Alfred Moe

Alfred Moe, 80, a resident of the Bay Area since 1936, died Aug. 5 in North Bend. He was a resident of 1540 Sheridan in North Bend.

Mr. Moe, a retired saw filer for Evans Products, was born May 22, 1890 in Barrett, Minn. He was a member of the First Presbyterian Church in North Bend and also of Veterans of World War I, North Bend.

Survivors include the widow, Marjorie, North Bend; a son, Ira, also of North Bend; and four grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 3 p.m. in the North Bend chapel of Campbell-Watkins Funeral Homes with the Rev. Richard Cochran of the North Bend First Presbyterian Church officiating. Interment will follow in Oceanview Memory Gardens.

Mrs. Frank Prince just received a cablegram that her brother, Percy Stevens, and Roscoe Blake are among the survivors of the Tuscania.

Much anxiety is being felt here concerning the safety of a number of foresters, who enlisted from Bend in the Twentieth Engineers, many of them being in Company D, which was on board the Tuscania. No word has been received reporting the safety of any of these men, but it is reasonable to believe that many were on other vessels in the fleet, which evidently was crossing with the sunken liner.

Among those from this city, who, according to letters, should now be just arriving in England are Edward Peterman, Percy Stevens, Alfred Moe, George Shafer, Shannon Bond, Earl Newkirk and Roscoe Blake. Mrs. J. F. Arnold, of this city, had a letter several days ago notifying her that her brother, Hey Corigan, a well known timber cruiser at Portland, was about to sail. In it he stated that Percy Stevens, Roscoe Blake and Alfred Moe would leave when he did. This indicates that all were probably with Mr. Stevens, who has been listed

by the War Department as being on board the ship. The four men were all at Vancouver together and left to take the six weeks' course at Washington University.

Shannon Bond, who enlisted from Roseburg, first with the Coast Artillery, was later transferred to the engineers and sent word to his parents in this city that he would leave for France the latter part of last month. He visited in Bend not long ago.

Edward Peterman, also on board, was formerly an employe of the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber Company. He is a member of the local Moose lodge and has lived here some time. His parents reside in Bend. George Shafer was another member of Company D, on board. He has relatives in Portland.

Parents of Alfred Moe, who was on board the Tuscania, received word today from the War Department to the effect that he was among the survivors. No other details were given. Mr. Moe enlisted in the forestry regiment last year with a number of other Bend men.

Sinking Of Tuscania Is Described By Survivor

A first hand account of the sinking of the Tuscania is given in a letter from Alfred Moe, just received here by his father, Ole Moe. The writer is now at a camp in England waiting orders to go on to the front.

The letter is as follows:

"I suppose you have read and heard all about the boat we sailed on, which was sunk by a German sub. We were hit about a quarter of six. I was sitting on my lifebelt near the dining room door when I heard a terrible noise and shock and then the lights went out. We all rushed to the top deck, where the lifeboats were, for we all knew what had happened.

"When I say I rushed to the top deck, I mean we got there in order and as fast as we could. We had boat drill every day on board so all seemed to be quite cool and took their places by the lifeboats we were assigned, so there weren't as many missing as we thought there would be at first.

"The boat I was in held about 70 men. Some of the boats were broken right in half on account of the ropes breaking while they were being let down. The men in these boats

There sure were some pitiful sights.

"I would like to tell you all I saw and heard, but I don't know whether you would be able to get this letter or not, so I'll not write any more about it, because I want you to hear I got through safely and am feeling fine. Our boat was picked up about three hours after the big transport was hit. I was one of the oarsmen and, believe me, I sure was glad to get out of the lifeboat. I stood in water above my knees because our boat leaked pretty bad and the sea was rather rough.

"I lost everything I brought along, only saving what happened to be on my back. But that isn't anything as we will get new outfits again.

"I am thankful to be able to be here and writing this letter, so don't worry. I am feeling fine and hope this terrible war will soon be over so we will be able to go back home.

"We don't have much time to write letters and it takes a long time before we get any mail over here, so write often. If you get a chance to send a little tobacco it would go fine because smoking materials seem kind of scarce over here. I had quite a supply with me, but it was in the boat that was sunk."

She was born July 7, 1894, at Paisley, Scotland and died March 12 at North Bend. Mrs. Moe was a resident of the Bay Area since 1936, and was a member of the First Presbyterian Church in North Bend.

Survivors include her son, Ira Moe of North Bend; a sister, Alice Scarrow of Vancouver, B.C.; four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Jessie O'Brien, Mrs. Moe's sister from Camloops, British Columbia, is here taking care of her.

