World War I flyers and groundmen from Santa Cruz County gathered at the home of historian Ray Durant of Felton last week. All were members of the Army's flying corps and two, Derick Lane and Karl Sundin of Felton, escaped when their ship, the Tuscania, was torpedoed in the Irish Sea near England in 1918. From left are Durant, Lane, Sundin, F. C. (Shorty) Poulson of Felton, a pilot; Homer E. Miller of Capitola, standing; Jack Henderson Jr. of Santa Cruz, Law-

rence Ward of Brookdale, a pilot's observer, and Merle Briggs of Santa Cruz, a pilot. Durant says he would like the World War I airmen to meet frequently, "since there aren't many of us left." Their stories of events and exploits are recorded for history by Durant.

Oakland Youth Tours Scotland
 Scenery Beautiful, People Are Kind

With six days' leave from his camp near London Bruce D. Bowring of this city, a member of the 100th aero squadron, toured Scotland with a chum. Bowring's mother, Mrs. Franklin Bowring of 3021 East Nineteenth street, is a native of Scotland, and in going there her soldier son was largely actuated by a desire to visit the places he had heard his mother describe. His trip took him to Edinburgh, Glasgow, Perth, Stirling, Inverness, the center of the Western Highlands; Loch Lomond and other historic and beauty spots. He found Scotland beautiful and the Scottish people "just flowing over with hospitality."

Here is a story of his visit told in a letter to his mother and father:

"I just got home last night from my six-day 'service leave,' and really I've seen so much that I can't begin to remember it all now. But it will come back to me."

STARTS FOR EDINBURGH

"Well, to begin with, Derrick Lane, a chap from Hollister, Cal., and myself got our six-day pass and half fare voucher last Saturday, the 27th. We left camp at 3 o'clock and got into London

Keene and started out again and put that day in solid and at night we all went to a show and to bed at 11. Tuesday morning we left for the heart of the Highlands, Inverness at 10. We passed through Perth, stopped there an hour or so, got out and saw a little of that place—a beautiful city it is, too. We arrived at Inverness at 5:30 and went up to the American "Y" to stop. We walked around the city after eating and out into the country a little ways. We tried to talk to an old Scotchman, out in the field working—one of the old-timers who still wore kilts—but it was a foreign lingo to us. It might have been English, but the only things I could get was something meant for Yankee and 'bonnie laddie.'

"Inverness is the first town I ever heard of where they had street cars and where the people voted them out of town, a sure enough fact. That's going backward with a vengeance."

"I say here and now, 'See America First.'"

"We left Inverness for Glasgow on the 4:30 p. m. train the same day, passed through Stirling, and saw the old Stirling Castle, 1000 and more years

that evening at 6. We went up to the Eagle Hut 'Y.' and had supper and so on, and at 10 that night caught an express to Edinburgh, Scotland.

"The train was just packed. There was a lot of soldiers right from France going home on leave. We had to stand up the whole distance, 293 miles, but I kept awake listening to the fellows tell about the Yanks holding down their sector. Everyone of them couldn't say enough for them. Well, anyway, we arrived in Edinburgh at 8 o'clock in the morning.

"We couldn't travel in the day time going up, partly on account of our limited time, but mostly on account of train schedule. We passed through Newcastle and over the Tweed river that separates England from Scotland.

SCOTCH ARE HOSPITABLE.

"As it was Sunday when we got up there, there wasn't a single place to go and get breakfast, or so we thought. Just about the time we had given up hope we were directed to a soldiers' and sailors' buffet. The Red Cross has them at all big stations, but in our hurry to get out we passed it up. We got some sandwiches and coffee and the Scotch ladies talked a leg off us, and in

old, and so on down into Glasgow. For miles before we got there, we passed through town after town with nothing but factories. The smoke stalks look like the oil fields with hundreds of oil towers, only all are made of brick and belching smoke.

"We got into Glasgow at 10 p. m., and stopped at another 'Y.' Thursday morning we looked the town over and saw to what extent the shipbuilding operations are going. For miles on the Clyde is one ship after another. Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock we went to Balloch on Loch Lomond on the street car or tram. It was a pretty two and a half hour ride. We rented a boat right away and rowed out on Loch Lomond. It was sure beautiful and the weather was perfect as it had been so far on our trip. When we were right in the middle of the lake we could see five old castles.

WHAT SIR WALTER MISSED.

