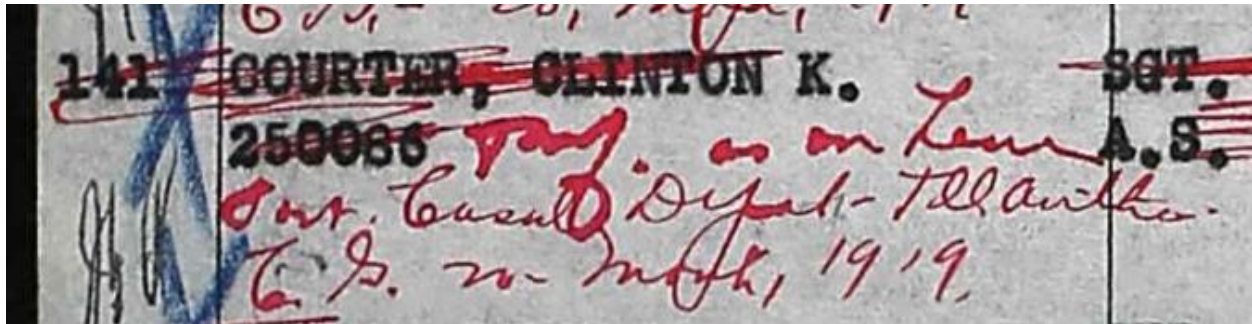

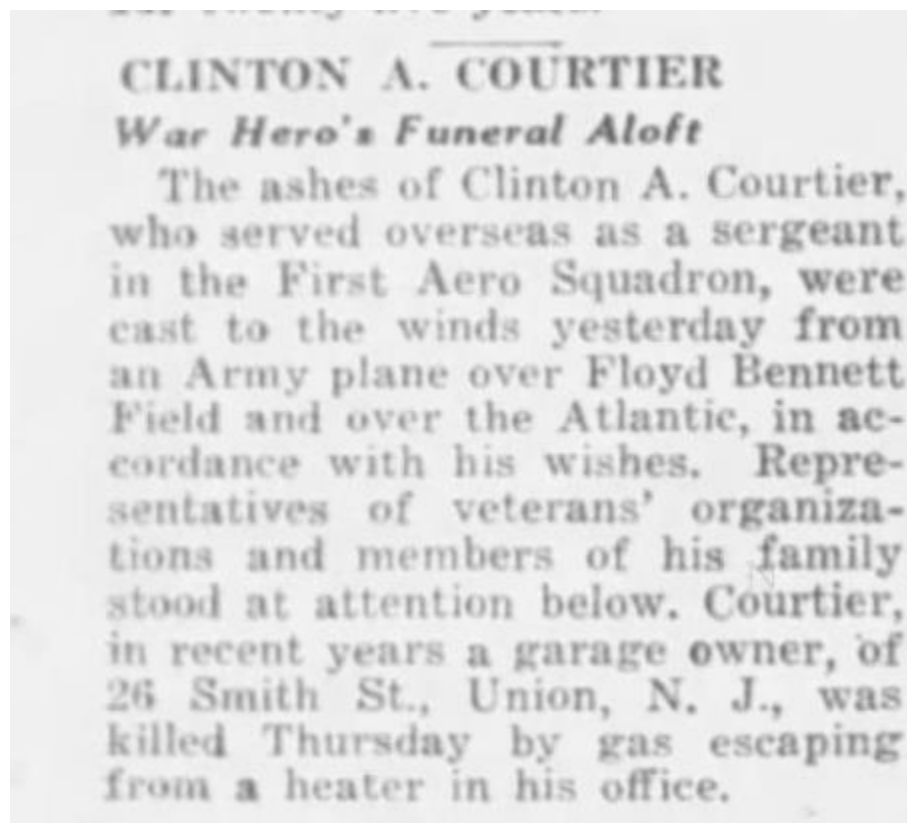

War Aviator's Ashes Scattered From Plane

In accordance with his wish, the ashes of Sgt. Clinton A. (Mickey) Courtier, World War aviator, were cast to the winds yesterday from a United States Army plane which circled, first, over Floyd Bennett Field, then over the Atlantic Ocean, as representatives of veterans' organizations and members of the Courtier family stood at attention on the ground below.

