Five Western Mass. Men on Transport Tuscania; Two from Springfield

George R. V. Carey of Reed Street and E. J. Radasch, Jr., from This City—Soldiers from Holyoke, Deerfield and Pittsfield.

Included in the official list of those on board the *Tuscania* when she was torpedoed are the names of five Western Massachusetts men, two from this city. No word has been received regarding the fate of any of these, and friends and relatives are anxiously awaiting definite news, now expected momentarily through the War Department.

Priv. George R. V. Carey of 33 Reed Street, son of Mrs. Alice A. Carey, is registered as sailing on the *Tuscania*. Carey belonged to the 6th Battalion, 20th (Forestry) Engineers, medical detachment. When last heard from by his mother he was stationed with the 20th Engineers at Camp Washington, Washington, D. C.

Carey enlisted at the local Hampden Street recruiting station on Aug. 26. He was immediately ordered to Ft. Ethan Allen, Vt., for preliminary training. About a month later he was transferred to Camp Meade, Md., and a few months ago was moved

with his battalion to Camp Washington.

In a letter received by his mother Jan. 22 Carey hinted that he would probably be on his way to France by the time the letter reached its destination.

Springfield's other representative on the ill-fated transport was Priv. Edmund J. Radasch, Jr., son of Edmund J. Radasch, a well-known haberdasher. Mr. Radasch learned through Congressman Frederick H. Gillett last night that his son was on board the boat. This was confirmed by the published list of those on board.

Young Radasch was with F Co., 6th Battalion, 20th (Forestry) Engineers. He enlisted here about two months ago.

One Holyoke man, Priv. Earl C. Dubuque of 123 Chestnut Street, is known to have been on the *Tuscania*. Dubuque belonged to the 213th Aero Squadron.

S. W. Eager of Deerfield, a private in E Co., 6th Battalion, 20th Engineers, is on the list of those sailing.

Pittsfield learned early this morning that one of its men, Charles F. Fasce

of 100 Newell Street, was on the Tuscania. Fasce was a member of the 32d division, National Guard, mobile laboratory.

Samuel W. Eager of Deerfield has an aunt and sister living in that town. He is 28 years old and a native of Newburg, N. Y. He lived in Deerfield eight years and was engaged in farm work after coming to that town from Boston. He is a nephew of Miss Margaret McLaren Eager and a brother of Mrs. Elsa, wife of Arthur W. Ball, both of Deerfield.

Priv. Eager enlisted Dec. 11 in the forestry section of the Engineers' Corps. He was sent to Ft. Slocum and from there to Washington, D. C. He was assigned to D Co., 18th Battalion of the 20th Engineers' Corps. Later he was transferred to E Co. of the 6th Battalion.

Priv. Earle C. Dubuque, 213th Aero Squadron, whose name appears on the passenger list of the Tuscania, is a former resident of Holyoke, and lived with his mother at 113 Chestnut Street. His mother, Mrs. Zoe Dubuque, now lives in Richmond, Va., and Priv. Dubuque has a wife in Brooklyn, N. Y., to which place he went after leaving Holyoke.

Priv. Dubuque is 21 years old. He was drafted into the National Army in Brooklyn, but while waiting for his call to service obtained permission to enlist in the aviation corps.

Priv. Dubuque's mother left Holyoke early last summer. For a time she lived in Brooklyn before going to Richmond. Priv. Dubuque has a brother, Clarence A., who is employed as a plumber in Holyoke.

Still Hope for Priv. Carey,

OTHER MEN FROM AROUND HERE SAFE

Several from New England
Among Those Not Re-
ported; 36 on List of Sur-
vivors Not on Roster of
War Department.

The name of Priv. George H. M. Carey, son of Mrs. Alice Carey of 72 Reed Street, Springfield, appeared in a list of 345 passengers on the Tuscania who have not yet been reported saved. According to the best information of the War Department all except 113 of the American soldiers on board were saved, so there is still a good chance that Priv. Carey will yet be reported among the survivors. Carey was in the medical detachment, 6th Battalion, 20th Engineers.

