WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—Seventy-four American soldiers aboard the torpedoed liner *Tuscania* remain unidentified or unaccounted for today according to the latest checking of lists of survivors and missing available to the war department and the Associated Press. Included in this number are thirty-three unidentified dead buried in Scotland and forty-one still reported as missing.

Forty-four More Safe

The names of forty-four additional American soldiers who were rescued from the liner, and one other listed as missing but who was not on the ship, were announced by the war department last night. Eight of these survivors had been reported previously by the Associated Press. Besides the thirty-seven new names, thirty-seven others previously listed as missing, were found to be survivors today when the Associated Press list of missing was checked against all available official records, leaving a total of seventy-four unaccounted for or unidentified.

Joseph Marsolek, Independence, named as a victim of the Tuscania sinking, and twenty-two other Wisconsin men previously reported missing are among the survivors of the marine disaster reported last night. The list follows:

Services Monday for Joseph Marshall, War I Veteran

Independence, Wis. — (Special)—Funeral services for Joseph Marshall, 51, who died early Thursday morning at the Winona General hospital, where he had been since August 24 and where he had undergone an operation for ulcers, will be conducted Monday at 9 a. m. at the St. Peter's and Paul's church, Independence. The Rt. Rev. L. J. Kufel will officiate and burial will be in the church cemetery, where services will be in charge of the American Legion.

Mr. Marshall, a veteran of the First World war, was born in Independence July 4, 1893, and lived there until entering service. He served for 24 months in the army, 18 months overseas.

He was one of the survivors of the sinking of the troop transport Tuscania in the Irish sea by a German submarine February 5, 1918. He was in icy water for nine hours before being rescued by boats from escorting British ships, and regained consciousness in a hospital in Londonderry, Ireland. He suffered hip and back injuries as he left the Tuscania, being caught between a smashed boat and the side of the ship.

After six weeks in the hospital, he rejoined his outfit and took part in the action at Chateau-Thierry, where he received shrapnel wounds in the face and neck. He also served in Alsace-Lorraine. He was a member of the 107th supply train of the 32nd division.

Mr. Marshall was a member of the National Tuscania Survivors association, the Disabled American Veterans, the American Legion and the Red Men.

Following his return from service, he was employed as a truck driver by the Winona Sand & Gravel Company and after he married Miss Mary Sluga of Independence in 1925, they moved to Milwaukee. They returned to Winona 15 years ago, and he was employed by the Consumers Ice & Fuel Company until illness prevented active work. Two years ago, the family moved to Stockton, where he operated a chicken ranch.

Survivors are his wife; two sons, Raymond, in active service in the merchant marine, and Jack, at home; one daughter, Mildred, at home; his mother, Mrs. Ambrose Marsolek, Independence; two sisters, Mrs. Margaret Burzanaki, La Crosse, and Mrs. Agnes Olsen, Chicago; seven brothers, Anton, Andrew, Theodore, Albert, Samuel and Paul Marsolek, Independence, and Valentine Marsolek, Mason City, Iowa; one half sister, Mrs. Polly Wanorek, Independence, and one half brother, Peter P. Marsolek, Independence. A half brother, John Marsolek, and a half sister, Mrs. Mary Wisenberger, Arcadia, are dead.

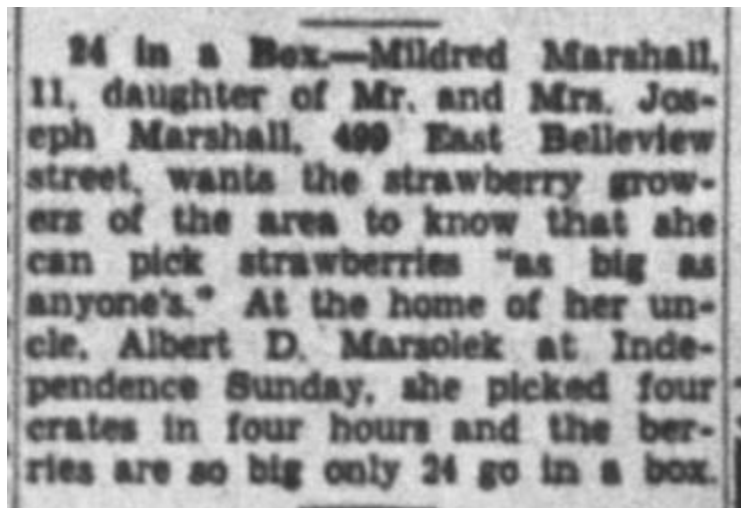

'Grace Gave Up More'

A Teacher Looks At Face of Europe

A Winona woman is "touring" Europe without leaving her home here.

Since August 1955 Mrs. Marie M. Marshall, 467 E. 5th St., has visited hundreds of famous sites in Europe through the letters of her daughter, Mildred, now a teacher in schools operated for the children of American Army officers overseas.

The letters give an insight into the lives of the people of Europe and her impressions of international affairs. For example, on leaving Spain she wrote, "We took the boat back to Algiers (from Tangiers) and then a train to Madrid. We were lucky this time. We had a sleeper. Old Franco is trying to steal the trade from the British in Gibraltar, so he had this new train installed."

