Surviving members of "Baraboo's 21," who escaped alive when the troopship, Tuscania, was sunk in World War I, with a loss of 147 American lives, will hold a dinner and smoker at Baraboo Saturday on the 31st anniversary of the sinking of the ship. Among the 2,030 American soldiers aboard the transport when it was sunk by a German submarine Feb. 5, 1918, off the coast of Ireland were 21 Baraboo soldiers. Fifteen of the 21 are alive but one of them, Wayland Kier, now lives in Montana. The other 14 are expected to attend the reunion in the Baraboo Legion club. Cables Sister He Is Safe.

Janesville, Wis., Feb. 9.—Charles Kellogg of Baraboo, a member of Company D, One Hundred and Seventh supply train, who was on the Tuscania, has cabled his sister from Ireland that he is safe. Herschel North, son of Rev. T. W. North of Edgerton, a member of the One Hundred and Seventh engineers, who enlisted at Calumet, Mich., also was on the transport. No word has been received from him. No other Rock county men are known to have been on the Tuscania.

JANESVILLE BOY ON TUSCANIA NOW SAFE AT PORT IN IRELAND

Word Received This Morning Telling
of The Safe Arrival of Charles
Kellogg, Former High
School Student

One Janesville young man is numbered among the troops aboard the ill-fated 'Tuscania', when it was torpedoed by a German submarine off the coast of Ireland, according to reports which have been received from various sources. Charles Kellogg, a member of Co. D, 107th supply train, and a former student of the local high school was on the boat at the time it was sunk, but a report, this morning, received by relatives, stated that he was now safe in Ireland.

Kellogg formerly lived at Baraboo, and enlisted from that city last spring, at the time so many entered the service. He was then sent to Camp McArthur at Waco, Texas, where he was in training for several months previous to his entrainment for an eastern port, and the trip across the Atlantic. Just previous to his sailing, he wrote a letter to Mrs. Cornelius Mahoney, 326 South Locust street, and told of his sailing on the 'Tuscania'. Relatives and friends awaited word from him anxiously, and were awarded this morning by the news that he was safe in Ireland.

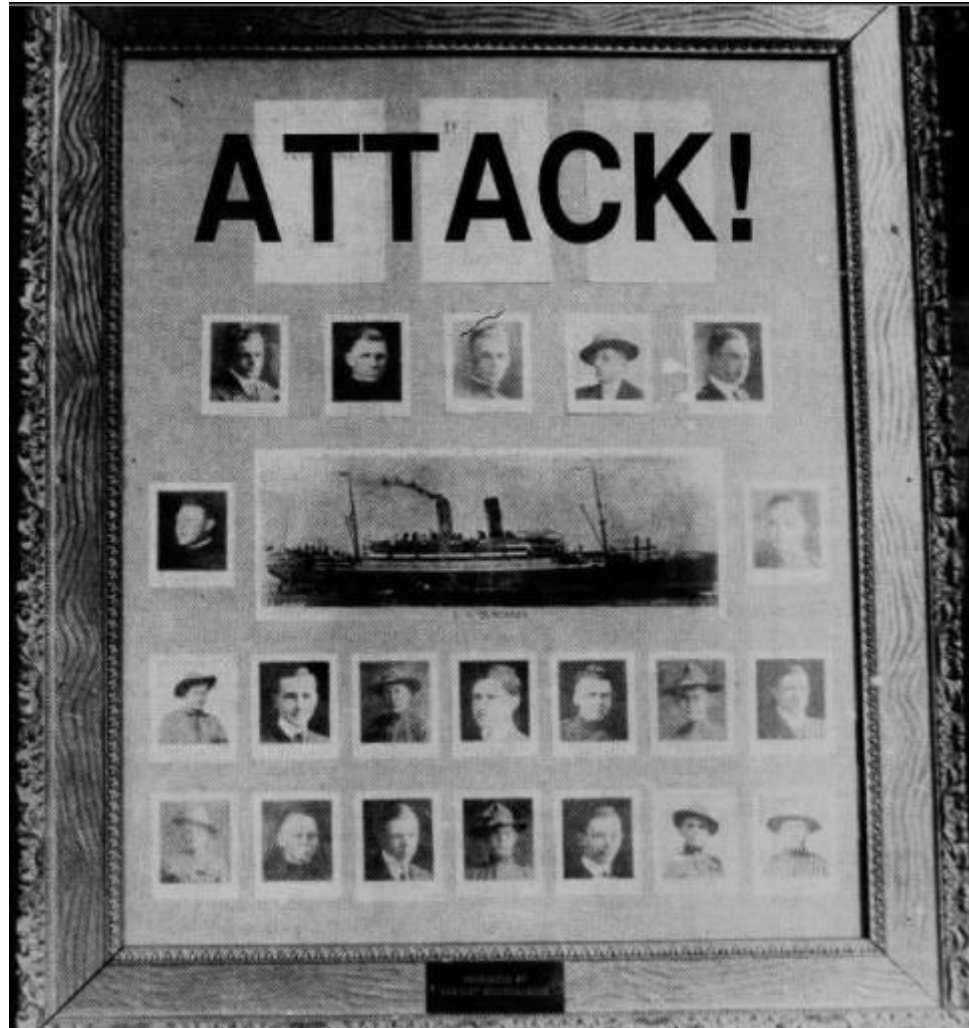
The young man came to this city from Baraboo, and attended the local high school until the time of his enlistment. He is twenty years of age, and a brother of Mrs. Albert Mahoney of this city.

