Sixth Annual Family Reunion Of Popes At Ernest Ford Home

The spacious and beautiful home nearly about 1810. The old ranch home and grounds of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Ford and family formed the setting for the sixth annual reunion of the Pope family of Mississippi on Sunday, June 18.

There was a large gathering of descendants and interrelated members of the Pope, Ball, Ford, Rankin, Rawls, Barnes, and Regan families. All of these were pioneer settlers of Marion County.

Joe N. Pope, vice-chairman, of Angie, La. presided in the absence of the chairman, Jack Pope, of McComb. After necessary business matters were transacted, a special memorial service for departed members and a dedication service for the restoration of the cemetery of the pioneer ancestors was held.

A large boulder type marker has been placed at the graves of Jacob Pope and his wife Sara Lee Pope, and their descendants. These pioneers moved from Robeson County, North Carolina and patented a large tract of land and built their

home burned many years ago and nothing remains on the site except the aged oaks and the burial plot. The present owner of the original acreage is Ernest Ford, a descendant of the Pope family, on the paternal side.

Judge Sebe Dale of Columbia, a distinguished relative, gave a most impressive address on, "The Value of Family Life." He emphasized the importance of a good family name. He stressed the point that the family was essential if our nation is to survive.

The next meeting of the family will be held at Percy Quin Park, McComb, on the third Sunday of June, 1962.

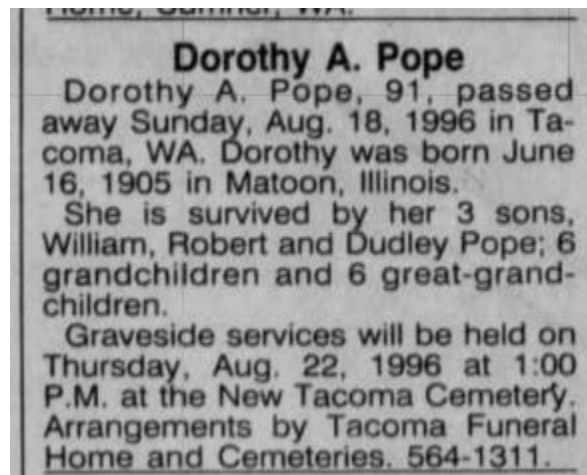

WILLIAM WINSTON POPE of Tylertown, Mississippi, Representative from Walthall County is the son of 'Jacob Pope and Berthana (Magee) Pope, daughter of John Magee and Clara Magee of Dexter, Marion County, Miss., (now Walthall County). He was born October 25, 1850, near Columbia in Marion County. His father, Jacob Pope, son of Sampson and Esther (Barnes) Pope, was born near Columbia. He was First Lieutenant of his company during the Civil War. Along with six brothers, one of whom was Major Henry Pope, he gave to the cause his whole manhood, in' the South's struggle for constitutional rights and liberties. The Pope family is believed by the present generation to have been descended from Thomas Pope, who came from England to America in 1631 and settled at Plymouth, Mass. W. W.

Pope's great-grandfather, Jacob Pope, moved from North Carolina to Marion County, Miss. in 1811 and was among the wealthy slave-owners and stockmen of that section. His son, Sampson Pope owned one of the largest ranches in his county. He was well versed in medicine and, being a man of large wealth and leisure, he gave his neighbors and their slaves the benefit of his medical knowledge, free of cost to them. His wife, Esther (Barnes) Pope, was well connected and owned in her own right quite a number of slaves, besides other property. Her sister, Charity Spear, married an officer of high rank in the 'War of 1812'. William Winston Pope was educated in the country schools of his locality, enjoying also the advantages of careful instruction and supervision by educated members of his family, a privilege that meant much at a time when the country was just emerging from the dark clouds of the Civil War, and was still contending with conditions that were not favorable to the establishment of schools and colleges.

As a mere youth, he assumed the responsibility of caring for his family, his father having enlisted in the Confederate Army. Like so many young men of the South, after the war, he chose farming as his occupation and prompted, doubtless, by the trials and vexations of agricultural labor without proper implements, he invented the Pope Side Harrow, and later made a stump burner on which he received, in December 1913, a patent. By the use of this latter invention, farmers make a great saving on all former plans for removing stumps.

