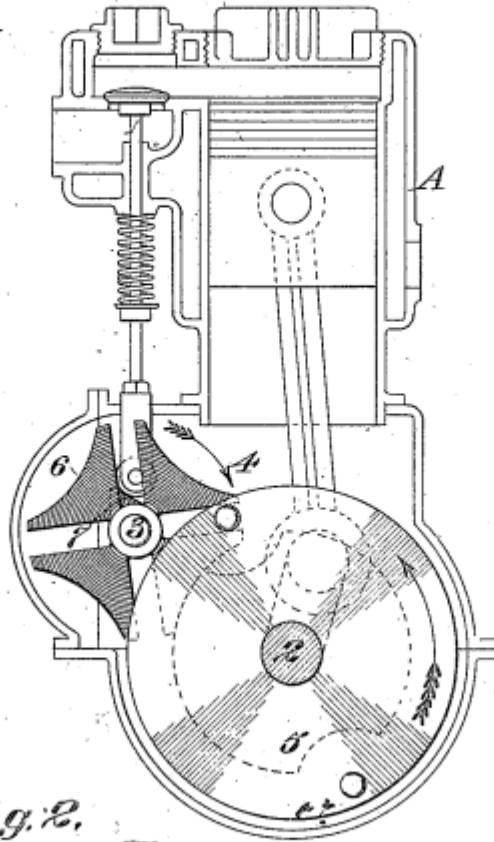
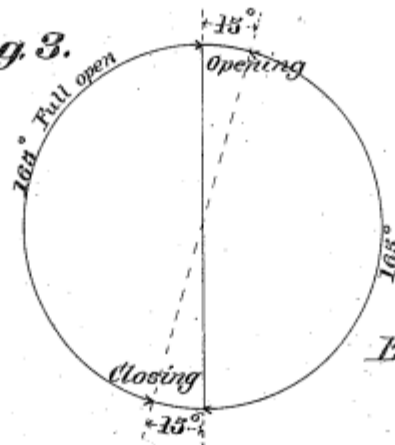

CAM-SHAFT DRIVE.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, ERIN P. NAGLE, a citizen of the United States, residing at Emeryville, in the county of Alameda and State of California, have invented new and useful Improvements in Cam-Shaft Drives, of which the following is a specification.

This invention relates to a cam shaft drive for internal combustion engines.

It is one of the objects of the present invention to provide a novel drive or connection between the crank-shaft and cam shaft on an internal combustion engine, whereby the cam shaft may be intermittently rotated at a speed ratio equal to that of the engine shaft, thereby causing a quick opening and closing of the valves, together with a complete open position period greater than can possibly be secured with the two-to-one gear drive now commonly in use.

Further objects will hereinafter appear. The invention consists of the parts and the construction and combination of parts as hereinafter more fully described and claimed, having reference to the accompanying drawings, in which—

Figure 1 is a central vertical section through an internal combustion engine showing the application of the invention. Fig. 2 is a plan view of the Geneva movement. Fig. 3 is a diagrammatic view of the valve movement.

A indicates in general a four cycle internal combustion engine, 2 the crank-shaft and 3 the cam shaft. The cam shaft is driven from the crank-shaft by the Geneva movement generally indicated at 4 and is in this manner intermittently turned 90° at a time or 360° or one complete revolution to two of the crank-shaft.

The proportion of the two members 5 and 6 of the Geneva movement is such that the speed ratio of one shaft, with relation to the other, while turning, is practically the same. This is a very important feature as it permits the exhaust and inlet valves to be opened or closed much quicker than where the two-to-one gear drive is used.

In the present instance by the use of an ordinary cam, such as is indicated at 7, it is possible to secure a complete opening of the valve during 15° of travel of the crank-shaft as compared with 30° to 40° on the

two-to-one gear drive. It is also possible to retain the valve completely open during a longer period than has heretofore been possible. For instance, by referring to diagram, Fig. 3, it is found that the valve is opened during 15° of crank travel. It thus remains completely open during 165° of crank travel and is again closed on 15° of travel, or, in other words, it is possible to open and close the valve during 30° of travel, thus making it possible to maintain a complete opening of 165° during a total travel of 195° of crank movement.

The materials and finish of the several parts of the cam shaft drive are such as the experience and judgment of the manufacturer may dictate.

