Harry W. Stewart, Who Left
With Draft Men In December
Among Those On Board

Harry W. Stewart, an Algonac boy, only son of L. D. Stewart, prominent Algonac grocer, is listed with Michigan men known to have been on board the transport Tuscania. Whether or not young Stewart is among those saved or is missing, is not known.

The young man was among the second St. Clair county draft contingent to go to Camp Custer. He left in December but was at Custer only a short time, when he was transferred to Waco, Texas. At Waco he was attached to the sanitary squad of the Thirty-Second division.

As far as is known, he is the second St. Clair county young man on the ill fated ship. The other was Lieutenant Nelson Ballentine of this city, who has since wired his father, A. R. Ballentine of the the Ballentine Dry Goods Company that he is safe.

THUG EMPTIES MEAT MARKET CASH REGISTER

Returns Some Change At
Request Of Manager;
Escapes In Car

An armed thug held up and robbed Donald G. Spencer, manager of the meat market of Smith Brothers store, Military and Griswold streets, and Harry W. Stewart, 1403 Military street, a customer, Saturday night.

When the thug entered the market Spencer was alone. Spencer was commanded to "stick them up" as the thug pointed a revolver at him.

Stewart entered the meat market and noticing Spencer with his hands up inquired what was going on. The thug pointed the gun at Stewart and told him to put up his hands. "Not so high," said the thug as Stewart raised his hands above his head.

Reaching over the counter and keeping both men covered the thug opened the cash drawer and took its contents. Spencer asked the thug if he did not intend to leave any change. "All right," replied the thug. "there's a little change for you," as he threw some silver pieces back into the cash register.

The thug, who was roughly dressed and unshaven, made his escape in an automobile which was parked on Griswold street. About \$70 in cash was taken from the register.

Local Survivor Recalls Tuscania Disaster Of 1917

Twenty-three years ago Wednesday, some 1,900 American and Canadian soldiers, survivors of the liner *Tuscania*, torpedoed and sunk the day before by a German submarine off the north coast of Ireland, landed in towns along the Irish coast.

The U-boat slipped through a cordon of British warships and shot a torpedo into the *Tuscania*, carrying 2,177 enlisted men and officers. The *Tuscania*, 13 days out of New York, and inside a convoy of troop ships, sank in a few minutes.

That day remains a vivid memory for Harry W. Stewart, 1406 Eighth street, the only Port Huron man on the ship. At that time, Stewart, a resident of Algonac, was on his way to France with a company of Thirty-second division men and scattered units from several states.

Stewart was unaccounted for in first press dispatches listing survivors, but he managed to stay afloat in a rough sea long enough to be rescued by a British destroyer.

Stewart today recalled the wild

confusion after the torpedo blasted the liner. He was resting in his bunk below deck awaiting his turn at the mess table at 5:55 p.m., he said. Like others on the ship, he rushed for the rail. Men jumped into the sea, life rafts were thrown overboard and lifeboats were lowered, sometimes dropping on the heads of men swimming. Boats were overturned and ropes, on which the men lowered themselves to the lifeboats or life rafts gave way, plunging men into the icy water, Stewart said.

Straps on some life preservers broke when the men wearing them hit the water after jumping overboard. Some of these men drowned and their bodies floated feet upward, he said.

Oil was poured on the water to quiet the sea, Stewart said, and after the boilers exploded, the floating oil caught fire and the liner sank in a blazing sea, he said.

Stewart reached France after a month of rest and stayed there until the end of the war.

Resident Recalls His Rescue From Transport Torpedoed In World War I

War perils of crossing the Atlantic ocean in the present war served to jolt memories of Harry W. Stewart, 1406 Eighth street, who was one of the 1,900 Canadian and American soldiers, survivors of the liner *Tuscania* which was torpedoed Feb. 5, 1918, by a German submarine during World War I. A 14,000-ton transport, it was the only transport lost in the movement of 2,000,000 American troops to Europe.

Twenty-four years ago today the survivors of the attack landed off the north coast of Ireland, landed in towns along the Irish coast after spending 24 hours in lifeboats.

Some 269 Canadian and American soldiers lost their lives in the attack. The U-boat slipped through a cordon of British warships and shot a torpedo into the *Tuscania*, carrying 2,177 enlisted men and officers. The *Tuscania*, 13 days out of New York and inside of a troop convoy, sank in a few minutes.

Those two days of the attack and landing safely in Ireland will al-

ways be a vivid chain of memories to Stewart, the only Port Huron man on the ship. At that time Stewart, a resident of Algonac, was on his way to France with a company of 32nd Division men and scattered units from several states and Canada.

Because of business, Stewart will not be able to attend the meeting of some 200 survivors of the *Tuscania* who are meeting Feb. 7-8 in Wisconsin Rapids, Wis., to pay homage to their buddies who perished.