Mr. Pope's fondness for agricultural pursuits, though of an absorbing nature, left him time to engage in many important movements for the social and political welfare of his section. He was William W. Pope active in all movements for the Prohibition Cause. During 1889-90, he was assistant manager of a mercantile company in McComb City and at various times has been employed as a collector and traveling agent. His participation in public affairs brought him into great popularity with the people and for three terms they have insisted that he should represent their interests in the Legislature. As a member of this body, he has proved entirely worthy of their confidence and has always been a keen and intelligent observer and participant in all that affects the welfare of his county and his state, and serves upon the following committees: Agriculture; Corporations; Census and Apportionment; Registrations and Elections; Pensions. Representative Pope is a Democrat; has served as a member of the Democratic Executive Committee in Marion County; and has been a delegate to County Nominating Conventions. A member of the Baptist Church, he has always been foremost in church work and has served in various positions connected with the business affairs of that denomination. He is a member of the fraternal order of Masons, in which he has served as secretary for a number of years; he was overseer of the Farmers' Grange in the 70's; was president of the local Lodge and lecturer of the County Farmers' Alliance. On October 14, 1879,

Mr. Pope was married to Eugenia Conerly, daughter of John M. and Lucinda (Lampton) Conerly or Tylertown, Miss. The Lampton family moved from Tennessee to Mississippi; the Conerlys from South Carolina to the same state. After the death of his first wife, Mr. Pope married Isabella Fortenberry, daughter of Willie and Lizzie (Pigott) Fortenberry, the ancestors of the latter having come to Mississippi from Georgia.

The Mississippi Foundry and Machine Company was founded in 1900 as a manufacturer of agricultural implements. Initially its major product was the Pope Side Harrow, which had previously been made by the firm of Crawford & Lapton Bros. That firm was reorganized in 1900 as the Jackson Harrow Company, which was, in turn, sold to the Mississippi Foundry and Machine Company. (The original foundry operated by Crawford & Lapton Bros. had stood alongside the Illinois Central Railroad on the eastern side of the property. It was demolished about 1925 when the Illinois Central Railroad elevated its tracks, and it was rebuilt in 1925 as the new foundry wing.)

The company continued in operation at this location for over ninety years. In 1953 it was cited in *The Story of Jackson* as one of the major industrial companies established soon after 1900 that was still active at that time.² Through the years the company's product line gradually changed. In its early years it produced agricultural implements and steam mill components. By the 1950s it has shifted its production to mill and industrial supplies and oil and gas well equipment. By 1959, its major products were oil and gas well supplies.³ The company ceased operation about 1991.

WILLIAM WINSTON POPE, OF TYLER TOWN, MISSISSIPPI.

HARROW.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Letters Patent No. 371,275, dated October 11, 1887.

Application filed March 1, 1887. Serial No. 229,322. (No model.)

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WILLIAM WINSTON POPE, a citizen of the United States, residing at Tyler Town, in the county of Pike and State of Mississippi, have invented certain new and useful Improvements in Harrows; and I do declare the following to be a full, clear, and exact description of the invention, such as will enable others skilled in the art to which it appertains to make and use the same, reference being had to the accompanying drawings, and to the letters and figures of reference marked thereon, which form a part of this specification.

Figure 1 is a perspective view of the device. Fig. 2 is a plan view of the frame, with parts broken away; Fig. 3, a side view of the frame-clamp; Fig. 4, a perspective view of the plow-clamp.

This invention relates to improvements in harrows; and it consists in the construction, hereinafter pointed out and claimed.

In the annexed drawings, the letter A indicates the clevis-holder of the plow. This holder may be made of two strips of metal, B, the portions *b* secured together, and the portions *b'* diverging therefrom at *b''*, such portions *b'* being connected at the ends *b'* by the bar *b'*; or the holder may be made in one piece, the various parts being formed and arranged as shown in the drawings. Passing around the portions *b'*, and held thereto by bolts *c*, is a band, C, having top and bottom *c'*, provided with notches *c''*. The bar *b'* is shaped so as to have the three parts *d d' d''*, the parts *d' d''* diverging from the middle part, *d*.

