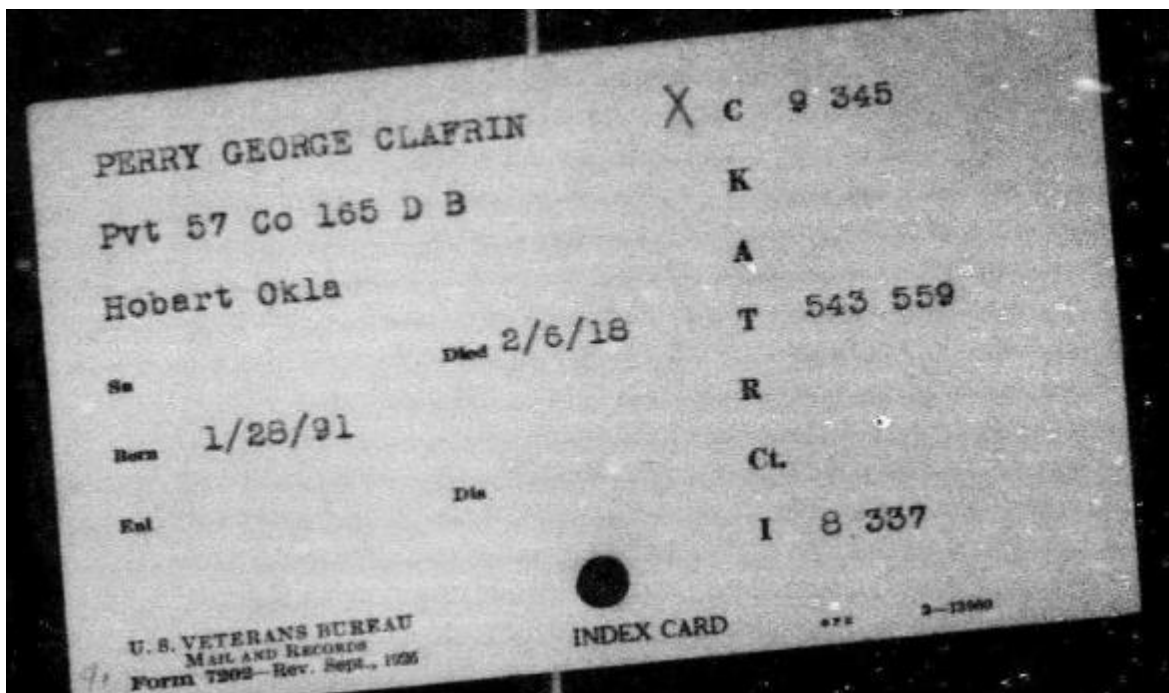

Thirty-Five Oklahomans' Names Are Still Among Missing With List of Survivors Incomplete

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Names of 106 Oklahoma men who were aboard the submarine Tuscania appear in a list of the names of 1,741 survivors cabled from "An Irish Port" to the war department today. This leaves thirty-five Oklahoma men known to have been aboard the boat unaccounted for. The names of three Oklahomans not included in the first lists of those reported on board showed up today in the list of survivors. They are Arthur G. Berry of Orlando, Howard J. Piper of Enid and Edward J. McMann of Prague. That makes a total of 141 Oklahomans known to have been aboard the vessel when she was torpedoed.

Relatives of men known to have been on the Tuscania and whose names do not appear in the list of survivors should feel reassured in the fact that the names of many survivors are yet to be received. They are coming in very slowly and there is no assurance when the list will be complete.

Three hundred and forty-five are still unaccounted for from the cabled list, but no official report has reached the war department to change the estimate that all except 113 of the men were saved.

PERRY AND KINGHAM IN LIST OF MISSING

Lone Wolf and Roosevelt Soldiers Not in Register of Tuscania Survivors—Thirty Oklahomans Believed Lost.

George C. Perry, son of Mrs. C. A. Perry, of Lone Wolf, and Merl S. Kingham, listed as being from Roosevelt, Texas, but in reality from Roosevelt, Kiowa county, Oklahoma, are in the list of the thirty Oklahomans, missing since the Tuscania was torpedoed off the coast of Ireland, Wednesday February 6.