Courtier of 26 Smith St., Union, N. J., proprietor of a garage in recent years, was killed on Thursday by gas which escaped from a heater in the office of his establishment.

Kenneth Behr, manager of Floyd Bennett Field, a war-time friend of Courtier, was notified by the latter's relatives of Courtier's desire to have his ashes scattered. Behr communicated with Maj. B. H. Chandler of the U. S. Army detail at Mitchel Field and the major arranged for use of a Government plane.

Courtier was a member of the 1st Aero Squadron of the American Expeditionary Force, and was decorated for bravery on several occasions during the World War.

After appearing in [Rio de Janeiro](#) (1921), he was a member of the Chicago Opera (1922–24). In 1923 he made his debut at Milan's [La Scala](#) as Rodolfo, and sang there until 1932. He also was a guest artist at [Buenos Aires](#)'s Teatro Colón (1924) and London's [Covent Garden](#) (1926; 1930; 1933–34).

It is likely that the baby will have an imposing array of Christian names, and one of them may be "Sydney," in honor of his birthplace.

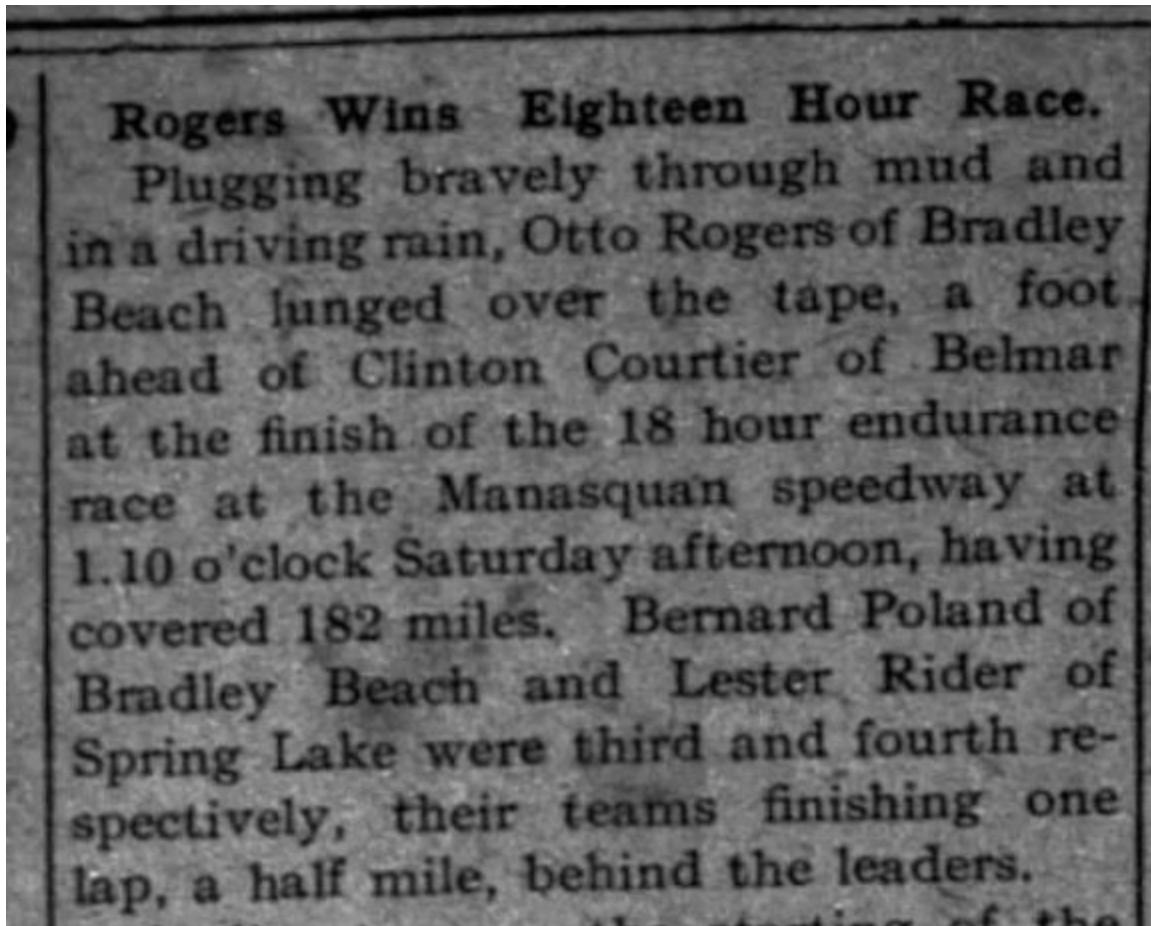

OF ABUSING POLICEMAN.



SILK STOCKING DEVOTEE FINED IN POLICE COURT

**Mrs. Louise A. Courter Charged
With Being Abusive to
Policeman.**

It seems impossible for Mrs. Louise A. Courter, nee Hayes, daughter of Mrs. Lena W. Hayes, of 1096 Broad street, to keep out of the public eye. Mrs. Courter first came into the limelight when her mother caused to be inserted in the papers an advertisement which forbade shopkeepers charging any goods that her daughter might put to her account. Investigation proved that the daughter had a penchant for silk hose, which she would buy at every opportunity. The charge against Mrs. Courter today was that she, with her husband, Clinton Courter, and their chauffeur had caused an unnecessary commotion on the streets and had damaged the clothing of an officer.

Patrolman Thelan, of the First pre-

