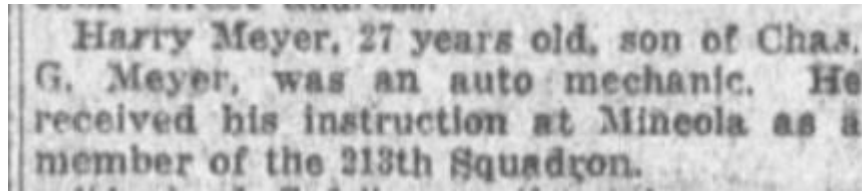

Harry Meyer, who was aboard the ill-fated "Tuscania" which was sunk by a German torpedo boat, was among those who were saved. He was connected with the 213th Aero Squadron, and when the

news of survivors were flashed over the wires and his name was among those picked up, relatives and friends of the young fighting man were greatly relieved.

With the terrible shock which the news of the disaster brought, Mrs. Frances Meyer, mother of Harry, refused to give up hope and great was her joy when a cablegram from her boy a few days after announced:

"Arrived safe, everything O. K."

Mrs. Meyer could not describe the feeling that came over her, but she lost no time in spreading the news among those with whom the young man was intimately acquainted.

Harry Meyer is a brother of Dr. Meyer, of 155 Covert street, now stationed at Camp Upton, L. I. as a dentist.

Bridegroom's Trip To Mother Leads To Bigamy Charge

NEW YORK (AP) — When the bridegroom announced he would spend his wedding night at the home of his mother and return for his bride the next day, his new mother-in-law became suspicious.

She called the police and they

checked on her "son-in-law," William Seitz, 27.

Seitz, using the alias of William Fink, married Germaine Meyer, 20, a blonde stenographer of Ridgewood, Queens.

Mrs. Girvean Meyer, the bride's mother, said Seitz told her he would return Monday to go apartment hunting with his bride. The mother decided to check on him.

It was learned that Seitz married Patricia Guerin, 20, in February 1956. He is the father of a 15-month-old daughter and his wife is expecting another child.

Police also learned that Seitz had been sentenced to prison in 1952 on a robbery conviction.

Wednesday, in Brooklyn felony court, Magistrate Raymond Tierney ordered Seitz held on a bigamy charge.

In court was Seitz' wife, Patricia. She and Miss Meyer recognized each other. They had been former classmates at Grover Cleveland High School in Queens.

He Wed and Fled—to Mama But Ma-in-Law Smells Rat—Rap Is Bigamy

William Seitz, 27, hadn't shaken the rice out of his clothes after his church wedding last Sunday to Germaine Meyer, 20, a blonde stenographer, before his new mother-in-law came to the conclusion that there was something mighty queer about the marriage.

Her reason: Seitz announced that he was going home alone to his parents until he could find an apartment for himself and his bride.

Kind of Odd, Thinks She

That struck Mrs. Meyer as an odd sort of honeymoon. Detective Munk of the Gates Ave. precinct investigated and agreed.

Munk found that Seitz actually had gone home to his first—and undivorced—wife, the former Patricia Guerin, also 20 and a blonde, at 1042 Flushing Ave., Brooklyn. Patricia, whom he married Feb. 11, 1956, is the mother of a 15-month-old daughter and is expecting another child.

It also came out at his arraignment for bigamy yesterday that Seitz is an ex-convict, something neither wife knew before.

Began as Wayward Minor

He was put on probation as a wayward minor after a 1946 burglary in Brooklyn; was arrested in 1948 for armed robbery in St. Petersburg, Fla.; drew a 1-to-5 year term for robbery in Brooklyn in 1952.

Seitz courted and married Germaine, of 1933 Gates Ave., Ridgewood, Queens, under the name of William Fink, an old pal who had been a witness at his first marriage. He and Germaine were wedded in St. Thomas Protestant Episcopal Church, Bushwick Ave. and Cooper St., Brooklyn.

Only a Ceremony

"Was this marriage consummated?" Magistrate Raymond A. Tierney asked Germaine yesterday in Brooklyn Felony Court.

She shook her head negatively. "It sure was a short honeymoon," said Tierney, holding Seitz-Fink without bail for hearing Monday.

Patricia announced that she would stand by the father of her children. He is a \$65-a-week lumber yard hand. She and Germaine, incidentally, found one more thing in common. They recognized each other in court as former classmates at Grover Cleveland High School, Queens.

Ex-Con and Bigamist

His Wife Loves Him

Unwavering in her loyalty, pretty, dark-haired Patricia Seitz, 20, stood hand-in-hand with her husband yesterday in Brooklyn Felony Court and promised to "stand by him," although he

was accused of marrying a second girl.

