Zalkind was a private in the 158th zero squadron and scores of friends had been studying the lists of names at the Committee of Public Informa-tion and the War Department for several days in the hope that his name would be found. When his name was not received with the last big batch they abandoned hope for

While young Zalkind's home was in Fore River, Mass., he was probably better known in Washington. He came here several years ago to fccept a position with the Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Animal Industry, and was taking a night course in law at Georgetown Univer-sity. When the United States desity. When the United States de-cided to enlarge its air activities he sought service as an enlisted man.
He was sent from Washington to
Dayton, Ohlo, and from there to the
border for a finishing course.
He went direct from the border to

the port of embarkation.

TWO FALL RIVER MEN ON TORPEDOED LINER

Nothing Yet Known Definitely of the Fate of John Hendrick and Jacob Zalkind, Both Members of the 158th Aero Squadron. Two Fall River men—John Hendrick and Jacob Zalkind—were aboard the Cunard liner Tuscania when the big steamship was torpedoed by a German submarine off the north coast of Ireland Tuesday afternoon. Neither the War department nor the Navy department has yet received reports to indicate definitely what the fate of the men may be. It may be several days, Washington dispatches indicate, before the full list of survivors and lost will be available.

John Hendrick's home is at 12530 South Main street. He was a member of the 213th Aero squadron but on Jan. 8 he received a furlough and had just reached home when he received a telegram to report back. He went to Providence, where he met Sergt. Henry of his company and was transferred to the 158th Aero squadron.

Hendrick enlisted in the Aviation corps on Sept. 22 through the recruiting office at Providence and was sent to Fort Slocum, going from there to a camp in Texas. After his training had been completed, his company was brought up to Long Island City, preparatory to going across. The men in the company were granted a week's furlough so that they could come, home. He had just reached home when the telegram arrived calling him back to his company. He left the city on Jan. 13 and has not been seen by his relatives since that time.

Had he left with his former company, he would have salled for France about Jan. 10 and so avoided the accident.

He is 20 years of age and worked in the King Philip mills in the South End. About three years ago he en-listed in the British army and was sent to the Dardanelles. After the failure of the campaign there he was brought back to France, where he served in the trenches for about seven During the time he was in months. service he was wounded four or five times, the last time going into the hos-It was during the time in the hospital that he, with four Boston boys, decided that they had enough of army life, so they left and in due time reached the United States, landing in March. He remained at home until March. last September, when he decided again to go into service, this time with the United States.

He is the son of Mrs. Nora Pelton and his stepfather, William Pelton, is a fireman attached to Hose 8. Jacob Zalkind, the other local young man aboard the Tuscania, is a son of Mrs. Bessie Zalkind, 62 Covel street and the late Charles Zalkind. He was born in Russia, 24 years ago, and with his parents came to this country settling in Fall River when three years old. There are five brothers residing in this city and one married sister residing in Providence.

Members of the family sent a telegram of enquiry to the War department yesterday, through Congressman Greene, seeking definite information regarding their brother, but up to noon today no reply had been received.



LOCAL BOYS ON TUSCANIA

Privates Jacob Zalkind and John Hendrick Believed Aboard.

Both Were Members of the 158th Aero Squadron—Last Heard From at Garden City, Long Island, Two Weeks Ago.

Two local boys are believed to have been on the ill-fated steamer Tuncania, when she went to the botcome off the north coast of Ireland, Tuncania, when she went to the botcome off the north coast of Ireland, Tuncania night. Private Jacob Zalkind of 62 Covel street, and Private John P. J. Hendrick of 1253 South Main street, both members of the 15th Aero Squadron, were last heard from at Garden City L. I., and as the 15th Squadron is listed among those organizations which had been shipped on the Tuncania, It is thought that the boys sailed with it two weeks ago.

John P. J. Hendrick is the son of Mrs. William Pelton of 1253 South Main street, and Jacob Zalkind is the son of Mrs. Bessie Zalkind of 62 Covel street. Mr. Zalkind, who is 34 years old, attended B. M. C. Durfee High school for two years, after that going to a commercial school, then taking a civil service examination and securing an appointment as stenographer in the navy yard at Portsmouth, N. H. From there he was promoted to the government service in Washington, about two years ago, and remained there until a few months ago, when he onlisted as a cierk in the aviation service of the army.

Zalkind was at first sent to Louisiana, from there to Texas, and finally come north to Garden City, a camp just outside of Long Island City, New York. Knowing that he was soon to cross to France, the Zalkind Jamily

Beside his mother, Zalkind has three brothers in this city, David, Harry and Samuel. The family sent a wire to Washington, Thursday, asking for information, but has not yet had a roply.