Carey's best friend, George Clark of Hydeville, Conn., the brother of his sister's husband, a member of the aero squadron which embarked on the sunken ship, called news of his own safety Saturday. Omission of Carey's name in the cablegram has brought sadness to the Carey home, for it was believed that were Carey safe his name would have been mentioned. The family still clings to the hope that he was washed ashore in some obscure part of the Irish coast where a wireless was out of the question. Were he "up and doing?" Mrs. Carey is certain that she would have been informed so, because of her son's great and constant solicitude for her comfort when he was at home.

Priv. Carey enlisted in Dr. John M. Birnie's medical unit shortly after America's entrance in the war. Subsequently he was detached for service in the engineers, being oddly enough the only man in Dr. Birnie's command transferred to that service. He was a dental assistant having always

desired to be a dentist. Before enlistment he was employed by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

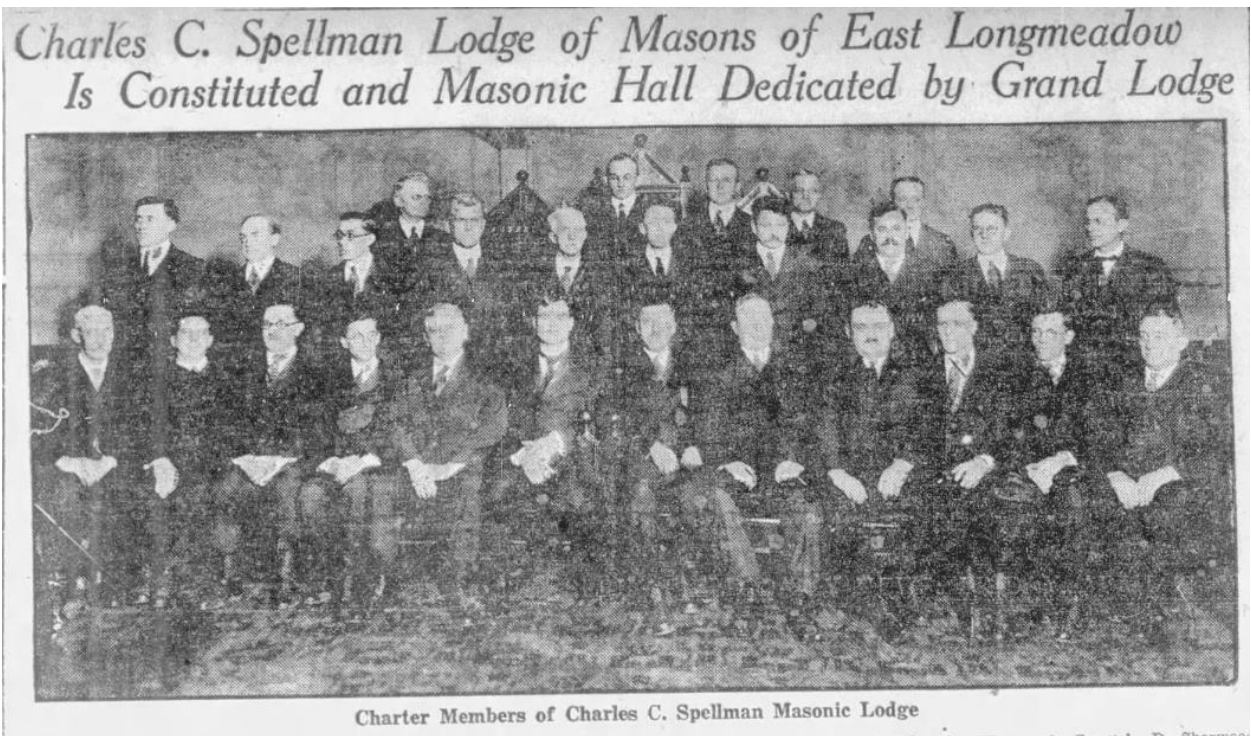
All the other Western Massachusetts men known to have been aboard the Tuscanis have been reported saved.

MOTHER HOPES TO HEAR PRIVATE CARY SAVED

She Asks Senator Weeks to
Learn If Son Sailed on the
Tuscania

No information has been received in this city to-day in regard to Private George R. V. Cary, son of Mrs Azilda L. Cary of 22 Reed street, who has been reported as missing among soldiers who were on the torpedoed Tuscania. It is thought that many of these men may have been landed at remote points on the Irish coast.