I wish it understood that various changes in form, proportions, and minor details of construction may be resorted to within the scope of the appended claim and that I do not wish to limit myself to the specific design and construction here shown.

Having thus described my invention, what I claim and desire to secure by Letters Patent is—

In combination, an engine having a hollow base, a crank shaft mounted in the base of the engine, a cam shaft also mounted in the hollow base, a valve operating cam fixed on the cam shaft within the engine base for actuating a valve of the engine, the slotted member of a Geneva movement fixed to the cam shaft within the engine base adjacent the valve operating cam, and the cooperating member of the Geneva movement mounted on the crank shaft and having spaced annular flanges between which the slotted member is adapted to move to engage with the driving pins supported between the flanges of said cooperating member, the hub of the slotted member being disposed in proximity to the periphery of the cooperating member to provide a compact arrangement.

LEAVES QUEER WILL.

Younger Children Get Nothing Under Its Provisions.

(The Bee's Special Service.)

NAPA (Napa Co.), November 28.—One of the strangest and most interesting wills ever offered for probate in Napa County was filed here yesterday by Attorney Percy S. King, who asks that letters upon the estate be issued to him.

The testament is that of Absalom Bennett, a Browns Valley resident, who died in North Dakota in September last, while on a visit to relatives. The testator leaves a wife and ten children. His will is a holographic affair of nine lines, executed about three years and a half ago.

Under the terms of the will, Bennett bequeathed his entire estate to his wife. In the event of her death,

all the property was to go to the oldest daughter, and if she should die, then the entire estate was to be inherited by the eldest son. In the event either the son or daughter should inherit, he or she should "provide for our children that shall be subject to them." No mention of the wife providing for any of the children is made, and she becomes the sole legatee.

The most interesting feature of the truly strange document is the fact that it is a "double" will. After Bennett had affixed his signature to the bottom of the brief writing, he wrote immediately after his name the character "&," which is followed by the signature of Mary Jane Bennett on the same line.

The funeral was held from the J. C. Durkee residence at 1211 First avenue south in Fargo this afternoon at 2 o'clock. Rev. Herbert G. Leonard, D. D., of the First M. E. church officiated.

EMERYVILLE, Nov. 23.—Armed with a search warrant, Marshal Cushing and Deputy Marshal Lane yesterday morning went to the hostelry on Holden street near the race track entrance, conducted by F. Grossheim, and recovered a saddle which had been stolen from Daniel Hanlin.

A great many petty thefts of horse furnishings have been reported of late, and it has been suspected that some one was acting as a go-between for the thieves in receiving the stolen goods. No proof of this could be found however, and the goods were scarcely ever recovered.

A short time ago Hanlin learned that a saddle which had been stolen from him some time last May was in Grossheim's possession. Going to the hostelry he demanded the saddle but was told that it was not there. Not satisfied with this, he swore to a search warrant yesterday. When Marshal Cushing went to the hostelry armed with the warrant Grossheim immediately produced the saddle, saying that he had bought it from a boy for \$3. He threatened to prosecute the boy.

MAN OUT ON PROBATION MUST FACE NEW CHARGE

**Louis Nagle, Who Pleaded Guilty of
Grand Larceny, Is Now Accused
of Battery.**

Upon the issue of a charge of battery preferred against Louis Nagle hangs a sentence in the city prison and also a term in the penitentiary. Nagle is charged with abusing a conductor on a street car whom he alleged mistreated him. A warrant was issued for his arrest and he will appear in the police court on Monday.

Last September Nagle was charged with grand larceny, entered a plea of guilty and was placed on probation upon the understanding that he would keep out of trouble. CONSTABLE IS ACCUSED OF MURDER

Morris Lane, Whose Wife Runs Saloon, Shoots and Kills Louis Nagle After a Series of Encounters in the Place

The Early Story of Accidental Shooting Doubted by District Attorney After Investigation; Four Suspects to Be Freed

Constable Morris Lane of Emeryville, whose wife conducts the Martinique saloon on High street, where Louis Nagle was shot and killed last night while running from a gang of iron workers with whom he had been drinking, was charged with murder today by District Attorney W. H. L. Hynes after consultation with Assistant District Attorney James Koford, who had made a thorough investigation surrounding the facts of the tragedy. Lane secured the services of Attorney Lin Church and may be admitted to bail. This will have to be taken up with the presiding judge of the superior court.

