Leland Vining Clark of Old Harbor Road in North Chatham died on August 18 in the Cape Cod Hospital after a short illness. Mr. Clark was 77 years of age. He was the husband of the late Dorris (Livingston) Clark.

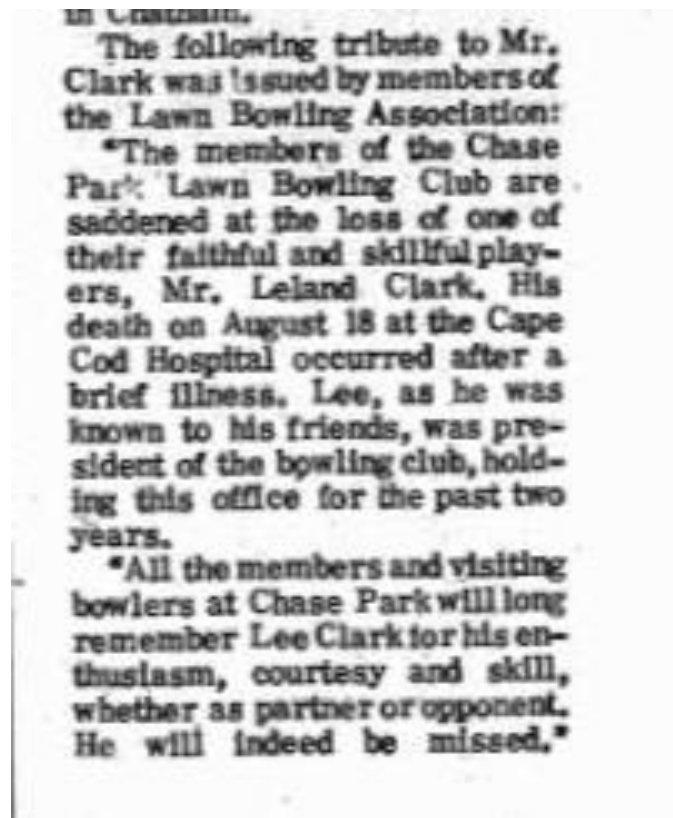
Born in North Abington, Mr. Clark was the son of the late Frederick W. and Carrie (Vining) Clark. He was manager of the Connecticut Power and Light Company in Waterbury, Connecticut for many years before retiring to Chatham in 1958.

DEFENSE CLASS FORMING HERE

Factories Join In Effort To Teach Special Engineer- ing Courses

Waterbury, New Haven Men Suffer Minor Injuries; Working On Sewage Disposal Plant

Two men were slightly burned at 9:55 o'clock this morning while at work on the construction of the borough's sewage plant at the southern end of Naugatuck when a crane came in contact with a high tension wire.

Taken to St. Mary's Hospital and released after treatment were Walter Spencer, 25, 342 Norton street, New Haven, and Philip Rinaldi, 31, of 44 Warner Place, Waterbury.

Spencer, the crane operator, was treated by Dr. Leo Tylec of Naugatuck for first and second degree burns of the left palm and large toe of the right foot.

Rinaldi was treated by Dr. Rudolph Damiani of Waterbury for first and second degree burns of the left hand and lacerations of the lower lip.

According to Anthony Kruge, Eagle street, Ansonia, superintendent of work for the DeFonce Construction Co., builders of the project, Spencer was moving the crane when it came in touch with a 13,000 volt line of the Conn. Light & Power Co. and was immediately thrown to the ground from his seat, a distance of about four feet.

Rinaldi, a helper, went to the aid of Spencer, Kruge stated, and thrown to the ground when he touched him.

Though Rinaldi was knocked down, he pulled Spencer clear of contact with the crane, which permitted fellow workers to rush to the aid of both and apply artificial respiration. Neither man was unconscious at any time, it was reported.

Kruege said that a call was put in for the police ambulance and it arrived within minutes. Officer Joseph Farren driving.

The men were then rushed to the hospital. Conn. L. & P. men were working on the task of clearing the crane from the wire at noon and work at the project was expected to resume later in the day.

Supt. Kruege was particularly grateful to the Police Department for their prompt action in arriving on the scene so soon after being called. He stated repeatedly and warmly that he was "very proud of them."

Miraculous Escape

L. V. Clark of the Connecticut Light and Power Company told the News today that 13,000 volts would normally kill a person instantly, and added that the two men "escaped miraculously."

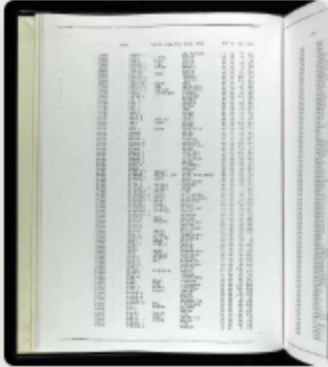

Fledgling Photographers Study Hobby in Classroom

**Boys' Camera Club At Avon Old Farms School
Became Regular Course, and Now Results
Are in New York Exhibit**

By BARBARA ATWOOD.