"Derrick raved over the lake and islands, but I guess I've seen too much that is prettier and bigger. Clear Lake has it backed off the map. Ben Lomond is quite a tall peak, but not nearly as high as old Knocti (you know what I mean). I don't think old

about twenty minutes had our history and invited us out to their house as soon as we could come to supper.

"They directed us to the American Welcome club, and I've not seen a place yet to equal it over here, just like walking into your own home. All over Scotland we found the people just flowing over with hospitality; all except one place—Loch Lomond—too many swells.

"The club is run by some Scotch women, and the meals and rooms are everything anybody could ask for, war or no war, and only 35 cents for a meal and the same for a bed. So we put away one of the meals for breakfast; porridge, fried sausage and fried potatoes, bread, butter, jam and coffee, engaged our room and started out for the rest of the day. We'd forgotten all about sleep.

PLENTY TO SEE.

"We had only got started up the street when a Scotch sailor, home on leave from the navy, hailed us—one of the nicest chaps you'd want to see. He took us in tow, and we saw Edinburgh for two days as she was never seen before. I can't describe any of the places, but one of the ladies at the club sent you a book of the city with

Scott would have written the "Lady of the Lake" if he had seen America first.

"But I'll give them credit for having a beautiful country. We went back to Balloch and had supper at 7:30 and caught a train back to Glasgow at 8:30. It only took us 30 minutes to go back, so we went to bed again at the 'Y.'

"We caught the 9 o'clock train Friday morning back to Edinburgh and got there at 10:30, so we went up to the American club for lunch. In the afternoon we went out to Forth Bridge over the River Forth. I've seen big bridges around New York and different places, but this one sure 'brings home the bacon.' It is three miles long and 'umptime' feet high, said to be the biggest bridge in the world. I guess it is, all right.

LINCOLN IN EDINBURGH.

"We saw the only statue of Abe Lincoln in Europe, in Edinburgh, put up by Edinburgh in memory of the Scottish-American soldiers who fell in the Civil War.

"We left there Friday night on the 7 o'clock train for London. We were lucky in getting a seat going back. It

her compliments. She'd lived in San Francisco ten years ago up to the time of the earthquake, and then she came home to Scotland and married. But the city has more beautiful sights than I ever saw before in my young life. First, he took us through Edinburgh castle. They can trace it back to the year 1000, and it was quite old then. He showed us where the first King of England and Scotland, James I, was born and Mons Meg; an old cannon I read about in school.

"It would take too many pages to tell it all. But there was nothing we missed. About 4 o'clock we went home with our sailor guide, and had tea and listened to tales from all over the world. We left with a promise to meet him early in the morning. After that Derrick and I walked to the park and listened to a swell Scottish band for three hours and landed in bed about 10 o'clock.

"The next morning we met Bob

was a good 14 hours' ride, getting up in London at 9 a. m. We went to the 'Y' and had breakfast and cleaned up but we didn't fool around any, for it started in to rain as soon as we hit the Strand. We had sunshine all the time until we returned to London.

"We got a couple of good tickets to 'Yes, Uncle,' an American musical comedy, which was playing in New York when I was there. It was a really fine show and I enjoyed it, and it was the first good show I'd seen since we left New York. And then we caught the 6 o'clock train for home and got to bed by 9:30. I was tired out for we had sure been on the go. I can see, mother, that you came from Scotland, just as much as Dad came from England. But I'm glad I'm pure Yankee just the same. By the way, we traveled over 1500 miles altogether. I'm seeing the world alright."