Secured by bolt *e* to the part *d'* is the skeleton frame E, consisting of top and bottom plates, *e' e''*, and ends *e'' e'*, the former of which is inside of the holder A and bolted to the bar *b'*. To the other side of the holder is similarly secured a duplicate frame, E. The outer edges of the plates *e' e''* of these frames are provided with notches *f*, preferably rectangular in shape, as shown. To the rear ends of these frames are bolted the ends *g* of the rear cross-brace, G, of the harrow. From this brace rise the uprights H, supporting the handles *h*. To this frame are fastened the plows I. The standards I' of these plows are L-shaped in

cross-section, having the offsets *l*. Any desired number of these plows may be used. One of them is secured to the band C, the offset *l* resting in the notches *c''*, said plow being clamped to the band. The other plows are arranged along the outside of the frames E, the offsets *l* resting in certain notches *f*, the plows being held by clamps M. These clamps consist of bolts *m*, having eyes *m'*, which surround the standards I', and threaded shanks *m''*, which pass between the plates *e' e''* and engage plates N, the lips *n* of which catch the inner edges of the plates *e' e''*. By means of these clamps M the position of the plows can be varied; also, plows of different size can be used with the same frame. These clamps also brace and strengthen the skeleton frame.

When only a few plows are used, I employ the clamp P to strengthen and brace the frames. This clamp consists of the twin plates *p p*, having at top and bottom the notches *p' p''*, adapted in shape and size to the plates *e' e''*. These plates *p p* are held together by the bolt *p''*, which passes between the plates *e' e''* and clamps the plates *p p* against them.

This construction forms a light and strong harrow, in which the parts are removable and adjustable, and yet are held firmly together. By making the notches *f* rectangular tendency to wrench the standards is avoided.

Having described my invention, what I claim is—

1. The combination of the clevis-holder A, the band C around said holder, the skeleton frames E E, secured to said holder, the rear brace, G, and the plows adjustably held to such frames and band, as set forth.

2. The combination of the clevis-holder A, the bar *b'* of which has the diverging parts *d' d''*, the band C around said holder, the skeleton frames E E, secured to said parts *d' d''*, the rear brace, G, and the plows adjustably held to such frames and band, as set forth.

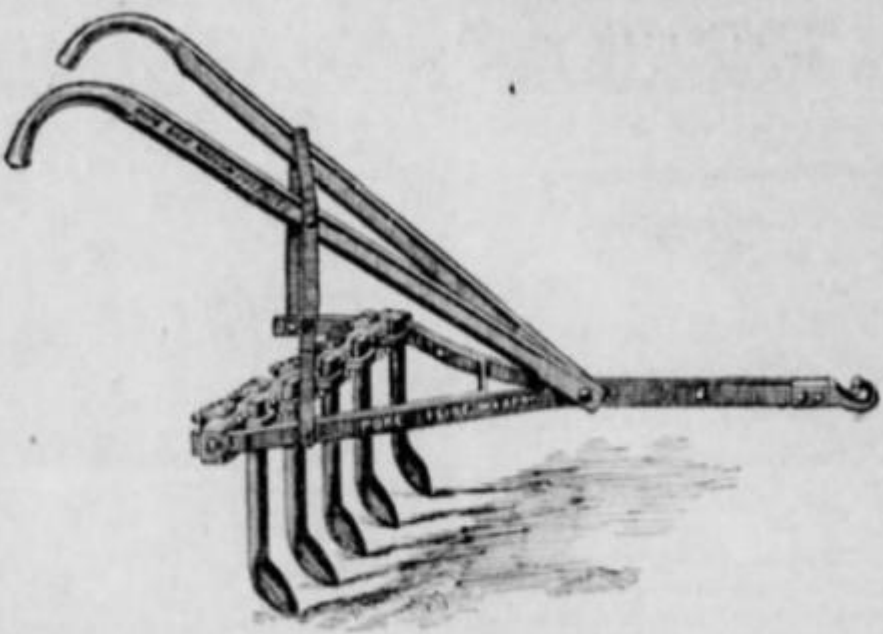

1. In a **stump burner**, a fire-box having an open side adapted to be placed against a stump, the fire-box being of less height than the stump and having an outlet for the products of combustion, the said outlet being located adjacent to the open side of the fire box.