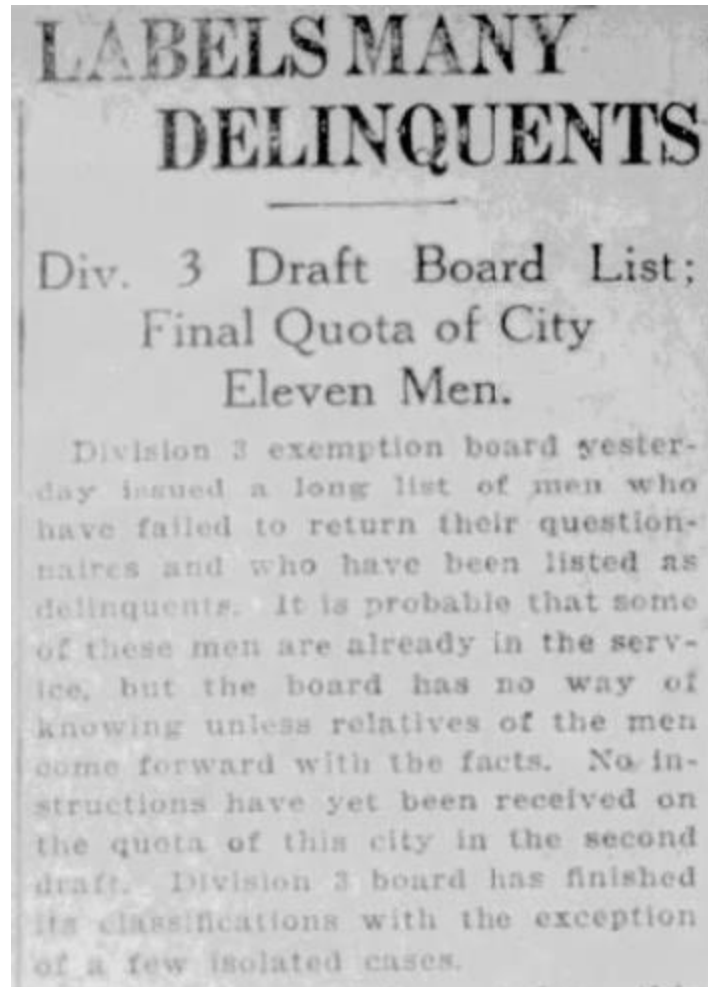
Mrs Cary has written to Senator Weeks to make certain that her son was on the sunken transport. Private Cary was attached to the medical department of the 6th battalion, 20th engineers. When his relatives in this city last heard from him Private Cary was at Camp American University in Washington, D. C. In a letter dated

January 22 he stated that Lieut Elslayer of his unit had gone to New York city and that they expected to meet him in New Jersey and board a troopship immediately.

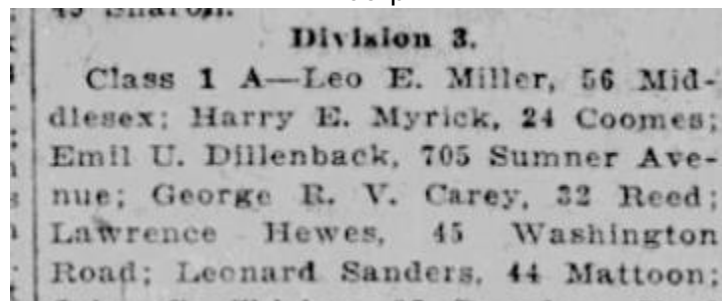
Mrs Cary is hoping to receive a cablegram, either from her son or from his chum, George Hyde, who was with an aero squadron on the torpedoed ship, announcing his safety.

Private Cary enlisted in Dr John M. Birnie's medical unit last June and was called into service in August. He was stationed first at Fort Ethan Allen, Vt., then at Camp Meade, and lastly in Washington. Before his enlistment he held a position with the Metropolitan life insurance company in this city. He was born in Stamford, Ct.

TUSCANIA SURVIVORS' LIST INCREASED 44

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—The War department last night announced the names of 44 additional soldiers who were rescued from the torpedoed liner *Tuscania* and that of one other man listed as missing, but who, it has developed, was not on the ship.

Those not previously accounted for include:

Second Lieut. Richard Warren, Waltham, Mass., and Privates Clarence H. Bradshaw, Haverhill, Mass., and George R. V. Cary, Springfield, Mass.