While Lane made a surrender of himself last night immediately after the shooting, he was given his liberty by Sheriff Frank Barnett on the story as told by Lane. At that time, in company with Judge James Quinn, he told of shooting his best friend by mistake at the Emeryville place, explaining that he thought his wife's place was being attacked by a gang of hoodlums. This morning, as soon as he arrived at the office Assistant District Attorney Koford began to probe into the story of Lane and at noon concluded that he should tell his story to a jury.

Koford interviewed Peter Ratto, Robert Buckman, William Powell and Harry Pollack, the men who had been drinking with Nagel prior to the shooting. According to what he could make of their narrative, Nagel and Pollack had fought earlier in the evening at the Ranlett Hotel, some distance from the Lane place. Here Pollack and Nagel patched up their difference and the five men went to Lane's place, where more drinks were had. An altercation arose and Nagel and Pollack again fought, and, unable to restore harmony, Lane put them out of the place. In the street they again fought, Lane remaining in the saloon before the bar with his hat off.

BULLET PIERCES HEART.

The men went some distance from the Martinique and Nagel turned to run away from their threats, taking a course back to the saloon. As the men gave chase Nagel rushed into the door. The same instant Lane shot, the bullet piercing Nagel's heart.

Marshal Ed Carey, after Lane had reported the affair, arrested the four men who had been out with Nagel. They were held until Koford could talk to them today. All will be released.

Behind the tragedy of last night is the court record of Nagel, who leaves a widow and two minor children. He had resided at the lodging-house over the Martinique for some time past, earning \$40 a week. His wife caused his arrest for failure to provide, and Deputy District Attorney William Smith had ordered Lane to take him into custody. The events of last night leave the widow destitute, the children in dire want and the mother in need of immediate medical attention.

The Martinique saloon was the scene of the Garland-Lux tragedy, when Hazel Lux, a woman of the night life shot and killed William Garland because he refused to marry her. After a sensational trial she was found guilty of murder and given a life sentence in San Quentin.

At the county jail today Lane declines to make any statement, on the advice of his attorney. Efforts will be made at once to have him admitted to bail, it being in the discretion of the court to do so. Church will make the application as soon as bondsmen can be selected.

LANE'S STATEMENT.

Earlier today, however, Lane, in explaining the circumstances of the shooting, characterized the affair as an unfortunate accident which he would not have had happen for the world. He said:

"The trouble started between a gang of roughs, some of whom were from Seattle, and Nagle, the dead man, in my hotel, 1377 Park avenue, Emeryville. Nagle had been badly beaten by these roughs during an altercation in a saloon in some other part of Emeryville early in the evening. He came home and the hoodlums followed him to the hotel. I warned them away. Later Nagle went out again, without my knowledge, leaving me in the belief that he was upstairs in his own room in bed. Shortly before midnight the gang came back again, armed with stones and bricks, and announced that they were going to clean up the place. They went away after a time and a overtaken by the gang and was running up on the porch again. I did not know that Nagle had again been overtaken by the gang and was running back to the hotel to escape them. As he dashed through the front door with his head down and the gang at his heels in the dark I thought that it was the ring leader of the gang breaking his way into the hotel. The women in the hotel were in a half-hysterical condition and in the excitement I fired a shot in the general direction of the crowd with the intention of shooting over their heads to frighten them. Instead I shot and killed Nagle. It is a most regrettable happening."

OFFICER KILLS WORKER IN SALOON ROW

Shot Fired When Brawlers Re- fuse to Cease Their Fight- ing, Penetrates Man's Heart

When it came to choosing between friendship and his conception of duty, Constable Morris Lane, of Emeryville, decided against his friend last night. As a result, Louis Nagle, a steel worker, was shot and killed by Lane.

Last night, while passing a saloon at 1477 Park avenue, Emeryville, Lane heard the sounds of a violent brawl inside. He entered and found several men struggling back and forth, fighting with fists and chairs. Fearing that someone would be killed, Lane tried to stop the fighting. No one paid any attention to his orders. Lane then drew his revolver and shot. The bullet passed through Nagle's heart.

Lane surrendered himself to the county authorities immediately after the shooting. He appeared greatly affected by the tragedy, and told of the friendship that had existed between himself and Nagle. Nagle lived in a lodging-house over the saloon.