The husband, William, 27, a borough lumber yard helper and an ex-con, had admitted he went through a marriage ceremony with Germaine Meyer, 20, on Aug. 10, but insisted that marriage never was consummated.

Mama Was Suspicious

Magistrate Edward D. Caiazzo continued him without bail for grand jury action after Seitz waived a hearing on bigamy charge.

His downfall came last Tuesday when Germaine's mother, of 1933 Gates Ave., became suspicious. After the wedding, Seitz took off, supposedly to his parents' home. The bride's mother alerted police, and Detective Paul Munk of the Wilson Ave. station locked him up.

Patricia Expecting

Patricia, who married him February 11, 1956, has a daughter, Doreen, 15 months, and is expecting another child. While she faced the court with Seitz, the attractive blonde Germaine

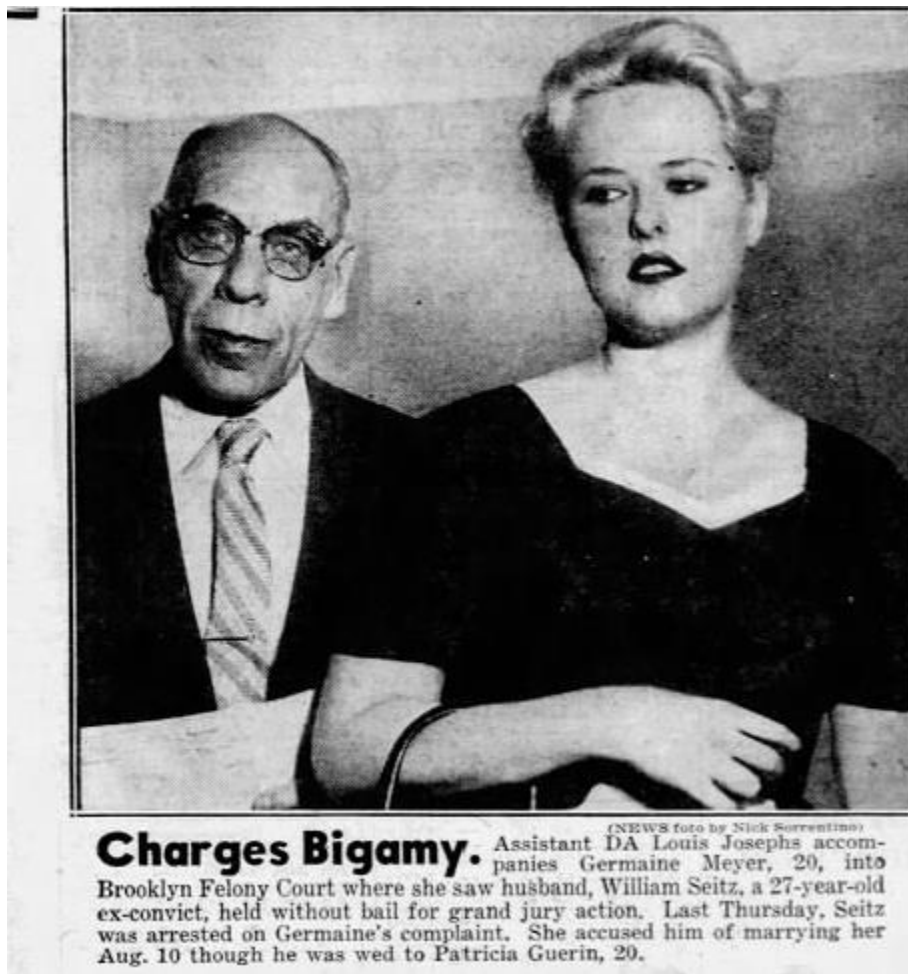

sat unhappily among spectators.

Neither girl had known that Seitz, of 1042 Flushing Ave., served time in 1952 for robbery and has a record dating to 1946, when he was placed on probation as a wayward minor.

Writers find treasure isles

Like many New Yorkers, Sharon Seitz never saw beyond the asphalt and skyscrapers to the many islands dotting the city's waterways.

But when she investigated Broad Channel, Queens, for her master's project at Columbia University's Graduate School of Journalism seven years ago, she was captivated by the vibrant island community. Residents banded together to fight and win from the city the right to own the land beneath their homes.

Seitz' experience with Broad Channel led her and a long-time friend, Stuart Miller, to explore some 40 other islands and chronicle their history in a new book, "The Other Islands of New York City" (Countryman Press, \$17).

"There are so many books written about New York, but none about its islands," said Miller, a columnist at the entertainment publication Variety. "New Yorkers often think their city consists of three islands: Manhattan, Long Island and Staten Island, but that's not the case at all."

