STILL SILENCE FROM SOLDIER

Parents of David Young Ex-
pecting Word from Him
Very Soon

No word has been received from David Young, the only New Castle boy aboard the Tuscania, except the telegram from government officials announcing that he was among the survivors. His parents are expecting a letter from him any time this week, but it is not known where he is located.

Mr. Young enlisted in November and after a few days at Columbus was sent direct to Kelley Field at

San Antonio, Texas. He was in training at Texas until he was sent to Garden City. At this place he received a short furlough, but although he was a sergeant when he left camp, he was a sergeant when he left camp, owing to a late snooze on one of the trains, and getting into camp a few hours late.

He took the matter cheerfully and expected to be promoted to his former rank within a few months.

A letter and two post cards have been received from him, all written before the Tuscania was torpedoed. In the letter he says that he had been out from New York about two days, and was in a very seasick state of mind. Aside from that he thought everything was "just fine." These letters have just reached his parents here.

The young soldier is well known and has many friends who will be interested in hearing from him.

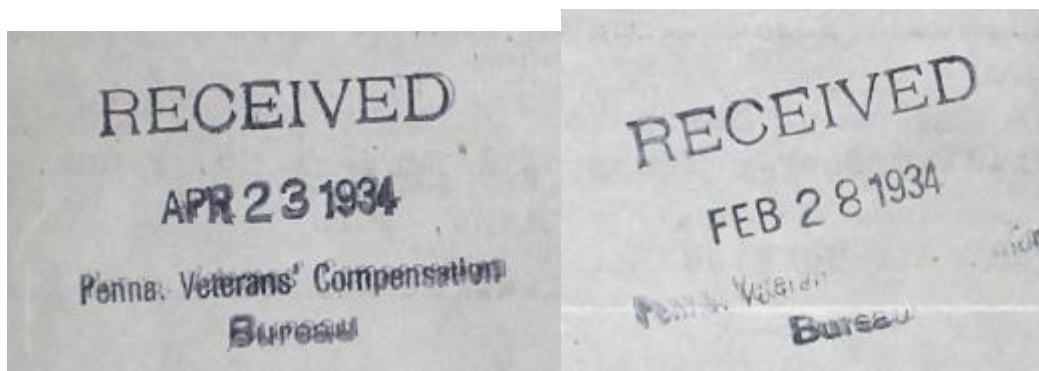

LIEUT. EDWARD KIRBY

Differs With Meyer Version of U-Boat Attack

Capt. Wilhelm Meyer, retired commander of the German U-77 which sank the British transport *Tuscania* with the loss of 204 American troops, might have his log but Police Lieut. Edward Kirby today has his memory of the disaster.

Lieut. Kirby was aboard the *Tuscania*, the sinking of which, in February, 1918, was described in two installments by Capt. Meyer and which was concluded yesterday in the Sun-Telegraph. Kirby was a member of the 155th Aerial pursuit squadron, which lost 24 members in the disaster.

Capt. Meyer's description of fearful detection by destroyers with the convoy of 13 ships amused Kirby. There were no destroyers with the convoy for about 18 hours preceding the torpedoing, Kirby said. His version of the sinking follows:

"Capt. Meyer said in his article that it was dark and he fired two torpedoes at 7:40 p. m. It was 5:45 p. m. when we were hit. The boxing show had just concluded and we were filling in for mess. Dick Given, a well-known local welterweight, had appeared in the last bout.

"It was still daylight. The Irish shore could be seen. There were no destroyers to give chase. They had gone to their base about 10 hours before the attack. The *Tuscania* was the twelfth boat in the long line of the convoy, each ship being about 1,000 feet apart.