Photography may be blacker than black magic to the wild tribes of unexplored continents; it may be a headache to the perspiring parent with a new baby and a new camera, it may be an art and means of livelihood to the magazine illustrator. To a dozen boys at Avon Old Farms School it's a hobby so fascinating it has become a regular course in the art department, and to the instructor it's a splendid means of teaching art.

The whole thing began with a camera club, five boys and the instructor, in 1933. It went on to a twice-a-week class in 1936, with two exhibits at the school every year and exchange exhibits with camera clubs at other schools. This year it culminated in a 10-boy show of 50 prints at the Ferargil Gallery, 63 East 57th Street, New York, that gallery's first show of photographs and also its first show of pictures not for sale.

The camera club proved extremely popular. Its membership increased, the members' demands on the faculty advisor, Paul Cushing Child, grew. Photography, Mr. Child says, is not something you can do from 10 to 11:30 on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and forget the rest of the week: It's practically continuous. So the boys' hobby club became a class, and the art instructor began teaching design and composition and other fundamentals with cameras in place of pencils and paintbrushes.

There were, presently, two school exhibits of the boys' photographs at the school each year, one at Thanksgiving and one in May, on Founder's Day. There were also exchange exhibits with camera clubs of other schools—Avon, Mr. Child says, is the only preparatory school which teaches photography. This year, during the week of March 27, there was the New York show. The next thing, if plans now under way go through successfully, will be inclusion of photographs by Avon Old Farms boys in a display at the New York World's Fair, under the auspices of the American Institute of Science, which has a space reserved for the work of boys, and which helps boys, for the most part high school students, in starting clubs related to the various sciences.

Four Connecticut boys are members of Mr. Child's class: Carrington Bidgood, who is 14 years old, son of Dr. and Mrs. Charles Y. Bidgood of West Hartford; Edward Clark, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leland V. Clark of Woodbury; Dewey Nelson, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold C. Nelson of West Suffield and Sydney Self, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sydney Self of New Canaan.

Bidgood's print at the New York show was of the facade of the Old Town Hall at West Hartford. Clark takes record photographs of architectural subjects, and pictures of workmen, working. Mr. Child describes his pictures as "straightforward and documentary, often with social significance." "Skippy" Self takes pictures of children; his younger sisters often serve as models. Last summer he made more than \$100 taking pictures of children's clothes, with youngsters in the neighborhood for models, for a New York store. He bought a new camera and equipped his own dark room.

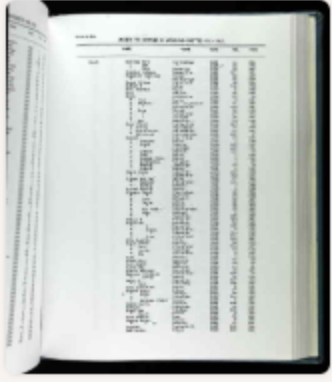

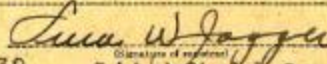

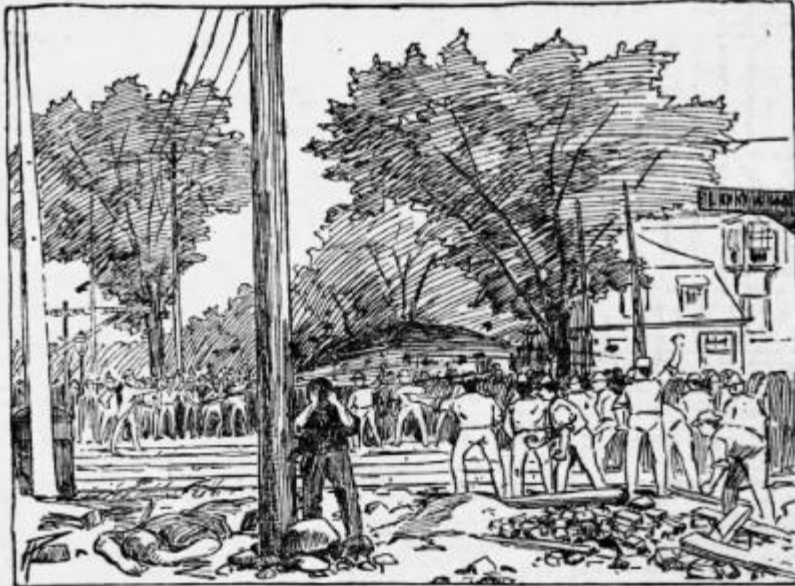

Shovel Blades, Paving Stones, Clubs, Pickaxes and
Rifles Cause Some Serious Wounds.