Stewart was unaccounted for in first press dispatches listing survivors, but he managed to stay afloat in a rough sea long enough to be rescued by a British destroyer.

The Port Huron survivor recalled the wild confusion after the torpedo blasted the liner. He was resting in his bunk below deck awaiting his turn at the mess table at 5:55 a.m., he said.

Like others on the ship, he rushed for the rail. Men jumped into

the sea, life rafts were thrown overboard and lifeboats were lowered, sometimes dropping on the heads of men swimming. Boats were overturned and ropes on which the men lowered themselves to the lifeboats or life rafts gave way, plunging men into the icy water, Stewart said.

Straps on some life preservers broke when the men wearing them hit the water after jumping overboard. Some of these men drowned and their bodies floated feet upward, he said.

Stewart reached France after a month of rest and remained there until the end of the war.

Survivor Recalls Tuscania Sinking 25 Years Ago

"World War I is beginning to look like a tea party compared to the present war," Harry W. Stewart, 1408 Eighth street, survivor of the transport ship Tuscania, torpedoed Feb. 5, 1918, by a German submarine, said today, 25 years later.

"The methods of war have so improved since World War I that I hate to think what World War III will be", Stewart said. Asked how this present war was affecting him, Stewart, manager of the Thumb Fire Extinguisher service replied that he was working about 16 hours a day checking fire equipment in six counties. "I work and sleep, there isn't time to do anything else", Stewart said.

Stewart, a resident of Algonac at the time of World War I, was one of 2,177 enlisted men and officers enroute to France with a company of 32nd division men and scattered units from United States and Canada. The Tuscania, 13 days out of New York and inside a troop convoy, sank a few minutes after being torpedoed by a German U-boat. It was the only transport lost in the movement of 2,000,000 American troops to Europe.

Stewart stayed afloat in a rough sea until he was picked up by a British destroyer. He was resting in his bunk, awaiting his turn at the mess table at 5:55 a. m., when the attack occurred. He rushed to the rail of the ship, then jumped into the sea. Stewart, who was the only Port Huron man on the ship, reached France after resting a month and remained there until the war ended.

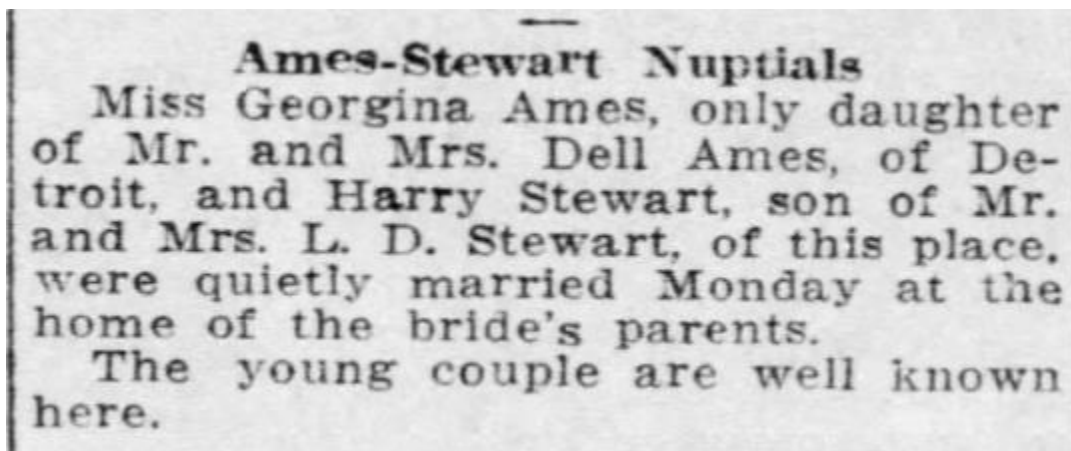

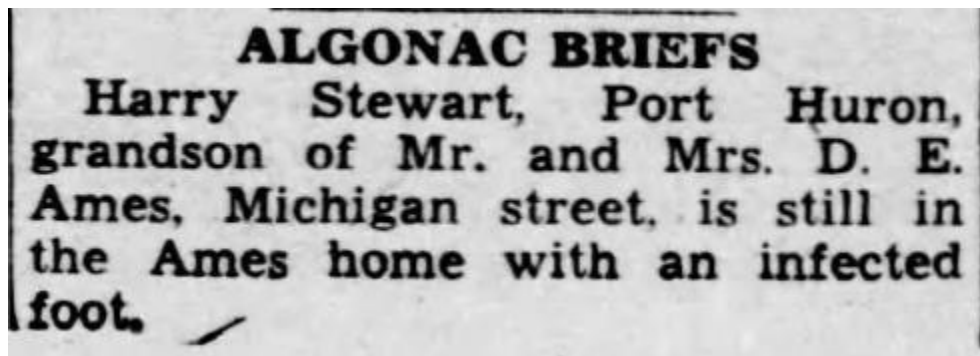