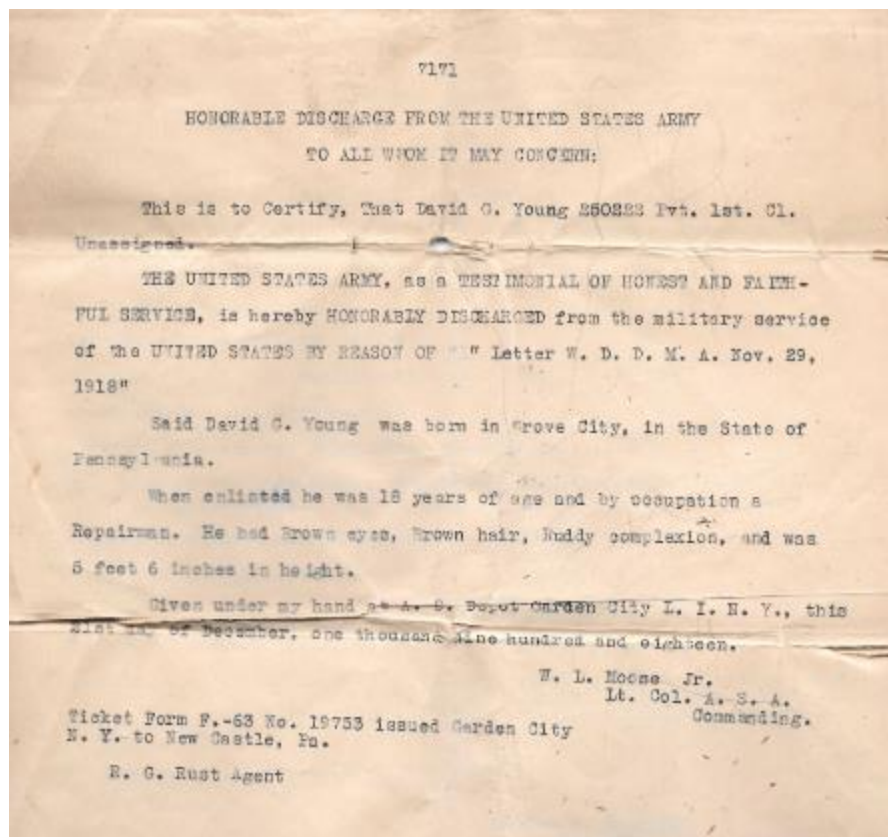
"That sure made it easy for the sub to hit something. The boat took three hours to sink. Our outfit was one of the last to leave. We were able to step off the boat onto the British destroyer *Pidgeon*. Do you know, the *Tuscania* was the only camouflaged boat in the convoy."

New Castle.—At least one New Castle boy was on the ill-fated Tuscania, when it was sunk off the coast of Ireland by a German submarine. He is D. G. Young, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Young of 101 1-2 North Liberty street. His name is in the list of Western Pennsylvania boys on the boat, and he is among the survivors. Young enlisted in this city on November 5, 1917. He entered the aviation branch of the army and went from this city to Columbus, Ohio. He was born in Grove City and was 18 years old when he enlisted.

For a number of years the Young's were residents of Greenville residing first on Main street and later in the Laird-Camp addition. David Young was well known here and it was within the past few months that the family moved to New Castle.

David Young, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Young, who was on board the Tuscania when it was torpedoed off the coast of Ireland four weeks ago, have received a letter from him for which they are more than thankful. He was among the first to enlist and is stationed in the Aerial squadron "Somewhere in England." He is enjoying fair health and free from all harm at the present time. The letter follows:

Dear All:

I am sorry to tell you the news of the Tuscania being torpedoed, off the coast of Ireland. I was not afraid, because we all held our nerve and were finally picked up by a patrol vessel, after we had been in a life boat for three hours. I suppose you read a detailed account of it in the papers. I worried a great deal thinking that you would think I was one of the unlucky ones, but I am glad to say now that I am not.

"I am well as can be expected, after having been through such a dreadful experience. The voyage over was fine until the submarine camp upon us about 40 miles off the Irish coast. I will tell you all about it when I get home.

The people here are very kind to us and give us tobacco and other things. But everything is so different from the U. S. A. There are some fine girls over here, but none of them for me. Write soon and tell me all the news and tell the fellows to write as I'd be glad to hear from them.

Mr. and Mrs. W. G. Young of North Liberty street, have received a letter from their son, David, who is with the U. S. aviation corps in England, stating that he had been in the hospital at Winchester, Eng., for a month, owing to an accident. Young was in the act of starting a plane, when the propeller on the machine, which was tied, broke loose and swinging around, struck him in the right side, crushing two ribs. He is doing very nicely at the hospital and will be able to be out in a short time. Mr. Young is well known here and has many friends. Last September he enlisted in the aviation corps and sailed to England on the ill fated transport Tuscania, that was sunk by a sub off the coast of Ireland about four months ago. He was the only New Castle boy on board and with some companions was fortunate enough to get to shore in a life boat.

**SOLDIER SERVICE FLAGS
IN TWO LOCAL CHURCHES
LOWERED YESTERDAY**

In two of the local churches, The United Presbyterian and the Presbyterian church, on Sunday, special services were held in conjunction with the lowering of the soldier's service flags and the raising of the church service flags.

