FARMERS ENTERTAIN RACINE SOLDIERS

**HIRAM JAMES SAYS THE BOYS
WERE GIVEN RARE TREAT ON
THANKSGIVING BY THE TIL-
LERS OF THE SOIL.**

R. M. Beeston has received a letter from Hiram James, now a first-class private of Ambulance Co. No. 2, Camp MacArthur, Waco, Tex., and in this letter, Mr. James tells how a large number of the boys passed Thanksgiving day. Through the efforts of the Y. M. C. A., the farmers around Waco invited a number of soldiers for dinner, Mr. James wrote.

"The farmers saw to it that we got enough to eat. Why, when they got through with the different courses, the boys couldn't have eaten any more if they had wanted to. We had six of our army trucks to take us out—there were 120 of us. Forty stopped at Hewitt, while the remainder went on to Goroing, about ten miles farther.

"We took a band with us and had a great time. The farmers were waiting with autos and wagons to take us to their different homes, where we passed a most delightful day.

"Back at camp, the officers and men sat down together to a good turkey dinner."

Mr. James is teaching two French classes, one in the Y. M. C. A., and the other in his ambulance company.

Bottle Bobs Up in Guernsey

Racine has quite a colony of Guernseyites, residents or descendants of one of the channel islands off England. Although their "get-togethers" have dwindled during the past few years, many of the families continue to take an interest in what happens on the scenic and colorful island and take trips back to see "cousins" and other relatives. Names like Mauger, Priaulx, Prinz, LePoidevin, Pomeroy, Langlois, James Carre, are linked to the Guernsey, Jersey and Alderney channel isles, which are closer to France than to England.

Mr. and Mrs. Alfred James of 1514 Holmes Ave., long-time residents of Racine but natives of Guernsey (She was a Mauger) sent along this note:

"Dear Alice:

This cutting was in the Guernsey evening paper. . . . Wondered if you are interested in reading it. We read your articles in our paper. Hope you are keeping well. Alf and I are both well.

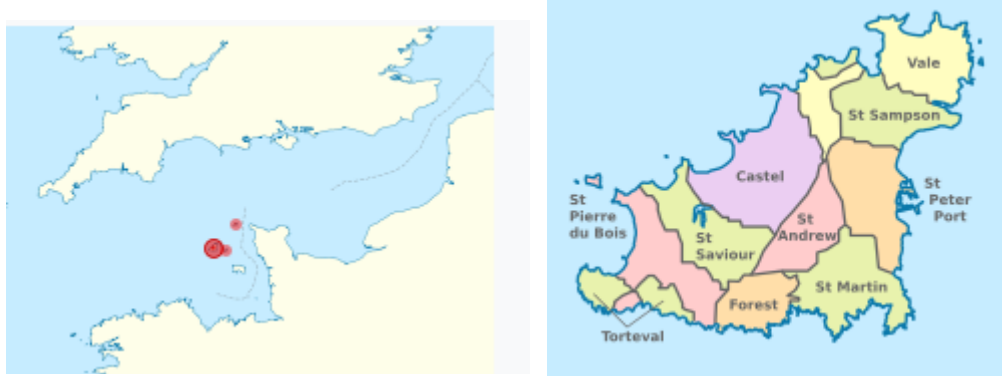

Notes: Hiram was born on the island of Guernsey, which is off the coast of France, and is a British crown dependency, not part of the United Kingdom itself. The island has a mixed population of English & French ethnic backgrounds. It is the second-largest of the Channel Islands & has 10 parishes. Some of Hiram's siblings have a birthplace in St. Sampson parish, which lies in the northeast part of the island.

In the 1891 census of England & Wales, Hiram resides in Dartmouth, Devon, England.

In the 1901 Channel Islands census, the family is residing on Corvee Road in Vale parish, Guernsey, which is the parish adjacent to St. Sampson. His mother's surname and the surnames of her parents are of French origin; Hiram taught French when he was stationed in TX.

An article in the "Racine (WI) Journal Times" Wednesday 12 Jul 1972 p 10 (copied above) said that Racine WI was home to many people from the Channel Islands, citing the names Mauger & Langlois as examples of names from the area.

Wartime:

"Green Bay (WI) Press-Gazette" 8 Feb 1918 p 7 – on board: Hiram James, 1st Sanitary Square, private M.D., Racine WI

"Dayton (OH) Daily News" 10 Feb 1918 p 2 – Hiram James was rescued

Post-war:

Naturalized 17 Nov 1919 Racine WI because he had served as a soldier.

Hiram seems to have had a good singing voice and performed and organized entertainments in Racine WI post-war. He belonged to the Sons of St. George (for men of British descent) and at least 1 of his sisters belonged to the women's group, the Daughters of St. George. Some of the citations:

"Racine (WI) Journal Times" 14 Nov 1919 p 9 – Hiram James performed a solo at the Sons of St. George.

"Racine (WI) Journal Times" Monday 17 Nov 1919 p 7 – there was a British invasion last Saturday when the Isaac Taylor lodge of the Sons of St. George hosted the lodges of the Illinois district, which includes Chicago, Milwaukee, Kenosha & Racine. The community singing was directed by Hiram James, a "well known vocalist of Racine" who was in excellent voice. Among those receiving gold service pins for service in Allied forces in the war was Hiram James.

"Racine (WI) Journal Times" Wednesday 7 Jan 1920 p 7 – Hiram James was in charge of entertainment for the Sons of St. George & Daughters of St. George & also performed.

"Racine (WI) Journal Times" Thursday 5 May 1921 p 9 – Holy Innocents Church held a variety show Tuesday. Appearing in "Dolly Dollars" was Hiram James as the suitor; he also appeared in a playlet. Mr. James & Miss James deserve credit for the fine event.

In the early 1920s he was president of the Horlick Soccer Club of Racine WI.

"Kenosha (WI) News" 21 Oct 1920 p 8 – Hiram James, president of the Horlick Soccer Club of Racine, and player Jack Tarro were arrested for trespassing in Zion when they showed up on the field to play the Lacemakers. They were fine \$5 & costs. The chief of police & mayor [city not named] had said they should not go to Zion.

Then Hiram seemed to become a religious speaker.

"Kenosha (WI) News" Monday 6 Feb 1933 p 4 – Hiram James will speak at the Baha'i Community Hall tonight in the 1st of a series of letters explaining the Baha'i faith & its 12 basic principles. [there are several subsequent articles about these speeches]

"Racine (WI) Journal Times" Sunday 5 Feb 1933 p 1 – there were 3 men from Racine on Tuscania. One was Hiram James of 3600 Wright Ave., who lived at 1605 Morton Ave. when he enlisted.

"Racine (WI) Journal Times" 6 Aug 1940 p 8 – Mr. & Mrs. Hiram James of NYC returned home yesterday about a week's visit with Hiram's relatives.

After retiring, Hiram appeared often in the Hartford CT newspaper for his frequent appearances at Clinton CT political & school board meetings in the 1970s. He is described as the retiree who opposed all spending proposals, the "most outspoken critic," "obviously a veteran of many New England Town Meetings" and "a perennial 'Nay Sayer'."

"Meriden (CT) Journal" Saturday 22 Feb 1975 p 8 – a testimonial dinner for Department Commander Hiram James is being planned by the Silver City Barracks #2479 Veterans of WWI.