It was not known in Hobart, until Tuesday morning that Merl S. Kingham, listed as being from Texas, was from Kiowa county. He enlisted a few months ago with Albert R. Harrison, of Roosevelt. Both remained together during their military service and embarked on the Tuscania. Harrison is listed as being among the survivors.

Howard E. Bowman, of Rocky, is also among the missing.

Late reports show that Otto Bussamus of Indianahoma, was rescued.

Oscar McCollum, of Lone Wolf, and Albert R. Harrison, of R. F. D. No. 3, Roosevelt, were likewise rescued. George C. Perry, of Lone Wolf, has not been heard from, and, of course, it is not known yet whether he has survived or not.

U. S. Expeditionary Forces in France,
via New York.

Mrs. C. A. Perry:

Lone Wolf, Okla.,

Dear Mother:

I will drop you a few lines to let you know I am fixing to take the rest of my trip across. I thought I would write my last farewell to you and the good old U. S. A., for a while. I hope it won't be forever.

Our officers said we were the hardest bunch they had ever seen, or we would of all been sick leaving a warm country and coming to such a cold country.

I don't dread going over to the trenches, but I dread to have to leave you all, but go I must and it can't be helped.

Mother, address your letters like I have written it at the head of this letter and they will send it to me anywhere I am.

Tell all of my friends I said good-bye to them.

I don't know much to write tonight so I will close for this time, so good-bye, as ever,

PERRY IS IN LIST OF TUSCANIA DEAD

**Three Oklahoma Lads Included
With Names of Sixty-one Ad-
ditional Men Lost on Trans-
port Tuscania Sank Feb. 6**

In a list of 61 more names of men who lost their lives on the Tuscania, sank February 6 by a German submarine, appears the names of three Oklahoma boys, one of whom is George C. Perry, of Lone Wolf, this county, now thought to be the only one from this community who went down with the ill-starred transport.

George C. Perry is the son of Mrs. C. A. Perry, who lives on a farm between Lone Wolf and Lugert. She is a widow, her husband having died at Lugert a few years ago.

Since it was known Perry was on the boat, hope has been entertained for his safety, and up until the war department Tuesday received the official list, which included his name, his friends were hopeful for a cheering report.

The other two Oklahomans reported lost are Joe Cochran of Lawton, and Ondis Powell of Sasakwa.

A few days ago, Meryl Kngham, thought to have been lost on the boat, was among the missing, but his safety has been reported.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—If a bill now pending in congress becomes a law, the bodies of all of the Oklahoma soldiers, except one, who lost their lives when the Tuscania was torpedoed will be returned to this country and buried with full military honors in the National cemetery at Arlington, -Va.

The bill provides for the return of all of the bodies of the Tuscania victims and their burial side by side in a suitable spot in the National cemetery.

It also provides for the erection of a monument to their memory on which would be inscribed the names of those who perished, their rank, organization and date of their death. All expense of the transfer of the bodies and their burial in Arlington would be borne by the government and would take place after the close of the war.

According to the final compilation of all available reports on the victims of the Tuscania, which has just been completed by the statistical division of the war department, the bodies of fifteen of the sixteen Oklahoma men who were lost, were recovered, identified and buried on foreign shores. The body still unaccounted for is that of George C. Perry of Lone Wolf, private in the Fifty-seventh company, 165th depot brigade. His mother is Mrs. C. A. Perry of Lone Wolf. It is assumed by

the war department that his body was lost at sea and he has been officially and finally classed as "missing."

The bodies of twelve of the Oklahoma victims, the report shows, were identified by identification tags or papers they carried as soon as they were recovered from the sea, while the identification of the remaining three was established by finger prints.

No effort is being made to hurry consideration of the bill for the return of the bodies although there is considerable sentiment in favor of it. The bodies have been buried at points far removed from the scene of fighting and which have no particular interest in connection with the war, which could be urged as reasons for letting them remain in their present resting places.

Oliver H. Turney, Cooperton, who died at Camp Travis.

"Pete" Christian, Mountain View, who also died at Camp Travis.

Frank W. Broaddus, who died at Camp Doniphan.

These young men have made the supreme sacrifice in the present war to the end that free government may endure throughout the world.

