Guy L. Crawford Killed in Action in France.

Tuesday afternoon L. M. Crawford recieved a telegram notifying him that his son Guy L. Crawford, of the U. S. Cavalry in France, was killed in action July 19th.

Guy was one of the survivals of the ill-fated Tuscania which was torpedoed by a German submarine on February 6th, 1918, he having been reported among the dead at that time but later picked up after having been in a life boat for about 24 hours. He was born in Lamar County, Texas, Sept. 21, 1895, being 22 years, 10 months and 28 days old at the time of his death. He was well known in Soper and surrounding country. He was a model young

man and loved by all who knew him best. He never lived to share the honor and glory that would have justify been bestowed upon him, but may those nearest him be consoled to know that he has gone to a greater reward and glory than ever human could have given.

Myrtle C. Norvell Dies After Fall

Mrs. Myrtle Clara Norvell, 74, of 3519 E. Thirteenth st., a Tulsan since 1917, died in a convalescent home today of complications from a hip fracture suffered in a fall at her home in January.

Mrs. Norvell had made her home in recent years with a daughter, Mrs. M. B. Templeton. She was the mother of Lemuel A. Norvell, Spokane, Wash., former commander of the Tulsa Veterans of Foreign Wars post.

Born in Texas, she moved here from Fort Worth. She was a member of the Fifteenth Street Church of Christ.

Also surviving are her husband, J. A. Norvell, Springdale, Ark.; two other daughters, Mrs. T. C. Quinn, 1130 N. Main st., and Mrs. Jack Ingram, Springdale; another son, Jerry Dee Norvell, Eureka, W. Va.; three sisters, Mrs. D. F. Wagenfeller, Marlow, Mrs. Brock Coward, Powderly, Texas, and Mrs. M. M. Dunn, Bogota, Texas; a brother, Newt Crawford, Tye, Texas; 12 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

Services will be held at 2:30 p. m. Saturday in the Fifteenth Street Church of Christ. Interment will be in Memorial Park under direction of the Guardian Funeral home.

Myrtle Clara Crawford story

CRAWFORD FAMILY HISTORY, AS I REMEMBER IT

Myrtle Clara Crawford, my mother, was the first of nine children born to Lemuel and Louticia Crawford. Lemuel was born in Cain Hill, Ark., near Fayetteville, where the home of the University of Arkansas is. Lemuel's parents were members of the Presbyterian Church. The members of this church started the first college in Arkansas at Cain Hill. All the Crawford children went to college there. Some of them were recognized as great Arkansas educators. Cain Hill was a flourishing community until the railroad came through that part of Arkansas and bypassed it.

Lemuel went to Texas, where he met and married a beautiful Cherokee Indian girl, for which he was disowned by his parents. However, his sister continued to communicate with him. Her name was Mary Lou Crawford Holcomb, and she taught at the University of Arkansas until her death. Lemuel, throughout his lifetime, was a farmer, a school teacher, a carpenter, and a United States Marshal in Oklahoma Indian Territory. He wanted his children to have a good education. Myrtle, being the first child, took elocution lessons (the same as public speaking, today). I remember part of a speech she recited, called Socrates Snooks. It went, "Socrates Snooks, the Lord of Creation, the second time entered his marriage relation." It went on to say that he referred to his house, his barn, his cows, etc. His wife would say, "Say ours, dear!" However, he continued to call everything his. One day, as they were getting ready for church, he said 'my something' once too many times. She took off her slipper and went after him. He crawled under the bed, finally saying, "My dear, may I come out from under our bed, and put on our new Sunday britches?" I

enjoyed hearing my mother reciting these things.

My mother could play the old pump organ by ear, but her father insisted she learn to play by note. We always had that old pump organ, and I loved to hear her play it and sing. I still remember a love song she sang:

"Somebody's tall and handsome, somebody's brave and true.
Somebody's hair is very dark, somebody's eyes are blue.
Somebody asks my mother if she would hear to the wed.
Somebody heard her answer no, and then the tears were shed.
Somebody asks my father if he would hear to the wed,
Somebody heard him answer 'yes,' and then the right was said.
There's going to be a wedding, so early in the fall,
and I am going to be the bride and that's the best of all."

Mama had a good education. Her Aunt Mary Lou sent her lessons, which she did and returned them for her Aunt to correct. Mama was also an excellent seamstress and milliner. I am not sure if she had her own shop but she did sewing and made hats for other people.

Louticia Edmondson Crawford, my grandmother, was raised by her mother's two old maid sisters, whose last name was Moore. I have often wondered if Louticia's parents died on the Trail of Tears. Mama told me the old maids were aristocrats, which I doubted until my sister-in-law gave me an old history book to read. It told about the Cherokee Indians in South Carolina who took on the ways of the white people. Some of them even had slaves. Some of the white people didn't think the Indians should be able to live like rich white people and that is one reason they were rushed out at night and driven to Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas. Many Indians died on the Trail of Tears. The sisters must have been very dark. Mama told us that someone, where they went to church, adopted a child, and one of the sisters said, "Well, if we were going to adopt a child, we would get someone who looked more like us." An old German woman in the church replied, "Veil, would you adopt a little nigger [sic] then?"

When I was in grade school, they gave us forms to take home for our parents to fill out to let the government know how much Indian blood we had, to see if our families would qualify for land given to Indians. I don't remember how much they had to have, but Mama told me she could have received rich bottom land in Texas, if her father would have signed the paper for her, but he wouldn't do it. In those days, there was still a stigma about having Indian blood, so he didn't want anyone to know that his children were part Indian.

Mama told me that she had many friends, some of them were men friends, but after her mother died, she never thought about getting married because she thought her father needed her to take care of the other eight children. In her earlier years, she wanted to marry a distant cousin, who was a doctor. Because they were related, their parents wouldn't let them marry. Unexpectedly, one day her father asked her if any of the young men coming around ever said anything about marriage. That made her think her father wanted her out of the way so that he could marry again. She decided she would marry the first man who asked her. My father, Jerry Alexander Norvell, who was working for her father, was the first to ask. So, she married him! Myrtle was 26 years old when she got married, which, in those days, was almost past the marrying age!

Jerry Alexander Norvell was born in Greenwood, Arkansas, near Fort Smith. He had black wavy hair and blue eyes. He was a very handsome man! Jerry's father came from Tennessee to homestead in Arkansas. He left his girlfriend in Tennessee, but her family planned to come to Arkansas later on. However, he didn't wait for her, he married before she came. He and his girlfriend each outlived several spouses, and in their old age were both single and courting again. Her family's surname was "Lowry," and when I was born, Daddy named me 'Lowry'. Daddy's father loved to play the violin. He made his own violin. He gave our family his violin, but I never knew what happened to it.

Daddy left home when he was 13 years old and never returned until he was married and had his first son. He was a hard worker. He made "[oil] rigs" all over Oklahoma during the oil boom. When they quit making wooden rigs, Jerry was out of work. He found out that they were still making rigs in South America, so he went to work for the Standard Oil Company building rigs in South America. During his second term there, for some reason, he quit his job and paid his own passage home. That was in 1929, the beginning of the Great Depression. He was 46 years old, and he never had a steady good job after that. I think the reason why he couldn't be hired was because of his age, because the companies couldn't get insurance on him.

My mother and father never did get a divorce, but they quit living together soon after that. Mama lived with first one child, and then another.

Mama and Daddy had two sons and three daughters. Mama's faith and children were all that she had. Her Christian faith sustained her through all the hard and lonesome times, and she tried to instill that faith in us.
