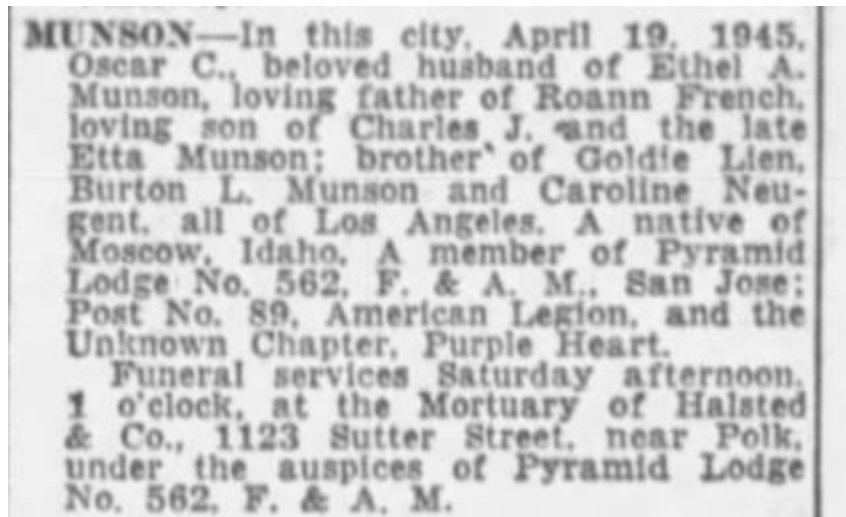

JOHN C. ROBINSON, OF POTLATCH DASHED TO DEATH IN BREAKERS

That John C. Robinson of Potlatch who lost his life when the Tuscania was torpedoed and sunk off the Irish coast, was dashed to death against the rocks and cliffs when the boat in which he left the torpedoed ship was swept into the breakers, is the statement of Oscar Munson, of Moscow, who was in charge of the squad of American soldiers of which those in the ill fated boat were a part. In a letter to his father, Charles J. Munson, Oscar tells of the death of his friend. This is the first information that has been received as to how Robinson, the only north Idaho man lost on the ill fated boat, met his death. Friends of Robinson, whose home was at Potlatch, had

asked Mr. Munson to request Oscar to give any information he might have or be able to obtain as to how the young hero died and this letter is in answer to one written by Charles J. Munson to Oscar, asking for this information.

A high compliment was paid to Oscar Munson by the officer who censored his letter, but did not change a word of it. Instead of that he added the following post script:

"Perhaps it will please you to know that Sergeant Munson is one of our most valued men and a boy to be proud of." This is signed with the initials of the censor, "H. H. E. W.," who wrote in another place on the

letter, "censored by H. H. E. Walcott, 26th Eng."

Oscar Munsor's letter follows:

April 22.

Dear Folks: Settled and contented. We (five sergeants, Bell, Firth, Jones, Lundell and myself) have an eight-man tent to ourselves. Makes it fine. In the center we have a table 3x5 feet with seats on both sides. Then at one end a stove which requires oodles of wood, sheds little heat but has a pleasant glow and makes things real homelike.

Today I started some log decks down at the mill which we are putting up. As soon as we start logging I go into the woods in charge of the woods end of it. Believe me I was sure glad when I was told that I have already been all over the "coupes" they call them here and have the boundary lines very well in my head.

We are in a very small hamlet here, that is we are about one-half mile from it. Human nature is always the same. Often being in some large French cities and then coming here is just like living in Spokane and then going to Cornwall.

I don't really know what I can write about that is I can't think of anything.

Ed Erickson is still here in the same company as myself. He is from Elk River and worked for me last summer. He is the fellow in the picture with me that you were asking about.

I am sending you the proof check which I got when I had my picture taken. I only had a few dollars so only had a few made (one dozen). Therefore the reason I didn't send any more home. You may be able to get some more there.

John C. Robinson was in the same squad as Oscar Welo from Potlatch and their squad was one that I had

charge of. When our boat came over and landed square I began ordering them over as fast as I could. Robison was lucky enough (that is we thought it lucky then) to get in before the boat was filled by the bunch below. That boat got swept into the breakers six hours later before the men knew they were going in. Everybody shook hands with everybody else and bid them good-bye and then the rocks and the cliff. About sixty men were in the boat and only about five came out and these were in the hospital for a month before they rejoined the company. I was amused at some of the letters published. I hardly recognized some parts myself.

Well by the time this reaches you Carrie will be picking those buttercups she spoke about in her last letter. How's Pom Pom. I'll bet he'd stand out on the porch and bark for a week without stopping if he saw some of these little donkeys over her. A little dog's cart about as high as your waist and a little donkey about the same height and a big man riding.