The principal address was made by the Hon. Claude Weaver, postmaster of Oklahoma City and former Congressman at large for Oklahoma, and was among the most beautiful ever delivered in the county. The music for the occasion was furnished by the band of Brunk's Comedians.

The meeting was opened by J. M. Rule, chairman of the Kiowa County Council of Defense, and the principal speaker of the evening was preceded by George L. Zink in a splendid tribute to Kiowa county's honored dead and by the reading of Abraham Lincoln's celebrated Gettysburg speech by Judge James R. Tolbert. Rev. J. D. Salter closed the services with prayer to Almighty God, invoking Him to be with our soldiers in our training camps and in foreign fields.

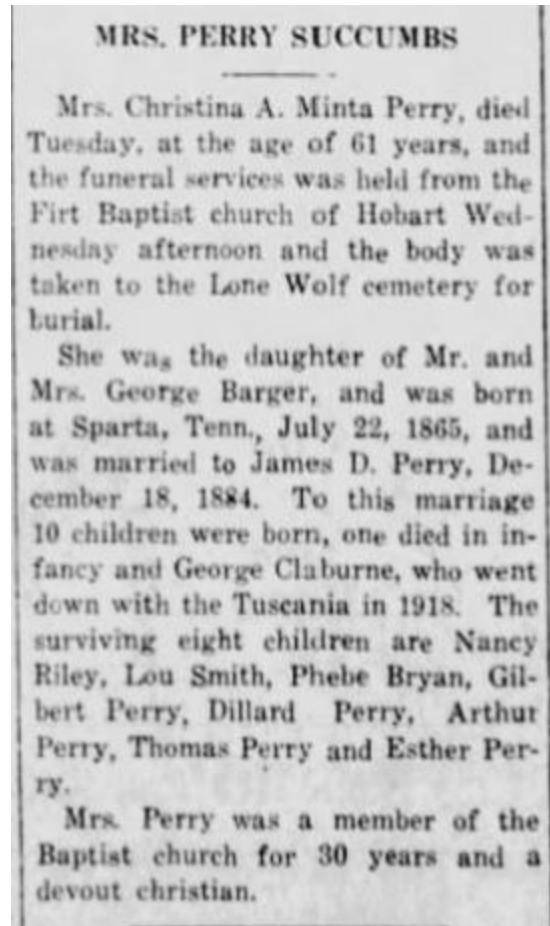

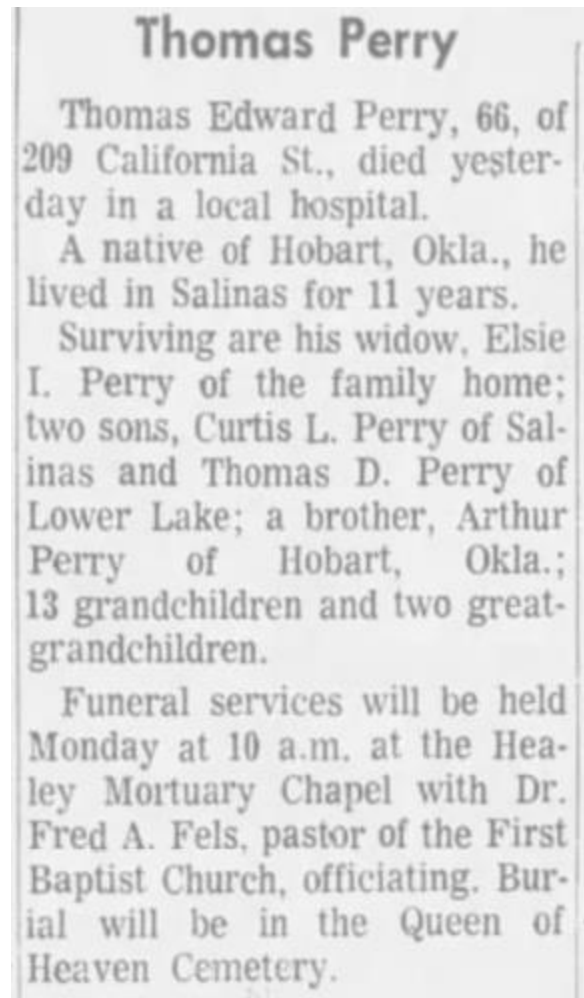