The book, described as part historical text and part travel guide, examines the more famous city islands, such as Governors Island, but also delves into the history and state of forgotten ones like Swinburne Island, off Staten Island.

Although Seitz, a feature

writer for a New Jersey newspaper, and Miller spent many hours poring through dusty archives, the authors found that the most fulfilling experience was visiting the islands themselves.

Among the more extraordinary islands the two Brooklyn natives explored was North Brother Island located between the Bronx and Queens. In the late 19th century, the island was home to a quarantine hospital where the infamous Typhoid Mary spent the last 22 years of her life.

In the 1950s the hospitals became drug rehabilitation

centers. Al Pacino's portrayal of a teenage junkie on the island in the play "Does the Tiger Wear a Necktie?" won him his first Tony Award in 1969.

The rehab centers closed, and today North Brother Island is home to abandoned buildings rotting away.

"It's this weird ghost island," says Miller. "For so long it housed the city's undesirables, and now it houses birds."

Although their two years of island hopping and intensive research — while holding down full time jobs — was exhausting the au-

thors found that some parts were less than burdensome.

"When you visit Coney Island and ride on the Cyclone as part of your research, I don't consider that a rough day," says Miller.

Both authors hope that the natural beauty as well as the abandoned buildings that cover many of New York's islands will be preserved.

"In a city that tends to bulldoze any old thing in its way, it would be nice if some of the islands remained untouched," says Miller. "In the end that's what it's all about."

SHARON SEITZ searches the moist turf near Brooklyn's Prospect Park Boathouse for a good log to turn over.

"Girls and boys both love it when I turn over logs, since it's nice and moist and dark and that's where a lot of creatures that live in decaying and dying leaves can be found. Kids love to hold worms, millipedes, centipedes, slugs and pill bugs — we spend a ton of time doing that!"

Seitz, a Park Slope resident and mother of two, holds a master's degree from the Columbia School of Journalism and has authored three books about New York City, two with her husband, Stuart Miller: "The Other Islands of New York City" (Countryman Press) and "Blue Guide to New York City," with Carol Wright (W.W. Norton), as well as "Big Apple Safari For Families" (Countryman Press), a resource for New York City families eager to explore nature in an urban setting.

A genial, friendly blond with a ready laugh, Seitz spent the better part of a recent windblown dusk at Prospect Park Lake and the boathouse discussing the best places to take kids to find horseshoe crabs and to seek out the mating habits of woodcocks.

Born in Elmhurst, Queens, Seitz has spent virtually her entire life in Brooklyn. Since the release of "Big Apple Safari for Families" in June 2005, she has been organizing and leading informal nature walks for parents and children around town, at no charge.

"A lot of parents want to go out and explore nature," she says, "but they don't know where to go or feel creeped out going alone to some of these places, so I found that if I led walks, people would respond."

"I started [leading walks] when the book came out because it's a small publisher and I needed to get the word out. I thought it was a better idea than dressing up as a squirrel and running around handing out press releases, which I almost started doing."

Though ideas and themes for her nature walks come readily to Seitz, she

has borrowed liberally from other experts. Along the lines of Joseph Cornell's classic "Sharing Nature With Children," she uses games to pique kids' interest and get them actively involved.

"I did what I call the Un-Natural Natural Trail," she says. "Before my tour started I would go out on the route we would be taking and hide things in the woods that I know didn't belong there, like an old sneaker, a ribbon, a little Matchbox car. Then I'd give out a list to the kids and have them look for these things, as a way to get them to hone their observational skills; on the way back, I'd do a 'regular' nature tour."

Out of necessity, Seitz has ranged far and wide through New York City to find unspoiled regions for her walks and tours. "I love Mount Loretto on Staten Island [in Prince's Bay]. It was privately owned by the

archdiocese, but the Trust for Public Land bought it and sold it to the state.

"It has spectacular walkways along the water that are bordered by steep cliffs, and it's one of New York City's few real meadows and is maintained as one. The keeper at the Staten Island Zoo does rock sculptures along the beach. He created walkways ... you bring kids there, and it's like, wow, there are all these rock formations and forts and it's really fun. In summer the milkweed is in bloom and it attracts all the butterflies, the monarchs, the swallowtails."

Walking by the Prospect Park Lake, as a mother swan protecting her cygnets admonishes her, Seitz returns to the boathouse steps. She continues, "The Bronx has great parks, too, like Pelham Bay Park and Twin Island, just north of Orchard Beach. Go there in early September — the golden-

rod grows out of the rocks, the same rock formations you find in Maine. They are erratics, glacial rocks that got strewn around there; my kids love climbing on them."

