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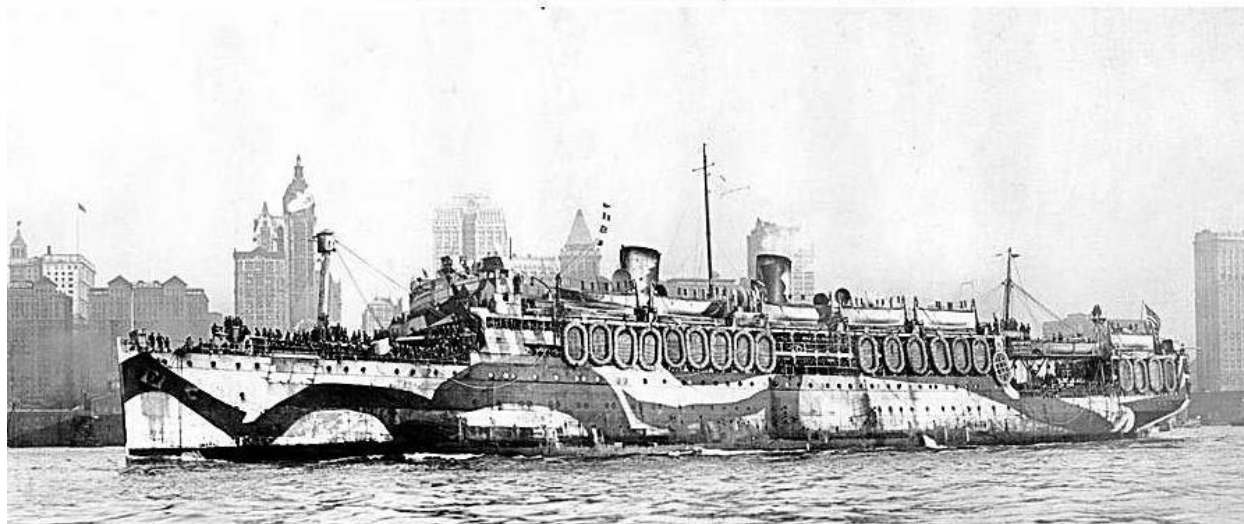

A beautiful wedding was that of Miss Ada Belle Rutledge and William Erwin Howell, which took place quietly on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock in the study of the Highland Park Baptist church. The Rev. Dr. J. B. Phillips officiated, using the simple ring service. Only the families and a few close friends were present.

The bride was lovely in a costume of beige and navy blue flat crepe. The skirt was finely pleated and finished with a velvet sash at the side. Her hat was a picture model of beige and navy blue hair braid, trimmed with flowers. Other accessories were also of beige.

Following the ceremony the couple left for a southern motor trip. Upon their return they will reside in their own home on Cherokee hill, South Missionary ridge.

For traveling Mrs. Howell wore a charming costume of monkey skin crepe satin, fashioned on straight lines, her coat also being of the same material, with hat and accessories of a blonde shade.

News of the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. Howell will come as a surprise to their many friends, as no previous announcement had been made. The wedding date was planned for the latter part of June, but the date was changed so that Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Howell of Dallas, Tex., parents of the groom, who are in Chattanooga on a visit, might attend the wedding.

Mrs. Howell is the daughter of Mrs. Laura F. Rutledge and the late N. B. Rutledge. Through her charming personality she has won a wide circle of friends in educational and church circles. Mrs. Howell received her education in the Georgia State College for Women and Middle State Normal. After her graduation she accepted a position as teacher in the Hamilton county schools, later entering the city schools of Chattanooga, where she has rendered valuable service as a teacher and community worker.

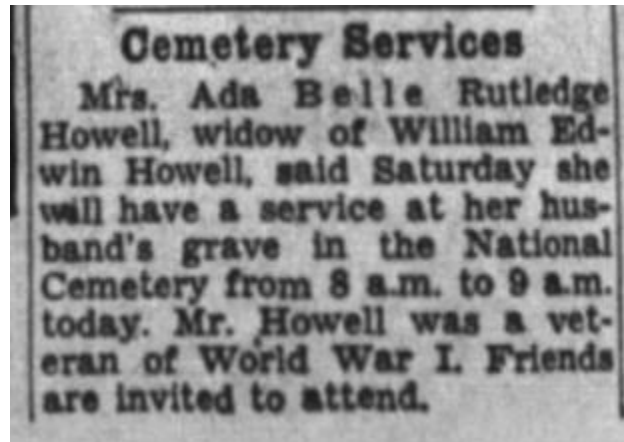

Ada Belle is the daughter of Mrs. Laura F. Rutledge & the late N.B. Rutledge. Was educated at the GA State College for Women & Middle State Normal. She taught in the Hamilton County schools & later the city schools of Chattanooga. William received his A.B. degree from Texas Christian University & graduated in 1925 from the Chattanooga College of Law. During the world war he served as a field clerk with the Signal Corps of the 1st Division. He is now connected with the law firm of Austin & Bernhardt. – Their license was obtained 17 Mar 1927 – according to the newspaper story they were married 18 Mar 1927 – a marriage date of 19 Mar 1927 is also recorded.