John P. J. Hendrick, although only 20 years of age, has had an adventurous career. About three yours ago he went over to England in a cattle boot and upon reaching the other side enmercing listed in the British army, with the Eighth Bing's Irish Liverpool Regiment seven months in the trenchcs. While doing guard duty one night, he was wounded a couple of times, and was sent to a base hospital in England. After staying at the hospital for two weeks. Hendrick, together with two Boston boys, escaped and made his way to a boat leaving for this side; preferring to fight under the American flag after his country had entered the war. He strived the latter part of March last year, and after gaining sufficient strength, enlisted in the nero division of the United States army, last September.

He remained at Fort Slocum for about a week, and was then sent to a camp down in Texas, where he remained for about three months, whom he was transferred to Long Island

City. New York. Previous to his reporting at Long Island City. Hendrick received a week's furlough, but had been at his home on South Main effect only one day when he received a tecgram to report at New York on the following day.

Instead of reporting, Hendrick went up to Providence to see Bersgeant Henry of his company, was also on furlough, and requested the sergeant to have him transferred from the 42th to the 153th Squadron. This was done in order to allow Hendrick to remain on furlough. He reported to his new commander on Jan. 14th, his mother receiving a postal on that day stating that he felt a little sick. FATE OF FALL RIVER LADS ON TORPEDOED TUSCANIA UNKOWN

John P. No estinite information has been received whether he has been saved or not. The same is true of Private Jacob Zalkind of 62 Covel street. Both young men were members of the 213th Aero Squadron.

He went over from this country on a cattle boat and after spending over a year there returned to this country whim the United States ent ed the war and enlisted in the aviation corps. Young Hendrick has been brought up since a baby by William E. and Nora Pelton of South Main street and about three weeks ago paid them a short visit, returning to Mineola, Long Island. Nothing has been heard of him until this morning when his name appeared in the list of Bay State boys who were aboard the ill-fated ship. Fears for his safety are entertained. It is possible however that he was among those saved.



FINE DISCIPLINE ON THE TUSCANIA

SERGT.-MAJOR JACOB ZALKIND TELLS OF EXPERIENCES ON TORPEDOED SHIP.

Was About To Jump Overboard, but Slid Down Rope to Torpedo Boat— Landed in Irish Port—Has Since Received Promotion.

Sergeant-Major Jacob Zalkind of this city was one of the last to leave the transport Tuscania, as it was settling into its ocean grave, torpedoed by a German submarine, more than a month ago. In a letter dated Feb. 11, received today by his brother, Samuel Zalkind, of 1650 North Main street, he relates his thrilling rescae from Davy Jones' locker in a matter-of-fact way.

in another letter to his mother, Mrs. Bessie Zalkind, he tells of his work in treland and England, and of his promotion to corporal and then to sergeant-major in the 158th Aero Service Squadron.

The discipline of the men aboard was wondrous. With the German submarine still lurking about, with the lurching and sinking ship in darkness, and with seeming confusion everywhere, order still predominated, and many smoked clearettes. Although the boat assigned to Sergt Zaikind and 50 others had been smeshed by the torpedo, no attempt was made to enter another life boat is a sool headelness of the men saved the situation from becoming a route and a complete catastrophe.

The sergeant says he had a fairly good trip and quarters until the 13th day on sea. Boat drills were held each day. After the 10th day on board, the submarine danger was guarded against.

"After the tenth day," he writes,
"we were met by a fleet of torpedo
boat destroyers, which acted as convoy, in addition to what we had before. We were awakeped everymerning before dawn and kept on
deck until dusk, with orders not to
go anywheree without life preservers.

We have seen no submarines, and all those precautions sometimes amuse me. Well, about the 13th night at 6, was in the bowels of the ship, waiting for grub, when—boom! And out went all the lights. It was not necessary for any of us to be told what happened.

We just hiked for the stairs, but here is where cool-headedness came, and though there was some crowding, there was no jam. The fellows who had flashlights and matches, ilt them so that the crowd could see the stairs. This eased things up a great deal and everyone got to the boat places in fine order and took their regular drill places.

"When I reached my place I found that the torpedo had blown my lifeboat to shreds. There were 60 of us assigned to the boat. We stood around for awhile and lit cigarettes and talked the situation over. None of us that I could see tried to enter another crowd's boat. Al this time the ship was going down, taking a big list to the starboard. I saw one boat lowered half way, containing a load of men. The ropes broke and they rolled back into the sea. We managed to haul some who were hanging to ropes back again.

Our crowd stuck together in the meantime, and the lieutenant in command of our boat with some of us went up on boat-deck to push a post over that was not in use. Most of the davits were out of order by this time, and we had to push the boat over the ride. We shoved one over, and it drifted away before anything could be done. We pushed another over, but that went upside down. So I went back to the lower deck, where I found about one-half of our crowd left.