dict, stated that last night as he was returning home with his wife he noticed an automobile coming down Frelinghuysen avenue without a driver. A pedestrian jumped in and put on the brakes. A few moments later Mrs. Courter came running up, the patrolman stated, and he asked her why she allowed the car to be alone. She became abusive, it is alleged, and used terms which were not complimentary. Called me a "stiff" and "a loafer," said the cop. "Then her husband came on the scene, and he demanded to know what right I had in 'butting in.' As I was in plainclothes I showed them my badge, and they demanded that I place them under arrest, if I dared. They stated that their 'pull' was greater than mine, at the same time naming prominent city officials who would assist them. I told them to move on, but they refused, and the first thing I knew I was being hauled about, with the result that my clothing was torn. Mrs. Courter then struck my wife, and Patrolman O'Connor was compelled to be a bit severe with Mrs. Courter."

Mrs. Courter, who is an accomplished musician and singer, was the first to speak for the defense. She was handsomely gowned and made an imposing figure as she faced the judge. She denied that she had caused too much noise on the streets, but admitted that she might have said a few foolish things which no one ought to pay attention to. She admitted that the automobile had been left standing on the street without the chauffeur, who had gone to the corner for a soda. Mr. Courter stated that he was unaware that Thelan was an officer and that Thelan had neglected to show any authority in making the arrest. Thomas Palmitier, the chauffeur, gave no excuses.

Judge Hahn found the defendants guilty, and after administering a warning fined them \$10 each. The fines were paid.

Man, Badly Beaten, Held for Wrecking Restaurant

On a charge of malicious mischief preferred by George Johnson, proprietor of a restaurant in Plane street, Clinton Courter, twenty-four years old, of 1096 Broad street, was held to-day for the grand jury in \$200 bail by Judge Hahn in the First Criminal Court.

According to the testimony of Johnson, Courter called at his place Sunday night accompanied by a "gang of forty," and proceeded to wreck the exterior of the place. Courter stated that when the trouble started he was inside the restaurant, and that he was severely beaten by two waiters. The general appearance of his face bore evidence of the truthfulness of his statement.

