania Survivors association and indulged in reminiscences of the sinking of the troopship ten years ago Sunday, and expressed disgust with stories of the catastrophe.

Capt. H. J. Pettigrew, of Milwaukee, formerly of Oconto, who commanded Company D, 107th Supply, took Irvin S. Cobb and other writers to task. The survivors claim that only three torpedos were fired, the first probably taking effect.

Tuscania Torpedoed 11 Years Ago Today; One Kenoshan Lost

Eleven years ago today just after dark the army transport Tuscania was torpedoed off the coast of Ireland. About 35 Kenosha men were aboard. All were saved except Corporal Arthur C. Junker.

Today most of the survivors are back in Kenosha. Corporal Junker is asleep in his last rest on the coast of Ireland.

Commemorating this event, a banquet will be held at the Republican hotel, Milwaukee, tonight. Several Kenoshans will attend. Among them are Elmer Williams, 6929 38th avenue; Fred A. Scholey, Paramount Fuel company, and Frank Tanking, 7238 31st avenue.

It was on the night of February 5, 1918, that the Tuscania was struck. It was proceeding along the north channel, between Ireland and Scot-

land. Suddenly there was a shock and a blast. The ship was torn open amidship, where the torpedo had found its mark. The submarine escaped.

Although only a little more than ten miles off shore, land was hardly discernible. It was just after 6:30 o'clock.

Sirens shrieked. Confusion was straightened into order. Boats were lowered, and distress signals were sent out. Elmer Williams was taken off the sinking ship by a destroyer.

Days passed before any accounting was taken. The roll of the 107th Supply Train, of which the Kenoshans were members, was called. There were feeble answers and for some there were no answers at all. About 210 never answered. One of them was a Kenoshan, Corporal Junker.

Report Legion Drive for Jobs

Committee Sessions Hear Employment Report, Plan Tuscania Session Meet

Two committee meetings at the American Legion memorial building Thursday night brought forth reports on the comparative success of the current campaign of the Kenosha post to seek employment for all ex-servicemen in private industry and on plans for attendance by Kenoshans of the coming nation convention of the Tuscania Survivors Association.

At the committee meetings, Post Commander Charles T. Werner announced that members of the local Legion post have been invited to attend and participate in open house festivities which Saturday, February 1, will signal the opening of the new club house of the Charvin Post of the American Legion in North Chicago. Commander Werner urged all Kenosha legionnaires to visit the new headquarters of the North Chicago post at 616 Foss Park avenue.

Reports on Job Drive

As chairman of the Kenosha post committee on unemployment, Paul Sattig Thursday evening reported that the recent and current campaign to secure employment for ex-servicemen has produced possible permanent placement for 22 veterans. Sattig also reported that

numerous others have secured employment through the campaign but that complete reports from local industries are still unavailable.

In a statement to the committee which includes Commander Charles T. Werner, Fabian Monfils, John Milkent and Frank Harvell, Sattig revealed that much of the success of the unemployment campaign is attributed to the cooperation of Kenosha industrialists and to the aid given the committee by the Kenosha offices of the state employment service.

Plan Tuscania Events

In another committee session at the memorial building Thursday evening an unofficial committee, including Frank Tanking, Fred Scholey, George Stephensen, Hans Anderson, Charles Knaup, and Elmer Williams, discussed local plans for representation at the annual national convention of Tuscania disaster survivors. The convention will be held in Detroit, Mich., February 7, 8 and 9.

Several of Kenosha's 26 survivors of the Tuscania disaster will attend the national convention. For those Kenoshans who are unable to attend the national event in Detroit, a similar program will be conducted at the clubrooms of the Cudworth post of the American Legion in Milwaukee on the same dates as the national session. The event in Milwaukee will be a state gathering of Tuscania survivors.

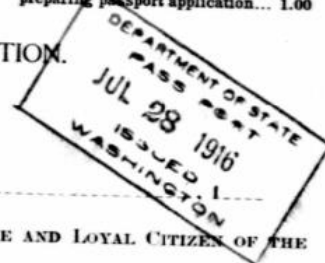