RIOT AT THE RAILROAD CROSSING.

NORTH ABINGTON, Aug 16—War, grim, earnest war was waged here in North Abington this afternoon.

It was a battle, realistic to a substantial degree, brimful of desperate charges, retreats, flank movements, sanguinary also, and worthy of record for the supreme generalship on the part of the leaders of the contending parties.

Two great corporate bodies contested for supremacy, and contested long and furiously, and at the end both were satisfied and both marched away with the spirits and cheers of victors.

On one hand was the large New York, New Haven & Hartford company, with all its immediate resources, and on the other was the thrifty village of North Abington, supported by the town of Abington with all the patriotic adherents that a prosperous manufacturing town has always in its midst.

These were the opposing commands.
The cause?

Well, it was all over a grade crossing, where North av, the main street, crosses the tracks of the Plymouth division of the New York, New Haven & Hartford.

The railroad said the Abington & Rockland electric railway shall not cross one of our tracks at the North Abington station.

"We will not allow them to encroach upon our property," and the powerful railroad corporation prepared to maintain the position it thought was right.

The electric railway responded, "We will cross your tracks. We have the authority from the court."

He was taken prisoner and was held in Libby and Andersonville prisons for nearly 16 months, being released at the close of the war in such an emaciated condition that his life was despaired of. He served as postmaster of South Weymouth for a term of four years under President Harrison's administration, and for 16 years was the treasurer of the South Weymouth savings bank. He at one time engaged in the ice business, but of late years operated extensively in real estate.

Mr Vining was a member of post 58, G. A. R., Orphan's Hope lodge, A. F. and A. M., Pentalpha chapter, R. A. M., South Shore commandery, K. T., and the 1st artillery veteran association. He was connected with the Union Congregational church. Besides his wife he leaves a son, Herbert F. Vining, and two daughters, Mrs Fred W. Clark of North Abington and Mrs Alvin T. Reed of this town. The funeral will take place at his late home on Columbian st Sunday afternoon at 2.

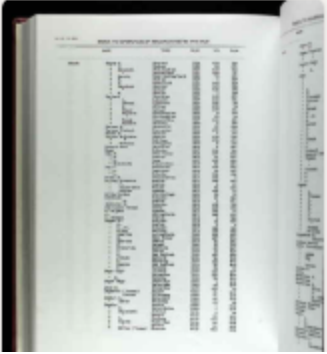

"Boston Globe" 9 Feb 1918 p 2 - Fred W. Clark of North Abington received telegram today that son Lt. Leland V. Clark is safe in Londonderry, Ireland. Member 100th Aero Squadron.

Served 18 months in France. Was a licensed pilot after the war but did not fly.

Post-war:

From 1919 to 1922 was an engineer with Lockwood, Greene & Co.

According to his obituary, began his employment at Connecticut Power & Light in 1922, originally stationed at Waterbury CT, then moved to New Britain CT, where he was assistant manager in charge of industrial power engineering.

"Hartford (CT) Courant" 12 Jan 1929 p 12 – at the East Berlin PTA meeting, the speaker will be L.V. Clark of CT Light & Power Co. speaking on "Electricity and Its Application." As an electrical engineer, he is well versed in matters pertaining to the study of electricity.

"Hartford (CT) Courant" 19 Jan 1929 p 5 – The Parent Teacher Association of East Berlin held its monthly meeting at Hubbard School. First meeting of the year, and there was a large attendance. The speaker was L.V. Clark, assistant manager of CT Light & Power Co.

"Hartford (CT) Courant" 16 Aug 1938 p 4 – L.V. Clark, assistant manager of the Connecticut Light & Power Co., said the reason for 5 minutes of darkness on 15 Aug, when temperatures were still in the 80s – "a sizzling day" - following a high temperature of 96 degrees, was the failure of a major transformer bank at the Freight Street powerhouse. A reserve transformer bank was turned on as soon as possible. Hospitals have their own power sources.

Listed in Wallingford CT city directory 1951 at 352 Walnut St. – Dorris L. & Leland V. Clark

"Naugatuck (CT) Daily News" 9 Sep 1952 p 1 – L.V. Clark of the Connecticut Light & Power Co., said the 2 men who came in contact with a power line "escaped miraculously" since 13,000 volts can kill instantly. The two workers were slightly burned at 9:55 a.m. while working on the borough's sewage plant at the south end of Naugatuck. Crane operator Spencer came in contact with the line, which threw him down 4 feet. Helper Rinaldi was also thrown to the ground when he touched Spencer, but was able to pull him away so he could be assisted. The men were taken to the hospital.

Retired in 1958 from Connecticut Power & Light & moved to Chatham, Barnstable MA. Served as president of the Chase Park Lawn Bowling Association for 2 years.