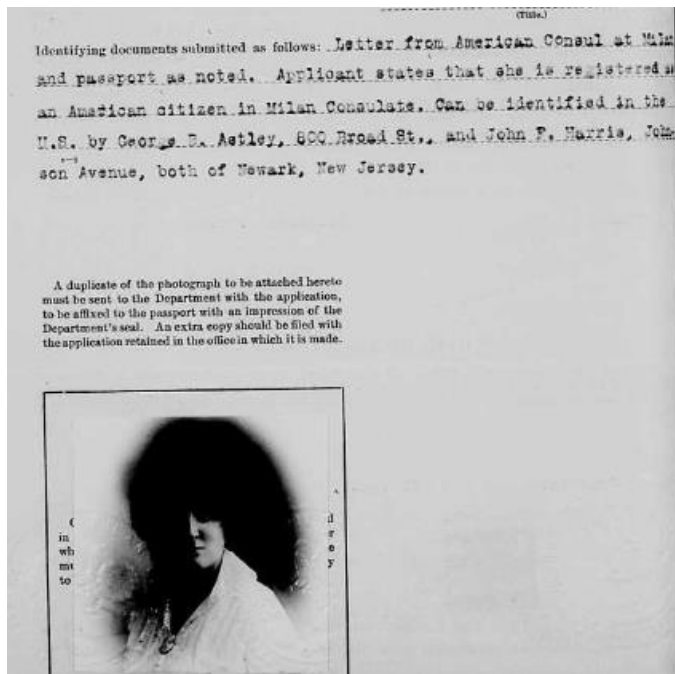

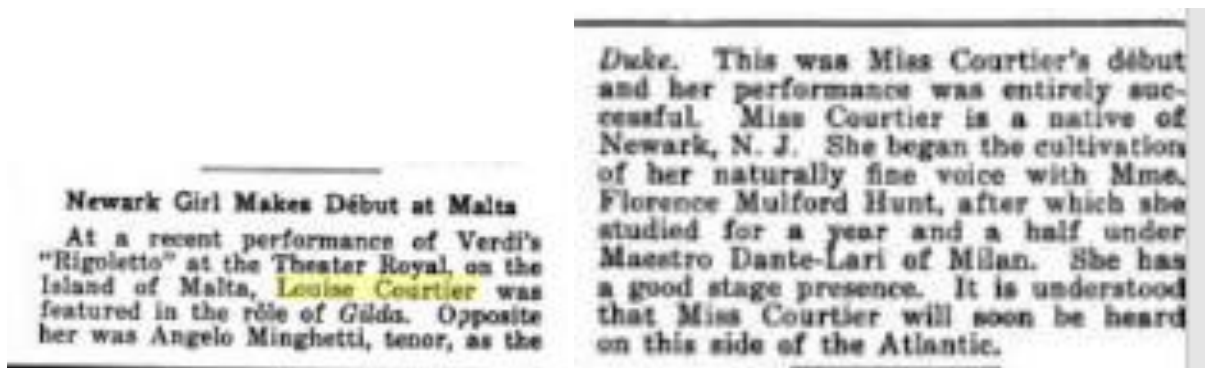

Lancellotti Pupil Pleases Venice

Italian operatic newspapers tell of the success of **Louise Hayes-Minghetti**, a talented New York soprano, wife of **Angelo Minghetti**, tenor, of the Chicago Opera. As Mimi in *La Boheme*, she won recognition from both press and public at the Malibran Theater in Venice.

Mrs. Hayes-Minghetti prepared the role with Chev. de Lancellotti, the well known New York voice teacher and coach, when she was visiting this country last May. This is not the first time that she has been under the personal guidance of Chev. de Lancellotti for it was during his regime as impresario of the opera at Malta that Mrs. Hayes-Minghetti made her operatic debut, singing Gilda in *Rigoletto* there with pronounced success.

It appears Louise Hayes has married her tenor Angelo Minghetti from Malta – "Musical Courier" 20 Sep 1923 p 38.

The paragraphs pertaining to Louise (Lulu) Hayes Minghetti -

In December, the tenor appeared in the United States for the first time, singing with the Newark Grand Opera at the Orpheum Theatre. His roles were Rodolfo and Alfredo and he sang, according to various reports, as William Hayes. I offer this information, without confirmation, because it was during this engagement that he discovered the charms of one Lulu Hayes, a lyric soprano of some accomplishment, who, after a frantic courtship, married him. I suspect that William Hayes was her father and that he was connected in some way to the Newark Company.

Fact-check: Since Angelo & Louise had sung together for years, the “frantic courtship” may have had a longer history than stated. William Hayes was indeed Louise’s father.