LANE ACCUSED OF THREAT TO USE GUN

Testimony Brought Forth at
Inquest of Louis Nagle That
Constable Warned Custom-
ers of Intentions in Evening

Bartender Recites Story of the
Tragedy Before Coroner's
Jury; Petersen to Delve Into
Details Surrounding Affray

An inquest held today by Coroner Grant Miller over the remains of Louis Nagle, who was shot and killed by Constable Morris Lane, in Emeryville, last Sunday night, brought out testimony to the effect that Lane, prior to the shooting, had threatened a group of customers that he would "use his gun" if they did not desist from making trouble; that drinks were served to intoxicated men, and that the fatal shot was fired within two feet of Nagle as he burst through the door into the saloon.

Lane stood with drawn weapon as the men approached the place, having been warned by his wife that they were about to make an assault, according to the testimony of C. R. Armour, bartender, who witnessed the tragedy.

Neither the prosecution nor the defense made any pretense of producing evidence at the inquest. Assistant District Attorney James M. Koford was present, as was Attorney Lin S. Church, representing Lane, who accompanied him. Lane was not called to the witness chair. The witnesses were Mrs. Esther Nagle, the widow of the slain man; Armour, the bartender, and Dr. E. V. Tiffany, county autopsy surgeon.

CORONER'S VERDICT.

The verdict of the jury was to the effect that the deceased came to his death from a pistol shot wound in the hands of Morris Lane, and further recommended "that Morris Lane be held and that further investigation be made by the authorities."

This investigation is now in the hands of Chief of Police Peterson, who was asked by District Attorney Hynes to handle the case in its preliminary stages through the police court. Until Lane is held to answer, Chief Petersen will probe into all angles of the case, into the past history of Nagle and his wife, Esther, who was some time ago an important witness in a tragedy coming out of Emeryville and into the relations between Lane and Nagle.

Mrs. Nagle was called to the stand to identify her husband's body, and to give unimportant details of the case. She was not subjected to any cross-examination, nor were the other witnesses other than Armour, who was asked by one of the jurors as to whether Lane was drinking on the night of the tragedy. The bartender's reply was that Lane had perhaps "two or three drinks during the evening, not what you would call drinking."

Armour recited the incidents that

lead up to the tragedy. He referred to the four men who were drinking with Nagle. They were Peter Ratto, William Powell, Ralph Buckman and Harry Pollock. Pollock appeared to be the leader of the gang in the tempest of words that preceded the shooting affray.

That the men had entered the place earlier in the evening, about 9 o'clock, coming apparently from another saloon, and that they were intoxicated at the time, was the statement of Armour.

"Apparently Nagle had met them on the outside, where they had a quarrel. They entered the bar and continued the quarrel. Lane ordered them out of the place. Pollock objected and Lane cuffed him with his handcuffs. He tried to keep Nagle in the place, telling him not to go outside with the other gentlemen. Lane stepped out of the room for a minute and Nagle went out.

"During the argument Lane told the bunch that if they did not quit bothering the place he would have to use his gun.

BOTH MEN FRIENDS.

"Some time after the men left Mrs. Lane came into the barroom and said that the men were across the street acting in a threatening manner, arming themselves with stones and clubs. Lane stood in front of the bar with his revolver in his hand. Suddenly the figure of a man burst through the doors, head downward. Lane fired. I don't believe that he meant to hit him, only to frighten the crowd. After he fired he

ORIGINAL CHARGE STANDS.

Members of the Structural Iron Workers' Union, of which Nagle was a member, are following the case closely, as are Lane's political allies.

The original charge of murder will stand until after the preliminary hearing, which commences next Friday before Judge Samuels. It will remain for Judge Samuels to fix the degree of the crime upon evidence produced in his court in holding the defendant to answer. This degree may be murder or manslaughter. If manslaughter, the pleadings in the Superior Court will be made to that charge. The district attorney's office, in taking up the case in the Superior Court, will proceed along the lines of the testimony brought out in the lower court. That at the utmost a strong case of manslaughter may be established is the opinion of many who have followed the case so far.

From the testimony of Armour, Lane's bartender, before the coroner's jury today, it was drawn that Nagle "happened" to be the victim of the shot fired by Lane; that any other of the men who were on the outside would have received the bullet had he been the first through the door.