Well must get this off so will close, with love to all.

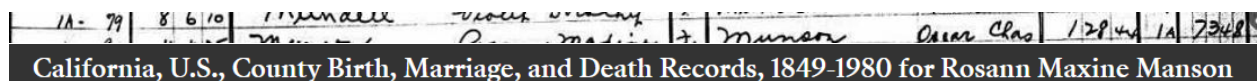

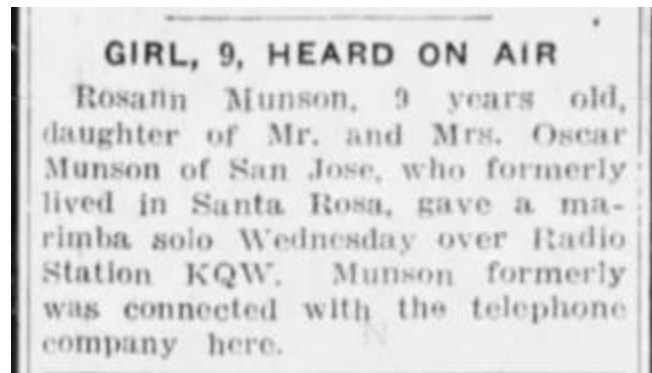

MOSCOW, ^NIda.—The University of Idaho's campaign for a \$1000 contribution to the \$150,000 fund being raised by the World's Student Federation for the alleviation of suffering in European war prison camps was inaugurated at a special assembly held Tuesday.

Four speakers, President Melvin A. Brannon, Dean George D. Ayers of the law school, Dean J. G. Eldridge of the university faculty, and the Rev. Dr. Jonathan Watson, delivered the message, the appeal being made in a way that seemed to inspire the undergraduate crowd that filled the auditorium.

The address of Dean Ayers was particularly stirring, dealing as it did with the theme that the relief of war-scourged Europe is a national obligation which all patriotic citizens are called upon to fulfil. "The least we can do," was one of the speaker's ringing sentences, "is to repair the damage which would not have occurred save for our lack of organization, insight or courage."

A student committee of 30, led by Oscar C. Munson, '17, has in hand the work of soliciting donations. The fund total had reached \$700 Friday night and it is confidently expected that the entire sum asked will be raised.

Drill at Elk River.

ELK RIVER, Idaho, April 27.—The Home Guard of Loyal Americans met last evening at the Rex theater for the purpose of organizing and selecting drillmasters. Senator E. M. Grant acted as chairman, and about 75 members, embracing several nationalities, were present. It was ascertained that 14 had previously received military training, and a majority of these had seen some actual service, and three or four had served in the regular army. Out of those that had former training the following members were selected as drillmasters: E. Duerselen, John Dimon, G. F. Brazier, J. F. Sibbits and R. K. Wheeler.

Friday evenings were selected as drill nights.

Lieutenant Oscar Munson of the University of Idaho was drillmaster for the evening.

OFFICERS RECOMMENDED FOR ENGINEERS' CORPS

H. W. Sanborn of Missoula Is Slated for Major and Other Montanans to Command.

Spokane, Sept. 27.—Recommendations for officers for the Twentieth Engineers' forest regiment, to be raised in Idaho, Montana and Wyoming, were made here today by a committee of lumbermen, named for the purpose.

H. W. Sanborn of Missoula is recommended for major, and for captains, George F. Weisel and Elmer A. Findell of Missoula, S. B. Lindley of Spokane and E. K. Barnum of Leavenworth, Wash., were named.

First lieutenants recommended were: Edgar G. Polleys and John Howard Toole of Missoula; James C. Twohy, Frank C. Kendall and W. W. Powell of Spokane; George B. Sypher, Butte; Oscar C. Munson, Potlatch, Ida.; Lawrence R. McCoy, Coeur d'Alene, Ida., and Alfred D. Kettenbach, Lewiston, Ida.

Second lieutenants named were: Ralph H. Boehmier, C company, Second Idaho infantry; Fred Leidinger, Dover, Ida.; George D. Patterson, Great Falls, Mont.; Ben L. Lindsley, Spokane; C. O. Crane, Coeur d'Alene; D. C. Van Ostrand, C company, 361st infantry, national army, and Don Mackenzie, Missoula.

Appointment of Rev. Henry S. Gatley of Missoula, who has offered his services as chaplain, was recommended.

Oscar Munson With Engineers.