There were seventy one service stars on the two flags, twenty three on that of the United Presbyterian and forty eight on the Presbyterian banner. On the church service flags raised there were four stars on that of the U. P. to represent members engaged in missionary work while there forty eight on the Presbyterian flag, representing the number of persons admitted to the church since April 1919.

With impressive exercises and before an audience that freely gave vent to its emotion, the service flag in the United Presbyterian church bearing twenty-three stars, one of them a gold one, was lowered Sunday morning and a church service flag with four stars was raised in its place.

Following the opening of the morning service, the program was practically turned over to the return-

ed soldiers. George M. Kamere spoke briefly on the "Spirit of the Soldiers in Service," B. G. Baird spoke on the "Value of High Ideals in Service" and Mark Mabon spoke on "Loyalty to the Church."

The Rev. John D. Gibson, pastor of the church, then took charge and called the roll of the soldiers. As each man's name was called, he rose and took a place in front of the pulpit until twenty-two had answered. The last name on the roll was that of Raymond Hamlin, who fell while fighting and who was represented by the gold star. As the men assembled "Onward Christian Soldiers" was softly played on the organ by Miss Vesta Leet.

Slowly the service flag was then lowered and delivered to two Boy Scouts who attached the church service flag with four stars and raised it to position. The stars are for Geo. A. Brown, in missionary service in East Liverpool, O., Miss Lois Downs, in service in Poland and Mr. and Mrs. Wallace Downs, who will leave short-

ly for India to take up missionary work. Mr. and Mrs. Downs were present at the service and were introduced to the congregation.

On Saturday evening the former service men were entertained at a banquet and reception in the church. The banquet was presided over by Rev. Gibson and during the course of the evening each soldier present gave an account of the service that he saw. Especially interesting was the account of the sinking of the Tuscania by David G. Young who was on the boat at the time it was torpedoed. The supper was in charge of a committee composed of Fred Reed, A. R. Read, T. T. McGeary, Mrs. W. B. Armstrong and Mrs. Robert Laird.

Following the banquet a congregational social was held at which more than 25 of the members were present. A musical program was held under the direction of Miss Vesta Leet, Miss Ethel Mahan and Miss Julia Stamm. Duets were sung by Miss Mahan and Mrs. Thos. R. Dickinson and violin solos were given by Miss Stamm.

At the Sunday morning services in the First Presbyterian church a ceremony was held in keeping with the lowering of the national service flag and the raising of the christian service flag.

There were 48 stars in the national service flag and it is the aim of the church to have by April, 1920 forty eight stars in the christian service flag representing so many persons having joined with the church on confession of faith since April 1913.

Special music was arranged for the occasion and there was appropriate reading by the congregation.

20 Years Ago

David G. Young, West Main Street, was preparing to attend the 15th annual reunion in Chicago of the survivors of the ill-fated Tuscania, the only troop transport among the many that carried the two million Americans to war that was actually torpedoed and sunk. Mr. Young was the only one in this district among the 2200 men on board when the

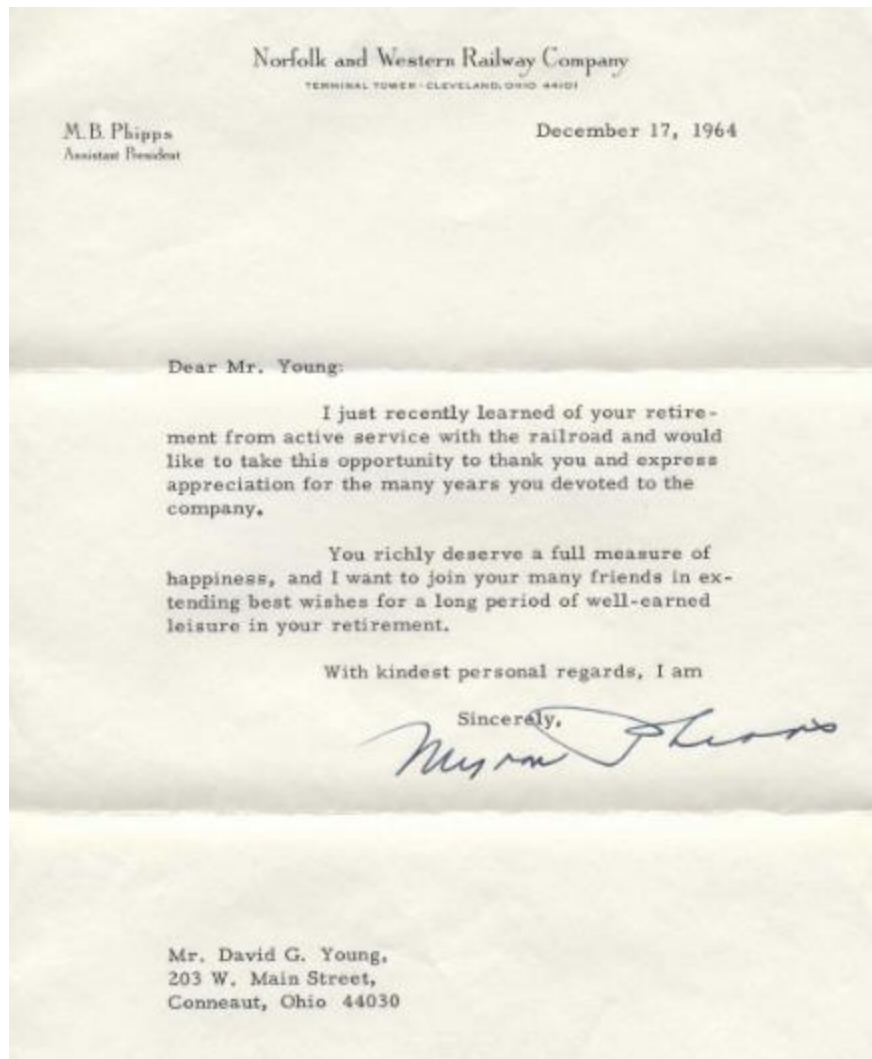
transport was torpedoed by the German U-boat 77.