Naples also saw him as Cavaradossi and, for the first time, in a professional concert with Lulu. According to one critic she showed a “light lyric voice, well suited to her chosen music.” Lulu was to appear with him from time to time until at last it became apparent that her talents were less inclined to the stage than they were to the role of a wife, mother and friend. She was deeply devoted to him as he was to her, and wherever he went throughout his career she and their children joined him.

The Minghetti family returned to Newark for a most rousing welcome from family and friends, long separated. A dispatch from Musical Courier, 24 April 1924:

Angelo Minghetti, after a successful season with the Chicago Civic Opera, gave a song recital in Aeolian Hall, New York City, and is engaged to sing in Italy and South America. Louise [sic] Minghetti sang sixteen times in Tosca, in Venice, with tremendous success and sang in Rigoletto in New Jersey under Bamboschek with the Metropolitan Opera House orchestra.

The dispatch failed to note that, at Newark, Minghetti also sang in Rigoletto and that they both appeared in Tosca. On May 1 Angelo and **Lulu** sailed from New York for Buenos Aires and a début at the Teatro Colón. During the season, Lulu’s star would shine rather brightly, if only for a moment.

Angelo returned to Buenos Aires on 13 July, where he resumed his season with *Mefistofele*. Signora Minghetti made her Colón début in the role of Margherita, Nina Koshetz sang Elena and Tancredi Pasero the protagonist. Lulu received a very warm ovation and kind notices in the press. Her husband fairly beamed with joy during the curtain calls as Pasero walked to her side and kissed her hand. When the company reached Rio de Janeiro, Lulu sang a performance of *Mimi* and again received a most warm welcome from a packed house. Minghetti added Vittadini's *Anima Allegra* at Rio and the company closed its season at São Paulo in October with *Mefistofele*. Though it had been a most rewarding year, it had been an exhausting one, and they were overjoyed to return to Bologna, where they allowed themselves a long rest before Angelo returned to the stage.

Minghetti débuted at Cairo on 12 January 1928 in *La Gioconda* with Giannina Arangi Lombardi, and remained in Egypt for nearly three months, appearing in *Tosca* with Pacetti and Arangi Lombardi alternating, Gianni Schicchi, *La Rondine* with Dalla Rizza and *Cavalleria Rusticana* again with Pacetti and Arangi Lombardi. Lulu and Angelo gave a joint recital at the Sala Calderón on 11 March, after which he joined the company at Alexandria for *Madama Butterfly*, *Tosca*, *La Rondine*, *Cavalleria Rusticana*, Gianni Schicchi and, finally, *La Traviata* with Dalla Rizza.

At Adelaide, Angelo had the honour of opening the season in *Tosca* with Scavizzi and Granforte. There was enormous commentary in the press about the splendid quality of Minghetti's voice and even more about his stage manner and his striking appearance. He was besieged by women wherever he went, and one commentator sniped that "his wife and daughter, perhaps wisely, accompanied him on the tour".

Lulu delivered their second child, a son, just before the end of the Sydney season and at Adelaide there was a baptism and a celebration in their honour.

Lulu and Angelo now had two children to care for and the days of long journeys were permanently behind them. There were schooling and everyday concerns to divert them from any long-term plans. It was also during 1929, after a few concerts in the area around Bologna, that Lulu retired from the lyric stage, except for a single engagement as Boit's Margherita at Genoa's Carlo Felice on 1 Sept 1931. (Angelo's career continued with an intensity and lustre as great as ever.

The rest is the tale of a few lonely performances by a man who had passed his best. His only engagement in 1936 was in *Giuletta e Romeo* at Rome, and in 1937 he sang only at Venice in *La Bohème*. In 1938 Angelo appeared in *La Bohème* at Turin and Palermo and in 1939 he appeared at Busto Arsizio and Livorno in *Tosca*. World War II was now on and, after performances of *Madama Butterfly* at Milan, on 29 September 1940, he sang his long-delayed farewell in the World Première of Davico's *Pincipessa Prigioniera* at Bergamo, under the direction of Gianandrea Gavazzeni. It was Gavazzeni who persuaded him both to appear in the new opera and to retire from the lyric stage. Angelo, Lulu and the children took up residence in Milan, where he taught for several years. After a series of illnesses, Angelo Minghetti died at Milan on 10 February 1957. He had had an extraordinarily rewarding life, with a remarkably close and devoted family, and a career that was among the most impressive and far reaching in this century.