MOSCOW, Idaho, Feb. 7.—A number of young men from Latah county enlisted last fall in the 20th engineers. Oscar C. Munson, son of C. J. Munson, former state land commissioner, is believed to have been on board the Tuscania. He was an undergraduate of the University of Idaho and a member of the Sigma Nu fraternity. During the last two years he has been in the service of the Potlatch Lumber company, and at the time of his enlistment last December was chief warden of his district.

Honors Tuscania Survivor.

Oscar C. Munson, a survivor of the Tuscania, is given first place in the annual report of the Potlatch association. The report was heard by lumbermen from many parts of northern Idaho.

Mr. Munson, who was chief fire warden, "waived his desire to enlist early in the war and remained until all of the work was disposed of in the fall," says the report.

"He was designated by the lumbermen committee for a commission as first lieutenant in the 20th United States engineers regiment, foresters.

"Mr. Munson was very anxious to see active service, and enlisted as a private early in December rather than wait for a commission. He has had five years of military training, four years of logging engineering in the University of Idaho, and had worked in the woods department of the Potlatch Lumber company and for this association in various capacities since 1910. He was appointed first sergeant six weeks after enlistment."

OSCAR MUNSON

That John C. Robinson of Pottlatch, the only victim of the Tuscania sinking from north Idaho, was dashed against the rocks on the Irish coast and perished with 54 others from one of the life boats has just been learned. Charles J. Munson today received a letter from his son, Oscar, who was on the Tuscania and was in charge of the squad in which Robinson was, telling the details of Robinson's death. He wrote:

John C. Robinson was in the same squad with Oscar Wells, from Pottlatch, and their squad was one that I had charge of. When our boat came over and landed square I began ordering the men over as fast as I could. Robinson was lucky enough (that is we thought him lucky at the time) to get into the boat before it was filled with those from below (the lower decks).

That boat was swept into the breakers six hours later before the men knew where they were. It was dark (about 1 o'clock in the morning) and when they realized they were in the breakers they knew their danger. All stood up and shook hands and bade each other goodby as they were being swept by the breakers against the rocks and the cliff. There were 60 men in the boat and only five of them

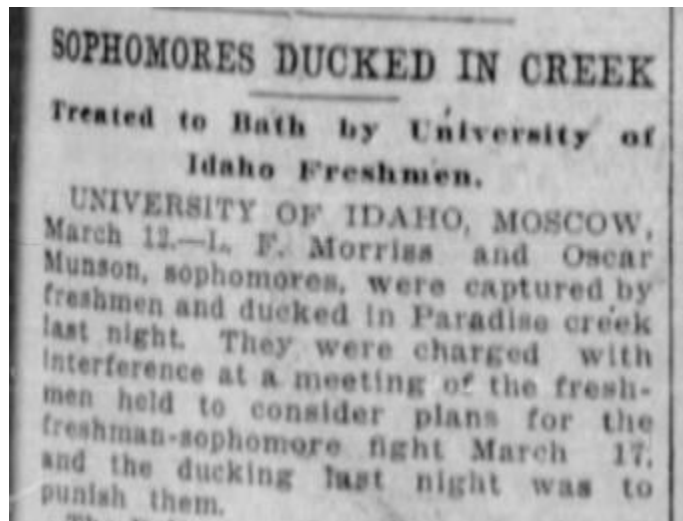
escaped alive, and these were in the hospital for a month before they rejoined the company.

The letter from Oscar Munson had been read by the censor, but no erasures had been made, but at the bottom of the letter the censor had written: "Perhaps it will please you to know that Sergeant Munson is one of our most valued men and a boy to be proud of." This is signed by "H. H. E. Walcott, censor.")