BARABOO—A reunion of Baraboo service men who were on board the Tuscania was held on the ninth anniversary of the sinking of the ship at the local armory on Saturday night. Twenty-one Baraboo boys were on board the Tuscania when she was sunk by a German torpedo off the Irish coast. Those who were present at the reunion Saturday were Earl L. Powell, Herbert G. Steckenbauer, Randall Herfort, Otto Arndt, Arthur Bender, E. W. Coughlin, Paul L. Stewart, James Bray, George Hattle, V. E. Caffisch, and Otto F. Bates. All of the Baraboo men were saved but two died over-seas, Donald Duncan and Russell Brodie. Others who were on board but who could not attend the reunion were Horace Cahoon, Charles Kellogg, R. L. Mahler, R. L. Sanderson, Earl Veerhusen, Walter E. Kier, J. T. O'Brien and Clarence Braun.

Baraboo Tuscania Survivors Reunite

100 Attend Annual Meeting of Veterans at Legion Hall

BARABOO — About 100 Baraboo men gathered at the American Legion hall Saturday night to attend the annual reunion of "Baraboo's 21," the group of local boys who were aboard the Tuscania when the American transport was sunk off the Irish coast by a German U-boat on Feb. 5, 1918.

Those honored at the reunion Saturday night were Otto Arndt, Paul L. Stewart, George W. Hattle, Beloit; Arthur Bender, Earl L. Powell, Otto F. Bates, Horace C. Cahoon, Madison; E. W. Coughlin, Herbert Steckenbauer, Randall M. Herfort, Charles Kellogg, Janesville; Richard Mahler, Maywood, Ill.; Earl W. Veerhusen, Milwaukee; James F. Bray, Arthur H. Thayer, John T. O'Brien, Milwaukee, and Clarence Braun, Wayland Kier, who resides in Montana, could not be present.

Four of the original 21 in the group have passed away: Russell Brodie died of pneumonia on his return from over-seas; Donald Duncan died in France of influenza; Ralph Sanderson passed away in Texas three years ago, and Vernon E. Caffisch died in Baraboo a year ago.

This was the fifth annual reunion which the Baraboo boys have held.

Tuscania Survivors Hold Meeting

BARABOO—Carrying on a tradition of 25 years, "Baraboo's 21," survivors of the sinking of the Tuscania 25 years ago, met at dinner at the Warren hotel Saturday night. When a German torpedo sent the transport to the bottom of the Irish sea, the 21 Baraboo men aboard were saved, and each year since then they have held a reunion. True, the 21 were never all present for two of them lost their lives in the first World war, and others have since died.

