HISTORY OF CASE (supposed facts to be proven at inquest):

Deceased resided at 2131 Grove Street with his wife, Reida and was employed as a shipping clerk by Allis-Chalmers Company. According to the deceased's wife, on 9-13-52 the deceased was supposedly at the above company's warehouse checking stock numbers on large motors that were in crates and while standing on one of these crates it broke causing the deceased to fall on the floor striking his head and becoming temporarily unconscious. There was no one present at the scene and when he revived he returned to the company office 650 Harrison Street and told Theresa Fryworth of his fall and she gave him first aid treatment. On 9-15-52, the deceased complained at home to his wife of severe headaches and was attended by Dr. E. Sailer. As the deceased's condition became worse, he was admitted to St. Luke's Hospital at 2:35 PM, 10/3/52, diagnosis: subarachnoid hemorrhage, treated by Dr. Sailer at the above hospital. Deceased expired at 10:22 PM, 10-4-52, final diagnosis: subarachnoid hemorrhage.

It was their annual Christmas celebration and distribution of presents, made especially pleasant by the presence of the immediate relatives of some of the children, and the reception of gifts that were particularly desired. The Board of Managers, the Ladies' Auxiliary, outside friends, and merchants of the city all united to make the occasion a happy one, and they were most successful. P. A. Chopin donated the tree, and the auxiliary of the home, assisted by Charles Rice Armstrong, made it resplendent with glistening tinsel and light. Misses Minnie and Mayda Diel trained the children in the preparation of a programme of songs and recitations and after it was all over, the check arrived from Dr. Sauvage of the American Drugstore, of \$105 to the asylum, in fulfillment of his promise to give a dollar each to every orphan in the city.

The presents given were very appropriate; toys, dolls, and playthings of every description for the very young children, and more useful articles, like tool chests, garden utensils, and toilet accessories, for the older ones. The presents were awarded by Miss Mayda Diel, who personated Santa Claus.

1 SON TUSCANIA MARTYR; 1 SAVED

Battle of Boys With Waves Described to Mrs. Louise Moore by Survivor.

A letter telling how her two sons had battled for life in the waves which dashed them against the rugged and desolate shore of Ireland following the Tuscania disaster brought thankfulness and sorrow to a San Francisco mother's heart yesterday.

The message came from Edward J. Moore from "somewhere in England" to his mother, Mrs. Louise Moore, 739 First avenue.

She was thankful because he had been spared to her and sad because it told in a pathetic way of the fight her two boys had made and in which one of them, William A. Moore, lost his life.

Here is the letter:

Will and I were together. We left the sinking ship in the last lifeboat. We did not know where Fred (Sergeant Frederick Burmer) was. If we had stayed, we would have been with Fred and the men who were taken off on the last destroyer which came to the ship before it went down. The boat we were in was overloaded with men, so crowded they were sitting on top of each other. Too crowded to row or bail water, we drifted onto the rocky coast near midnight. The wind was strong and the waves seemed ten feet high. The boat overturned when it struck the rocks and then it was an awful fight to keep from being killed on the rocks. Will and I were rowing on the same oar when the boat turned over. It happened so quick the water was filled with men and I had no chance to find Will.

I was thrown in and out against the rocks under the water most of the time. It seemed an age. I had almost given up when the thought came to me that God was watching over me, and soon after I had trusted myself to him I was able to clutch a rock and hold on there for a few minutes. Then I gained hold on a larger rock and pulled myself up out of the water. I lost consciousness then and two men who had landed safely found me hanging there and carried me ashore. When I regained consciousness it was daylight. I had no coat on and had been lying in a muddy, wet place all night.

LETTER FROM Y. M. C. A. SECRETARY

R. W. Bayless,
Army Y. M. C. A.,
Monterey, Calif.,
My Dear Friend:

In keeping with my pledge to write a word as often as possible of our work, I am taking about the first opportunity since reaching the foreign field to do so. In the first place the friends to whom this letter goes will be surprised that I am not in France, but working in England instead.

When our party of 59 secretaries reached London there was a very urgent call made upon them for men who would be willing to stop in England and carry on a very important work opening up. I, or coorse, was disappointed in not being able to go on to the war zone, but with the prospect of a later transfer to France, accepted the invitation to get into a real ready work among our own men. I am not at liberty to say a great deal about the troops which we have the privilege of serving.

We had the privilege of caring for the survivors of the Tuscania, the first American troops to experience the submarine menace. They were a fine bunch of fellows. Among them, to my surprise, was Fred Burmer of the Army and Navy branch of the Y. M. C. A. at San Francisco. I was sure glad to see him saved.

The trip over was an uneventful one, save for the constant possibility of meeting up with some of Kaiser Bill's sea rovers, which we fortunately missed.

I think about the only interesting event and that only to those with whom I have associated in the financial campaign, was the collection of my laast funds for the Y. M. C. A. work.

We reached Pittsburgh quite late and were detained there for a few hours. A party of young men, in our car who were somewhat convivly inclined, went to one of the hotels to get the benefit of the liquid refreshments provided at the bar.

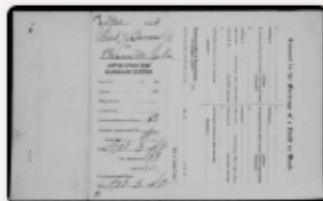

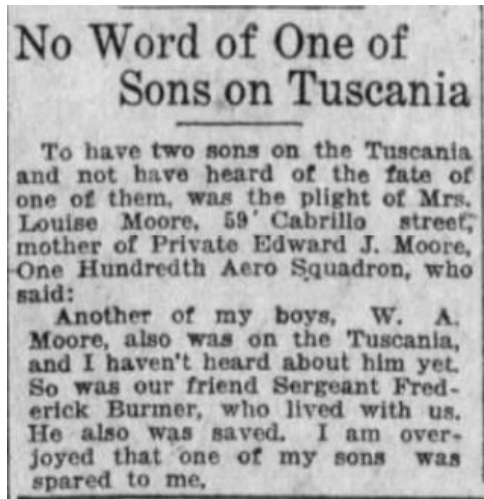

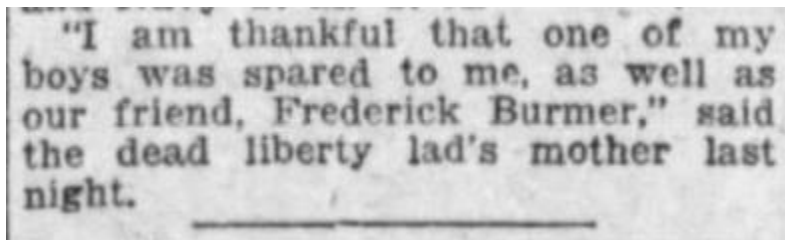

“Woodland Daily Democrat” 25 Mar 1925 p 6 – The fireman’s benefit was held at the National theater last night, with a production of a fashion review called “Melody Lane,” which had musical interludes. “Fred Burmer, one of the fireman, contributed several solos on a stringed instrument of his own manufacture.