She also recommends Inwood Hill Park. "You feel like you're really hiking. Native Americans used the rock formations as shelters and used the incredibly straight and tall tulip trees you find there to make canoes. In spring, tulip trees produce actual tulip-shaped flowers.

"There's a little meadow at the top [of Inwood Hill], with a magnificent view of the Hudson River and the New Jersey Palisades beyond. It's a good place to watch hawks in the fall. Pale Male is famous because he lives on Fifth Ave., but we have nesting red-tails all over town.

"And you have got to love the Jamaica Bay Wildlife Refuge in Queens. A year or so ago, I heard you can see diamondback terrapins there. When I went in, after a while I heard this faint sound behind me, I turned around — and there's a terrapin right there! Nearby I saw another one laying eggs! I guess July is the right time of year.

"The Wildlife Refuge is so nice, because you won't see better birds anywhere else. I go there at night and look for the woodcocks. When they mate they do this mating dance where the male bird flies straight up and goes, 'Whooooooooo!' I see and hear things more readily than I used to. I'm hooked in — I'm always looking around!"

Seitz's kids, Lucas, 6, and Caleb, 7, get a firsthand introduction to nature when she and her husband take them to places like Floyd Bennett Field in Jamaica Bay, Brooklyn.

"When we go there, we're singing 'Floyd Bennett Field Forever!'" she laughs. "It's still a rough around the edges kind of place ... no one really knows it's down there.

"There are the guys [at the field] with the radio-controlled cars and planes, and hangars where people are restoring historic aircraft, but in the middle of it all, there's a trail ... and you

can camp there!"

"I've camped out in every borough with my kids," she adds, noting that the city offers so many nature experiences that there's no reason for kids to lounge at home.

Seitz, who is now an aspiring teacher, says that for her next project she would like to do a series on naturalists aimed at kids, spotlighting "the Rachel Carsons, the John Muirs, Edward Abbeyes of the world that kids don't learn about in school."

"There are these wonderful people ... and kids should know who they are! People like Hattie Carthan in Bedford-Stuyvesant — she lived on this drug-infested block in the 1960s and she wanted to beautify it with trees. They were going to tear down this brownstone that had a magnificent magnolia in front of it. She got the tree declared a landmark and saved it!"

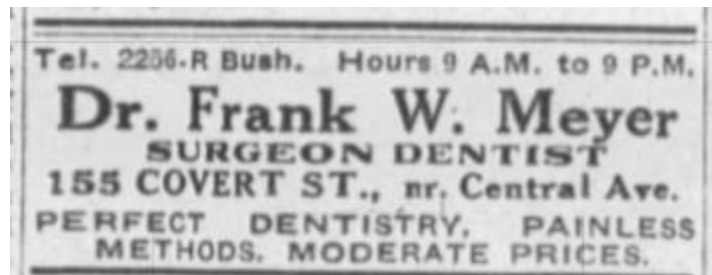

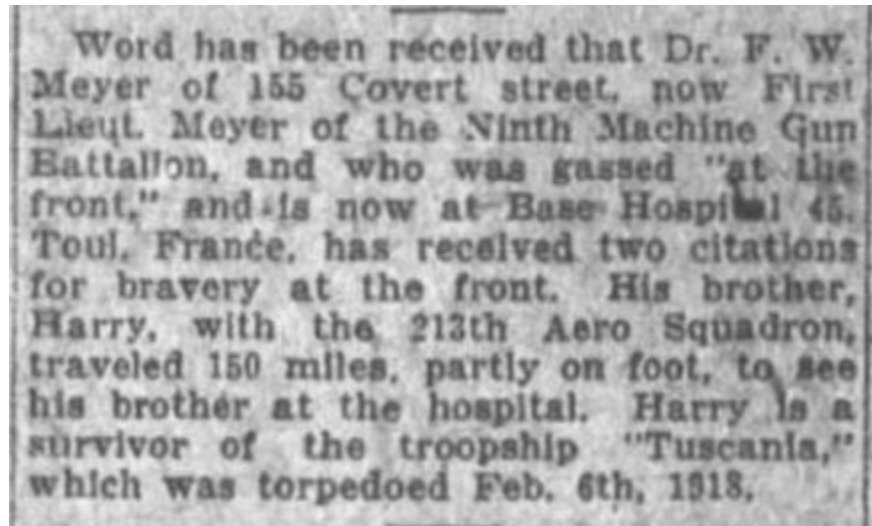

ADMITS FORGERIES, BLAMES IT ON DRINK

Conscience-stricken for forging two checks, Ambrose F. Hanlon, 30, of 1213A Bergen st. gave himself up to justice when he appeared at the Gates ave. station last night. He was held under \$1,500 bail for trial Sept. 18.