Those who hoped to be present Saturday night were Paul L. Stewart, James F. Bray, Otto Arndt, Herbert Steckenbauer, Earl Powell, Edward Coughlin, Otto Bates, Arthur Thayer, Randall Herfort, Clarence Braun, all of Baraboo; Horace Cahoon, Wisconsin Dells; Earl Veerhusen, Milwaukee; Richard Mahler, Maywood, Ill.; and Charles Kellogg, Janesville. Only other surviving member of the group is Wayland Kier, who resides in Montana and could not be here.

BARABOO—A unique reunion was held here on Saturday, bringing together all surviving members of the "Baraboo's 21", a group of World War I veterans who were aboard the Tuscania when it was sunk by the enemy in Irish waters.

All of the Baraboo veterans reached the Irish coast in safety and every year since the end of the war they have held a reunion here. The get-together dinner was served at the Ritz and ceremonies included depositing a wreath in the Baraboo river while taps were blown in memory of departed comrades.

Check with Army on Local Burglary

Rock county officials were communicating with Fort Sheridan officers today to ascertain whether the two army prisoners who escaped from there may have been the same ones who stole a car at Rockford and then abandoned it behind the Charles Kellogg tavern after looting the building early Thursday. The sheriff's department had received a radio message that the two soldiers escaped Wednesday afternoon, later stealing a car in which they presumably headed for Wisconsin. Several fingerprints were obtained at the scene as well as some footprints.

Second Rural Tavern Victim of Burglars

Theft of coins from vending machines and juke box at the White House tavern, on Pleasant street at the west city limits was reported to the sheriff's department here Sunday by Charles Kellogg. The break-in was discovered at 2 p. m. Saturday by Earl Williams who operates the Williams Auto Parts next to the tavern.

In many ways the burglary paralleled the breaking and entering at the Club Derby, a tavern at the north city limits on U.S. Highway 14, where the music coin boxes, vending machines and game machines were wrecked to remove coins. The loot there Friday night also included five dozen colored Easter eggs.

At the White House tavern the thief apparently suffered a cut finger, probably on the left hand. Blood stains were found in several spots in the tavern.

Entrance was gained by breaking a glass in the front door and then unlocking a self-lock from the inside. A pinball machine, cigaret vending machine and record player were broken open and the coin boxes removed. The loss is unknown except for the cigaret machine, where 34 packages of cigarets or the equivalent in 25-cent pieces was taken. A rear door was found open, apparently the exit for the thief.

It is the second burglary loss at the White House tavern this month. On March 1, a burglary was reported there. At that time a box of cigars, two phonograph records, cigarets and money from a pinball machine were taken.

Elmer Horton, route 2, Evansville, reported the theft of three guns and a hunting knife from a house on the old Harry Topp farm near Evansville recently. The house where the guns were stored is vacant and was not locked, he said. Included was a 12-gauge shotgun and antique over-under gun with wire stock and a pearl handled .22 calibre revolver, a Civil war period relic.

Arrested on a tip provided by one of his alleged victims, Terence Denny, 23, Rockford, withheld plea to six counts of passing worthless checks in Janesville and rural Rock county. Sheriff E. A. Silverthorn, who made the arrest, said Denny was driving a car which he admitted had been stolen from a private garage in Rockford Oct. 12. He had lived in a Janesville motel for more than a week.

He is charged with passing checks amounting to \$95 in Janesville and nearby rural taverns since Oct. 24. The name of a Janesville attorney was signed to most of the checks. Mrs. Charles Kellogg, wife of a tavernkeeper who had cashed two of the checks, made the first complaint and gave the sheriff's department information as to where Denny could be found.