2. In a **stump burner**, a fire-box having an open side adapted to be placed against a stump and to partly surround the same, the fire-box being of less height than the stump, and a smoke-box adapted to communicate with the fire-box, and having also an open side adapted to be disposed against the stump.

3. In a **stump burner**, a multi-section fire-box having an open side adapted to be placed against a stump, the fire-box being of less height than the stump and having an outlet for the products of combustion, the outlet being located adjacent to the open side of the fire box.

4. 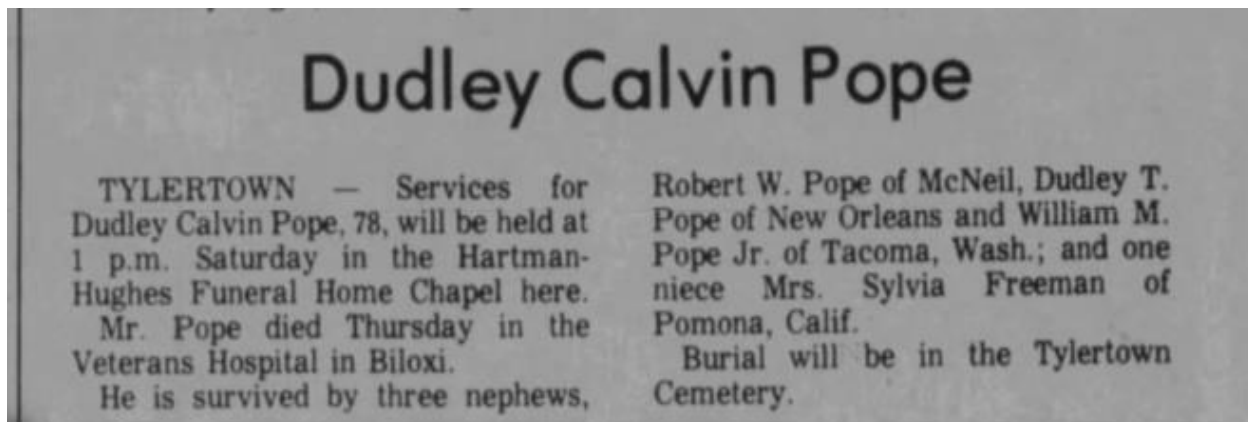

WALTHALL COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI



Although the Walthall County area was one of the first areas in the region to be settled, it was one of the last counties to be organized. Walthall was carved out of Old Pike County, which had been part of Old Marion County. Old Marion County was originally part of Amite County, which had been part of Wilkinson County, which in turn had once been part of Adams County. The earliest significant community in Walthall County is China Grove, eight miles northeast of Tylertown on Magee's Creek. The creek was the site of several grist mills. China Grove is also the site of one of the oldest churches in south Mississippi. The China Grove Methodist Church was built in 1861 and is still being used on occasions. Some of the earliest settlers, including slaves, are buried in the church's cemetery. Tylertown was originally named Conerly's Community after Cullen Conerly who, along with his brother-in-law Benjamin Lampton, owned a grist mill, a saw mill, and a cotton gin. In 1879 it was renamed Tyler Town for William G. Tyler and in 1894 became Tylertown.

Walthall County was created in 1910 by taking land from Marion County, and from Pike County. If you are looking for your ancestors, you may need to look in the old records of those counties as well. The Mississippi Genealogy and History Network website has marriage and census records available and links to Marion County early census and tax records as well. At least two-thirds of it once belonged to Pike County and the early histories of the two counties are so closely interwoven that they are difficult to separate.