AT MONACO (which she termed "unique") Mildred and a friend saw "Grace's (Kelly's) palace." Continuing, she said, "Monaco is lovely, but I certainly think Grace gave up more than she gained."

A 1950 graduate of Winona State Teachers College, Miss Mar-

mans are somewhat more like Americans. These Germans really are bitter toward Americans, and although individuals are very nice, as a whole they don't like our being over here one bit."

Via postcards, letters and photographs, she has taken her mother to many famed European sites, among them, the Vatican. "There we saw the Pope—we were within two feet of him—I can't tell you the feeling I had." Traveling from Pompei (the city buried by volcanic eruptions from Mt. Vesuvius 20 years before the birth of Christ) to Salerno, which she recalled as a "drive on the cliffs along the Mediterranean Ocean" where "in a 20-mile ride there are over 1,000 curves." She visited other towns during the holiday and summed up her impressions of Italy. "The Italians are such wonderful people—they love life and enjoy it. I was so happy all the time in Italy. People are so serious in Germany."

PERHAPS her most unpleasant experience was a train ride from Valencia, Spain to Algiers. She wrote: "We went first class all the way and it was ghastly . . .

shall taught kindergarten at Richfield a year and then spent two years at Roswell, N.M., teaching first and second grades. Before going to Europe, she taught music a year at Wichita, Texas, and second grade for a year in Houston, Texas.

Her first teaching assignment was in Mannheim, Germany, and she also taught summer school there. Earlier this year she applied for a transfer to Italy. Now she is at Verona, Italy.

SOME OF HER impressions of Germany include: "Germany is not a very glamorous country, such as Italy. The people are very serious . . . I am in southern Germany, and the northern Ger-

The cities in Spain are lovely, but the rural areas are in utter poverty. The ride lasted 26½ hours. We never saw one drop of water. There are no dining cars. You buy ham sandwiches and fruit along the way when you stop at a station, and you stop at every one. But it is only safe to eat fruit."

Near Tangiers, Spanish Morocco (in North Africa) she described primitive people living in caves.

Of Madrid, Spain, Mildred said: "If it weren't for the language you'd think you were in New York or Chicago. And the clothes are so beautiful—fabulous shoes and inexpensive. I bought five pairs for \$23." In general, however, her impression is that "Spain is wonderful to see, but not to live in."

"I shall always love Europe for what it is, but more than ever how much it has shown me how fortunate one is to be born in America."

Millie (Mildred) Mary Diehl (almost 90) passed away peacefully on Wednesday, April 17, 2019, at Hope Hospice – Cape Coral, Fla., surrounded by her loving family. Millie was born on June 12, 1929, in Winona, Minn. Her parents were Joseph and Marie (Marsolek) Marshall. Millie's family members always referred to Millie as "Dollie" as she was born prematurely and weighed only 3 pounds at birth. Millie's grandmother kept "Dollie" warm on the opened oven door, the 1929 version of a modern-day incubator. Millie graduated from Winona High School and Winona State Teacher's College. She earned her master's degree in education from SUNY Brockport and later enrolled at the University of New Hampshire where she extended her studies in the writing process.

Body found in car near Independence

INDEPENDENCE, Wis. (Special) — The body of a 67-year-old Iowan was found this morning in a car which was parked in the yard of a farm in Bohrst Valley, rural Independence.

The man has been identified as Wallace Valentine Marsolek, Mason City, who reportedly had been visiting friends in the area.

An autopsy to determine the cause of death was performed this forenoon at Sacred Heart Hospital, Eau Claire.

Gilman Bolstad, who notified the Trempealeau County Sheriff's office at 8:30 a.m. today after finding the dead man sitting behind the steering wheel of an automobile parked in his yard.

The ignition switch was on and the gas tank was empty, said investigating officers.

Mrs. Monica Liley, Trempealeau County coroner, said the man had been dead for six or seven hours.

Mrs. Bolstad said she heard a dog barking Tuesday about 11 p.m. but saw no one when she went outside to investigate.

Investigating officers included Sheriff Wayne Holte, Willard Knutson, traffic officer, and Peter Speerstra, deputy sheriff.

The body was taken to Kern Funeral Home, Independence.

In 1880 he married Rozalia in WI. If so, the 1900 census which reports that their 5 oldest children were born in Poland is inaccurate.

His will was probated 6 Jan 1920. In it, he gave his wife Rozalia his real & personal property – his son Paul a piece of property – son Simon & daughter Agnes each to receive \$100 after Rozalia died – the rest of his property to his son Valentine & nothing to his other children. He says that nothing from his estate or that of his wife's will be given to Joe because "Joe is now and has been working for himself before he was twenty one and is well and able to care for himself." Andrew gets nothing because he has not obeyed his father or his mother and "spends his money for drink." The others of his children have received a proportionate share in advance: Theodore, Albert, Anton, Peter P. (by his 1st wife), John A. (by his 1st wife), Margare Burzinski [sic], Paulina Waniorek (by his 1st wife) & Mari Karis? Kaus? (by his 1st wife). His will is signed with "his mark" – therefore, he is illiterate.