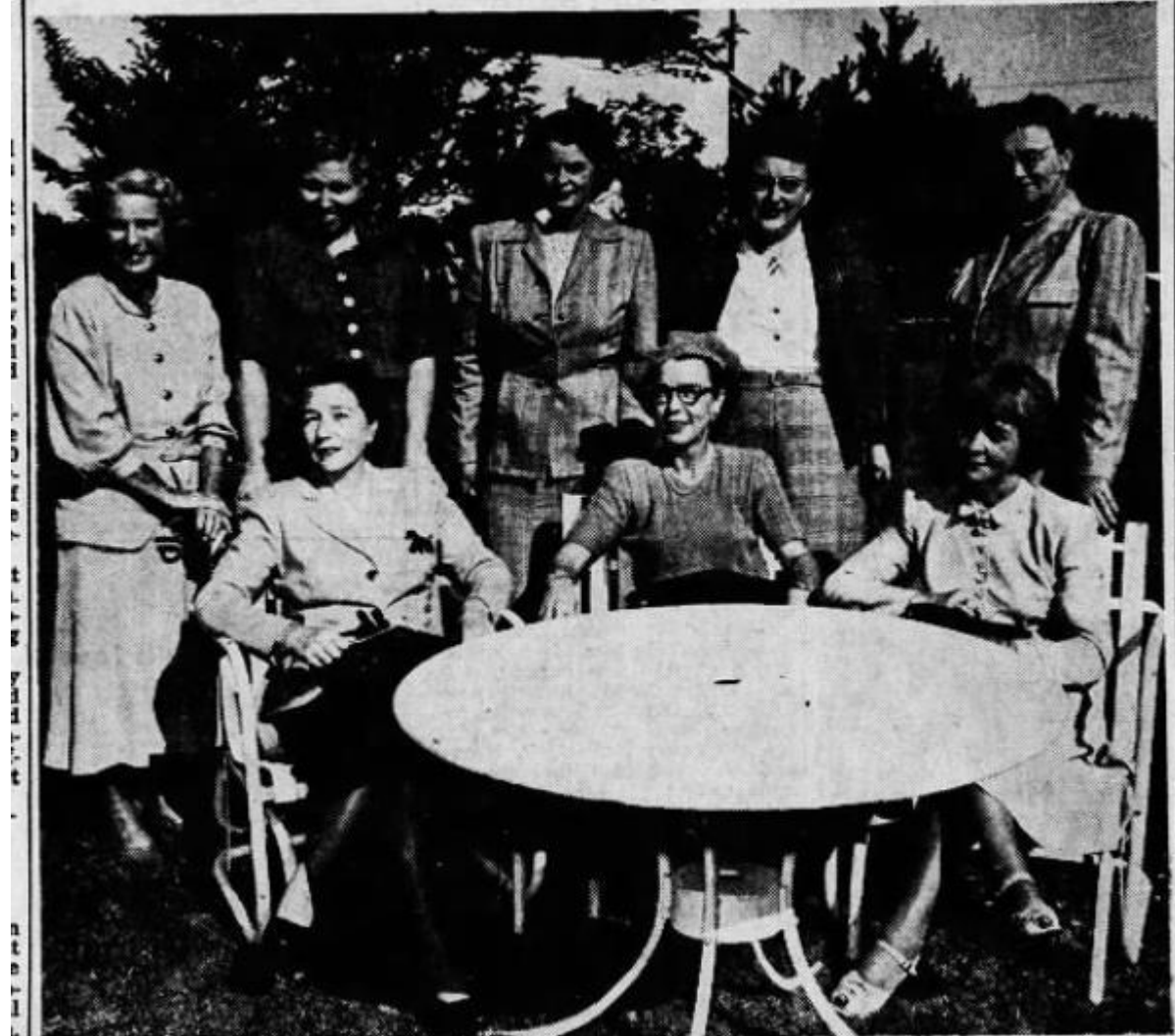

Volunteers Give More Than Their Time

 Mary Negri is a volunteer
 with a heart.

For the past two years she
 has been spending one day a
 week answering telephone re-
 quests for help at the Santa

Cruz office, Volunteer Service
 of Santa Cruz County, Inc.
 She considers herself an
 ambassador of goodwill

because help is what Volunteer Service offers — help to seniors who need to go to the doctor, pick up surplus food, go to the grocery store. Help to the foreign born who want to learn the English language, help to shut-ins who are lonely and need someone to call each day and see if they're all right; help to kids without fathers who want to enroll in the Buddy program, and help to women in the county jail who are aided by Friends in Contact.

All of these calls go through the desk volunteer at the VS headquarters on Emeline Street.

"It's hard for people to say, 'I need help,'" says Mary. "So the desk volunteer must be extremely diplomatic. In rural communities people are used to helping their neighbors but in urban areas many people don't even know their neighbors, let alone offer to help them. People are apprehensive about getting involved today. That's why Volunteer Service was organized — we're here to help."

Mary, a tall girl with a ready smile, has empathy with the people who make these calls for help and this is apparent in her telephone voice.

"The desk worker's attitude toward people is so important," says Mary. "Most of our callers have seen better days — we must not be condescending but let them know we care."

After receiving a call, Mary will then set the wheel in motion to carry out the request, calling other volunteers who act as drivers, or referring the call to the proper channels.

For the transportation service alone for the year ending May 30, 3280 transportation requests were made to the Watsonville and Santa Cruz Offices with 2970 of them filled.

Some of the requests for help are humorous. For instance one little old lady called who was going on a trip and needed a babysitter for her goldfish.