The question remains: in the face of the evidence, why is he so little known and so seldom remembered? The answer probably lies in his recordings. He made only six published discs, though he did record several duets with Margaret Sheridan that were never released, as far as I know. I own two of the six that have been circulated, a lovely rendition of Donaudy's 'Vaghissima sembianza' and a stunning version of 'Che gelida manina'. There is some pressure on the top C but it is a full, rich tone, and the attack is quite wonderful. The voice itself is of a lovely brilliance with a most attractive, beautifully modulated vibrato. It should also be noted that Lulu made at least one recording; on 23 May 1921, at Milan, she recorded 'Sì, Vendetta' from *Rigoletto* with Mattia Battistini. Let us hope that the remainder of Angelo's meagre but undoubtedly impressive legacy will appear for our enjoyment and edification.

George A. Courter was tried in the Essex County court at Newark, on Friday last, on a charge of manslaughter. In April George Squiers and George Courter drove from Orange to Newark and sold a dead horse. Returning home they stopped in a bar-room, and while drinking quarrelled over the money received, when Courter struck Squiers with a beer glass. Squiers's head was badly cut. Two weeks afterward he died and Courter was arrested and brought to trial. A physician testified that a blood vessel in Squiers's head had been ruptured. The defence sought to prove that Squiers died of delirium tremens. The jury returned a verdict of assault and battery.

HUSBAND DRUNK WHILE WIFE TOILS

Mrs. Anna Courter Tells Sympathetic Story in Police Court.

MUST NOW SUPPORT HIS WIFE

One of the most sympathetic stories ever heard in police court was that told to the Recorder this morning by Mrs. Anna Courter, when her husband, Moses Courter, was arraigned on a charge of neglecting to provide for her. Courter, a big hearty man of 40 years, whiningly said his neglect was due to failure to secure employment.

Mrs. Courter, a well spoken and careworn appearing little body, testified that hers was a life of drudgery and care.

"My husband," said she, "has been under the influence of liquor for the past seven weeks and in that time has not given me one penny toward my support. Every cent he gets he spends for rum and my hours of pleading amount to naught. I hated to take this step but was compelled to, because while I am out at work trying to keep body and soul together, he comes home, takes away articles of furniture and sells them to get money to continue his debauches. Once he sold almost everything we had in the house."

Questioned by the Recorder, Mrs. Courter said that for a period of ten years when her children, all of whom are now grown up, were young, she was compelled to take in washing in order to get money for the necessities of life.

"Please Anna withdraw the charge and I'll sign the pledge for a year," implored the wretched defendant.

"No, I can't," replied the tearful wife, "I have lived on your promises for years."

The Recorder promptly adjudged Courter guilty, made an order on him for \$3 weekly and fixed the guarantee bond at \$200. In default of the necessary surety he was committed.

The Courters live at No. 40 North Second street.

Moses Courter, no home, was arrested for begging ferry tickets and money along Federal street near Second. Policeman Murray saw him accost pedestrians and after warning him to move on, which was not heeded, Murray placed him under arrest.

At that time Courter had an overcoat with him and when taken before Recorder Stackhouse this morning he told the Court that he had one cent yesterday and was trying to raise the other two to get on the other side. He said he wanted to pawn the coat.

James Donovan, the man who owned the coat, was at the hearing and said he received a telegram from another city saying that there was work for him if he would come. Donovan gave Courter the coat to pawn so that the carfare could be raised.

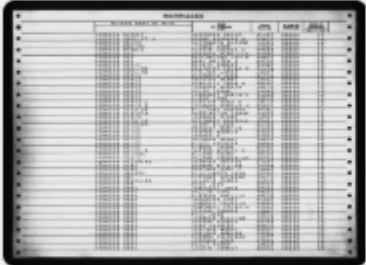