HEIR TO FORTUNE OF MANY THOUSANDS

The body of Arthur Kellogg, who died suddenly at the Portage hospital Thursday night, was taken to Baraboo for burial Friday afternoon. The deceased was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Kellogg who lived in Baraboo a great many years. The invention of A. N. Kellogg grew into great proportions and made for him a fortune. Not many months ago his widow, Mrs. Alfred Dale, died in New York and left the greater portion of the fortune, reported to be \$1,250,000, to Arthur Kellogg and his cousins, the two sons and two daughters of Chauncey W. Kellogg, now residing in Baraboo. The money has not yet come from the estate and death has overtaken the former Baraboo resident just a short time before the wealth was due to arrive.

Mrs. Kellogg, widow of A. W. Kellogg, founder of the ready print business, died recently in New York state, leaving an estate valued at \$1,250,000. In her will the fortune is left to eight heirs, five of whom reside in Baraboo—two nieces and three nephews. According to the will each will receive about \$150,000. One of the heirs, Arthur Kellogg, is proprietor of a livery stable in that city and the others reside on a farm near there. A. W. Kellogg was one of the pioneers of Baraboo and started the Baraboo Republic. During the war, it was almost impossible to secure help, and Mr. Kellogg went to Madison and had one side of his paper printed there, thus he conceived the idea of the ready print business, which netted him a fortune.

■ **Dr. G.S. Avery Jr. dies:** Dr. George Sherman Avery Jr., a plant physiologist who headed the Brooklyn Botanic Garden from 1944 to 1969, died Friday at Greentree Manor Convalescent

Center in New London, Conn. He was 92 and lived in Quaker Hill, Conn.

He had been in declining health in recent years, said Elizabeth Scholtz, who was the Botanic Garden's director from 1972 to 1980.

Before becoming director, Avery, whose Ph.D. was from the University of Wisconsin, was the director of the Connecticut Arboretum in New London, and professor of botany at Connecticut College, also in New London, where he had joined the faculty in 1931.

Arthur's uncle, Ansel Nash Kellogg (1832-1886, F: 134995705), who founded the "Baraboo Republic," was credited with inventing the "patent inside" of a newspaper (pre-printed auxiliary newspapers). Shortly before Arthur's death, he found out he was 1 of the 8 heirs to his uncle's \$1.25-million fortune. He died before receiving the approximately \$150,000 he was to receive. "Portage (WI) Daily Register" Friday 4 Dec 1914 p 3 – George W. Graves & H. Hughes formed a partnership to operate the livery barn formerly owned by the late Arthur Kellogg at Baraboo WI. - Buried in Walnut Hill Cemetery, Baraboo, Sauk WI.

She is listed as the wife of Everett Clark II of Bradenton FL as of Aug 1954. – Beatrice & Everett married 28 Jun 1924 in Watertown, Litchfield CT. She had been living with an aunt in CT for several years prior to her marriage. - Her obituary in the “Bradenton (FL) Herald” Saturday 7 Oct 1989 p 14 (copied above) said she was to be buried in Milford, New Haven Co. CT. It said Beatrice had moved from Orange CT to Bradenton FL in 1949. She was a graduate of the National Park Seminary in Washington DC & was survived by 2 daughters & a sister, Virginia K. Avery of Quaker Hill CT.

He was director of the Brooklyn (NY) Botanic Garden from 1972-1980. George was the son of George Sherman Avery Sr. & Georgie Pattison. – The couple lived in Quaker Hill CT.

“Chippewa Herald-Telegram” (Chippewa Falls WI) Monday 9 Feb 1942 p 5 (and numerous other WI newspapers) – At the meeting of the National Tuscania Survivors Association in Wisconsin Rapids WI, Charles Kellogg was named vice president. The next meeting will be held in Beloit WI in 1943.

“Wisconsin State Journal” (Madison WI) 4 Feb 1944 p 9 - Baraboo 21 reunion on 5 Feb is 26 years after the sinking, now fathers of sons in service, or themselves working behind the lines for war. Charles has a son in the military.

Several applications by Charles Kellogg for the “White House Tavern” for Class B fermented beverage (beer) & intoxicating liquor licenses appear in the Janesville WI newspaper. Some are copied above, as are stories of various burglaries.