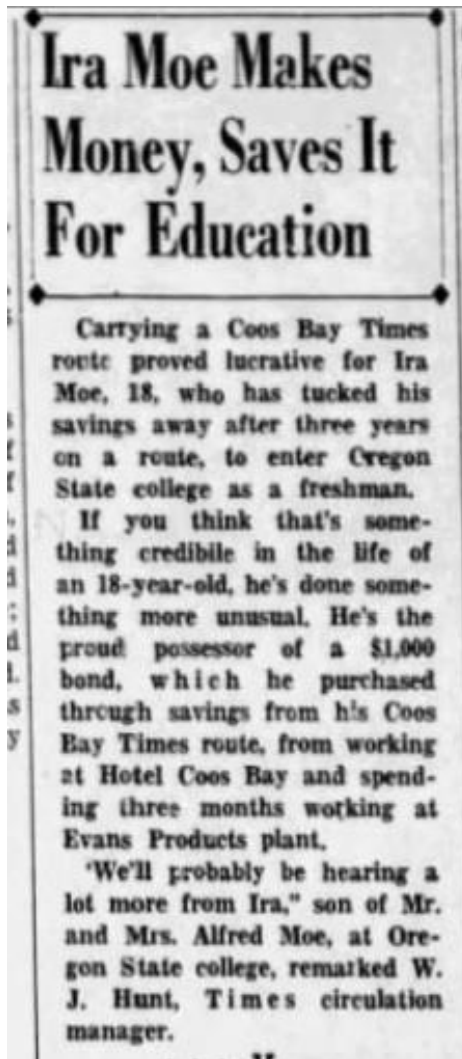

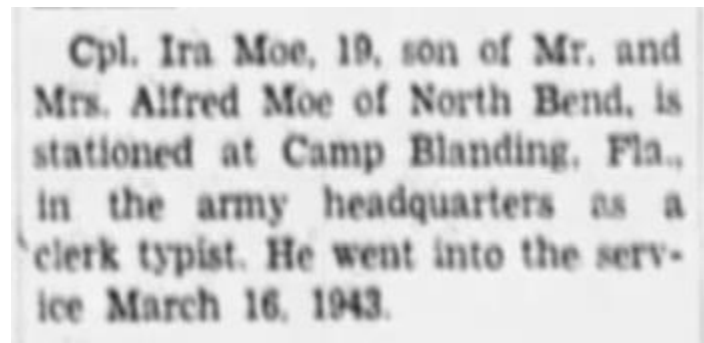

Ira A. Moe, 21-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Moe of North Bend, has been missing in action

in Germany since Dec. 16, his parents have been notified this week.

Young Moe is one of the best known of North Bend's men in the service. He was graduated from North Bend high school in 1942 and prior to that time carried a Coos Bay Times route for more than three years and worked at the Coos Bay hotel for nearly a year.

He was born at Rainy River, Canada, May 20, 1924, and his parents came to North Bend when he was a small boy. He attended both grade and high schools at North Bend, and was at Oregon State college almost one year when he enlisted in the army at Fort Lewis, Wash., March 16, 1943.

Moe went to England in late October of last year and was there about a month when his regiment was sent across the channel to France. In his last letter home Moe wrote of France, "I have seen buildings in London ruined by bombs, but it was nothing compared to what is happening here."

His last visit with his parents was in August of last year.

N.B. Youth Safe In German Camp, Parents Learn

Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Moe of North Bend have been notified by the International Red Cross that their son, Ira A. Moe, reported Dec. 16 as missing in action, is safe and in good health at a prisoner of war camp in Germany.

Twenty-one-year-old Ira Moe was graduated from North Bend high school in 1942, and was at Oregon State college almost one year before he enlisted in the army at Fort Lewis Wash., March 6, 1943.

He went to England in October of last year and was sent across the channel to France in November. His last visit here with his parents was in August of last year.

Ira Moe Freed From Famous Prison Camp

Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Moe of North Bend have received a letter from their son, Ira Moe, advising that he was liberated April 12 from Stalag 8 prison camp near Breslau. He failed to say whether he was liberated by Americans or Russians, but he said he was in a hospital getting a checkup and was trying to gain some weight. He said he had been "pretty well starved" during his four-months imprisonment. He was captured in the battle of the Belgian bulge and had been imprisoned since Dec. 16.

After being sent to a general hospital for a month, Moe said he expected to be sent home on furlough. He was a member of the 122nd division.

Moe was graduated from North Bend high school and attended Oregon State college before he entered the service in 1944. He was a former carrier of the Coos Bay Times, and also was employed at the Hotel Coos Bay.

Pvt. Ira Moe Returns to N. B. Home After Liberation from Nazi Camp

Officials of the reception station at Fort Lewis, Wash., announced today that 117 Oregon returnees passed through the center today homeward bound of furloughs and leaves to be spent in the state. Among the men was Private Ira A. Moe, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Moe of North Bend. He arrived home over the weekend.

Private Moe, 21, was a German prisoner for more than four months, being captured in the Belgium bulge while serving with the infantry. He was imprisoned at Stalag B-4 and Stalag 8 and was liberated by American forces at Brunswick. Pitifully underweight when he was liberated in April, following his capture of Dec. 19, 1944,

he was immediately hospitalized in France and had gained 35 pounds upon his return home.