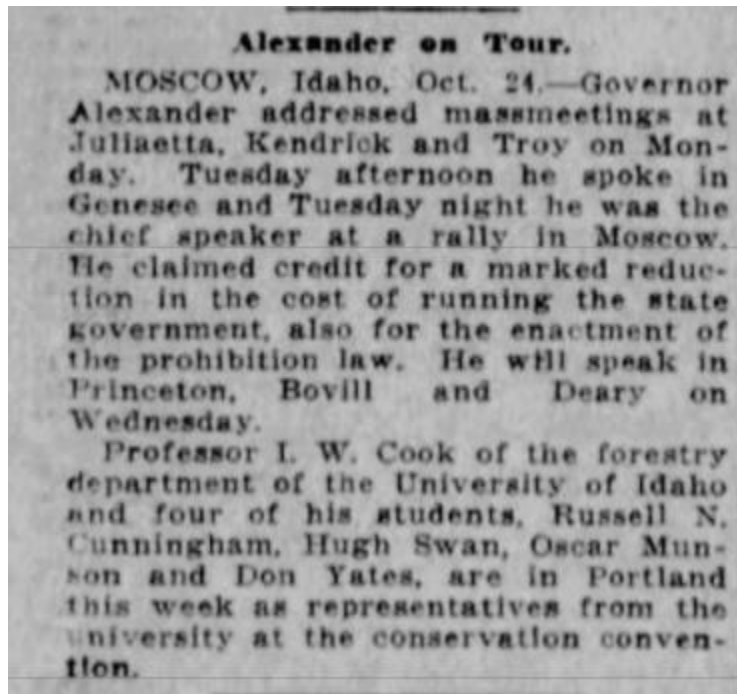

BLAME I. W. W. FOR NEW IDAHO FIRES

28 Blazes Said to Have Been Started
by Incendiaries in Clear-
water Country.

CONTROL POTLATCH FIRE

Call on Sheriff to Arrest Suspicious
Characters in the
Timber.

POTLATCH, Idaho, July 26.—Word has just been received by W. D. Humiston, chairman of the fire committee of the Potlatch Timber Protective association, that there were 20 incendiary fires set yesterday and eight the day before in the north fork of the Clearwater country, thus threatening some of the best white pine timber in Idaho. About 10,000 acres belong to the state, about 6000 acres to Rupp & Holland of Portland and 3000 acres to the Potlatch Lumber company, all of which is in danger.

The Potlatch Timber Protective association is making efforts through its chief fire warden, Oscar C. Munson, and all men available to get these fires under control. Officials of the fire association feel certain that they can prove who started the fires and that an I. W. W. is known to have made the statement that before fall all the timber in northern Idaho would be burned up.



Posse After Fire Bugs.

F. Elliott Smith, prosecuting attorney, and Sheriff Cullivan, both of Clearwater county, are making every effort to apprehend the fire bugs and a strong posse is making a search for them.

This timber is located on Swamp creek and Cranberry creek and lies about 10 miles south of Elk River.

A big fire raging on the head of Three Bear creek and all smaller fires in the Potlatch Timber association are now completely under control, according to report from Chief Fire Warden Munson this morning.

Calls Sheriff to Make Arrests.

OROFINO, Idaho, July 26.—Deputy Fire Warden Oscar Munson of Elk river telephoned to County Attorney Smith from the north fork of the Clearwater river that nine fires broke out in that neighborhood Sunday and 24 more were started yesterday and asked that the sheriff be sent out with "John Doe" warrants, as suspicious characters were believed to be in the timber. Deputy Sheriff Jewell left this afternoon for the Dent country, 20 miles north of Orofino.

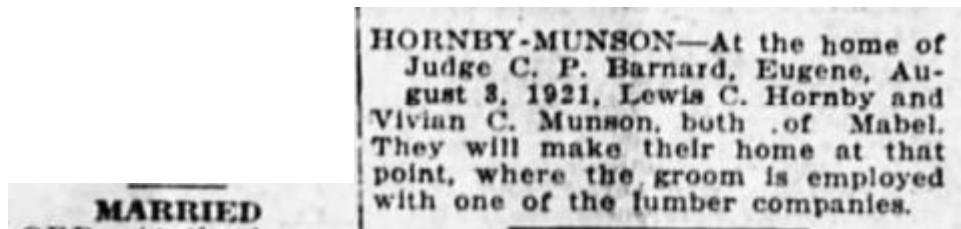

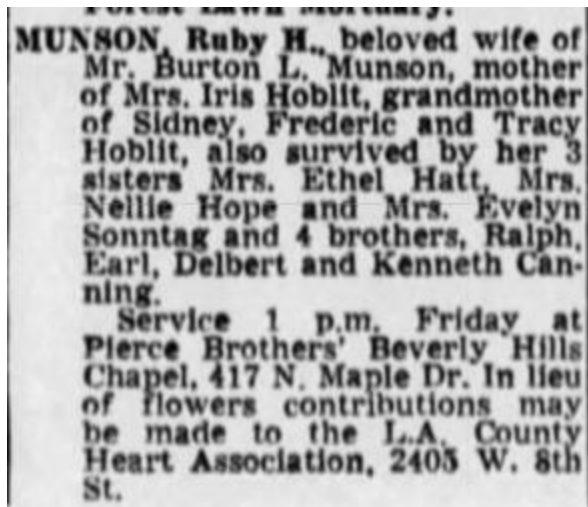