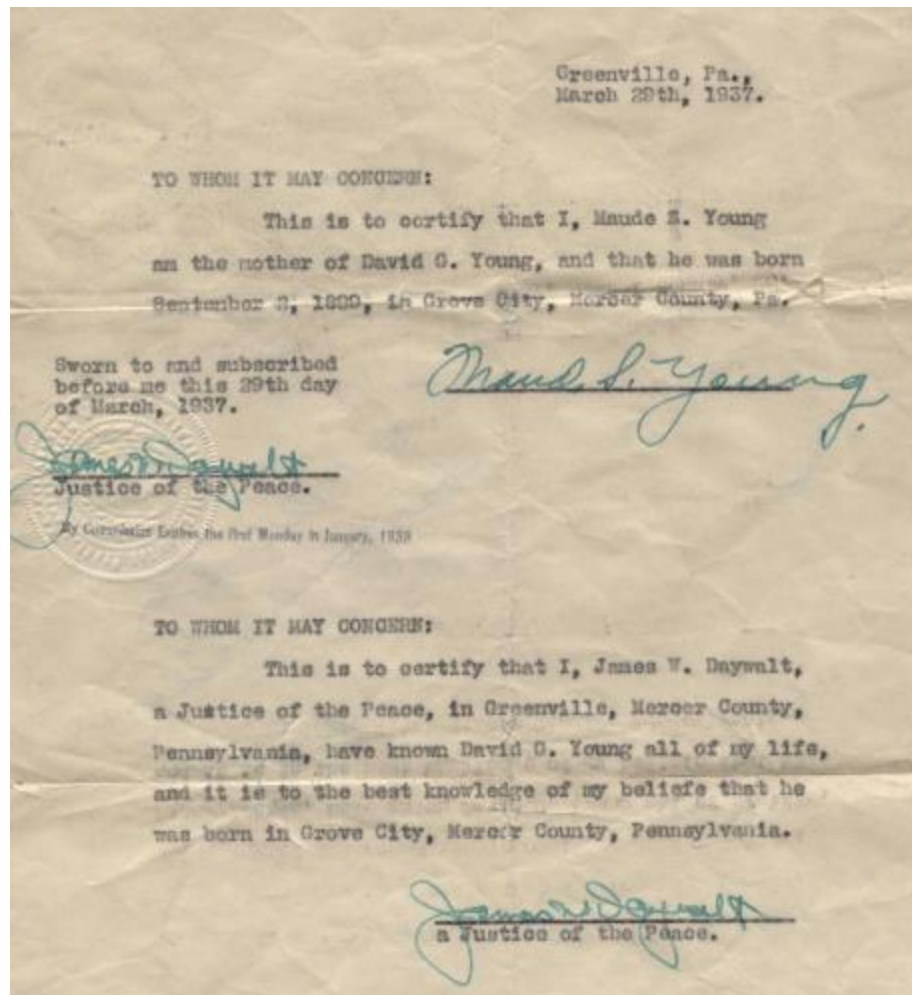