Notes:

Family trees list a 1st wife named Mittie Elizabeth Martin (b. 1892) whom a William E. Howell married 18 Dec 1907 in Cross Co. AR. This couple had a son named Fred Edward Howell, b. 11 Apr 1910 in rural Colt, St. Francis AR.

The 1910 census for Telico, St. Francis AR lists William Howell, 21 TX, father b. VA, mother b. OK & Mittie, 18 TX, father b. TN, mother b. TX with son Frederick E. (1 month AR). This William is a farmer, general farm & Mittie is a farm laborer on the home farm.

Returned with “effort syndrome”:

DAH means disorderly action of the heart, sometimes called “effort syndrome” or “soldier’s heart”. Often the result of stress or fatigue, it does not imply there was any organic disease.

From “Medical Diseases of the War” by Sir Arthur F. Hurst (London: Edward Arnold, 1918):

Da Costa's syndrome is a syndrome with a set of symptoms that are similar to those of heart disease. While a physical examination does not reveal any gross physiological abnormalities, orthostatic intolerance has been noted. It was originally thought to be a heart condition, and treated with a predecessor to modern cardiac drugs. While the condition was eventually recategorized as psychiatric, in modern times, it is known to represent several disorders, some of which now have a known medical basis.

The condition was named after Jacob Mendes Da Costa, who investigated and described the disorder during the American Civil War. It is also variously known as cardiac neurosis, chronic asthenia, effort syndrome, functional cardiovascular disease, neurocirculatory asthenia, primary neurasthenia, subacute asthenia and irritable heart.

Lewis described “Soldiers Heart and the Effort Syndrome”² in soldiers in World War I (1919). He realized that the “effort syndrome” involved a very mixed group (unrecognized infection, convalescence, a small group with incipient but unrecognized heart disease), but dealt with large groups with constitutional weakness (nervous, physical or both) or those “played out” by exposure and strain. He recommended an attitude of deferred judgment and inquiry when considering cause.

He discussed breathlessness, noted vital capacity to be only a little below normal, and suspected an alteration in the character of the blood (acidosis as produced by CO₂ or lactic acid) as a causative factor. Fatigue was an almost universal complaint, with symptoms those which were found in healthy subjects submitted to strenuous exercise. Chest pain was common, frequently was referred to the left side of the chest (the precordium), described as an ache or soreness, frequently exercise related. Palpitation was a frequent complaint — “rapid and energetic heart action” in the majority, occasionally effort related extrasystoles, and rarely paroxysmal tachycardia or atrial fibrillation. Excessive heart rates were found in most of these subjects, and . . . “the pulse shows an exaggerated reaction to posture.” The blood pressure was “rarely more or less than normal.”

Describing the signs and symptoms as contrasted with those of heart disease, Lewis commented “it is because these symptoms and signs are largely, in some cases wholly, the exaggerated physiological responses to exercise . . . that I term the whole the ‘effort syndrome’.”

Most of the soldiers came from sedentary occupations and a large percentage of the patients was affected by the condition in civil life many years before joining the Army. Many showed defective development; "in some the chest is long and narrow, or flattened and associated with a kyphotic curve; in others there is general under-development . . ."

" . . . amongst any large group of patients who suffer from the 'effort syndrome' a number is discovered in which nervous manifestations are more or less prominent . . . that the syndrome is produced by a primary defect of the nervous system is not likely. Nevertheless a proportion of the patients whom I include in the group effort syndrome sooner or later acquires the diagnosis of neurasthenia."

Grant³ reported on the five year after-histories of 665 men suffering from the effort syndrome in 1925, following a program initiated by Lewis in 1915. One interesting facet concerned the cardiac findings. In 266 cases the heart was reported as being entirely normal. "An apical systolic murmur was present in 233 cases, in 208 of these the murmur was not conducted; in the remaining 25 cases it was noted as being loud and being conducted to the axilla." However, the incidence of "definite cardiac disease" was no greater in patients with cardiac physical signs than among those whose hearts were entirely normal.

By 1933, Lewis⁴ reflected that " . . . the syndrome is not peculiarly . . . a soldiers (sic) malady or an athletes (sic) malady; it is one of the commonest chronic affections of sedentary town dwellers." He thought that possibly several distinct but similar syndromes were being confused, and realized that "for the moment useful subdivision cannot be affected."

Was William divorced? Does this explain why a wife is not mentioned in his obituary? Except his widow Ada Belle holds a memorial service 4 years later at his grave. "Chattanooga (TN) Daily Times" Wednesday 27 Jun 1945 page 11 – divorce granted: Ada Belle Howell from William E. Howell.