The others managed to get off. saw, however, several accidents while the life boats were going over, so with some of the others we started to stick to the ship. Just before she took her plunge we were going to jump overboard, with the chance of swimming out of the suction, as she went down, for he had life-preservers, anyway that seemed our only chance because no small boats were left. While I was on the port side a torpedo boat destroyer came along the starboard and was taking men off. I happened to stroll around, and believe me, was surprised, for the torpedo boat destroyer was diving as the tin fish (the submarine) had sent two torpedoes at our ship and was

By this time the deck was almost cleared and I had no difficulty in finding an empty rope, from which I slid onto the deck of the torpedo boat. The seamen on the boat (names censored) and English vessel did wonderful work, and it was due to the way they laid their ships along side and their Trojan-like efforts that we managed to get off. I only left when practically all the men got off. It was when I had to leave pretty hurriedly that another torpedo grazed the destroyer's keel. After three hours steaming we landed safely in an Irish port, and put up in a barracks, where we remained four days. We were given wonderful treatment by the English, Scotch and Irish troops quartered there."

Sergeant Zalkind is at present in an English rest camp. He says his men are a motley-looking bunch, as they received nondescript pieces of clothing from the various places visited since landing. All the survivors are in excellent shape, and eager to get over there to do their bit against the Huns, who sent their comrades to an ocean grave.





Referee Sherman Hears More of Dondis Case, in Which Attorney Radovsky and Others Are Concerned.

Contempt proceedings against Attorney David R. Radovsky, Samuel Dondis, David Biltsky and Samuel Zalkind, in connection with the bankruptcy of Fannie Dondis, were further heard and completed before Referee Clifford P. Sherman in bankruptcy court today. The referee reserved his decision and ordered the hearing into the estate of the bankrupt continued in until Oct. 14.

Referee Sherman read an amendment to the contempt petition filed by Nathan Yamins, receiver in the case, and who filed the original petition, in which the receiver requested that name of David R. Radovsky be withdrawn from the petition. The referee was about to grant the request, when Attorney A. S. Phillips interposed an objection. Mr. Phillips state that he joined in the original petition, as counsel for the receiver and also as counsel for creditors and that so far as he was concerned Mr. Radovsky was still a party to the contempt protition was allowed as to Mr. Yamins, but not as to Mr. Phillips.

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F. A. Pease, who appeared as coun-sel for the respondents, did not take advantage of the opportunity offered for argument, but Mr. Phillips argued for a time. He asserted that the court had been "outraged" in the Dondis case and that an attempt had been made, through mortgages, to prevent the bankruptcy court from taking charge of the estate of the bankrupt.

Attorney Radovsky, Deputy Sheriff Hugh T. McNeill, who served the papers in the case, Samuel Dondia, husband of the bankrupt, David Biltsky and Samuel Zalkind, the other respondents in the contempt petition, were examined at today's session, more or less feeling being displayed session, during the hearing, particularly on the part of counsel.

Mr. Radovsky went through the entire proceedings from the time of the placing of the first attachment Dondis' stores down through bankruptcy matter. He had a number of talks with Nathan Yamins, the receiver, and they agreed, he said, that the best way to do in the matter would be to keep the stores open and then dispose of them as quickly as possible. Then Mr. Phillips entered into the case and announced that he would close the stores, one on Mul-berry, the other on East Main street. This and other matters in relation to the bankruptcy petition stirred up a lot of trouble and the parties at in-terest have since been more or less at loggerheads. When he heard of the contempt petition he called the referee by telephone and told him he considered such action nothing but bulldozing and intimidation.

Yamins, witness testified, told aim after the petition was filed that he did not know Radovsky's name was on it, that it was put on Mr. Phillips, although he would not say that the latter was trying to "put one over" on him. Witness defended his action in advising Zaikind to break open the Mulberry street store after Deputy Sheriff McNeill and the received had posted a notice and locked the place, asserting that he considered the re-spondent had a perfect right in the store. David Biltsky told of going surety on a bond to dissolve the attachments on Fannie Dondis' store, he being se-cured by a mortgage. He simply cured by a mortgage, He simply went surety as a personal favor to Samuel and Fannie Dondis in return for favors they have done him. Sam-uel Zalkind, former manager of the Mulberry Mulberry street store, admitted breaking into the store after the readmitted ceiver had posted a notice and locked the place up, but that he thought he was doing all right. He was advised as to his rights by Mr. Radovsky. The latter did not tell him in so many words to break into the store, but said he had a right in there if he wished he had a right in there if he wished to go in. 