Another with whom Mary visits often sent her a recipe for mashed potato candy.

"We never have a dull moment," says Mary. "I try to have something personal to say to each of the callers, something that is only applicable to that client. After a while you get to know them and enjoy visiting with them."

"One of my requests from a big lady who wanted transportation to phyciotherapy. She said, 'You

know honey, I fell off a U-Haul truck. I'm just so glad I didn't fall on my teacup poolie because he'd be hamburger for sure.'"

Some calls are frustrating because the desk volunteer cannot help. Mary had one call from a woman who had been referred by the Welfare Department. She was emotionally distraught, had three children under the age of 8; her husband had just deserted her, the kids had the mumps, and she needed to get groceries.

Mary says Volunteer Service tries to encourage the client to call three days ahead of time when transportation is needed.

"In this particular case, however, it was an emergency and I was not able to get a driver who had had mumps. I finally called a public health nurse who took her to the grocery store."

More volunteers are needed to serve as desk volunteers. And Mary says anyone who is friendly, warm, compassionate, can write, and can listen will fill the bill.

Volunteers are also needed to provide transportation. Drivers can be on call one or more days a week. Desk and driver volunteers may call Chairman Esther Clarke at 423-0554.

Professor Emeritus William Allen, an entomologist whose work helped the California strawberry industry become the nation's primary strawberry producer, died Dec. 21 of cancer. He was 80. Allen served on the faculty and in several leadership positions in the College of Natural Resources.

Allen's main scientific contributions were identifying spider mites, lygus bugs, root weevils and aphids as the most economically significant strawberry insect pests.

He was the key strawberry entomologist in the state from the 1950s until he retired, according to cooperative extension specialist Frank Zalom, former director of the California Statewide Integrated Pest Management Project. “During that time, the industry grew from a few hundred acres to 85 percent of the national production. This productivity requires intensive pest management.”

“When growers saw an insect feeding on their crop,” Zalom said, “they automatically assumed it was causing a problem; the natural thing was to spray anything.”

Allen, however, used monitoring and other tools of the then-emerging field of integrated pest management to help the industry concentrate on the economically significant insects. As a result, Zalom said, the industry began using pesticides more judiciously and slowed the rate at which insects developed resistance to the chemicals.

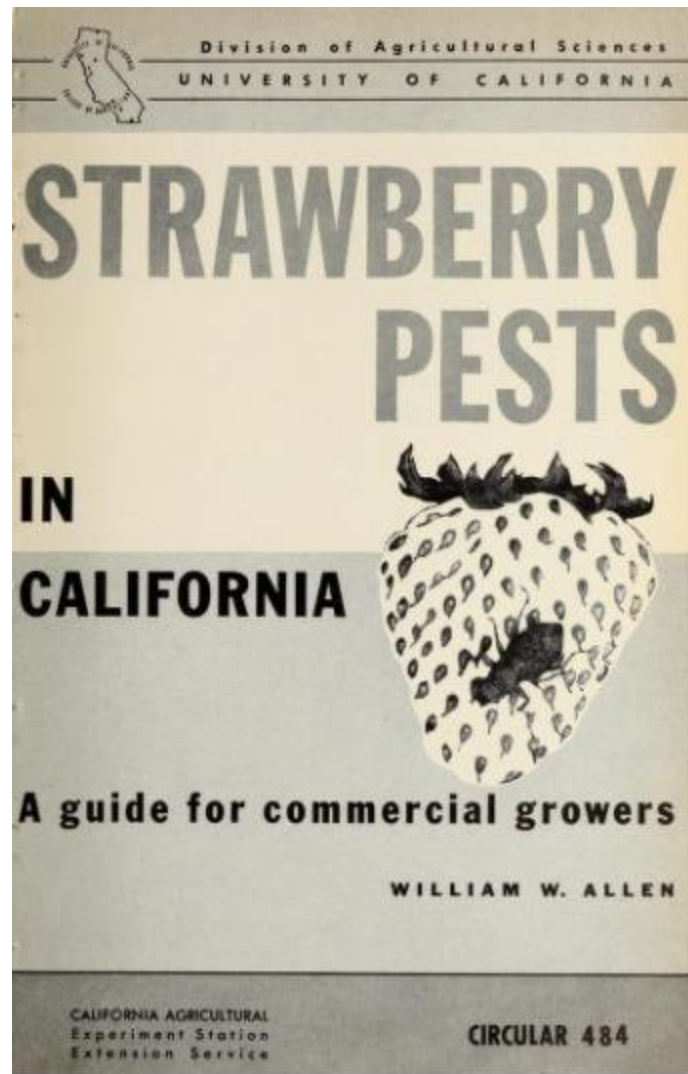
Allen earned his B.S. in 1943 and his Ph.D. in entomology in 1952, both at Berkeley. He joined the faculty in 1953 and became associate dean for research in 1985. He retired in 1991.