Edgar H. Taber, Providence, R. I., was also saved.

Only 74 American soldiers are now unaccounted for. Included in that number are the 33 unidentified dead buried on the Scottish coast.

CAREY IS SAVED

NAMED AS SURVIVOR

OF TUSCANIA DISASTER

RELATIVES GET MESSAGE

Navy Department Announces Names of 44 Additional Sol- diers Who Are Safe

Private George V. R. Carey of this city, who was at first unofficially reported lost on the Tuscania, was saved, according to word Louis Carey, a brother, received from the war department last night at the home, 22 Reed street. The telegram said: "Private George Carey saved from Tuscania."

Carey enlisted in Dr. John Birnie's medical unit last year and was subsequently stationed at Camp Washington, Washington, D. C., with the medical detachment of the 6th battalion, 20th engineers. With that organization he sailed on the Tuscania. Before enlisting he was in the employ of the Springfield office of the Metropolitan life insurance company.

The war department last night announced at Washington names of 44 additional American soldiers who were rescued from the Tuscania and that of one other man listed as missing, but, who it develops, was not on the ship. Eight of the survivors previously had been reported in Associated Press dispatches as saved. The list which includes the name of Private Carey follows:—

The war department also received by cable last night the names of five soldier victims of the Tuscania previously reported in Associated Press dispatches, and the name of one survivor which had been announced by the department some days ago.

Besides the 37 new names of survivors contained in dispatches to the department last night, 37 other men previously listed as missing were found to be survivors yesterday when the Associated Press list of Tuscania missing was checked against all available official records, leaving a total of only 74 American soldiers unaccounted for. Included in that number are the 33 unidentified dead buried on the Scottish coast.

Priv. George R. C. Cary, son of Mrs. Azilda Cary of Springfield, Mass., formerly of this borough, one of the boys on the Tuscania when the ship was torpedoed, and who was reported for a number of days as among the missing, has written to his mother. He wrote probably from Ireland, although he does not state. Cary was with the medical department of the 20th engineers. Priv. Cary wrote in part as follows:

"February 8, 1918.

"My Beloved Folks:

I am on land and very well cared for, have good sleeping quarters, plenty to eat and am among real true friends. I was on the ship Tuscania which, of course you know by this time, was torpedoed. The loss of life was very small and we were all landed without any difficulty by a destroyer at hand.

"I wish I could tell you where I am since I have so many wonderful things to tell you of. However, when I get back I shall have just so much more to tell you. The land I am in is beautiful indeed, and their winter weather is for all the world like our spring. I am sure you could hardly guess, perhaps there would be no harm in telling you, however, I mean to serve the country as best I can so shall keep mum upon the name.

"To-night I am in a small city of about 40,000 people and it cost me one penny to take a ferry from the barracks to the city, and just now I have finished a delightful supper of ham and eggs. Eggs cost eight cents a piece here and sugar is hardly obtainable. The bread is whole wheat and to me very delicious. It looks all the world like graham bread in color."

The Christmas tree, a rugged 30-foot hemlock, was erected today by the members of the fire department and will be brightly illuminated for several hours each night throughout the coming week.

Robert Warner, editor and publisher of Stafford Press, and president of the Stafford Civic association, will be master of ceremonies and has made arrangements to have Santa Claus present, with a gift for each child at the celebration. This year the firemen, besides inviting the residents of Stafford and children to see the arrival of Santa Claus, have also invited residents of four adjacent communities to join in the celebration. Oliver John Carey, aged 75 years, a carpenter, died yesterday shortly before 1 o'clock in the Johnson Memorial Hospital of a shock. Mr. Carey was working at his trade in one of Colonel W. H. 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Many years will come and go before the thunder storm of last Saturday afternoon will be forgotten by those who were in this village during its continuance. No one has any recollection of such a storm before, and men who never felt fear before are free to say that they were glad when it was over. Many a cheek was blanched with terror, and in more than one case the female operatives in the mill swooned completely away. About noon the black clouds began to gather in the west, and faster and faster the gloom began to deepen until the darkness was as intense as at midnight, while the complete stillness of the air portended something unusual about to occur. Nor did we have to wait long before our anticipations were more than realized. The storm, or storms, seemed to center direct over this village, and then the electrical display was something beyond description. It appeared to be one continuous blinding flash and roar. The lightning struck many times in the village. A large maple tree standing near the side entrance to Cyril Johnson's house; a large oak in the lot belonging to G. E. Burke was shattered; a telephone pole near the residence of Mrs. Eliza Holbrook was hit; George Jenkins' house, which was vacant at the time, was also one of the places which suffered. But