Given Furlough

Private Moe has been given a 60-day furlough, which he will spend in North Bend and then reports to a receiving center at Santa Barbara, Cal., for further assignment.

Mr. and Mrs. Moe were notified that their son was missing in December and did not learn that he was a prisoner until almost two months later.

Before entering the service Moe worked at the Coos Bay hotel in North Bend and was also a former Coos Bay Times carrier. His father is a filer at Evans plant in Coos Bay.

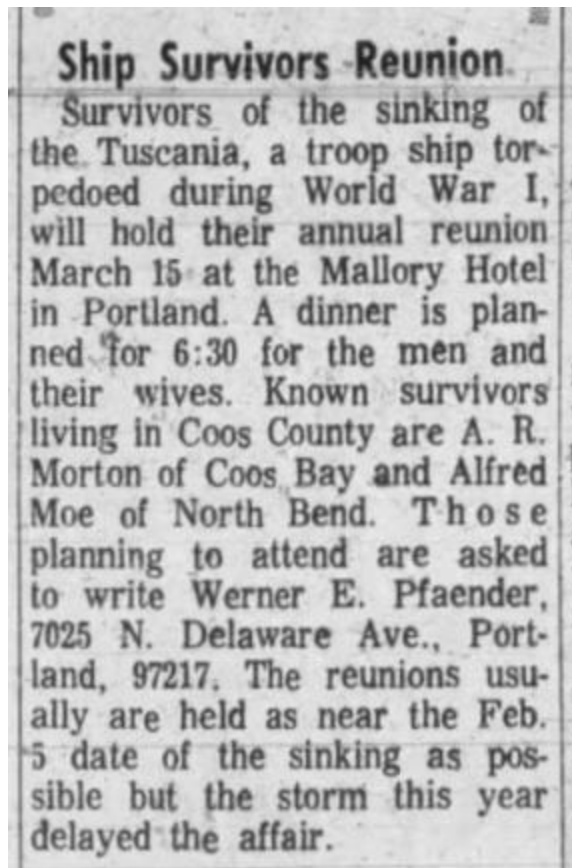

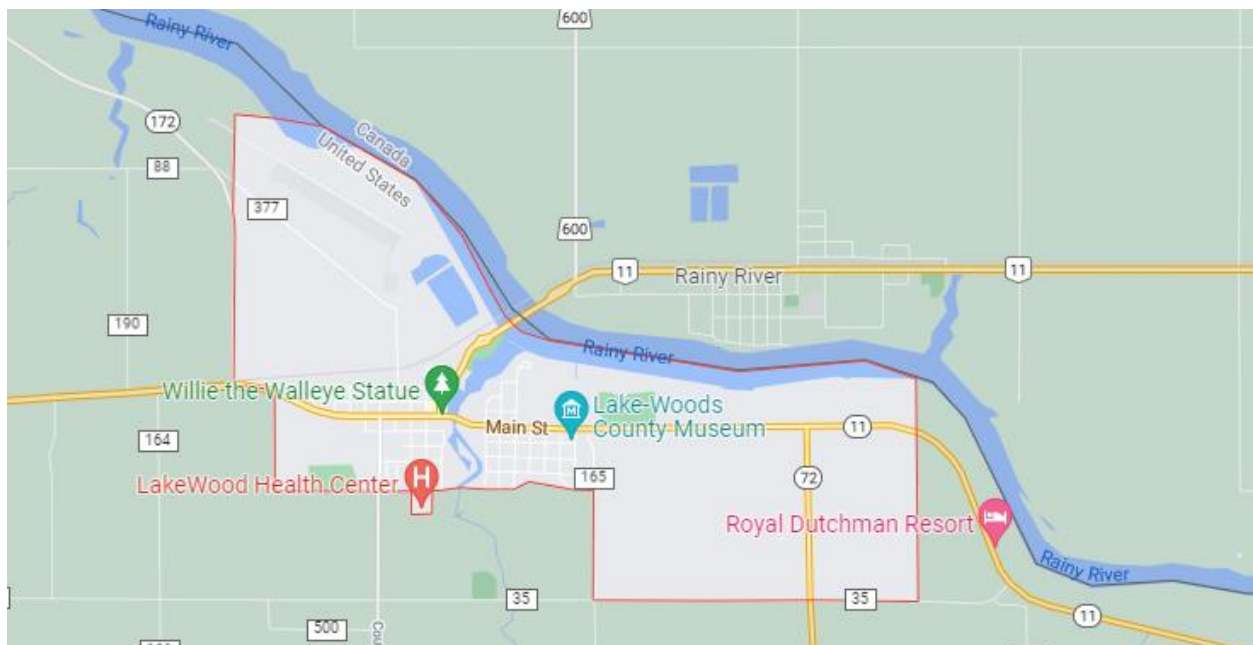