It is believed that Nagle, for whom Lane had shown solicitude during a

After he fired he saw that it was Nagle who was shot."

Asked by Coroner Miller as to the relations between Lane and Nagle, Armour responded that "so far as he knew they were the best of friends."

"I always heard Lane say that Louie was a fine boy, and I heard Nagle say that Lane was his best friend."

Following the inquest Lane stated that his wife is in danger of her life from heart trouble as the result of the tragedy and that it was for that reason that he desired to be released on bail, as her condition was aggravated on account of his confinement.

"It was a regrettable incident," he said. "Things are bad enough as they are without any more trouble and my wife is in a very precarious condition."

Mrs. Nagle, smiling through tears, consented to pose for her photograph. She had no comment to make, no denunciation, and left the Harbours undertaking parlors, where the inquest was held, after making arrangements for the funeral and ordering a special wreath of flowers.

In the meantime political forces of Emeryville and Oakland are taking more than ordinary interest in the case. Constable Lane has been a prominent figure in county politics for many years, both in Emeryville and in Oakland. The case was passed up to the Oakland police department in order to obviate embarrassment on

previous visit in the barroom by endeavoring to prevent him from going outside with the others, had again been assaulted on the outside and was returning for protection from his friend.

Dr. Tiffany, who assisted in performing the autopsy, testified that Nagle's face bore signs of rough treatment. He said that he had bruises over and above his eyes and on different parts of his head. Armour testified that Nagle had a fight with someone before he entered the barroom the first time and that it was for that reason that Lane advised him to stay within.

PETERSEN OBJECTS.

The release of Lane was an exceptional proceeding. Chief Petersen contends, in view of the fact that he was formally charged with murder, and that no evidence was presented to Police Judge Samuels that would tend to show that a lesser charge than murder would hold before a superior court jury.

Pending the preliminary hearing for the defendant in the police court next Friday, Chief Petersen is conducting a searching investigation into the circumstances that lead up to the shooting and the conditions under which the fatal shot was fired by Lane. Chief Petersen said today:

"We are going into this investigation without consideration of any politics. I want it understood that we are acting strictly as police officers, and that we will proceed in the case of

Lane as we would were anyone else involved. That he was an officer of the law will make no difference so far as the procedure is concerned.

IN REGARD TO BAIL.

"As to the matter of bail being allowed, there was no evidence presented to the court that would tend to show that a lesser crime than murder was committed. If the district attorney's office believed that the crime was a bailable offense, why was not the charge reduced to manslaughter, or evidence produced that would indicate it in that degree? While it is within the province of the court to grant bail in a murder case, it should be upon a consideration of evidence justifying such a course. In this case Judge Samuels is not to be criticized,

the part of the county officials, who would under ordinary conditions have handled the preliminary proceedings. Lane having been an officer in the court of the justice of the peace of Oakland township, Judge James G. Quinn was practically barred from sitting in the preliminaries as a mat-

ter of ethics, and for that reason the case was assigned to Judge George Samuels in the Oakland Police Court, upon request of District Attorney Hynes.

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as he acted upon the recommendation of the district attorney's office.

"There are not any personal reasons why Lane should not be released on bail, but there are police reasons why such a course in a murder case might thwart justice. Had the case been primarily within the jurisdiction of the police department, I would have vigorously opposed the proceedings.

"If Mr. Lane had done nothing reprehensible, he should have come in with clean hands and made a statement, at the same time producing the weapon. So far as I know, this has not taken place."

Witnesses Missing In Trial of Lane

Appearing in the Superior Court of Oakland yesterday with her three weeks old baby, born since the alleged murder of her husband by Constable Morris Lane of Emeryville, Mrs. Louis Nagle listened to the reading of a transcript of testimony given at the preliminary police hearing by C. R. Armour, chief witness for the prosecution, who is now missing.

A bench warrant for Armour, who was the bartender in the Martinique saloon at Emeryville on the night that Constable Lane shot and killed Nagle, remains unserved, and three subpoenas for William Powell, Ralph Buckman and Harry Pollock, companions of Nagle, were returned to the court yesterday also unserved.

Upon the failure of witnesses for the prosecution to appear, Superior Judge Frank Ogden permitted the testimony given by Armour at the police hearing to be read as the people's evidence.