of the places which suffered, the most serious in its results was when a bolt struck the new addition to the barn of E. H. Pinney, when Wm. Green and Oliver Carey, Jr., were instantly killed. In an interview with D. K. Green on Sunday he describes the catastrophe as near as he can remember. He says that there were five of them, Mr. Snow, the contractor, Ed. Clark, Wm. Green, Oliver Carey, Jr., and himself engaged in painting E. H. Pinney's house. They had carried the blinds down under the new part to the barn, and were at work painting them when the storm came up. When it became so dark that they could no longer see to work Mr. Snow and Mr. Clark left for their homes. D. K. Green was standing between the two men, when Wm. Green pulled out his pipe and said that he was going to have a smoke while waiting. At the same time Carey asked D. K. Green to look at the back of his neck, if he could see it. At that instant, Mr. Green says, the place seemed to be all afire, and that is all he remembers until he recovered consciousness and saw the two men lying there, with the shirt front of Carey all afire. He extinguished the fire on Carey and called for help from the hay field in the rear of the barn, where G. E. Burke and a gang of men were trying to cover up the tumblers of rowen before the

up the ladders or tower before the shower. In the meantime the barn was seen to be blazing, but with the aid of operatives from the Riverside mill, which was immediately shut down, the flames were soon extinguished, without doing a great amount of damage. The men were carried outside and medical aid summoned. It was at first thought there was some life in the body of Carey, but he was probably killed as quickly as his companion, the muscles showing some little action after death. The bodies were removed to the Springs, where they both lived, and on Monday the remains of Mr. Green were taken on the train to South Coventry for burial. The funeral of Mr. Carey was held Monday afternoon, Rev. W. H. Morrall officiating, with burial in the Springs cemetery. Mr. Carey leaves a father and mother and several brothers and sisters, while Mr. Green leaves a wife and three children. Happily for his family Mr. Green had taken out a life insurance policy only nine months before for \$500. D. K. Green is still suffering from the effects of the shock, his feet and legs being badly swollen, and unable to walk.

**Were in a Barn Near Stafford Springs
when It Was Hit by Lightning.**

Stafford Springs, Sept. 6.—Oliver Carey, jr., aged 25, and William K. Green, aged 45, were instantly killed on a farm two miles from here during a severe storm yesterday afternoon. They were painting a barn when the storm came up and sought shelter on a ladder beneath a shed. A bolt of lightning struck the barn and killed them instantly. A third man was in the barn, but he escaped uninjured. Both the men who were killed reside in this place and leave families here.

The storm was the worst of its kind that was ever known here. Hail fell in large quantities and a severe wind storm accompanied the electrical display. It is believed that crops in this vicinity have suffered immeasurably and the fruit trees are greatly damaged.

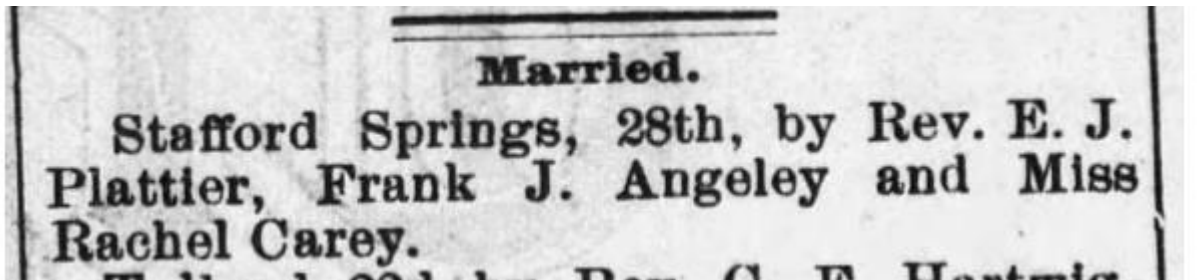