Hanlon told Detectives John Osnetto and John Fitzsimmons that he was wanted in Bay Ridge for forging checks. He said that he was an assistant cashier in a branch of the Borden Milk Company at 6002 Fort Hamilton Parkway. On Sept. 5, he declared, he signed the general manager's name to checks of \$45 and \$32 on the Irving National Bank.

Hanlon told the detectives that the cause of his downfall was liquor. He had begun drinking a mixture of paragonic and whisky six months ago. Hanlon is married and has two children.

BOOZE COMPOUND MADE HIM FORGER

Combination of Paregoric and
Whiskey Proves Undoing
of Borden Cashier.

Paregoric and whiskey led to the downfall of Ambrose F. Hanlon, of 1213a Bergen street, assistant cashier at the branch of Borden's Farm Products Company, Inc., at 8002 Fort Hamilton avenue, according to the story he told the police at the Gates avenue station last night.

Hanlon walked into the police station and described himself as a conscience-stricken forger. He said he had filled out two checks on the Irving National Bank, one for \$41 and one for \$32, to both of which he signed the name of Peter Bottenus, general manager of the branch.

Detectives John Osnato and John Fitzsimmons, both of the Fourth Avenue Station in which precinct the offense was committed, placed the man under arrest. He said his "downfall" had been brought about by friends who taught him to drink a mixture of paregoric and whisky, the irresistible craving for which beverage led to the forgeries. Hanlon is married and has two children.

He was held in \$1,500 bail today by Magistrate Brown in the Fifth Avenue Court, on a charge of forgery, for a hearing next Monday.

Conscience Causes Hanlon To Surrender as Forger

Explaining that he gave himself up because his conscience bothered him, Ambrose F. Hanlon, 33 years old, married and the father of two children living at 1213a Bergen street, walked into the Gates avenue police station last night. He told the lieutenant he was wanted for forgery.

Detectives John Fitzsimmons and John Osnapo of the Fourth avenue station, who were looking for Hanlon, were notified, and they took Hanlon to the Fourth avenue station. Here, it was learned, Hanlon had been employed as cashier by the Borden Milk Products Company at 6002 Fort Hamilton parkway.

On Sept. 6, Hanlon is alleged to

have taken two blank checks and forged the name of Edward Bottenus, general manager of the Fort Hamilton branch of the company. One check was for \$45; the other for \$32. Hanlon told detectives he became acquainted with a number of men who taught him to mix paragon with whiskey. Under the influence of this concoction, Hanlon said, he was not responsible for what he did. In the Fifth avenue court to-day before Magistrate Brown, Hanlon was held under \$1,500 bail for examination Sept. 18.

It was learned that during the war, Hanlon served with the Ordnance Corps.

- Johanna (Hannah) Katherine Meyer Lloyd Irwin, 2 Apr 1895 Kings Co. NY - . Married on 23 Sep 1916 Brooklyn, NYC, NY to Claudius J. Lloyd (1889-1919). She is listed in his obituary as his wife. They had a son, Robert W. Lloyd, born 7 Sep 1917, died at age 4 on 17 Mar 1922. Hannah & Robert live with her parents & siblings in the 1920 census of Brooklyn NY at 155 Covert St.; she lists herself as married. According to records, however, Hannah married on 26 or 28 Nov 1917 in Kings Co. NY to Francis (Frank) Irwin (b. 1892). They had a son, Robert Henry Irwin, b. 6 Dec 1933 Brooklyn, Kings NY, d. 5 Jun 1998 Huntington Station, Suffolk NY.

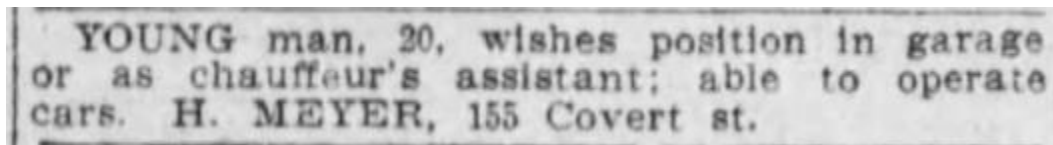

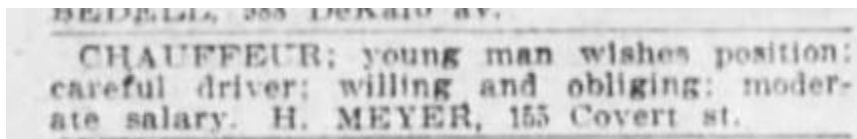