Allen is survived by his wife, Adele, of Orinda, Calif., and daughters Joan Husted, of Pleasant Hill, and Mary Knott, of Martinez.

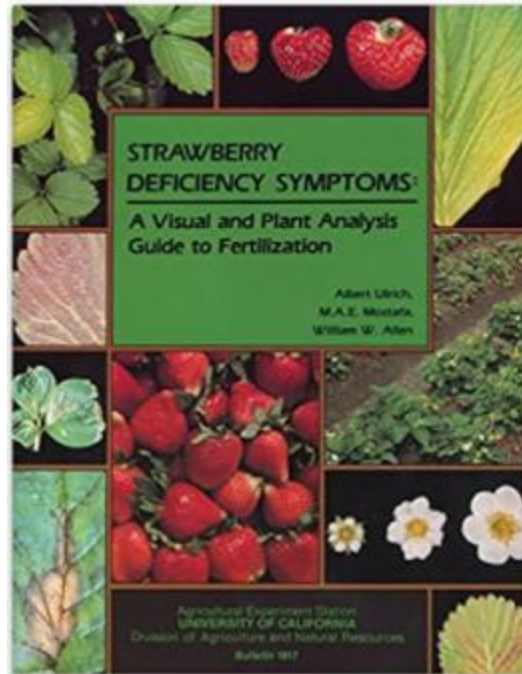

John Marshall Allen died on September 12 at his home in Soquel after a long struggle with cancer. He was 78.

Mr. Allen was born in Santa Cruz and was a graduate of Santa Cruz High School. During World War II, at the age of 17, he enlisted in the Navy and went overseas aboard the USS Fanshaw Bay. He saw action in Saipan, Morotai, the Philippine Sea and Okinawa.

After the war, he returned to Santa Cruz and began a 35-year career in banking with County Bank of Santa Cruz and retired as a Senior Vice President.

During the 1960's Mr. Allen served on the Soquel Elementary School Board. He was founding President of the Mid-County Rotary Club. An Unusual White Robin Appears In Valley Area

When you've seen one white robin — you've seen them all. Because, probably, that's all there are around here.

A couple of months ago, Clark Reason of Zavante was partaking of a cool beverage at his kitchen table when he happened to look out the window and see a white robin jumping around the yard.

Of course, Clark told his wife, who, of course, had to be shown and neighbor Derick Lane was invited over to get a photograph of the bird to prove it to the world.

How rare is a (nearly) white robin?

It's pretty hard to tell and local bird club members, themselves, are in some apparent disagreement about the rate of occurrence.

Bird club member Viola Anderson told the Sentinel that she feels the condition is quite rare and says that one of the factors that make it so, is that

albino birds usually lose the advantage of protective coloration and are easier marks for predators.

Interestingly, Reason says that normal robins in his yard appear at times to be avoiding their fair - feathered friend, who in turn is probably looking on them as fair - weather friends.

The Reasons are hoping their white robin will stick around and nest on their property; however, it is not known to them what role it will play in the nesting as its sex has not been determined.

Albinism in birds is explained in the book, "An Introduction to Ornithology," by George John Wallace (1955):

"White plumage is of course normal for many birds — gulls, terns, swans, egrets, to mention only a few — but sometimes in other species the factors responsible for pigment production are lost and albinism results.

"This is particularly true of browns and blacks and is due to

lack of melanin — producing cells (melanophores); failure in lipochromes (red and yellow) is much less frequent.

"Albinism may be partial (limited to certain feathers or regions) or total, as in a completely white Crow or Robin."

The book has two pictures of albinism in robins, one showing a partial (much less white than Reason's bird) and a total albino (even whiter than Reason's bird).

The point Wallace makes in his book about the loss of red pigment being much less frequent, is shown in the bird in Zavante which has flecks of red and orange on its breast. Its head has, to a large degree, kept its robin - brown coloring.

The Reasons are happy with their locally - unique robin.

As Mr. Reason pointed out, "You know, it could have happened to us, as it did to some friends of ours — they woke up one morning and there was a horde of vultures encamped in their yard."
